<p>This week's learning is based on diary entries.</p> <p>Firstly, complete a reading comprehension about Anne Frank. Anne Frank lived during The Second World War. She is arguably the most famous diarist in the world. Her diary has been read by millions of people and is of great historical importance!</p> <p>If you scroll through the Reading Comprehension pdf attached to the class webpage, you will see there are 3 to choose from (from easier to harder). You only need to choose one to do. The last one is the most interesting so be brave if you think you can have a go at this. There are answer sheets provided so you can mark the work yourselves to see how you've achieved!</p> <p>Once you've completed this, I've attached three extracts from Anne Frank's diary for you to read. Being stuck in a small space during WWII is a little like being stuck indoors during lockdown, don't you think?</p> <p>Your grammar task for the week is all about fronted adverbials. These are words or phrases which tell us when, where or how something happened. They are great ways to open paragraphs and sentences. We learnt of 3 different ways we could write them, in our writing based on Star Wars.</p> <p>1. 2 adverbs together: <u>Aggressively and fearlessly</u>, Darth Vader marched towards me.</p>	<p>This week's learning is all about angles. Angles can be described as a turn between two lines and they are measured in degrees.</p> <p>To complete the first 2 White Rose lessons, you will need a protractor. You can buy them very cheaply in supermarkets or small newsagents. You will need one throughout secondary school so buying one is a very good investment. If you have an older brother or sister, they will probably have one!</p> <p>When you're measuring and drawing angles, following the first two White Rose lessons, please be aware you are allowed to be within a two degree margin of accuracy. So, if you measure an angle as 33 degrees but the answer sheet says it is actually 31 degrees, you are still correct as you are within two degrees of the actual answer! Similarly, you'd be correct if you'd said the answer was 29 degrees.</p> <p>The tuition videos for the week are here: www.whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-5/</p> <p>The first lesson is on measuring angles. Make sure you are choosing the correct scale on the protractor to read (there are 2 to choose from) by judging whether the angle is greater than or less than a right angle (90 degrees).</p>	<p>Art</p> <p>Create a family portrait. Choose a family member and use the art activity sheet to guide you in how to draw an accurate sketch of a face. It gives great tips on how to create a realistic drawing! Did you know, for example, that eyes should be placed halfway up the face? I always used to draw mine much higher (which is possibly why my portraits never looked like the person I was drawing!). I cannot wait to see your pictures.</p> <p>Alternatively, if you are sat in front of a mirror, you could even have a go at drawing a self-portrait!</p> <p>Science</p> <p>Grow your own rainbow using the Rainbow Experiment worksheet. All you need are felt tips and kitchen roll. I experimented with toilet paper as well. Can you do the same? I won't reveal what happened!</p> 	<p>Dance</p> <p>Click on the link below to visit Oti's Boogie Beebies again. This week I learnt 'Musical Instrument Jam'. I liked the bass guitar and drum dance phrases the best. With (and a description of emotion / action): <u>With fear in my heart</u>, Darth Vader marched towards me.</p> <p><u>With the ground trembling beneath his feet</u>, Darth Vader marched towards me.</p> <p>3. -ing verb: <u>Glaring evilly</u>, Darth Vader marched towards me.</p> <p>To extend your learning, I've attached a Powerpoint all about fronted adverbials for you to read, as well as a grammar exercise on them to complete.</p> <p>Once you've completed these, have a look at your Fronted Adverbial Word Mat. This will help you in your writing task.</p> <p>For your writing task, I'd love to hear about a day (or more if you want) spent in lockdown. Pick your favourite day to write about, or your most boring day. You could even choose to write about your own theme, such as 'My Funniest Day of Lockdown'. Try to be detailed in your writing.</p> <p>Start with Dear Diary, and write about your chosen day. Remember that diary entries are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Written in the past tense • Written in the 1st person narrative (I / we) <p>Make sure you include lots of fronted adverbials in your writing. Make sure you use a comma after each one. Good ones to use that are not on the mat are:</p> <p>Later on, Around midday, & In the evening,</p> <p>Finally, I've added a spelling word search to complete.</p>	<p>The second lesson looks at drawing angles.</p> <p>There is no need to have a protractor to complete the final two lessons so everybody can have a go at these.</p> <p>The third lesson is all about calculating missing angles along a straight line. You must remember that a straight line is 180 degrees. You must make sure you calculate answers using written methods (addition and subtraction). Do not use a protractor for this lesson.</p> <p>The final lesson is all about calculating missing angles in a circle. You must remember that a circle is 360 degrees. Again, you must make sure that you calculate answers using written methods (addition and subtraction) without using a protractor.</p> <p>If you'd like a further challenge, explore the Active Maths website:</p> <p>http://www.active-maths.co.uk/</p> <p>Play a game on your own or with a partner – there are lots of challenges on the website!</p> <p>Also, keep learning all your times table and division facts by playing Hit The Button:</p> <p>https://www.topmarks.co.uk/maths-games/hit-the-button</p>	<p>DT</p> <p>Design an ice-cream sundae.</p> <p>Below the grid is my one. I call it 'Caramel and Maple Fruit'. It has a portion of pineapple, blueberries and raspberries topped off with caramel ice-cream and maple syrup on top. It contains at least 3 of my portions of fruit a day. I designed it as I don't enjoy fruit but know I have to eat it (and I don't mind it so much with ice-cream on top). I used frozen fruit as it is cheaper (make sure you take it out of the freezer a few hours before eating it to defrost, if you do the same).</p> <p>You don't need to use fruit at all in your creation, though. Add whatever you want: different sauces, sprinkles, sweets and even biscuits if you like!
