Tom wants to make a pancake.

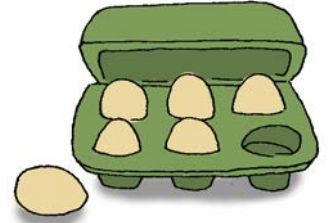
Tom needs his dad to help him.

They make a pancake.

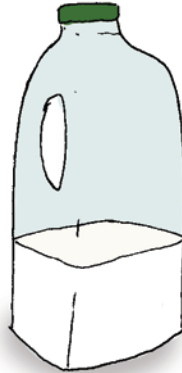
The flour.

Jam.

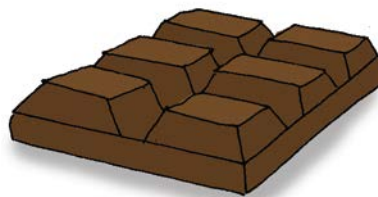
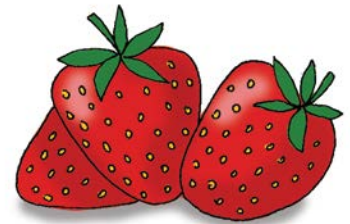
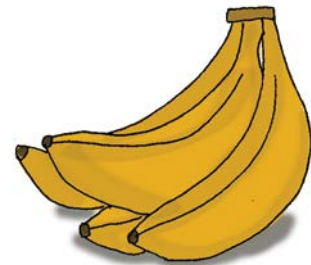
Too many choices!

<p>What is this '!' ?</p> <p><b>Exclamation mark</b></p> <p>Themes and Conventions</p>	<p>Why do you think Tom's dad helps him make the pancakes?</p> <p><b>The pan is hot so Tom needs his dad so that he does not hurt himself.</b></p> <p>Predictions and Inferences</p>	<p>Why has the author used an exclamation mark on this sentence?</p> <p><b>'Yummy!'</b></p> <p><b>To emphasise that the pancakes tasted yummy.</b></p> <p>Themes and Conventions</p>
<p>Why does Tom flip the pancake?</p> <p><b>To cook it on both sides.</b></p> <p>Predictions and Inferences</p>	<p>What did Tom do to make the pancakes?</p> <p><b>He mixed flour, eggs and milk then put them in the frying pan. He flipped it and then it was ready.</b></p> <p>Comprehension</p>	<p>What day is it?</p> <p><b>Pancake Day</b></p> <p>Comprehension</p>
