

PUPIL PREMIUM STRATEGY FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 2019 - 2020



The predicted pupil premium funding for Huntington Primary this year is circa £38,000. This funding is to be used for raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities so that they reach their potential and for supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces.

We will receive £1320 for each pupil in receipt of free school meals (or who has received these in the last six years), £2,300 for each child adopted from care, £2,300 for each looked after child and £300 for each child from a service family.

Summary of the main barriers to educational achievement for eligible pupils

Regular attendance at school.

Developing healthy lifestyles, including access to sports clubs and school residential visits.

Social, emotional and mental health difficulties.

The acquisition of basic literacy and numeracy skills so that they meet the expected standard (or higher) in reading, writing and mathematics.

Key objectives for 2019 -2020

- 1.To continue to ensure that pupils in receipt of pupil premium make the same amount of progress as their peers and where there are gaps in attainment, they make better progress in order to 'catch up' or 'keep up', in particular Y6 pupils need to achieve the expected standard in the KS2 reading test.
2. To continue to ensure that eligible pupils can access all parts of the curriculum offered at Huntington Primary Academy, including visits and clubs.
3. To continue to ensure that pupils maintain good attendance in order to access the extra provision provided for them.
4. To improve the social, emotional and mental health well-being of pupils.

Our pupil premium funding will be used in the following ways:

- 1.To continue to fund increased teacher time to enable pupils to learn in smaller teaching groups or to access small group interventions for English and mathematics.(£27,000)
- 2.To continue to fund extra TA time to support pupils with emotional and learning difficulties or who have difficulties acquiring basic skills. (£7,000)
- 3.To fund pupil attendance at clubs or on visits.(£1,000)
- 4.To continue to fund ELSA time to support pupils' social, emotional and mental health needs (£3,000).
