



Accounting for the spend of the PE and Sports Grant for the period from

APRIL 2018 to MARCH 2019

During this period, the Academy actually received **£15,557** to promote a wide range of high quality sports provision for all pupils. We received £4083 in May 2018 and £11,474 in November 2018. Added to this figure was a further £5 000 carry over from 2018 so the available monies **total** was **£20,557**

We abided by six general principles for the use of this grant:

- To increase engagement in sport from an early age, that is for our youngest pupils.
- To identify and offer additional provision outside normal school hours for target groups of pupils who have not previously attended out of school sports provision.
- To provide a wider range of sporting experiences for those pupils who have already shown that they are skilled and talented in sport.
- To provide additional out of school sports activities across the school (including Y5 and Y6 Residential Visits).
- To promote and provide our pupils with access to competitive sports tournaments in a range of sports.
- To access high quality training for our staff which is focused on providing outstanding PE and sports provision across the school.

The following list shows how Huntington Primary Academy had originally planned to spend the 2018/2019 PE and Sports Grant

- Funding for all Y5 pupils to take part in a sports - based residential visit to a local fee paying school and for a sports coach to attend (£1,000).
- Subsidising fees for the longer sports- based residential visit for some Y6 pupils and for a sports coach to attend (£1,000).
- Funding travel, supply costs and first aider to enable pupils and their families to attend regional sporting events in school time with a sports coach including a (£2,000).
- Funding a 'Super Saturday Sports Club' for EYFS and KS1 pupils (£4,000).
- Funding after schools clubs for alternative sports such as archery (£4,000)
- Funding kit/hoodies etc. for our sports teams (£500).
- Funding vulnerable pupils to attend sports clubs, such as York City FC and 'Total Energy', and taxis to transport these pupils home after clubs (£500).
- Improve playground facilities to promote sports activities in the playground (£7,300)
- Funding extra staffing and training to enable pupils to learn to swim in smaller groups (£800).

How was the PE and sport premium actually spent? MARCH 2019

The money was actually spent on the following sporting activities:

- Food for Y5 pupils attending the sleepover in the academy and payment for a sports coach to attend (£300).
- Subsidising fees for the longer sports- based residential (Robinwood) visit for some Y6 pupils and for a sports coach to attend (£2,500).
- Funding travel, supply costs and first aider to enable pupils and their families to attend regional sporting events in school time with a sports coach (£4,000).
- Funding a 'Super Saturday Sports Club' for EYFS and KS1 pupils (£4,060).
- Funding extra staffing and training to enable pupils to learn to swim in smaller groups (£884).
- Funding time for administrative assistants to carry out admin tasks for tournaments such as organising coaches and for NQT (as she learns about the role of PE subject leader) to attend training/meetings e.g for School Games Award (£2000).
- Funding 1 or 2 sports coaches every lunchtime to lead games activities in the playground (£2,500).
- Funding free extra swimming sessions for Y6 pupils who were not meeting the NC requirements (£1,100).

TOTAL MONIES SPENT amounted to £17,344

The remainder of the monies (£3,213) has been carried forward to fund playground markings to increase active play at break and other times (to be completed autumn 2019)

What was the impact? The spend resulted in the following successes:

-
- Continued extensive and increased participation and success in sports by pupils from the academy in local and regional, national sporting competitions (Please see results from tournaments and competitions)
- Pupils who are talented and skilled in a particular sport have competed in swimming tournaments, football tournaments, dodgeball and athletics competitions.
- Continued opportunities for pupils in Y5 and Y6 to take part in a wide variety of sports or active activities on residential visits. Y5 tackled a challenging assault course whilst Y6 experienced canoeing and scaling the climbing wall at Robinwood.
- KS1 pupils had access to a free active club named 'Super Saturday' thereby increasing the participation in sports activities for our youngest pupils
- High participation in a range of sports -based clubs (as evidenced in club registers).
- All Y4 pupils who took part in the swimming sessions in the autumn term improved their level of competency as swimmers.
- The percentage of pupils meeting the end of KS2 requirements for swimming increased from 58% to 80% as a result of attending extra funded sessions in Y6.
