| <p>Draw the main character from a book you have recently read. How many words can you come up with to describe them? What is their personality like? Does it change through the story?</p> | <p>From a book you have just read, select either an important object or creature and create a user manual or a guide explaining how to care for it.</p> | <p>Place yourself in the shoes of one of the main characters you have read about and write a diary entry of a key moment in the story.</p> | <p>Have a go at drawing a map of one of the places from the text you have just read. See how much detail you can include.</p> |
| <p>Create an imaginary Facebook page for your character with some status updates about what they have been up to. Include some pictures and make sure your status updates are relevant to the character and the story.</p> | <p>Using speech bubbles and pictures of the characters, draw a conversation between two characters from the story you have been reading.</p> | <p>Create an alternative book cover for the story you have just read. Remember to include the name of the author and illustrator.</p> | <p>Choose the most exciting part of the story you have been reading. Write a newspaper report explaining what happened. Remember to include an enticing heading. Remember to answer the 5Ws Who, what, when, where and why.</p> |



Be a comic book creator!
Choose a book you have recently read or use your own imagination. Create a comic book with pictures and captions that will WOW the reader.

Think about the most evil, nasty villain you can from a story you have read. Can you make a wanted poster all about them? Don't forget to include details of their crimes and what the public need to watch out for.



Think about three of the characters from the last story you read. Inside the treasure chest, draw one item that belongs to each character.



Then write one clue about who each character is. Can an adult correctly guess all of their names and which item belongs to them?

Your challenge is to find an adjective for every letter of the alphabet within your reading book.

Think of the last story that you read. Write true or false questions about the plot, characters, the setting or the information you have learnt. Ask an adult or sibling to answer them. Will they get full marks?

There are many synonyms for the word 'said'. Your challenge is to find at least one word that can be used instead of 'said', for each letter of the alphabet.

Draw a picture of an interesting, mysterious or frightening setting from a story that you have read. Imagine you are there and use your senses to describe it.
