


Summer Term - first half term topic is 'Good to be Green'

	<p>These are the two new sounds the children need to learn to recognise, say and read/write in words, then sentences.</p> <p>e.g. pure, sure, cure rubber, burger, hammer, farmer, letter</p> <p>(There are no actions for these sounds)</p>
<p>Monday</p>	<p>Read the story or listen to 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VCpAYajmvo Discuss (and create a picture/writing story board if you like) what happened at the beginning, middle and end of the story.</p>
<p>Tuesday</p>	<p>Can you remember any of the characters from the story? Discuss the characters names and what their roles were in the story. Choose a character and draw and picture of them, labelling the different features (clothes, colours etc).</p>
<p>Wednesday</p>	<p>Create a beanstalk chain, adding on the characters and different features of the story.</p> <div data-bbox="480 996 906 1142" data-label="Image"> </div> <p>What was at the bottom of the beanstalk? What was at the top? Make it as crafty and colourful as you like! If you don't have craft bits, have a go at drawing it!</p>
<p>Thursday</p>	<p>Practice counting forwards and backwards to and from 10. Ask your child to give you '8' things from their play (any number to 10). If you have anything related to the story that you could use that would be brilliant! (Such as animals, dried beans or jelly-beans, leaves etc). If your child is confident counting items to 10, go beyond 10 up to 20, and see which numbers your child finds tricky.</p>
<p>Friday</p> <div data-bbox="100 1491 459 1753" data-label="Image"> </div>	<p>Discuss what plants need to grow. If you have any seeds at home, can you plant something? We would love to see how big your plants can grow!</p> <p>If not; why don't you have a go at re-enacting the story? Be the director, write a 'script' and get your grown-ups involved. Think about what you could use to trade the cow? Have you got any animals? What could be the giant? Can you make a golden egg?</p>
