GDPR Privacy Notice for Pupils and their Families

Who processes your information?

St Day and Carharrack School is the data controller of the personal information you provide to us. This means the school determines the purposes for which, and the manner in which, any personal data relating to pupils and their families is to be processed. The Headteacher acts as a representative for the school with regard to its data controller responsibilities and can be contacted via the school office.

In some cases, your data will be outsourced to a third party processor; however, this will only be done with your consent, unless the law requires the school to share your data. Where the school outsources data to a third party processor, the same data protection standards that St Day and Carharrack School upholds are imposed on the processor.

St Day and Carharrack School will be appointing a data protection officer. Their role is to oversee and monitor the school's data protection procedures, and to ensure they are compliant with the GDPR.

Why do we collect and use your information?

St Day and Carharrack School holds the legal right to collect and use personal data relating to pupils and their families, and we may also receive information regarding them from their previous school, LA and/or the DfE. We collect and use personal data in order to meet legal requirements and legitimate interests set out in the GDPR and UK law, including those in relation to the following:

- Article 6 and Article 9 of the GDPR
- Education Act 1996
- Section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013

In accordance with the above, the personal data of pupils and their families is collected and used for the following reasons:

- To support pupil learning
- To monitor and report on pupil progress
- To monitor pupil attendance
- To provide appropriate pastoral care
- To assess the quality of our service
- To comply with the law regarding data sharing

Which data is collected?

The categories of pupil information that the school collects, holds and shares include the following:

- Personal information – e.g. names, date of birth, pupil numbers and addresses
- Characteristics – e.g. ethnicity, language, nationality, and country of birth
- Attendance information – e.g. number of absences and absence reasons

- Assessment information – e.g. national curriculum assessment results
- Relevant medical information
- Information relating to SEND
- Information relating to Child Protection and Safeguarding
- Information relating to school meal administration and free school meal eligibility
- Behaviour information – e.g. number of temporary exclusions

Whilst the majority of the personal data you provide to the school is mandatory, some is provided on a voluntary basis. When collecting data, the school will inform you whether you are required to provide this data or if your consent is needed. Where consent is required, the school will provide you with specific and explicit information with regards to the reasons the data is being collected and how the data will be used.

How long is your data stored for?

Personal data relating to pupils at St Day and Carharrack School and their families is stored in line with the school's GDPR Data Protection Policy.

In accordance with the GDPR, the school does not store personal data indefinitely; data is only stored for as long as is necessary to complete the task for which it was originally collected.

Will my information be shared?

The school is required to share pupils' data with the DfE on a statutory basis, this includes the following:

- Characteristics – e.g. ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility
- Personal information – e.g. names, pupil numbers and addresses
- Attendance information – .g. number of absences and absence reasons
- Assessment information – e.g. national curriculum assessment results
- Information relating to SEND
- Information relating to Child Protection and Safeguarding
- Behaviour information – e.g. number of temporary exclusions

The National Pupil Database (NPD) is managed by the DfE and contains information about pupils in schools in England. St Day and Carharrack School is required by law to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections, such as the school census; some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The DfE may share information about our pupils from the NDP with third parties who promote the education or wellbeing of children in England by:

- Conducting research or analysis.
- Producing statistics.
- Providing information, advice or guidance.

The DfE has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of any data shared from the NDP is maintained.

St Day and Carharrack School will not share your personal information with any third parties without your consent, unless the law allows us to do so. The school routinely shares pupils' information with:

- Pupils' destinations upon leaving the school
- Our School Improvement Partner
- Our Student Support Officer
- The Local Authority
- The NHS

The information that we share with these parties includes the following:

- Personal information – e.g. names, pupil numbers and addresses
- Characteristics – e.g. ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility
- Attendance information – e.g. number of absences and absence reasons

- Assessment information – e.g. national curriculum assessment results
- Relevant Medical Information
- Information relating to SEND
- Information relating to Child Protection and Safeguarding
- Behaviour information – e.g. number of temporary exclusions

What are your rights?

Parents and pupils have the following rights in relation to the processing of their personal data. You have the right to:

- Be informed about how St Day and Carharrack School uses your personal data.
- Request access to the personal data that St Day and Carharrack School holds.
- Request that your personal data is amended if it is inaccurate or incomplete.
- Request that your personal data is erased where there is no compelling reason for its continued processing.
- Request that the processing of your data is restricted.
- Object to your personal data being processed.

Where the processing of your data is based on your consent, you have the right to withdraw this consent at any time.

If you have a concern about the way St Day and Carharrack School and/or the DfE is collecting or using your personal data, you can raise a concern with the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO). The ICO can be contacted on 0303 123 1113, Monday-Friday 9am-5pm.
