## Pupil Premium Funding 2017-18

In 2017/18 each school received £1,300 for every primary-aged pupil registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years. The school received £1,900 for every looked after child.

For 2017-18 Manor Park Primary received a final amount of £185,464 – this consisted of £172,920 plus £11,400 for post LAC pupils and £1,144.80 Early Years PP (nursery children).
