At KS1 the children have two PE lessons a week of 45 minutes each and also have a daily afternoon play of 15 minutes when they use the outdoor climbing area and play equipment.	Quality PE lessons are taught to children in groups of 14-16 by qualified PE teachers and a sports coach.  Review small play equipment and update as necessary.	£858 per term for sports coach, total= £2,574 Cost of teacher for one term=£1200  £200	The sports coach helps deliver the KS2 rolling programme for the year teaching: football, hockey, basketball, tennis and batting and fielding.
