## Key Vocabulary

artefact	an artefact is any object discarded or lost by a previous human culture, and later recovered by some archaeological endeavour
chalk board	a dark-coloured board that you can write on with chalk
dip pen	a pen with ink inside that is fed as needed to the writing point
greengrocer	a person who works in or owns a store that sells fresh vegetables and fruit
rationing	Rationing is used for consumables, which are items that cannot be used forever such as food, gasoline, water, rubber, and cloth. The idea of rationing is to make the number of consumable items available last as long as possible.
rote	the act of repeating over and over often without attention to meaning
