

Using the Pupil Premium and Pupil Premium Plus (PP)

The Staff at Sampford Peverell C of E Primary School are committed to ensuring **all** children achieve their potential.

We are all aware of the research showing disadvantaged children often fall behind their peers, achieving lower grades throughout their education. This is known as an “attainment gap” and the purpose of the PP is to “narrow the gap”. As a result of the evidence, the government introduced the Pupil Premium (PP) in April 2011. Pupil Premium is paid directly to schools.

Who is eligible for the Pupil Premium?

Ever 6 FSM

The pupil premium for 2019 to 2020 will include pupils recorded in the January 2019 school census who are known to have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) since May 2012, as well as those first known to be eligible at January 2019.

Children adopted from care or who have left care

The pupil premium for 2019 to 2020 will include pupils recorded in the January 2019 school census and alternative provision census who were looked after by an English or Welsh local authority immediately before being adopted, or who left local authority care on a special guardianship order or child arrangements order (previously known as a residence order). These are collectively referred to as post-LAC in these conditions of grant.

Ever 6 service child

For the purposes of these grant conditions, ever 6 service child means a pupil recorded in the January 2019 school census who was eligible for the service child premium since the January 2012 census as well as those recorded as a service child for the first time on the January 2019 school census.



Rates for eligible pupils

Interventions for Reading Writing, Maths and Personal, Social and Emotional Development will run across the academic year.

Interventions will include:

- Maths and literacy targeted interventions in all year groups
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Reading and Phonics interventions for KS1 and KS2 children
- Speech and Language interventions
- Forest School intervention KS1

To engage and experience a range of enrichment activities:

- Places on school residential and enrichment events
- Opportunity to attend afterschool sports clubs
- Personal support budgets to facilitate attendance at school visits and events

Assist with the purchase of the school uniform where necessary.

Invited to attend breakfast club every morning, for a healthy and calm start to the morning.

Pre-teaching by the class teacher for maths and English:

- Class teachers to pre- teach children, to ensure they understand key principles before a lesson is taught, maximising learning in lesson.

Teaching Assistants will need to be working with the rest of the class when pre-teaching occurs.

Purchase and training of a new interactive guided reading resource:

- Class teachers will have access to a greater quality range of guided reading material that captures the children's imagination, maximising progress and creating a love of reading. Guided reading material will be cross curricular, promoting links between subjects.
