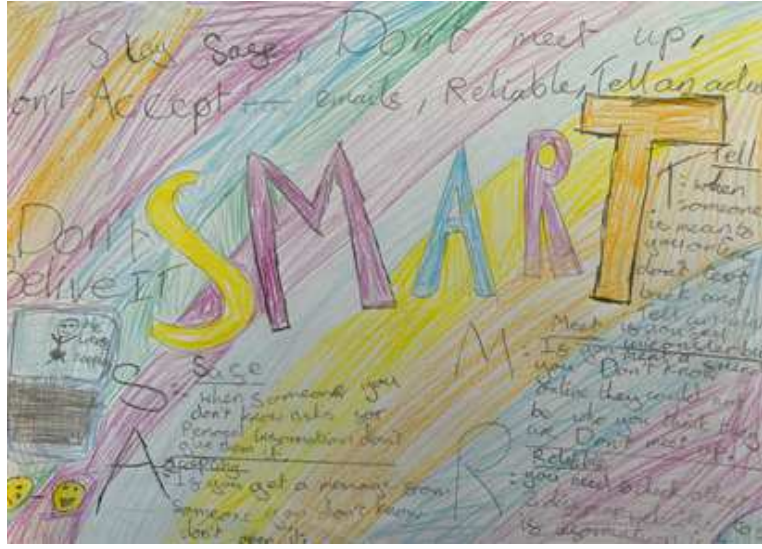
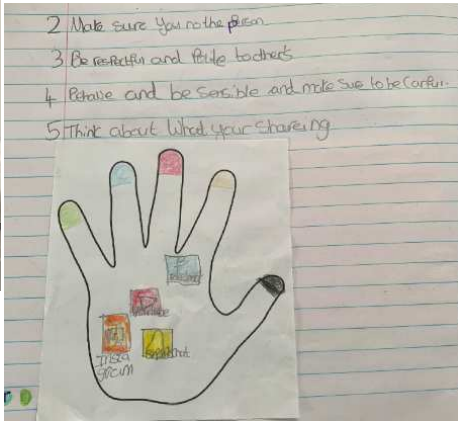
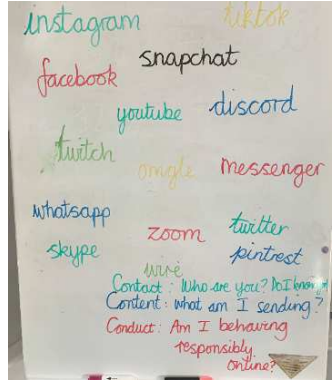

Year 4 Online Relationships

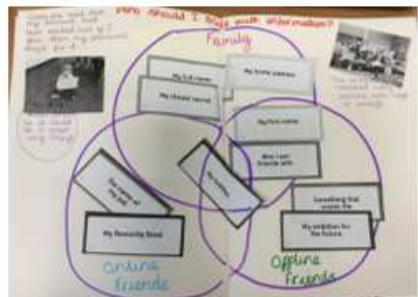
I can understand online relationships.
