Charlestown Class

Year 3 have been learning the story of The Mousehole Cat through storytelling with the aid of actions and a story map. A copy will be sent home in book bags for children to continue to practise over the weekend. From the story, they have written some beautifully descriptive diary entries and have questioned the main characters through role play and 'hot seating'

In maths, children are continuing to build upon their fraction knowledge and are comparing fractions by judging whether statements are true or false. For example, one third is bigger than one sixth.

In art, we have been working from photographs of mackerel- looking at the shape, tone and pattern on the fish to then create our own sketches. Please look on Twitter for photographs!



Whipsiderry Class

What a fantastic week this week! We've had great fun learning our class story 'Dangled' and I have been so impressed with all of the children's enthusiasm towards learning the story off by heart. Next week, we will continue to learn the story and use this to inspire our own writing. In maths, we will be learning about money and will be using our knowledge of decimals to support the learning of pounds and pence.

Porthcurnow Class

We have had a great week, learning Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone by heart (a copy of which will be coming home for the children to continue learning), the children have written character descriptions for Harry, some very convincing letters of complaint to Albus Dumbledore, diary entries and potion recipes. Next week we will be looking at the grammar and punctuation within the story.

In maths we have been adding and subtracting decimals within 1 and looking at compliment to 1. Next week we will be adding and subtracting across one whole and multiplying decimals by multiples of 10.

We have had a great week looking at Aztec Gods, designing and making our own God masks. Our caterpillars have arrived and we have been busy sowing seeds and planting our butterfly garden. Next week we will be learning about the Aztec number system and life cycles of mammals.

Pentewan Class

In English this week, Year 6 have been innovating on the 'Sea Fever' poem by John Masefield and writing their own poems throughout the week. In maths, we have been exploring algebra, including balancing equations. In our topic work, we have been exploring the global positioning system (GPS) and used 'trilateration' to understand how satellites are used to plot position. Next week will be a full week of revision in preparation for the National KS2 Assessment week (SATs) beginning on the 13th May. Remember, children are invited to come into school from 8am Monday to Thursday of SATs week for breakfast and to prepare for the tests with their friends. Please continue to support your children's preparation by using the study guides provided.

What attendance is Good attendance?

It is vital that pupils attend school, on time, every day in order to gain the greatest benefit from their education. **95%** - 100% (less than 10 days absence in a year) is good attendance. **96%** is the national average attendance rate for a child at primary school.

Why is Good attendance Important?

The **attendance** rate is **important** because pupils are more likely to succeed academically when they attend **school** consistently. It's difficult for the teacher and the class to build their skills and progress if a pupils are frequently absent.

What might be the impact of poor attendance?

Struggle to keep up with **school** work. ... Setting good **attendance** habits from an early age, from nursery through **primary school** will also help your child later on in their life where punctuality is a vital expectation of working life..
