Class News

Menabilly Class

Reception have been working hard this week. In maths we have been investigating 'solid' 3D shapes and 'flat' 2D shapes and using mathematical terms to describe them in our shape shop.

Next week we will be doing some assessment to check our learning so far.

Thanks to all parents who are reading at home- we've gone from around 15 children up to 24 who are reading 4x a week. This is fantastic and will really support each child's learning journey

Charlestown Class

Another productive week in Year 3! The children have been using a video clip about a mysterious creature to write their own forest settings and non-chronological reports. They have written some beautiful descriptions which they can't wait to share with you during our upcoming Open Afternoon!

Next week they will build upon this to include more description, verbs, adverbs and preposition phrases in their writing

In maths we will begin to interpret various charts and graphs.

We will begin visiting our school library weekly to borrow books and will also be pairing with Year 1 children to read to one another from next week. Please continue to encourage your child to read to an adult at least 4 times per week and

record this in their reading record.

Whipsiderry Class

Next week is set to be a great week. We will be continuing our learning about decimals in maths lessons. In English we will be focusing on report writing. On Wednesday, we will be visiting the Farm and Country day to find out all about agriculture in our county. Please remember that PE kit should be in school all week and children should have their reading record book in school every day. Thank you for your continued support

Porthcurnow Class

What a busy week we have had, we have been practicing how to sit a test, strategies to stay calm, read the questions carefully, have a go and don't give up. Some of the children have pleasantly surprised themselves with how well they've done which is great to see. Great perseverance.

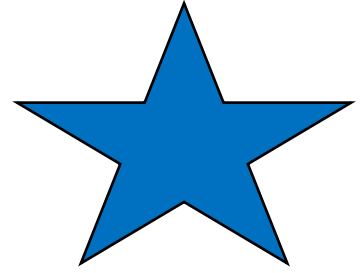
We have started to look at poetry in English this week, the class have all impressed with their great use of figurative language. They have been able to identify metaphors, similes and personification and use these techniques in their own writing. We will continue to immerse ourselves in WW2 poetry and writing our own.

Pentewan Class

This week, Year 6 enjoyed an incredible visit from Rich Parker, a professional inline skater and X Games medallist. He led a superb circuit training session and delivered an inspirational presentation which included him jumping over three teachers on his skates! All the year sixes took the opportunity to meet him and have their topic books signed by him. Throughout the rest of the week, we have continued our maths and grammar revision ahead of the SATs which are steadily drawing closer (the week beginning 13th May). We have implemented a couple of changes to reading and from next week, we will be reading to children in Reception class on Tuesday afternoons, reading with children from year 4 on Wednesday afternoons and listening to children read from year 1 on a Thursday afternoon. In addition to this, we will continue our daily guided reading sessions alongside increased opportunities to read for pleasure and read 1:1 with an adult. Children should have their reading records in school every day. PE kits should also be in school every day but especially for our PE session on Wednesday afternoons, which this term is cross country running.

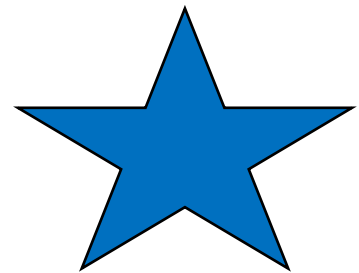
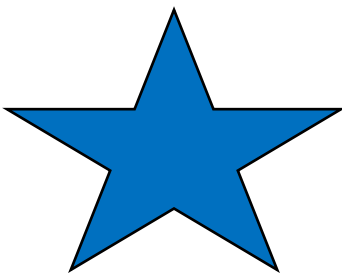


Treverbyn Academy Open Afternoon

What attendance is Good attendance?

It is vital that pupils attend school, on time, every day in order to gain the greatest benefit from their education. **95%** - 100% (less than 10 days absence in a year) is good attendance. **96%** is the national average attendance rate for a child at primary school.

Why is Good attendance Important?

The **attendance** rate is **important** because pupils are more likely to succeed academically when they attend **school** consistently. It's difficult for the teacher and the class to build their skills and progress if a pupils are frequently absent.

What might be the impact of poor attendance?

Struggle to keep up with **school** work. ... Setting good **attendance** habits from an early age, from nursery through **primary school** will also help your child later on in their life where punctuality is a vital expectation of working life..
