

<p>Noun</p>	<p>It names things...</p>
<p>Verb</p>	<p>It tells us what happens, a doing word.</p>
<p>Subordinate Clause</p>	<p>A group of words with a subject and a verb which cannot stand alone.</p> <p><i>While it was too windy</i>, we couldn't fly our kites.</p>
<p>Non-finite Clause</p>	<p>Subordinate clauses beginning with an -ing or -ed word.</p> <p><i>Leaping from the balcony</i>, the zebra galloped off.</p> <p><i>Tired from working so hard</i>, Class 6 fell asleep.</p>
<p>Relative Clause</p>	<p>These add extra information to a sentence by defining a noun - which, who, whom, that, whose.</p> <p>The woman, <i>who lives next door</i>, works in a bank.</p>
<p>Adjective</p>	<p>Gives detail about the noun.</p> <p>E.g. The wooden table.</p>

<p>Pronoun</p>	<p>I , me, you, he, him, she, her, we, us, they, them, it, mine, yours, his, hers, ours, theirs, its</p>
<p>Contraction</p>	<p>A shortened word. I'm, won't, shouldn't, can't...</p>
<p>Phrase</p>	<p>A small group of words that adds meaning to a word. It is not a sentence as it is not a complete idea.</p>
<p>Simple Sentence</p>	<p>It has one clause - noun/noun phrase/pronoun + verb/verb chain. I am running.</p>
<p>Compound Sentence</p>	<p>It has clauses of equal weight linked by and, but, or so. It is sunny and I am happy.</p>
<p>Complex Sentence</p>	<p>It has two or more clauses linked. One clause is dependent on the other, giving a main & subordinate clause.</p>

<p style="text-align: center;">Clause</p>	<p>A noun or noun phrase and a verb or a verb chain stuck together.</p> <p>The goldfish was jumping.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Connective</p>	<p>Link ideas.</p> <p>moreover, however, eventually, at last, and, so until...</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Preposition</p>	<p>At, over, by, with...usually followed by a noun phrase.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Article</p>	<p>The words a, an or the, placed before a noun.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Adverb / Adverbial Phrase</p>	<p>The roving reporter of the sentence.</p> <p>It tells us how, where, when, how often.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Question / Statement / Command</p>	<p>When does the cinema close? = <u>Question</u></p> <p>The film started on time. = <u>Statement</u></p> <p>Switch it off. = <u>Command</u></p>

<p>Exclamation Mark</p>	<p>In the grammar test, only begin an exclamation sentence with What or How...</p>
<p>Determiners</p>	<p>Usually come with a noun or noun phrase...</p> <p>Two apple trees screened the open windows on one side.</p>
<p>Expanded Noun Phrase</p>	<p>Can they be replaced by a pronoun?</p>
<p>Conjunction</p>	<p>Joins two clauses...</p> <p>Ali locked the door before he left.</p>
<p>Co-ordinating Conjunctions</p>	<p>and...but...so</p> <p>It's getting late and I'm tired.</p>
<p>Subordinating Conjunctions</p>	<p>because, although, until, when, where, unless, while, before, if...</p> <p>Bert cried because the phone was stuck to his ear.</p>

<p>Present Perfect</p>	<p>Formed with the present tense form of 'to have' plus the past participle of the verb...</p> <p>She has gone to lunch. I have played football today.</p>
<p>Active Sentence</p>	<p>The subject does the action...</p> <p>The dog ate the chew.</p>
<p>Passive Sentence</p>	<p>The subject has the action done to it...</p> <p>The chew was eaten by the dog.</p>
<p>Past Perfect</p>	<p>Formed with the past tense form of 'to have' plus the past participle of the verb...</p> <p>She had played for the team before.</p>
<p>Subjunctive</p>	<p>Use were after: if, as if, wish, suppose</p>
<p>Conditionals</p>	<p>Could, would, should</p>

Comparative Adjectives	Used to compare things...
Generalisers	These add a personal voice to the piece of writing or simply generalise about a statement...
Superlative Adjectives	Used to compare nouns...tall, taller, tallest.
Suffixes	Appear after the root word~forgetful, government
Fronted Adverbials	Words or phrases at the beginning of the sentence...
Subject	The subject of the sentence is who it doing the doing...

Object	The object of the sentence is having the action done to it..
Synonyms	A word or phrase that means something similar to another word or phrase..
Antonyms	A word or phrase that means something opposite to another word or phrase..
Modal Verbs	An adverb that expresses likelihood..
Past / Present Progressive	The verb 'to be' plus an 'ing' ending.
Prefixes	Prefixes appear before the root word~impossible, unable
