

# Pupil Premium Report

## PUPIL PREMIUM REPORT AUTUMN 2014

You may have heard about the pupil premium in the news; if you are a member of the armed forces you have probably heard about it through MOD channels.

The government decided to deliver funding straight to schools for certain groups of eligible children; the main purpose was to target disadvantaged and vulnerable children with those eligible for free school meals and those looked after by the state the main priority. Children of service families were added to the list through concerns raised about the potential impact of regular school moves and issues around deployment.

In 2013-14 Children who are 'Looked after' or entitled to free school meals attracted £900 of funding to the school; for children of service families the amount was £300.

### **Why has it been introduced?**

- The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their wealthier peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.
- In most cases the Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for individual pupils.
- Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit. However they will be held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income or forces families and to publish online information about how they have used the Premium.
