Year 3 Mathematics Curriculum Overview

Number and Place Value	Addition and Subtraction	Multiplication and Division	Fractions, Decimals, Percentages and Ratio
<p>I can count from 0 in multiples of 4, 8, 50 and 100 (KP1)</p> <p>I can find 10 or 100 more or less than a given number</p> <p>I know that 10 tens are equivalent to 100 and that 100 is ten times the size of ten. I can work out how many tens there are in three digit multiples of ten. (KP2)</p> <p>I can recognise the place value of each digit in a three-digit number (KP3)</p> <p>I can compose and decompose three digit numbers using standard and non-standard partitioning (KP4)</p> <p>I can compare and order numbers up to 1000 (KP5)</p> <p>I can identify, represent and estimate numbers using different representations</p> <p>I can read and write numbers up to 1000 in numerals and in words</p> <p>I can solve number problems and practical problems involving these ideas.</p>	<p>I can calculate complements to 100 (KP6)</p> <p>I can add and subtract mentally a three-digit number and ones</p> <p>I can add and subtract mentally a three-digit number and tens</p> <p>I can add and subtract mentally a three-digit number and hundreds</p> <p>I can add and subtract numbers with up to three digits, using formal written methods of columnar addition and subtraction (KP7)</p> <p>I understand the inverse relationship between addition and subtraction (KP8)</p> <p>I can estimate the answer to a calculation and use inverse operations to check answers</p> <p>I can solve problems, including missing number problems, using number facts, place value, and more complex addition and subtraction.</p>	<p>I can divide 100 into 2,4,5 and 10 equal parts. (KP9)</p> <p>I can recall and use multiplication and division facts for the 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 10 multiplication tables (KP10)</p> <p>I can write and calculate mathematical statements for multiplication and division using the multiplication tables that I know, including for two-digit numbers times one-digit numbers, using mental and progressing to formal written methods (KP11)</p> <p>I can solve problems, including missing number problems, involving multiplication and division, including positive integer scaling problems and correspondence problems in which n objects are connected to m objects. (KP12)</p> <p>I can count up and down in tenths</p> <p>I can recognise that tenths arise from dividing an object into 10 equal parts (KP13)</p> <p>I can divide a one digit number or quantity by 10 (KP14)</p>	<p>I can recognise, find and write fractions of a discrete set of objects: unit fractions and non-unit fractions with small denominators (KP15)</p> <p>I can recognise and use fractions as numbers: unit fractions and non-unit fractions with small denominators (KP16)</p> <p>I can add and subtract two fractions with the same denominator (KP17)</p> <p>I can compare and order unit fractions and fractions with the same denominator (KP18)</p> <p>I can solve problems that involve all of the above.</p>

Measurement	Shapes- Geometry	Statistics
<p>I can measure, compare, add and subtract: lengths (m/cm/mm); mass (kg/g); volume/capacity (l/ml)</p> <p>I can measure the perimeter of simple 2-D shapes</p> <p>I can add and subtract amounts of money to give change, using both £ and p in practical contexts (KP19)</p> <p>I can tell and write the time from an analogue clock, including using Roman numerals from I to XII, and 12-hour and 24-hour clocks (KP20)</p> <p>I can estimate and read time with increasing accuracy to the nearest minute;</p> <p>I can record and compare time in terms of seconds, minutes and hours; (KP21)</p> <p>I can use vocabulary such as o'clock, a.m./p.m., morning, afternoon, noon and midnight</p> <p>I know the number of seconds in a minute and the number of days in each month, year and leap year (KP22)</p> <p>I can compare durations of events [for example to calculate the time taken by particular events or tasks].</p>	<p>I can draw 2D shapes</p> <p>I can make 3D shapes using modelling materials</p> <p>I can recognise 3D shapes in different orientations and describe them</p> <p>I can recognise angles as a property of shape or a description of a turn (KP23)</p> <p>I can identify right angles, recognise that two right angles make a half-turn, three make three quarters of a turn and four a complete turn;</p> <p>I can identify whether angles are greater than or less than a right angle</p> <p>I can identify horizontal and vertical lines and pairs of perpendicular and parallel lines. (KP24)</p>	<p>I can interpret and present data using bar charts, pictograms and tables (KP25)</p> <p>I can solve one-step and two-step questions [for example, 'How many more?' and 'How many fewer?'] using information presented in scaled bar charts and pictograms and tables.</p>
