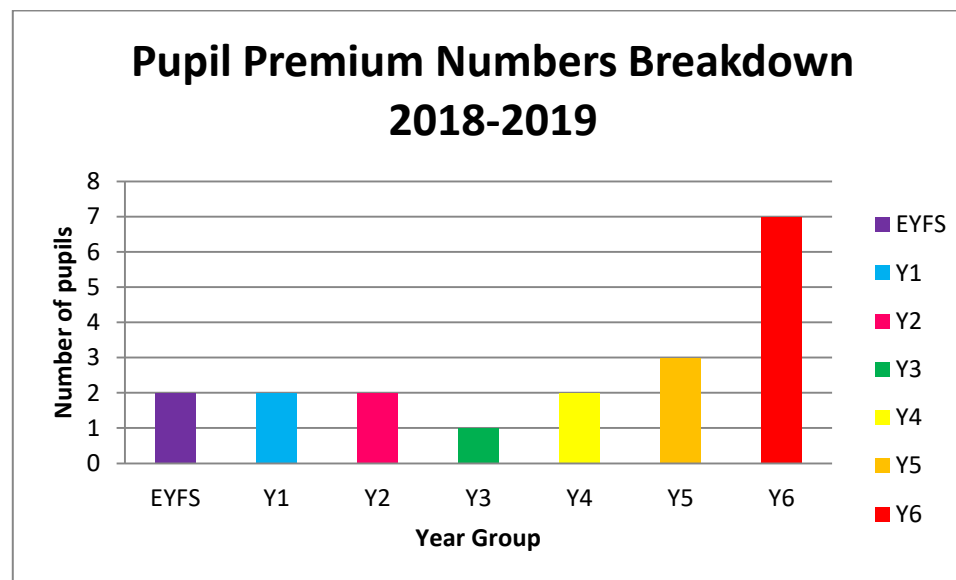

Autumn Term 2018	End of Autumn 2018 data shows the following:				<p><u>Reading</u> Differentiated, targeted guided reading groups are impacting on the pupil premium children's progress and outcomes. Reading speed is impacting on those children not yet at the expected standard. This is to be addressed with the introduction of Reading Plus in the Spring Term.</p> <p>Focused interventions in phonics is beginning to impact on the children's reading.</p> <p><u>Writing</u> Moderation shows that the focus for the children's writing is very much linked to their Communication and Language skills: the vocabulary they use in spoken language or their grammatical sentence structures.</p> <p>Leading practitioner support to focus on accelerating progress in writing in the Spring term by looking at planning for vocabulary development, planning for writing and oral rehearsal. Leading practitioners to also support Newly Qualified Teachers (NQTs) in planning for writing.</p> <p><u>Maths</u> There needs to be a greater focus on acceleration of progress in maths. Question Level Analysis (QLA) indicates that focused direct teaching and acquisition of arithmetic would impact on outcomes for children.</p> <p>Prior learning groups include pupil premium children who have been targeted to accelerate progress.</p> <p>Some children typically struggle with the transition from one class in the summer term to another one in the autumn term. Although some PP children did not achieve EXS in reading, they did make progress in terms of their standardised scores.

The children achieving 99 in reading did not attend reading prior learning as the focus was on maths. This may have impacted on their combined outcomes.

Writing

Targeted support through prior learning and in class writing support/planning resulted in improved outcomes in writing. A change in text types has also impacted on outcomes in some cases.

All pupils made expected progress in writing and many better than expected progress. Targeted support for Year 6 pupils resulted in all except one of the seven children achieving EXS in writing and two PP children achieving GDS (there were only three children achieved GDS in writing)

Maths

Progress is generally good but the children are not making accelerated progress in Maths like they are in English. Focus needs to be on those PP children who are currently EXS and need to be targeted for GDS.

Autumn Term 2018	<p>SENDCo has had Theraplay training in the Autumn term and is ready to work with children in the spring term. Parental consent has been obtained and so impact should be seen at the end of the spring term.</p> <p>Staff have been trained in LEGO therapy and children identified for the after school club. Discussions with the teaching assistants and teachers show that this is having an impact on the pupils targeted.</p> <p>Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaires (SDQs) show a decrease in the overall stress levels of the pupils targeted for LEGO therapy.</p> <p>The impact of the children receiving the Trauma Informed therapy will be seen in the spring term but teachers and teaching assistants have identified a reduction in barriers to learning and an increase in quality peer relationships.</p> <p><u>Prior Learning</u> Prior learning has been a success in the Autumn term. All pupils in the maths and reading groups have made progress in terms of their scaled scores in comparison to their baseline scores.
