

Message from Mr Tucker





Dear Parents/Carers,

Several parents have asked where I was on Wednesday morning when the most almighty torrential rain pounded down on us. Believe me, it truly hurt having to stay inside while so many of you turned up

looking like drowned rats. The problem was, Beth made me do a... thing. A very important 'thing' and just would not let me out. I begged and pleaded but the woman was not for turning. Normal service shall be resumed on Monday. (Probably. If it is warm and dry).

Reception have been reading information texts this week, looking at the animals which inhabit the Arctic and Antarctic polar regions. As Christopher informed me, 'Polar bears don't eat penguins because polar bears are at the top and penguins are at the bottom'. Quite right, my good sir. As often happens, things started to spiral at this point, with Narwhals becoming the hot topic of conversation. A metre stick was used to find out just how long one of their 'tusks' are (up to 4 metres, by the way) and they have now decided that they would like to make a life-sized version out of toilet rolls and paper, to be suspended from the ceiling for ever more. The whole school is watching Mrs H, it had better be good!

Year 1/2 have been having a go at something a little different this week. Armed with some of the biggest pinecones you have ever seen, half a ton of bird seed and a vat of lard, Fin's mum has been working on creating bird feeders for every member of the class. The children had great fun mixing up the ingredients (when I say 'mixing', I really mean 'wearing') and then trying to spoon them into the gaps between the cones' fronds, which is distinctly trickier than it looks. Right, it is 2:45 on Thursday afternoon and I have just been into Miss Madge's class to see what they have been learning about this week. If I am honest, I was not expecting to be confronted with, 'The digestive system.' This topic, coupled with Year 3/4: I was decidedly edgy; one might even say 'nervous' about the nature of the information they were about to impart to me. Well, fair dooz, they were incredibly eloquent and had a far more intricate knowledge of the digestive tract than myself. All of this background information was in preparation for them to be able to have the understanding to support their Big Write explanation. It will allow them to concentrate on crafting an effective piece rather than having to think about the factual information required and how to make it sound appropriate. On the other hand, I live in mortal dread of being asked a question, any question, as the chances of me being able to answer it are slim. Decidedly slim. I was genuinely impressed with the way they were managing to calculate some really challenging problems; problems that I would not ever have looked at until I was in secondary school. Just so you have a point of reference, here is one of the problems that the whole class had to tackle. Although the maths was pretty easy, working out what was required of them was another matter. (*Obviously* I know the answer, but if you would like to check how you have got on, it is probably best to contact Mr Khanna. You know, as it is his question and all. Don't want to step on his toes. Protocol and all that).

All the children in Class 6 vote to pick a class captain. The choice is Holly, Dev or Joe. Dev gets 10% of the votes, Joe gets twice as many as votes as Holly. What % of votes does the winner get?

Next Friday we are having an 'Orange day', where the children are invited to come wearing something orange to school. Anything goes, from jumpers to scarves to ribbons. This is in support of a local boy who has sadly been diagnosed with having muscular dystrophy. Many of the schools in our areas are joining together to raise money for research into this illness and we would very much appreciate any donations you can spare. If you do not have anything orange, please do not worry, it is not a problem. Just come in your normal school uniform and you are very welcome to still bring in £1.00, if you would like. To be honest, all donations will be very gratefully received. There is an article on the front of the North Somerset Times this week which may be of interest.
