

<p>Revision: Alternative pronunciations of 'i' Sort the long i and short i words into two piles (see resources on school website) or sort words on the PPT slide.</p> <p>New learning: To use the suffix 'ed'. Using PPT slides, go through the rules with your child. Can they explain the rules to you? Can they think any extra words for each rule?</p> <p>1. Activity – Sorting table See printable resources on school website. Change the base word, so that you change it from the present tense to the past tense. Sort the correctly changed words into the sorting table or write them into the table.</p> <p>2. Activity – Edit the text See printable resources on school website or slide 5 on this week's PPT. Change the verbs from the present tense to the past tense. This can be completed on the computer, changing the text electronically or printing the page and using a pencil to do the edits.</p>	<p>Revision: Compound words Click on Evergreen Ena to play a compound word game: https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/zd63xyc/articles/zncgvk7</p> <p>Applying learning: To use the suffix 'ed' Can your child remember the three rules from yesterday on changing verbs from the present to the past tense? Recap on these if needed.</p> <p>Activity – Game Have displayed around the room, the three headings for the different pronunciations of 'ed' (see resources): Filled (d), Chopped (t), Needed (id)</p> <p>Children to write this list of words (Challenge: Parent to say the word and child to write it)</p> <p>Words: wanted, liked, roasted, looked, pulled, smiled, stopped, panted, scraped, kicked, barked, sorted, exploded, played, asked, carried, hiked, baked.</p> <p>Child to pick a word, read it aloud and then run/skip/ walk to the heading that matches the pronunciation, e.g. wanted – id, liked –d, stopped – t.</p> <p>Discuss any tricky ones together.</p>	<p>Revision: Alternate spellings for the sounds 'oi' Can the children tell you and write on scrap paper the two ways to write the oi (as in foil) phoneme? Look at the Best Guess poster for oi (link here or from resources) Which is the best guess for the start of the word? At the end of a word? https://new.phonicsplay.co.uk/teachers/printable-resources/phase-5/oi-printables</p> <p>New learning: Irregular verbs in the past tense</p> <p>Look through the Twinkl PPT irregular past tense verbs reveal the picture. Can your child work out what the past tense of each verb would be? Click on the picture to reveal the answer.</p> <p>Activity – Irregular past tense verbs jigsaw puzzle. 1. See printable resources. Cut jigsaw pieces out and play a matching game, matching the irregular present and past tense verbs. Alternatively, make your own jigsaw pieces/ matching cards.</p>  <p>Challenge: Can you think of three more irregular words? Make your own jigsaw puzzle pieces for these.</p>	<p>Revision: Common Exception Words What mnemonics/ patterns/ rhymes can the children think of to spell the following common exception words: busy, half, parents, clothes, eye, people...and any others you'd like to practise? A mnemonics folder with ideas has been created under 'Home Learning', 'Wonder Zone' on the school website.</p> <p>Applying learning: Irregular verbs in the past tense</p> <p>Look at this week's PPT slide, slide 6. Read the text. Can you spot the irregular past tense verbs?</p> <p>Activity – Question and answer cards 1. See printable resources (Irregular verbs past tense question and answer cards). Look through the cards to get some ideas, then make your own irregular past tense question and answer cards.</p>  <p>Can you include these irregular past tense verbs? caught, taught, bought, thought, knew, drew, began</p>	<p>Revision: Common Exception Words Ask your child to tell you how to play 'Can we cross the Golden River?' "You can only cross the Golden River if you can spell the word after." Repeat with the following words: again, any, asked, are, said, was, were.</p> <p>Applying learning: Irregular verbs in the past tense</p> <p>Play irregular past tense verbs jigsaw game and/ or question and answer cards to refresh memory on irregular verbs in the past tense.</p> <p>Activity – Irregular past tense verb endings worksheet 1. Children to complete one or two of the irregular past tense verb endings sheets. It seems that the PDF document is able to be completed electronically or print it and handwrite the answers.</p>
