Pupil Premium 2016-17

Overview

The Pupil Premium is designed to ensure that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. The funding is allocated to Local Authorities and then to schools with pupils from Reception to Y11 who:

- are currently eligible for Free School Meals (**FSM**)
- have been eligible for FSM at any point in the previous six years (even if they are not currently eligible) known as **Ever 6**
- are Looked After Children (**LAC**) who are in care, fostered or adopted. Known as Pupil Premium Plus
- have parents currently in the **Armed Forces**.

In the 2016-17 financial year the national funding is

- £1320 for Free School Meals
- £300 for Armed Services
- £1900 for Looked After Children (Pupil Premium Plus) This is held centrally by the Cambridgeshire Virtual Head. Schools receive £600 per eligible child per term. £100 is held centrally to provide training & support.

It is important to note that the funding is for each **financial** year and this bridges over two Academic Years. The 2016 budget will pay for five months (5/12) of the 2015-16 academic year and seven months (7/12) of the 2016-17 Academic school year.

Some children who are entitled to the Pupil Premium achieve well at school, attain highly and make good progress. However nationally many do not and the reasons for this are complex. There is often a link between a pupil's poor attainment and the family's income; parents' previous experience of school or higher education and their qualifications and aspirations. Here the Pupil Premium money can have an impact.

However some pupils entitled to the Pupil Premium may also have Special Educational Needs or Disability (SEND) or Social, Emotional or Behavioural Needs (SEBD) which need addressing. The pupil premium can only go some way to support these pupils and the school will provide and access further resources to meet their Special Educational Needs.

Our aim is to use this funding to narrow the disadvantage gap by addressing the inequalities and raising the attainment of those students in low income families. It is evident that the longer a pupil is at Burwell, is settled and receives good quality teaching, support and intervention the greater the impact. For these pupils our evidence shows that they make good progress and narrow the gap with their peers. For those pupils who join the school, particularly later in Key Stage 2, the time and opportunities for significant impact on attainment and progress is lessened.

As an outcome of our actions, listed below, we set out to ensure that every students, however financially disadvantaged, was able to:

- Improve their levels of attainment and make good progress, relative to school averages
- Have full access to our curriculum
- Access our extra-curricular provision

Total amount allocated to the school for the current financial year 2016 – 17 (to March 2017)

The **anticipated** budget (March 2016) of **£82,580** for 2016-17 was based upon predicted numbers below.

This means 13 % of the school qualify. (Nationally there are 26% entitled to FSM)

5/12 (£34,411) of this sum went to support the provision in the previous academic year 2015-16 (April to August)

7/12 (£48,171) of this sum will support the provision in this academic year 2016-17 (September to March)

Note: the actual number during and at the end of the academic the year will rise and fall with the arrival & departure of pupils.

Planning for Academic Year 2016-17

As of **September 2016** there are currently **55** pupils currently entitled to Free School Meals or Ever6.

The actual numbers vary from the predicted because

- some families are newly eligible for Free School Meals (FSM)
- Pupils new to the school who are Pupil Premium
- the new Reception pupils starting in September who were eligible to the Pre-School Pupil Premium.
- The number often declines in September with the Year 6 pupils transferring to secondary school.

This is 12% of the school (Nationally there 26% of pupils entitled to FSM). The change in pupil numbers will be picked up on the Census update at the end of September 2016 and any changes will be reflected in future funding.

There is not a equal distribution of Pupil Premium pupils across the Year groups or across the classes. Some year groups have as many as 14 and others have as few as 1.

Pupil Premium and Special Needs.

Of the 55, 16 are also on the SEND register and receive varying levels of extra support to meet their Special Educational Needs & Disability (SEND). Whilst some of this SEND support is allocated as extra funding by the Local Authority through a child's individual Education Health Care Plans (EHCP) the rest of the financial support is taken from both the school's main budget allocation as well as the Pupil Premium budget. Currently there are 17 Pupil Premium children who are also on the SEN register. Some of whom require extra support, above their EHCP funding, to fully meet their SEND needs

How the allocation will be targeted during the 2016-17 Academic year.

This is the total expenditure for the academic year 2016-17 and will be financed 7/12 from the current financial year (2016-17) and 5/12 from the financial year 2017-18.

How the school ensures the effective use and impact of the expenditure on the educational attainment of those pupils who were eligible for Pupil Premium

The school tracks the attainment & progress of those children entitled to the Pupil Premium.

In Reception teachers undertake baseline assessments and continual assessments throughout the year which allow us to track their academic and social progression.

In Key Stage 1 (including Reception) teachers assess the children's phonic ability and use the National Phonics Screening test at the end of the year 1.

At the start of every term and in every year, the teachers assess every child's attainment. They identify what they can do and what they still need to learn. This then becomes a part of the **Cohort Analysis** – a year group document which highlights common misconceptions in the year group. These are linked closely to the expectations for the year group and in particular those areas we deem to be essential for the pupils to understand. The Cohort Analysis is then used to inform planning & teaching to fill these misconceptions or gaps in knowledge. Through this cycle of assessment, marking and targeted teaching the teachers can show both attainment and progress in reading, writing (including grammar, punctuation and spelling) & maths .

Each term after the teacher assessments the class teacher, Head, Deputy and the Special Educational Needs Coordinator hold a 'Pupil Progress Meeting' for each year group. During this meeting we look at the attainment and progress of all the children, but have a particular emphasis upon any child who is not making progress, those entitled to the Pupil Premium and those with Special Educational Needs (SEN). It is decided whether any

extra individual or group intervention would be suitable and who will lead it.

Parents are informed at parents' evenings about any extra support their child will receive and the impact that this has had upon their progress. These interventions are also put on a pupil's report at the end of the year. The progress of any child who has had extra support is looked at to see if the intervention has been successful in helping the child make progress. If it has not then another intervention will be arranged or the Special Educational Needs Coordinator may become involved.

Nationally the attainment of Pupil Premium pupils is below the level an average child attains when tested in Reception, Year 2 and Year 6. This gap is also visible with GCSE and A levels. It is vital that these pupils have the chance to fill in the gaps in their skills & knowledge as soon as possible and start to bridge the gap between themselves and the level that an 'average' child achieves.

The intention is that with extra support and extra interventions the Pupil Premium pupils at Burwell school will be able to make accelerated progress and close the gap and start to work at the national expected levels.

To make a judgement about the effectiveness of Pupil Premium interventions it is vital that we look both at the Attainment pupils make by the time they leave school and the Progress they make. From 2016 the old curriculum Levels were no longer be used in any year group. The old progress measures (Average Point Scores) no longer exist and currently there is no standardised, national system to show progress in the new curriculum.

Attainment of Pupil Premium Pupils in Early Years Foundation Stage / Reception

In 2015-16 there were 8 Pupil Premium pupils.

In EYFS there are 17 areas of learning with 3 possible scores:

- 1 Emerging (Below age expected),
- 2 Expected (age expected),
- 3 Exceeding (Above age expected)

In Early Years & Foundation Stage (EYFS) children will be defined as having achieved a **GLD** (Good Level of Development) if they achieve at least the expected level in 7 of the areas:

- The early learning goals (ELGs) in the three prime areas of learning: communication and language; physical development; and personal, social and emotional development.
- The ELGs in the four specific areas of mathematics (number; shape & space) and literacy (reading & writing)

Summary: Whilst some of the pupils attained age expected (score of 2) in various aspects of Reading, Writing or Maths none of the Pupil Premium pupils attained age expected in all of the 7 areas. For some this was for their Literacy or Maths and for others it was for their social and emotional development.

Summary: our 1 Disadvantaged pupil in Year 2 made progress from Emerging (below age expected) in Reception to attaining age expected in Year 2 for Reading & Maths but continued to be below age expected in writing.

Summary: Having only received 2 years of the New National Curriculum not enough of the disadvantaged pupils managed to reach the new age expected levels in 2016.

Whilst the average Scale Score for Reading was over 100 (the pass mark) only 5 of the 12 actually passed the Reading test and Writing Teacher Assessment.

For Maths & GPS the Scale score was below 100 and only 3 of the 12 pupils passed the Maths & GPS tests. 5 of the pupils were also on the SEND register at School Action or School Action Plus.

Summary: whilst there isn't a pass mark for the spelling element of the GPS test it is clear that the Disadvantaged Year 6 pupils failed to reach the same average score as the non disadvantage at Burwell or pupils nationally.

Key Stage 2 Attainment by prior attainment group In other words: Did the lowest attainers in Year 2 reach the new national age expected levels in Year 6?

To see this we compare what a pupil attained in Year 6 (Scale score) compared with their average attainment in Year 2.

For **Reading tests** this shows:

- Those Nationally & at Burwell that attained below age expected in Year 2 (at or below level 1) on average failed to attain the national Scale Score pass mark of 100 in Year 6.
- Those Nationally & at Burwell who attained a 2c (not securely at age expected in Year 2) on average failed to attain the Scale Score pass mark of 100.
- Those who attained age expected in Year 2 (2b & 2a) on average attained the national Scale Score pass mark of 100 and indeed Burwell pupils attained higher than those non-disadvantaged pupils nationally.
- Those pupils who attained above age expected in Year 2 (3c) on average attained and exceeded the national scale score pass mark of 100

The national benchmarking comparison is between the Scale Score attained by Burwell Disadvantaged pupils in comparison with what non-disadvantaged pupils attain nationally.

Reading Summary: At Burwell those pupils who were at age expected in Year 2 (2b and above) were above the national non disadvantaged group in Year 6. However those who were below age expected in Year 2 on average failed to attain the national pass mark of 100. Those that had the biggest difficulty in attaining the national pass mark of 100 were those pupils who previously attained Level 1.

- Those Nationally & at Burwell that attained below age expected in Year 2 (**at or below level 1**) on average failed to attain the national Scale Score pass mark of 100 in Year 6.
- Those Nationally & at Burwell who attained a 2c (**not securely at age expected in Year 2**) on average failed to attain the Scale Score pass mark of 100.
- The 2 Burwell pupils who attained age expected in Year 2 (**2b & 2a**) on average did not attain the national Scale Score pass mark of 100. We would have expected these pupils to have been age expected and reached a scale score of 100 in Year 6.
- Those pupils who attained above age expected in Year 2 (**3c**) on average attained and exceeded the national scale score pass mark of 100

The national benchmarking comparison is between the Scale Score attained by Burwell Disadvantaged pupils in comparison with what non-disadvantaged pupils attain nationally.

Summary: Non of Burwell's disadvantaged pupils managed to match the attainment of all non-disadvantaged pupils nationally.

For **Maths** tests this shows:

- Those Nationally & at Burwell that attained below age expected in Year 2 (**at or below level 1**) on average failed to attain the national Scale Score pass mark of 100 in Year 6.
- Those Nationally & at Burwell who attained a 2c (**not securely at age expected in Year 2**) on average failed to attain the Scale Score pass mark of 100.
- The 2 Burwell pupils who attained age expected in Year 2 (**2b**) on average did attain the national Scale Score pass mark of 100 however the 1 child who attained 2a did not.
- Those pupils who attained above age expected in Year 2 (**3c**) on average attained and exceeded the national scale score pass mark of 100

The national benchmarking comparison is between the Scale Score attained by Burwell Disadvantaged pupils in comparison with what non-disadvantaged pupils attain nationally

Summary: Non of Burwell's disadvantaged pupils managed to match the attainment of all non-disadvantaged pupils nationally.

Attainment in other year groups where there are no national tests or assessments:

The New National Curriculum no longer uses Levels and 2016 was the first year that assessments were fully made without using levels. Burwell Primary School uses the new classification of:

- **Below** Age Expectations
- **At Age Expectations** which the school has divided in to
 - **Developing**: the child is working at age expected levels but their knowledge is not yet secure when tested. This is the group we target with extra support to help them to reach the age expected level by the end of Key Stage 2 (Year 6)
 - **Secure**: This is the level which we use when comparing with National statistics.
- **Mastery**: Above Age Expectations

It is important to note that there is no direct comparison between the old Levels and the new levels as the new age related expectations have increased significantly (somewhere around 18 to 24 months more difficult). This means that direct comparison and progress is not possible to do. It is important to note that as there are no national tests in Years 1, 3, 4 & 5 it is difficult to compare attainment and progress against national expectations. At Burwell the teachers use tests and assessments of pupil work during lessons and marking of books to inform their judgement of where a pupil is in comparison to the age related expectations for their year group.

We can then use the number and % of Burwell pupils working at or above the age related expectations for their year group and compare it with the National expectations at the end of the relevant Key Stage.

- For Year 1 this will be compared with the national Year 2 test results.
- For Years 3, 4 & 5 this will be a comparison with the national Year 6 test results.

The following data compares the national attainment for disadvantaged pupils with:

1. those already working **securely** at age expected and above.
2. those pupils who are currently working at **Developing** (age expected but not yet secure when tested) These are the pupils we target with extra support to help them to reach the age expected level by the end of Key Stage 2 (Year 6). This gives us our current estimated percentage for those pupils expected to be age expected by the end of the Key Stage.
