

# Alverton Primary School Pupil Premium Strategy Statement 2019 – 2022

Please note – this is our overarching, three-year strategy for Pupil Premium. It should be read in conjunction with our annual Pupil Premium strategy documents as these contain more information about our strategies as well as detailing their impact.

## Principles

We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils.

We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups.

We recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged and that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals.

We conform to the DfE's guidance that there is no expectation that schools should spend the grant only on eligible pupils, or on a per eligible pupil basis.

Our Pupil Premium allocation supports training and continuous development to **improve the quality of all teaching, targeting support through interventions** and supporting **whole-school strategies to improve attendance, behaviour and readiness to learn.**

<b>Maintain a focus on high quality teaching and learning.</b>	Teachers receive focused and highly effective professional development; teachers' subject and pedagogical knowledge consistently build and develop, maintaining a focus on high quality teaching and learning including annual teaching and learning projects, personalised CPD, support for Early Career teachers and a focus on Teaching Assistants.
<b>There is a rigorous approach to the reading curriculum in all year groups to enable pupils to achieve at least in line with national %.</b>	A whole-school focus on reading ensures pupils achieve at least in line with other subjects at the end of Key Stage 2. Teachers sustain the focus on helping all pupils widen their vocabulary and achieve at a greater depth in reading. There is a rigorous approach to the reading curriculum to help younger children gain phonic knowledge and achieve at least in line with national % in the Year 1 Phonics screening. Further engage parental support and better enable parents to support their child with their learning at home (eg through workshops).
<b>Barriers to learning these priorities address</b>	The current levels of attainment for some of children identified as disadvantaged may prevent them from achieving nationally expected standards at the end of a key stage and achieving their full potential. Some disadvantaged children enter the EYFS with low communication and literacy skills or speech and language needs.

<b>Pupils have good attendance and come to school on time ready to learn.</b>	Appropriate, swift and effective action for example through rigorous monitoring and meetings with parents. Breakfast Club.
<b>Pupils' emotional wellbeing is supported by providing social and emotional support where needed.</b>	High-quality pastoral support is provided; this includes social and emotional support (eg Thrive, Thrive to Five, Outdoor Learning). Educational psychologist Behaviour Support Dreadnought Counselling
<b>Pupils are given the knowledge and cultural capital they need to succeed in life and have access to a wide, rich set of experiences and opportunities.</b>	Arts activities and opportunities (art, music, drama, dance). Cooking. Wider range of reading materials. £100 per Pupil Premium child to access extra-curricular activities (eg music lessons, after school clubs or trips) and to pay for uniform. Half the cost of camp is funded. Contingency funding to respond to individual need. Funding allocated to ensure the leadership of Pupil Premium is highly effective.

<b>Teaching</b>	Ensuring sufficient time is given to allow for staff professional development.	Use of INSET, twilights and staff meetings. Timetabled sessions with HLTA cover.
<b>Targeted academic support</b>	Ensuring sufficient time is dedicated to interventions and that staff delivering these have time to prepare, especially when these are delivered by Teaching Assistants.	Timetable of interventions, including dedicated preparation and assessment time.
<b>Wider strategies</b>	Engaging “hard to reach” families.	Ensure excellent relationships between home and school and an “open door” policy. Continue to work with range of external professionals to build links.

## Review: last year’s aims and outcomes

2020 Data is Teacher Assessment due to COVID-19.

Aim	Outcome
<b>Progress in Reading</b>	2019: % achieving EXS in line with previous year; progress lower. 2020: % predicted to achieve EXS slightly increased. Reading remains a whole-school priority in 20-21.
<b>Progress in Writing</b>	2019: % achieving EXS increased from previous two years; all children targeted to achieve EXS did so. Progress higher than national PP. 2020: % predicted to achieve EXS slightly lower than in 2019 but still above national and in line with other measures. Unable to calculate progress scores this year.
<b>Progress in Maths</b>	2019: % achieving EXS higher than previous two years; all children targeted to achieve EXS did so. Progress higher than national PP. 33% of PP children achieved GDS (higher than national “other”). 2020: 70% predicted to achieve EXS; this is higher than 2019 national PP.
<b>Phonics</b>	2019: % of pupils achieving the pass mark lower than in previous years; Phonics will remain as a whole-school priority in 20-21. 2020: % of children predicted to achieve required standard increased by 12% including 5/6 PP children. Will continue as a priority in 20-21.
