<b>In-school barriers</b>		
<b>A.</b>	Literacy skills (reading and writing) tend to be poorer for our vulnerable pupils, slowing progress across all subjects.	
<b>B.</b>	Self-esteem and confidence (often arising from social and emotional needs and complex life experiences) tend to be lower for our vulnerable pupils, leading to lower resilience and lower achievement.	
<b>C.</b>	Concentration and focus tend to be poorer (learning behaviour).	
<b>External barriers</b> ( <i>issues which also require action outside school, such as low attendance rates</i> )		
<b>D.</b>	Lack of parental engagement is an issue .eg. lower attendance at Parent Consultation Evenings, lower attendance in school and less engagement in Extended Learning.
