




How to Train Your Dragon

Hiccup Horrendous Haddock III was an incredible sword-fighter, dragon-whisperer and the greatest Viking hero who ever lived.




Malkin Moonlight




Demolition Dad


El Deafo



Izzy is really excited to be picked to look after the new girl, Mathilde, but the new girl isn't quite what Izzy and her friends were expecting...








Cakes in Space




The Cat Who Came in Off the Roof

This is a humorous, surreal and satisfying story with an old fashioned feel.






Please Mr Panda




Blown Away


Over the Hills and Far Away




Where Bear?

Little book lovers will adore this silly story of naughty Ralfy. The illustrations are fun and modern, with some bunny puns to keep adults entertained too.




Peep Inside the Night Time
