Limericks

A limerick is a silly, nonsense poem with five lines. Limericks were made famous by Edward Lear, who wrote the 'Book of Nonsense' in the 1800's. This was a whole book of silly limericks.

How to write a limerick:

A limerick has 5 lines. Lines 1, 2 and 5 rhyme with each other and have 8 or 9 syllables. Lines 3 and 4 rhyme with each other and 5 or 6 syllables.

Copy this limerick by Edward Lear:

There was an old man called Greg,

Who tried to break open an egg,

He kicked it around,

But fell on the ground,

And found that he'd broken a leg.
