

Your child is expected to complete 1 piece of home learning each fortnight from the options below. After weekly spellings, times tables and guided reading, there remains about half an hour for other home learning. If your child wishes to complete additional pieces, then they are free to choose from the activities detailed below. This grid, and any home learning sheets needed, are also available on the school website. The file name is the same as the box number. Please let me know if your child needs a paper copy.

<p><b>1. Country project</b></p> <p>Complete an in depth study of a country of your choice. You could create a fact file, powerpoint presentation, leaflet, non chronological report or booklet. Be prepared to share with the class your exciting discoveries!</p> <p>Helpful hint: You could research the culture, food, language, traditions and history.</p>	<p><b>2. Maths project</b></p> <p>Can you create a maths project (PowerPoint, booklet, poster, leaflet) about each topic area you have covered in maths so far?</p> <p>You could create a learning journey of your learning so far. Things you might include could be how to use particular methods, vocabulary, visual representations and resources that could be useful.</p> <p>Year Three have covered: Multiplication and division, money, statistics, length and perimeter and fractions.</p> <p>Year Four have covered: Place value, addition and subtraction, multiplication and division, fractions and some decimal work.</p>
<p><b>3. States of matter project</b></p> <p>Research into states of matter (solid, liquid gas) and present a detailed piece of research about what happens to materials as they go through different processes and change state. You might want to try some baking* and write an explanation of the changes that took place or you could investigate what happens to water.</p> <p>*Please make sure you have adult supervision for this activity.</p>	<p><b>4. English - story settings</b></p> <p>This half term, we will be focusing on narrative writing and story settings. Can you create your own imaginary world and describe it in words? You might like to draw a picture first to help you with your ideas before writing a short description of an amazing place, building or even planet. Your description doesn't have to be long (no more than a page in your book) but it should transport your reader to a fantastic location!</p>
