# Nuances in Fundamental Suzuki–Miyaura Cross-Couplings Employing [Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>4</sub>]: Poor Reactivity of Aryl Iodides at Lower Temperatures

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#### **Supporting Information**

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#### I. General

Unless otherwise specified all reactants and reagents were purchased and used as received. [Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>4</sub>] was recrystallized prior to use. trans-[Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>2</sub>(p-tol)(I)], trans-[Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>2</sub>(p-tol)(Br)], sodium phenyltrihydroxyborate, trans-[Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>2</sub>I<sub>2</sub>], and [Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)(p-tol)( $\mu$ -OH)]<sub>2</sub>, Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)(p-tol)( $\mu$ -I)]<sub>2</sub>, trans-[Pd(P(2-furyl)<sub>3</sub>)<sub>2</sub>(p-tol)(I)], and PPh<sub>3</sub>(p-tol)I were prepared according to literature procedures.

 $^{1}$ H,  $^{13}$ C NMR and  $^{31}$ P spectra were recorded on a Bruker NMR spectrometer operating at 400 MHz for proton, 100 MHz for carbon, and 162 MHz for phosphorus nuclei. GC data were obtained on an Agilent 6850 Network GC System using an Agilent HP-5 ms capillary column (30 m x 0.25 mm x 0.25 mm): injection temp = 250 °C, oven temp = 45 °C (1 min)  $\rightarrow$  250 °C @ 10 °C per min. All Suzuki–Miyaura cross-coupling reactions were performed employing a Radleys parallel reactor.

#### II. Pd-Catalyzed Suzuki-Miyaura Cross-Couplings

## General Procedure for reactions employing [Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>4</sub>] (1 mol%).

Phenylboronic acid (137.5  $\mu$ mol; 250  $\mu$ L of a 550 mM solution in n-PrOH), the aryl halide (125  $\mu$ mol; 1.00 mL of a 125 mM solution in n-PrOH),  $\uparrow$  Na<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub> (500  $\mu$ L of a 1 M aqueous solution), and [Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>4</sub>] (1.25  $\mu$ mol; as a 750  $\mu$ L solution in n-PrOH), were added to Radleys reactor tube (containing a stir bar). This tube was then placed in a Radleys parallel reactor that had been preheated to the specified temperature and then magnetically stirred under N<sub>2</sub>. Aliquots were obtained from the reaction mixture at the specified times and analyzed by GC.

#### General Procedure for reactions employing Pd(OAc). (1 mol%) and ligand.

Phenylboronic acid (137.5  $\mu$ mol; 250  $\mu$ L of a 550 mM solution in *n*-PrOH), the aryl halide (125  $\mu$ mol; 1.00 mL of a 125 mM solution in *n*-PrOH), Na<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub> (500  $\mu$ L of a 1 M aqueous solution), and a *n*-PrOH solution (750  $\mu$ L) containing Pd(OAc)<sub>2</sub> (1.25  $\mu$ mol) and ligand ( $\mu$ mol as required), were added to a Radleys reactor tube (containing a stir bar). This tube was then placed in a Radleys parallel reactor that had been preheated to the specified temperature and then magnetically stirred under N<sub>2</sub>. Aliquots were obtained from the reaction mixture at the specified times and analyzed by GC.

<sup>†</sup> This aryl halide solution also contained 1,4-dimethoxybenzene (50  $\mu$ mol, 50 mM) as an internal standard.

#### Equation 1.

Phenylboronic acid (125  $\mu$ mol; 250  $\mu$ L of a 550 mM solution in *n*-PrOH), a *n*-PrOH solution (1.00 mL) containing 4-bromotoluene (62.5 µmol) and 4-iodotoluene (62.5 µmol), Na<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub> (500 µL of a 1 M aqueous solution, and  $[Pd(PPh_i)]$  (1.25  $\mu$ mol; as a 750  $\mu$ L solution in n-PrOH), were added to a Radleys reactor tube (containing a stir bar). This tube was then placed in a Radleys parallel reactor that had been preheated to the specified temperature and then magnetically stirred under N<sub>2</sub>. Aliquots were obtained from the reaction mixture at the specified intervals and were analyzed by GC.

## Figure 3. Procedure for reactions employing trans-[Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>2</sub>(p-tol)(X)]

Phenylboronic acid (250  $\mu$ mol; 2.00 mL of a 125 mM solution in THF) was added to a mixture of trans- $[Pd(PPh_3)_2(p-tol)(X)]$  (62.5  $\mu$ mol), Na<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub> (1.00 mL of a 0.25 M aqueous solution), and THF (2.00 mL)<sup>‡</sup> in a Radleys reactor tube (containing a stir bar). This tube was then placed in a Radleys parallel reactor that had been preheated to 50 °C and then magnetically stirred under N<sub>2</sub>. Aliquots were obtained from the reaction mixture at the specified times and analyzed by GC.

#### Figure 3. Procedure for reactions employing trans-[Pd(PPh), (p-tol)(X)] + PPh

Phenylboronic acid (250 µmol; 2.00 mL of a 125 mM solution in THF) was added to a mixture of trans- $[Pd(PPh_3)_2(p-tol)(X)]$  (62.5  $\mu$ mol), PPh<sub>3</sub> (375  $\mu$ mol; 2.00 mL of a 187.5 mM solution in THF),  $^{\ddagger}$  and Na<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub> (1.00 mL of a 0.25 M agueous solution) in a Radlevs reactor tube (containing a stir bar). This tube was then placed in a Radleys parallel reactor that had been preheated to 50 °C and then magnetically stirred under  $N_i$ . Aliquots were obtained from the reaction mixture at the specified times and analyzed by GC.

#### Figure 3. Procedure for reactions employing $Pd(PPh_1)(p-tol)(\mu-OH)$ ].

Phenylboronic acid (250 µmol; 2.00 mL of a 125 mM solution in THF) was added to a mixture of  $[Pd(PPh_3)(p-tol)(\mu-OH)]_2$  (31.3  $\mu$ mol),  $H_2O$  (1.00 mL), and THF (2.00 mL)<sup>‡</sup> in a Radleys reactor tube (containing a stir bar). This tube was then placed in a Radleys parallel reactor that had been preheated to 50 °C and then magnetically stirred under N<sub>2</sub>. Aliquots were obtained from the reaction mixture at the specified times and analyzed by GC.

## Figure 3. Procedure for reactions employing $Pd(PPh_3)(p-tol)(\mu-OH)]_2 + PPh_3$

Phenylboronic acid (250 µmol; 2.00 mL of a 125 mM solution in THF) was added to a mixture of  $[Pd(PPh_3)(p-tol)(\mu-OH)]_2$  (31.3  $\mu$ mol),  $PPh_3$  (375  $\mu$ mol; 2.00 mL of a 187.5 mM solution in THF), and HO (1.00 mL) in a Radleys reactor tube (containing a stir bar). This tube was then placed in a Radleys parallel reactor that had been preheated to 50 °C and then magnetically stirred under N<sub>2</sub>. Aliquots were obtained from the reaction mixture at the specified times and analyzed by GC.
