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1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Ethyl acrylate (EA) (≥99.5%), cross-linker *N,N'*-methylenebisacrylamide (BIS) (≥99.5%), initiator 2,2'-Azobis(2-methylpropionamidine) dihydrochloride (AMPA) (97%), surfactant Hexadecyltrimethylammonium bromide (≥98%) were purchased from Sigma-Aldrich. Ethyl acrylate was destabilized with aluminium oxide. *Cis*-1,2,3,6-tetrahydrophthalic anhydride was recrystallized from n-hexane/ ethanol. All other chemicals were used as received. Reactions were performed in anhydrous solvents dried and distilled following standard procedures. Water for microgel synthesis was doubly distilled Milli-Q-water, for dialysis single distilled water. Solvents for column chromatography were technical grade and distilled prior to use. Analytical thin layer chromatography (TLC) was performed on Merck silica gel 60 aluminium plates with F-254 fluorescence marker, visualized by UV irradiation or KMnO₄ stain. Merck silica gel 60 (particle size 0.063 - 0.200 mm) was used for preparative column chromatography. Dialysis membranes ZelluTrans/Roth Dialysis membranes T4 with MWCO 12.000-14.000 were obtained from Carl Roth.

Optical properties were studied by UV/Visible spectrophotometer Cary 100 Bio from Varian. Hydrodynamic radii (R_h) were measured by dynamic light scattering (DLS) at a wavelength of 633 nm with an ALV-5000. TEM pictures were taken at a Transmission Electron Microscope LIBRA 120 PLUS from Carl Zeiss. The sedimentation velocities were determined with the stability analyser LUMiFuge 1112-54 at a rotation speed of 2000 rpm.

 1 H- and 13 C-NMR spectra were recorded on VNMRS-600, VNMRS-400, Inova 400 or Mercury 300 spectrometer in CDCl₃, MeOD-d4 or DMSO-d6 using the residual solvent peak as an internal reference (CDCl₃: $\delta_{H} = 7.26$ ppm, $\delta_{C} = 77.0$ ppm; MeOD-d4: $\delta_{H} = 3.31$ ppm, $\delta_{C} = 49.1$ ppm; DMSO-d6: $\delta_{H} = 2.50$ ppm, $\delta_{C} = 39.4$ ppm). Chemical shifts (δ) are reported in ppm; multiplicities are indicated: br (broad signal), s (singlet), d (doublet), dd (doublet of doublet), ddd (doublet of doublet), t (triplet), dt (doublet of triplet), m (multiplet); coupling constants (J) are in Hertz (Hz). Mass spectra (MS-EI, 70 eV) were conducted on a Finnigan MET SSQ 7000 system. IR spectra (ATR) were recorded on a Perkin Elmer spectrometer and are reported in terms of frequency of absorption (cm⁻¹). Optical rotations were measured on a Perkin Elmer 241 polarimeter. Enantiomeric ratios were determined by analytical supercritical fluid chromatography (SFC) using chiral stationary phase column Daicel Chiralcel OJ-H with solvent mixtures and temperatures indicated below. The methods were calibrated with the corresponding racemic mixtures.

2. SYNTHESIS OF THE ORGANOCATALYSTS

9-Amino-(9-deoxy)-epi-quinine

9-Amino-(9-deoxy)-epi-hydroquinine

To a solution of 1.0 equiv 9-Amino-(9-deoxy)-*epi*-quinine in ethanol was added 0.05 equiv Pd/C (5 wt-%) and the reaction mixture was transferred into a stainless-steel autoclave where a hydrogenation was performed at 20 bar pressure, 30 °C for 16 h. The reaction mixture was filtered through a small pad of Celite to remove Pd/C, concentrated under reduced pressure and the residue was purified by column chromatography on silica gel with EtOAc/ MeOH/ aq. NH₃ 50:50:1 as eluent.

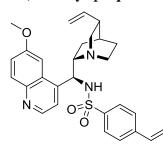

Quinine and Hydroquinine derived sulfonamides:

Under argon atmosphere, a solution of 1.2 equiv 9-Amino-(9-deoxy)-*epi*-quinine or 9-Amino-(9-deoxy)-*epi*-hydroquinine in dry DCM was cooled to 0 °C and 1.1 equiv NEt₃ was added. A solution of 1.0 equiv arylsulfonyl chloride in dry DCM was cooled to 0 °C and slowly added to the reaction mixture. After being stirred for 3 h at 0 °C, water was added to the solution. The DCM phase was collected and the aqueous phase was extracted with DCM twice. The combined organic phases were dried over Na₂SO₄, concentrated under reduced pressure and the residue was purified by column chromatography on silica gel with EtOAc/ MeOH 20:1 as eluent.

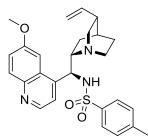

3. SYNTHESIS AND CHARACTERIZATION OF THE MICROGEL

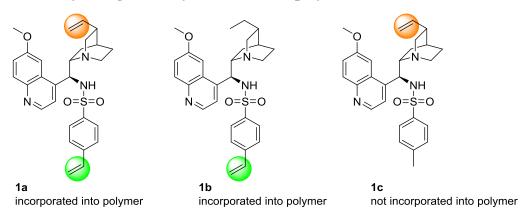
3.1 Synthetic procedure

For the emulsion polymerization a certain amount of organocatalyst monomer (1-10 mol-%) was dissolved in calculated volume of ethyl acrylate (90-99 mol-%) under continuous stirring. Then cetyltrimethylammonium bromide (CTAB, 1 mol-%), crosslinker *N*,*N*'-Methylenebisacrylamide (BIS, 3 mol-%) and water were added. Dissolved oxygen was removed by purging of nitrogen through the mixture within 60 min. In order to build an emulsion, the flask with the mixture was placed in an ultrasonic bath for 15 min. Then the flask was placed in oil bath and heated up to 70 °C under constant stirring. Finally, a water solution of the initiator 2,2'-azobis(2-methylpropionamidine) dihydrochloride (AMPA, 1 mol-%) was added to the reaction mixture. After 6 hours reaction time the mixture was cooled down to the room temperature and dialyzed

for 5 days against water to purify the microgel. After cleaning procedure the microgel was freezedried. Although the conversion of the monomers in the polymerization is quantitative, yields of microgel are typically 50-65% since also linear polymers are formed, which are removed during dialysis.

3.2 Sulfur elemental analysis

To verify the incorporation of the organocatalyst **1a** into the microgel, sulfur elemental analysis was performed by the external provider *Mikroanalytisches Laboratorium Kolbe* (the report is attached). Reported values in *Table S1* represent the average of a double determination. For our best catalyst **A** (poly-EA-**1a** (95:5)), two different batches were measured in a double determination each and the reported value represents the average of all four measurements. As control experiments also the monomeric organocatalysts **1a** and **1c** as well as unmodified poly-EA were measured. All measured sulfur contents are in very good agreement with the calculated values. The only exception is catalyst **D** (poly-EA-**1a** (80:20)) [VPR_022], which was thought to have a ratio of 90:10 and was reassigned accordingly.

3.3 FT-IR spectra for microgels with variable amount of catalyst 1a

To verify the copolymerization of catalyst **1a** in the microgel, we performed FT-IR studies (Table S1). Curve 1 shows unmodified poly-EA with a characteristic ester carbonyl C=O stretching band at 1730 cm⁻¹. Additional characteristic signals are C-H deformation vibration (1450 cm⁻¹) of the ethyl group and asymmetric C-O stretching vibration (1100 cm⁻¹) of the saturated aliphatic ester. The organocatalyst **1a** is shown in curve 5 with two significant bands at 1625 cm⁻¹ and 1595 cm⁻¹ indicating the aromatic ring C=C and C=N stretching vibration. Additional characteristic signals for the organocatalyst are asymmetric (1330 cm⁻¹) and symmetric (1170 cm⁻¹) SO₂ stretching vibration of the aryl sulfonamide as well as asymmetric (1230 cm⁻¹) and symmetric (1030 cm⁻¹) C-O stretching vibration of the aryl methyl ether.

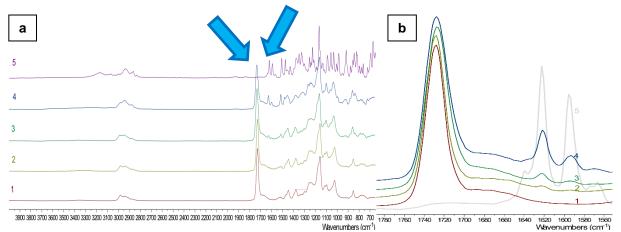

3.4 Size and size distribution of microgels at different temperatures

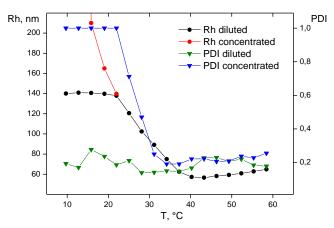


Figure S2. Hydrodynamic radius and polydispersity index (PDI) of microgel catalyst **A** (poly-EA-1a (95:5)) at different temperatures.

Figure S2 presents hydrodynamic radius (R_h) and polydispersity index (PDI) for microgels measured at different temperatures by dynamic light scattering. For the diluted microgel sample, we observed an increase of the size by cooling below 40°C (T<UCST) at almost constant PDI due to the partial aggregation of microgels. Starting from 25°C, no change of the size can be observed and microgel aggregates become stabilized in solution. In contrast, for the concentrated microgel sample even below 25°C aggregation process continues and leads to a rapid increase of the aggregate size and PDI. Finally, this process induces precipitation of microgels and allows simple recovery from solution.

3.5 UCST behavior in different solvents

In general, we qualitatively tested catalyst **A** (poly-EA-**1a** (95:5)) for UCST behavior by dissolving the polymer (10 mg/ml), heating and equilibrating the solution at 50 °C (or slightly below the boiling point) and then successively lowering the temperature by placing the vials on the bench (RT), in the fridge (5 °C), and in the freezer (-20 °C). Polymer precipitate indicated a UCST behavior (Figure S3). A broad range of common organic solvents (alcohols, acetone, acetonitrile, DCM, CHCl₃, EtOAc, Et₂O, THF, Dioxane, toluene, DMF, and DMSO) was tested, including typical solvents applied in catalysis in general and in desymmetrization reactions in particular.

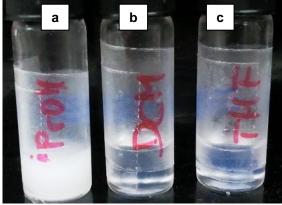

In order to quantify the UCST behavior, temperature-dependant UV-Vis measurements (Figure S4) were performed for catalyst **A** (poly-EA-**1a** (95:5)). Solvent mixtures relevant for catalytic application (see table 1 in the manuscript) were investigated, containing i PrOH, MeOH, and Et₂O as the major component, and the added nucleophile as the minor component.

In pure i PrOH, nice UCST behavior at ~34 ${}^{\circ}$ C was observed (Figure S4a). Upon addition of Et₂O, the UCST temperature was lowered and the transition became less sharp (Figure S4c) and very broad (Figure S4e). In those mixtures, catalytic reactions did not provide product, likely because the microgel is not well solvated in the absence of a sharp UCST and cannot act as a homogeneous catalyst.

In pure MeOH on the other hand, no UCST was observed (Figure S4b) and therefore the catalyst could not be recycled. Addition of Et₂O, however, resulted in a relatively sharp UCST behavior ~6 °C (Figure S4d+f). Both catalytic reactions and catalyst recycling worked well.

Unfortunately, a measurement in pure Et_2O was not possible due to low transmission since a solution of the microgel in Et_2O is more turbid compared to solvent systems containing alcohols (compare Figure 2a in the manuscript with Figure 4, picture "catalysis"). However, we did observe UCST behavior qualitatively: a solution cooled to 0 °C precipitated over time and we were able to separate the catalyst by centrifugation and reuse it in further catalytic cycle.

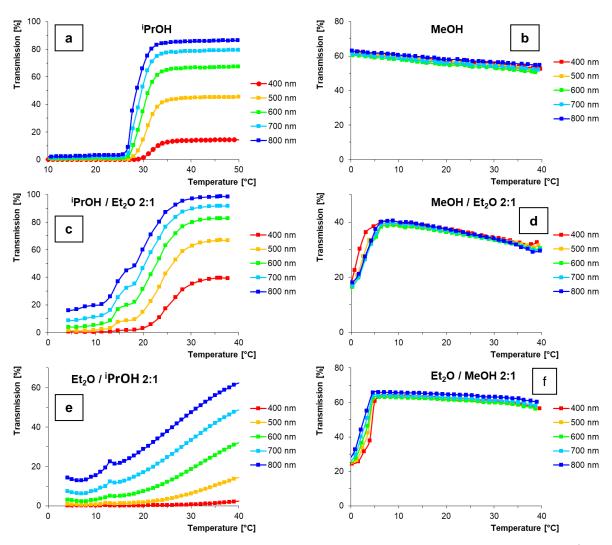

4. ORGANOCATALYTIC DESYMMETRIZATION OF MESO-ANHYDRIDES

4.1 Synthetic procedures and characterization

Before a catalytic test reaction, the dried polymer was dissolved in the corresponding abs. solvent, stirred for 1 hour, and cooled the 0 °C. The precipitated polymer was separated from the supernatant solvent by centrifugation in order to remove possible contaminants like residual traces of water or unreacted monomers.

To perform the catalytic test reaction, the polymer catalyst (1 - 20 mol-%) was dissolved/suspended in the appropriate mixture of abs. solvents under argon, 1 equiv *meso*-anhydride and the nucleophile (methanol or *iso*-propanol, 5 - 20 equiv) were added. The reaction mixture was stirred at RT for the indicated time (TLC control, n-hexane/ EtOAc 2:1, KMnO₄ stained). When cooling the reaction mixture to 0 °C, the microgel catalyst precipitated and was centrifuged for 10 min. The supernatant was carefully taken off with a Pasteur pipette and the polymer catalyst was washed by repeating the dissolving/ cooling/ centrifugation procedure with a fresh portion of solvent. The combined solvent was concentrated under reduced pressure and the residue was purified by column chromatography on silica gel with n-hexane/ DCM 1:1, later n-hexane/ EtOAc 2:1 as eluent.

The separated polymer catalyst was reused in another catalytic cycle by recharging the system with fresh solvent and substrate as described above.
