1. Expanded discussion of metal material flow analyses

Existing MFAs for the elements of the periodic table were the subject of an extensive review by Chen and Graedel (2012). Since that review was completed, a number of other MFAs have been published. It is not appropriate in this work to conduct an exhaustive review, but it is useful to list work of interest that was either not captured in the earlier publication or has appeared since that time. The entries in Table S1 are intended to indicate the breadth of MFAs that can serve as sources of information on MFA structure and analysis.

Although the individual elements (mostly metals) are the most common subject of MFA material studies, not all of the elements have thus far been addressed in MFAs, as can be seen from the compilation of Chen and Graedel (2012) and of Table S1. None of the noble gas cycles have been studied, nor have the halogens save chlorine (which sees significant industrial use). Among the alkali metals, only lithium has been investigated. Of the alkali earth metals, calcium and barium remain unstudied. Chemists have quantified much of the life cycles of hydrogen, carbon, nitrogen, oxygen, and sulfur in the atmosphere, but quantification of the uses of those elements within human technology and society awaits analysts. Even one of the transition metals – scandium – awaits a cycle analysis.

d. Published MFA analyses for common polymers

As of the date of this review, there are few published MFA analyses for the common polymers or common polymer uses. However, complete cycles for Europe are available for all of the principal industrial polymers except PUR, and a dynamic cycle for the United States covers the years 1996-2007 (Table SI-2). Additionally, partial cycles that have useful content include those of Patel et al. (1968; PE, PP, PVC, PS), Zhou et al. (2013; PVC), Van Eygen et al. (2017, polymer use in products), and Levi and Cullen (2018, PE, PS, PET).

- 3. Expanded discussion of fiber material flow analyses
  - a. Published MFA analyses for wood and wood-based fibers

As of the date of this review, only a few published MFA analyses for wood and wood-based fibers have thus far been completed; they are listed in Table SI-3. Additionally, partial cycles that have useful content include those of WBCSD (2015, fiber recycling), O'Brien and Bringezu (2018, fiber products), and Spruce-Up GE<sup>3</sup>LS (2018, spruce fiber in Canada).

## 5. Discussion of construction material flow analyses

Although the annual flows of construction materials (sand, crushed stone, cement) are larger than those of metals, polymers, or fibers, the complete lack of recycling of those components does not permit the construction or analysis of MFAs.
