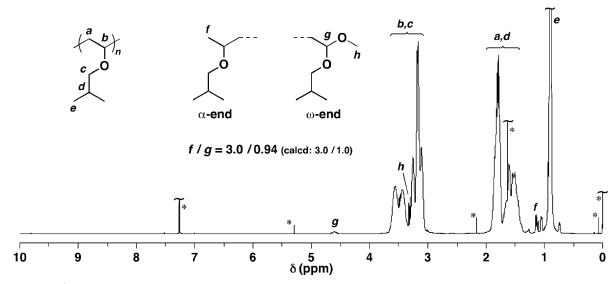

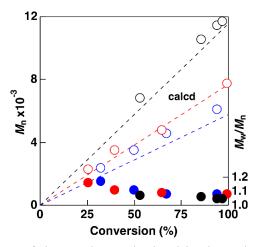

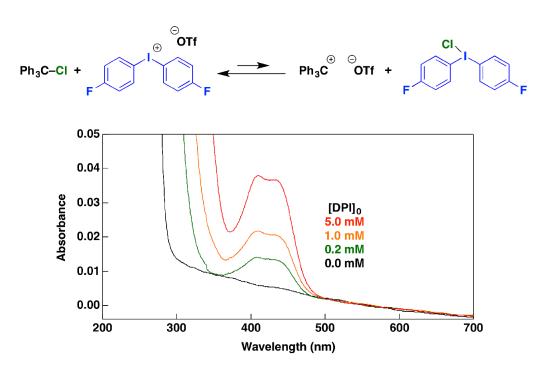

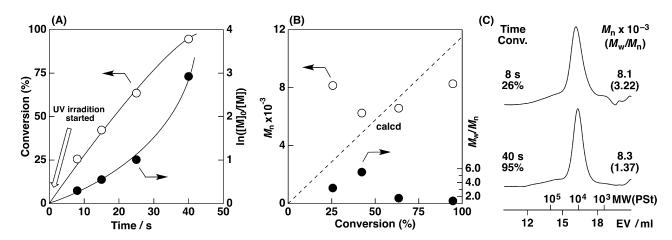

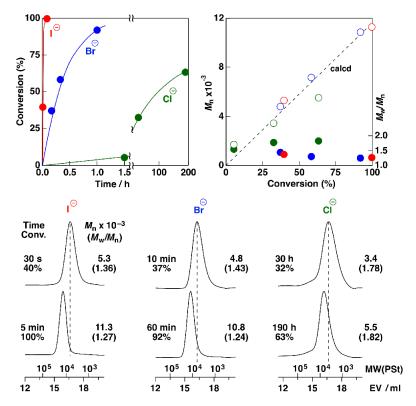

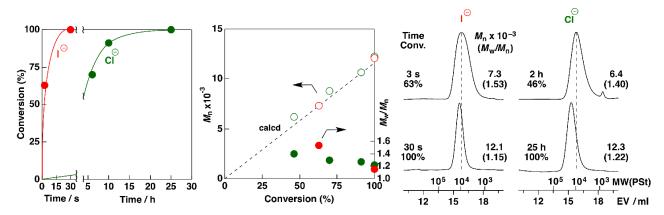

Note for Figures S5 and S6: IPVE, which is a more reactive VE than IBVE, was used in Figures S5 and S6 because the polymerization of IBVE with a cationogen with a Cl atom requires very long reaction time (Table S1).

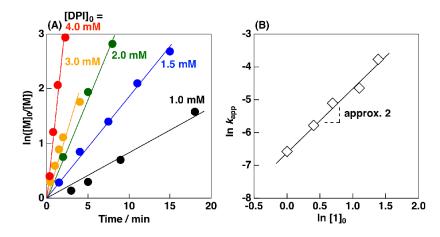

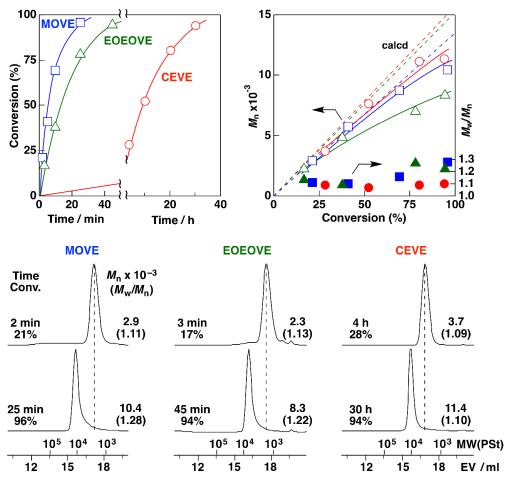

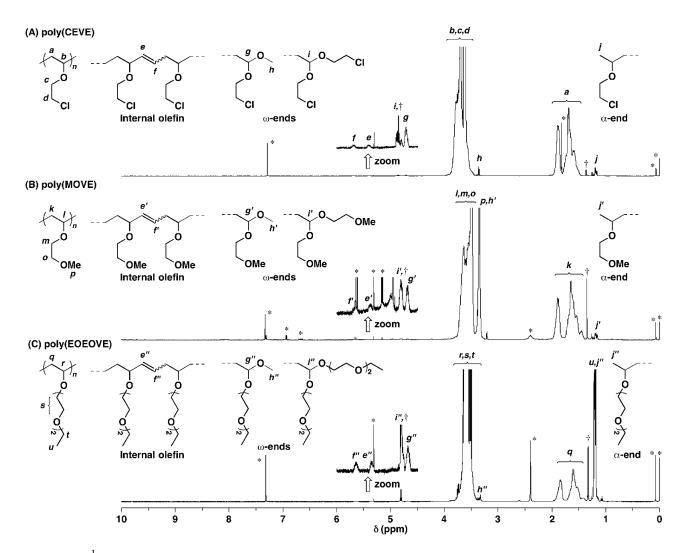


Figure S9. ¹H NMR spectra of (A) poly(CEVE), (B) poly(MOVE), and (C) poly(EOEOVE) obtained using **1** as a catalyst. See Figure S8 for the polymerization conditions. The data correspond to the lower MWD curves in Figure S8. Peaks at 1.3 ppm and 4.8 ppm (†) are likely assignable to an acetal generated from a VE and an alcohol derived from the side chain of a VE. * TMS, grease, water, chloroform, dichloromethane, or contaminants.

Note for Figures S8 and S9: The M_n values of the poly(CEVE)s, poly(MOVE)s, and poly(EOEOVE)s deviated from the theoretical line at high monomer conversion (Figure S8). In addition, peaks assignable to internal olefin structures (peaks at 5.3 and 5.6 ppm) were observed in the 1 H NMR spectra of the polymers (Figure S9). These results suggest that chain transfer reactions likely occurred via alcohol elimination. Specifically, an alkoxy group is abstracted from the polymer chain via the intra- or intermolecular reaction with the propagating carbocation and/or the reaction with a catalyst. S2,S3 The reactions liberates a proton, which generates a new propagating chain.

(B) Reaction with a catalyst (X = catalyst)

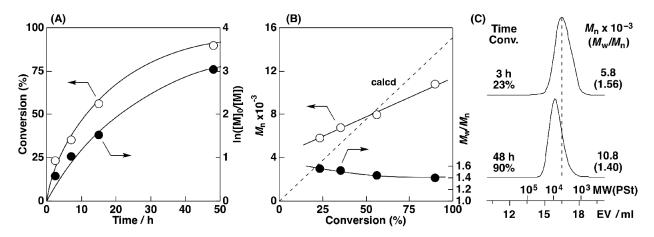

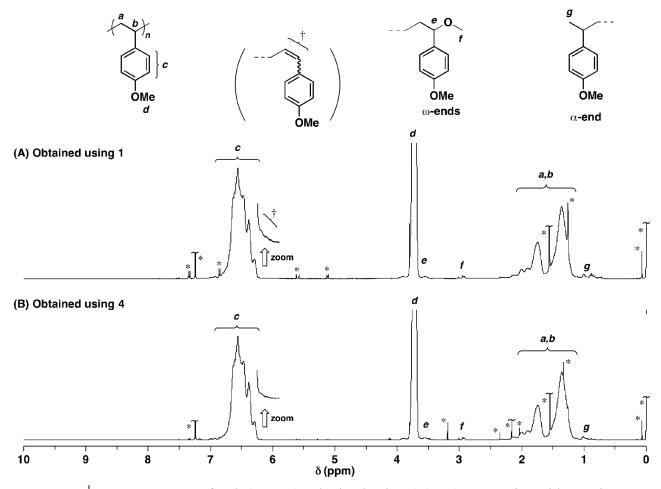

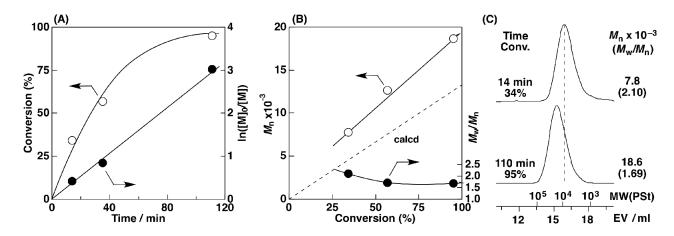

Note for Figure S12: The M_n values of the poly(pMeSt)s were larger than the theoretical values. The result suggests that the initiation efficiency is relatively low although the reason is unclear.
