Synthesis of β -methyl alcohols: influence of alkyl chain length on diastereoselectivity and new attractants of *Rhynchophorus* ferrugineus

1. Experimental

1.1. General Methods

All manipulations were performed under a dry nitrogen atmosphere using Schlenk techniques. All of the materials were purchased from Acros (Belgium) or Sigma-Aldrich. Diethyl ether was dried with Na/benzophenone and freshly distilled prior to use. The other solvents were purchased from Fluka and used without further purification. Column chromatography was performed with Merck Kieselgel 60. Synthesis of ketones using IBX was carried out under microwave-assisted in SANYO EM-D9553N. GC-MS analyses were carried out using an Agilent Technologies 6890N (USA). ¹H (500 MHz) and ¹³C (125 MHz) NMR were determined on a Bruker AVANCE 500 NMR spectrometer using CDCl₃ as solvent and tetramethylsilane (TMS) as internal standard. Chemical shifts are reported in δ relative to TMS.

1.2. General procedure for synthesis of alcohols by Grignard reactions (1a-15a)

To a 250 mL round bottom flask equipped with a reflux condenser was added magnesium shavings (60.0 mmol, 1440.0 mg). After alkyl bromides (48.0 mmol) in anhydrous diethyl ether (70 mL) is added slowly dropwise via cannula to the solution. After addition of the bromides was completed, the reaction mixture was stirred and refluxed for 1h in nitrogen atmosphere. A

solution of α -methyl aldehydes (40.0 mmol) in anhydrous diethyl ether (70 mL) was then added slowly to the solution of Grignard reagent cooled at 0°C and stirred for 1h. The mixture was stirred at ambient temperature for an additional 1h and poured into an aqueous solution of NH₄Cl. The organic layer was extracted with diethyl ether (30 mL x 3) and then washed with an aqueous solution of NaHCO₃, water, brine and dried with anhydrous MgSO₄. The solvent was removed and followed by column chromatography of the residue (n-hexane: Et₂O = 8:2) or distillation to afford the alcohols.

1.3. General procedure for reduction of ketones by LiAlH₄ (1c – 15c)

Ketones (40.0 mmol) in dry diethyl ether (100 mL) were added through a dropping funnel to LiAlH₄ (80.0 mmol) in dry diethyl ether (100 mL) at 0°C. The solution was allowed to warm to room temperature for 1h under stirring. The reaction was monitored by TLC. The mixture was poured to cold HCl acid (10%) and extracted with diethyl ether (3 x 30 mL). The organic layer was dried by anhydrous MgSO₄ and organic solvent evaporated. The crude product was purified by distillation or chromatography column (n-hexane: Et₂O = 8: 2) to afford alcohols.

Synthesis of 6-methyl-7-pentadecanol (15a) from (\pm) -2-methylheptanoic acid

Synthesis of (\pm) -2-methyl-1-heptanol.

In a round-bottom flask equipped with a condenser, 2-methylheptanoic acid (10.0 g, 69.0 mmol) and *p*-TSA (0.2 g, 1.0 mmol) were stirred with methanol (160 mL). The resulting mixture was refluxed for 6h and then the solvent was evaporated. The mixture was extracted with ethyl ether (3 × 50 mL). The combined organic layer was washed with saturated NaHCO₃ solution (100 mL), brine (100 mL), dried over MgSO₄, filtered and concentrated in vacuo to give the desired ester as a colorless oil (9.8 g, 89%). The crude product was used directly for next reaction without further purification.

A 500 mL three-necked round-bottom flask equipped with a magnetic stir was charged with ester (6.0 g, 38.0 mmol), NaBH₄ (5.8 g, 152.0 mmol) and 5 mol % of LiCl (0.2 g, 4.7 mmol) in THF (100 mL) at room temperature. The resulting suspension was stirred at 65°C for 15 min. Methanol (100 mL) was then added dropwisely and the reaction mixture was refluxed for 4 h. After cooling to room temperature, the reaction mixture was quenched in 10% HCl (100 mL). The organic layer was separated and the aqueous phase extracted with diethyl ether (3 x 50 mL). The combined organic layer was washed with saturated NaHCO₃ solution (100 mL), brine (100 mL), dried over MgSO₄ and concentrated to obtain a colorless oil. Further distillation under reduced pressure (104-109°C, 60 mmHg) gave 2-methyl-1-heptanol as a colorless oil (4.4 g, 89%). (±)-6-methyl-7-pentadecanol (15a)

In a 500 mL round-bottomed flask fitted with a reflux condenser was suspended 18.7 g (115.0 mmol) of pyridinium chlorochromate (PCC) in 150 mL of anhydrous CH₂Cl₂ in nitrogen atmosphere. Then 2-methyl-1-heptanol (5.6 g, 43.0 mmol) in 20 mL of CH₂Cl₂ was added in one portion to the magnetically stirred solution. After 1.5 h, dry ether (200 mL) was added and

the supernatant decanted from the black gum. The insoluble residue was washed thoroughly 3 times with 50 mL portions of anhydrous ether whereupon it became a black granular solid. The combined organic solution was passed through a silica gel column chromatography and the solvent was removed by distillation to give 2-methylpentanal as a yellow oil. The crude product was purified by distillation under reduced pressure to afford a colorless oil (4.5 g, 82%). 1.4. General procedure for synthesis of ketones under microwave-assistance (1b-15b)

o-iodoxybenzoic acid (IBX) (30.0 mmol) was dissolved in CH₃CN (30 mL) in a thick-walled Pyrex screw-cap tube. After addition of the alcohols (20.0 mmol, **1a-15a**) in CH₃CN (30 mL) was completed, the reaction mixture was carried out in microwave for 20 min. The reaction mixture was poured into HCl solution (10%, 30 mL) and extracted with Et₂O (3x 30 mL). The organic layer was washed with NaHCO₃ solution, dried with anhydrous MgSO₄ and

the solvent evaporated. The crude product was purified by distillation or flash chromatography (*n*-hexane:EtOAc= 9:1) to give ketones (**1b-15b**).

2. Field Trials

Field experiments were conducted to coconut tree at Chau Thanh district, Ben Tre province, Vietnam (10°18'06.0"N 106°17'22.0"E). Pitfall traps prepared from polypropylene plastic bucket (5L, diameters of 26 and 30

cm, height of 36 cm) covered with a lip possessed four openings (4 cm x 8 cm) with a distance of 10 cm from the top (Figure S1). Traps were added soap water and put under the ground (about 20 cm).

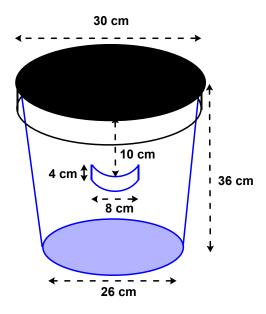


Figure S1. Trap design of field trials

For preparation of baits, the synthesized compounds (10 mg) were placed in 1 mL Eppendorf tube. The Eppendorf tubes had four 1 mm diameter holes and were suspended at center of the bucket lip with a distance of 10 cm from the top. In the traps, the weevils searched to the bait, walked to window and then fell into the trap where were drown in the soap water. The empty Eppendorf was used as negative controls in all experiments.

The synthesized compounds (1b-15b) and (1c-15c) were used to prepare the bait and trials of each compounds were observed during a week. the baits (10 mg) were prepared from pure compounds or blending alcohols

and corresponding ketone in comparison with their pheromone which were mixture of 4-methyl-5-nonanone (**10b**) and 4-menthyl-5-nonanol (**10c**) in a ratio of 10:1 (v/v). The experiments were carried out during January to July during two years 2019 and 2020. The experiment was arranged in randomized block design in coconut farm with five replicates. Each block included three traps and distance between the traps were at interval of 15 m while a distance of 30-40m were maintained between the blocks. The results were described in mean number of the captured weevils per 3 traps per week.

Analysis of collected data was performed Duncan's Multiple Range Test (DMRT) software package. All significant differences in doses with respect to tested pheromone or analogue components were calculated by means of the paired Student's t-test with 95% ($P \le 0.05$) and 99% ($P \le 0.01$) confidence level.

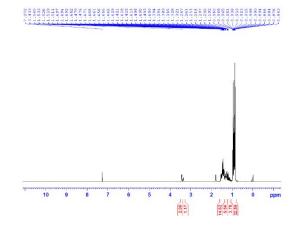


Figure S3. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **1a** (CDCl₃)

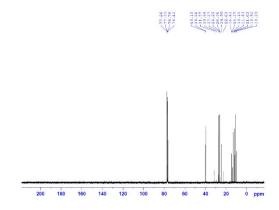


Figure S4. ¹H NMR spectrum of **2a** (CDCl₃)

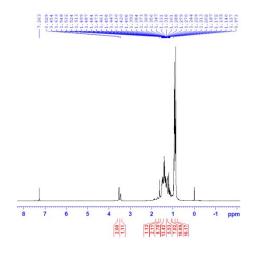


Figure S5. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **2a** (CDCl₃)

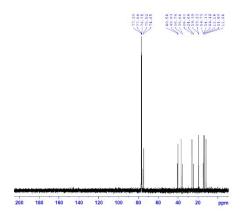


Figure S6. ¹H NMR spectrum of **3a** (CDCl₃)

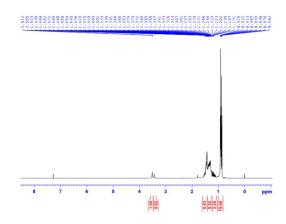


Figure S7. ¹³C NMR spectrum of 3a (CDCl₃)



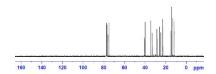


Figure S8. ¹H NMR spectrum of 4a (CDCl₃)

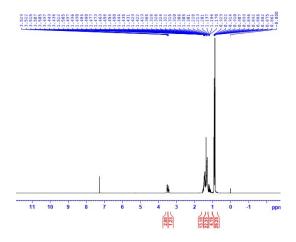


Figure S9. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **4a** (CDCl₃)



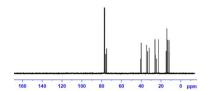


Figure S10. ¹H NMR spectrum of 5a (CDCl₃)

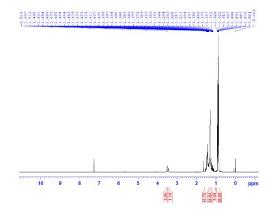


Figure S11. ¹³C NMR spectrum of 5a (CDCl₃)

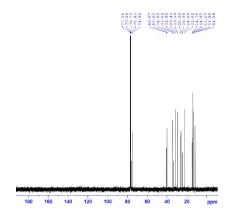


Figure S12. ¹H NMR spectrum of **6a** (CDCl₃)

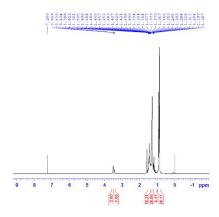


Figure S13. ¹³C NMR spectrum of 6a (CDCl₃)

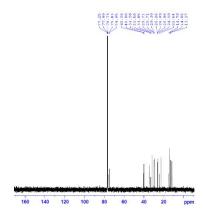


Figure S14. ^{1}H NMR spectrum of 7a (CDCl₃)

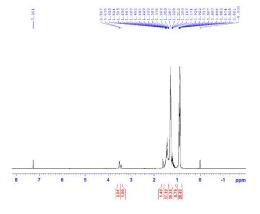


Figure S15. 13 C NMR spectrum of 7a (CDCl₃)

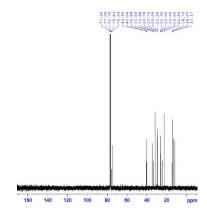


Figure S16. ¹H NMR spectrum of 8a (CDCl₃)

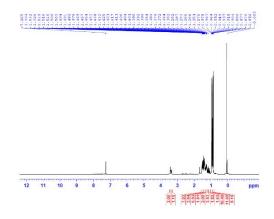


Figure S17. 13 C NMR spectrum of 8a (CDCl₃)

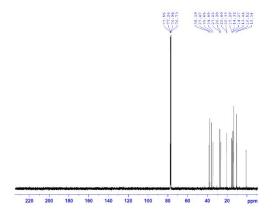


Figure S18. ¹H NMR spectrum of **9a** (CDCl₃)

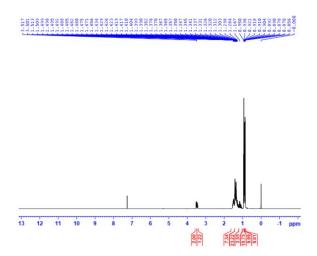


Figure S19. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **9a** (CDCl₃)

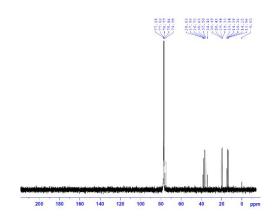


Figure S20. ¹H NMR spectrum of **11a** (CDCl₃)

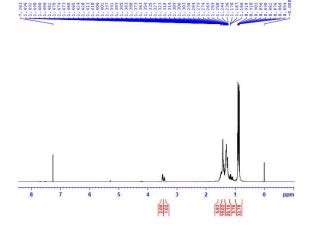


Figure S21. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **11a** (CDCl₃)

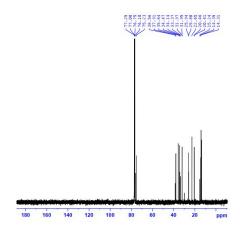


Figure S22. ¹H NMR spectrum of **12a** (CDCl₃)

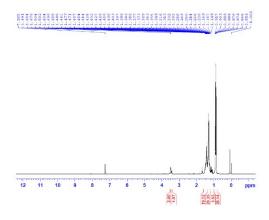


Figure S23. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **12a** (CDCl₃)

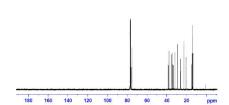


Figure S24. ¹H NMR spectrum of **13a** (CDCl₃)

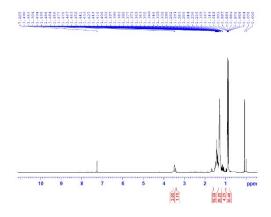


Figure S25. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **13a** (CDCl₃)



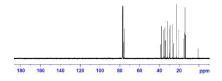


Figure S26. ¹H NMR spectrum of **14a** (CDCl₃)

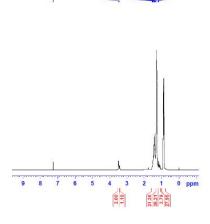


Figure S27. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **14a** (CDCl₃)

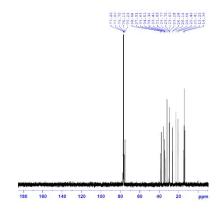


Figure S28. ¹H NMR spectrum of **15a** (CDCl₃)

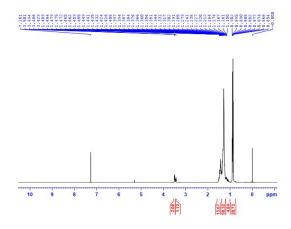
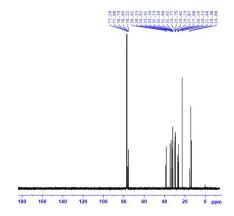
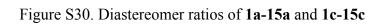
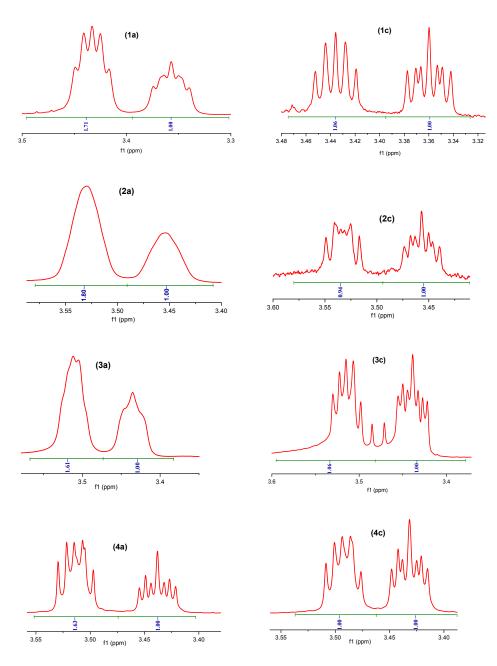
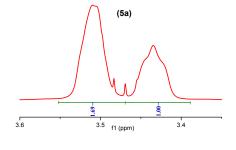


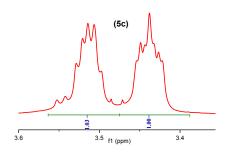
Figure S29. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **15a** (CDCl₃)

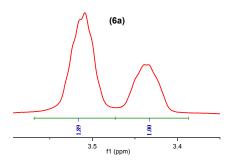


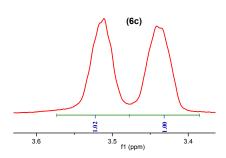


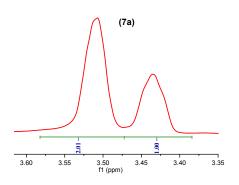


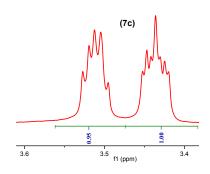


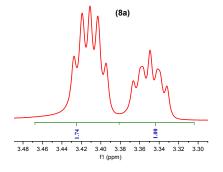


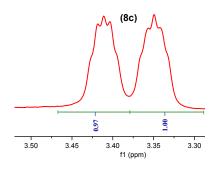


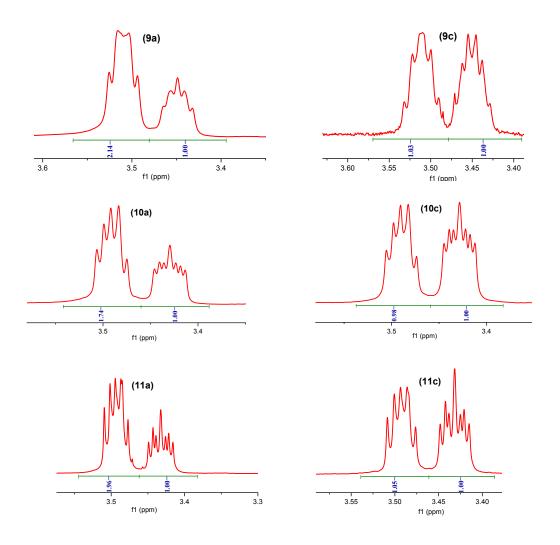


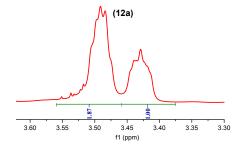


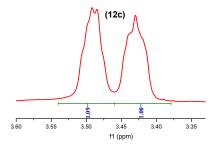












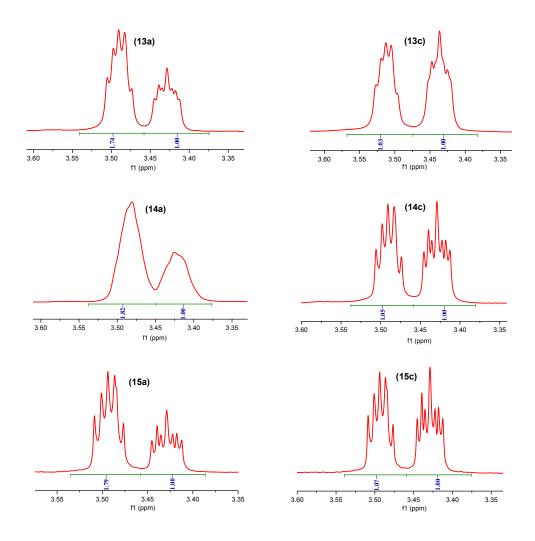


Figure S31. ¹H NMR spectrum of **3b** (CDCl₃)

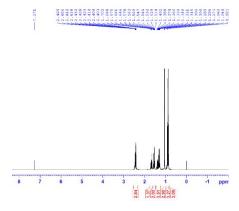


Figure S32. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **3b** (CDCl₃)

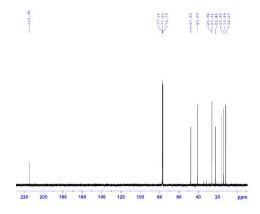


Figure S33. ¹H NMR spectrum of **5b** (CDCl₃)

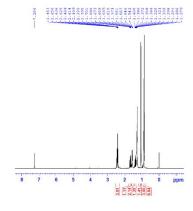


Figure S34. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **5b** (CDCl₃)

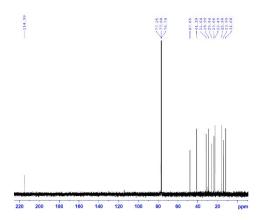


Figure S35. ¹H NMR spectrum of **6b** (CDCl₃)

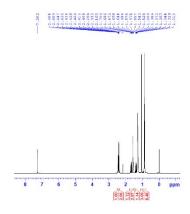


Figure S36. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **6b** (CDCl₃)

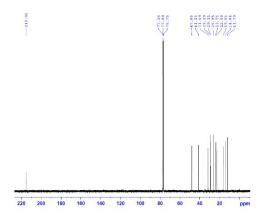


Figure S37. 1H NMR spectrum of ${\bf 7b}$ (CDCl3)

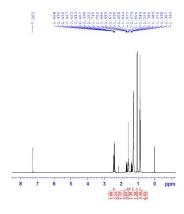


Figure S38. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **7b** (CDCl₃)

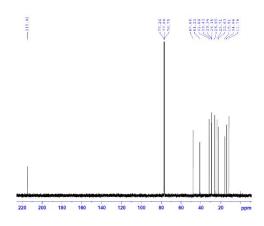


Figure S39. ¹H NMR spectrum of **8b** (CDCl₃)

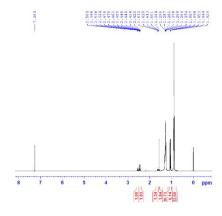


Figure S40. ¹³C NMR spectrum of 8**b** (CDCl₃)

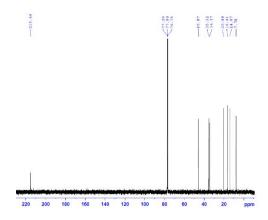


Figure S41. 1H NMR spectrum of 9b (CDCl $_3$)

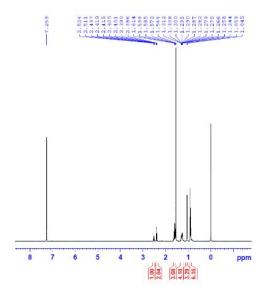


Figure S42. ¹H NMR spectrum of 11**b** (CDCl₃)

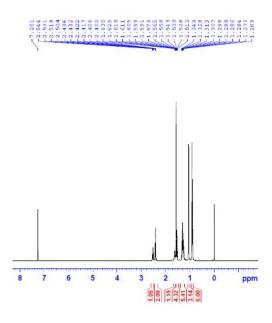


Figure S43. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **11b** (CDCl₃)

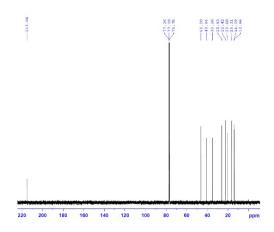


Figure S44. ¹H NMR spectrum of **12b** (CDCl₃)

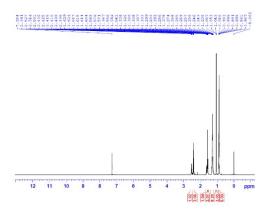


Figure S45. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **12b** (CDCl₃)

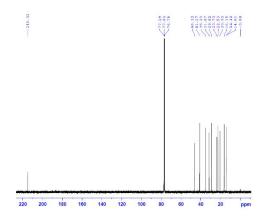


Figure S46. ¹H NMR spectrum of **13b** (CDCl₃)

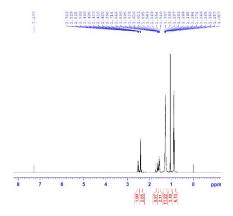


Figure S47. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **13b** (CDCl₃)



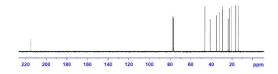


Figure S48. ¹H NMR spectrum of **14b** (CDCl₃)



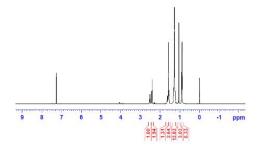


Figure S49. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **14b** (CDCl₃)

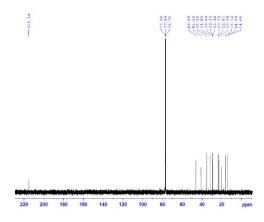


Figure S50. ¹H NMR spectrum of **15b** (CDCl₃)



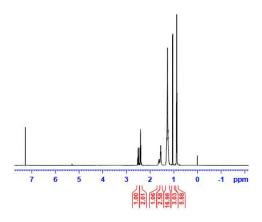


Figure S51. ¹³C NMR spectrum of **15b** (CDCl₃)

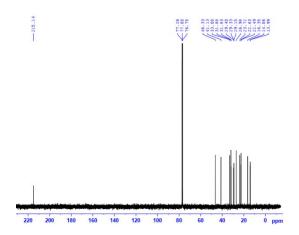


Figure S52. 1H NMR spectrum of 2-methyl-1-heptanol (CDCl $_3$)

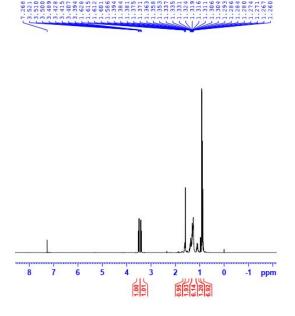
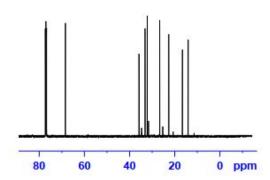


Figure S53. ¹³C NMR spectrum of 2-methyl-1-heptanol (CDCl₃)
