

Vanadium Octacyanoniobate-based magnet with a Curie Temperature of 138 K

EPR spectrum:

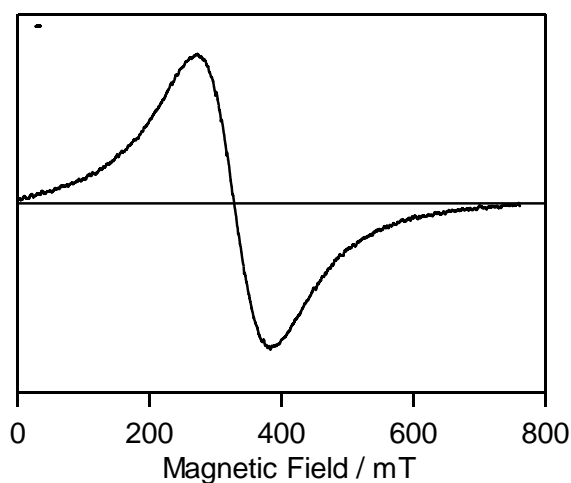


Figure S1. EPR spectrum measured at 300 K.

$\chi_M T$ - T plots:

The $\chi_M T$ value at 300 K is $6.2 \text{ K cm}^3 \text{ mol}^{-1}$, which is much larger than the expected spin-only value of $2.5 \text{ K cm}^3 \text{ mol}^{-1}$ for one Nb^{IV} ($S_{\text{Nb}} = 1/2$), $1.24 \text{ V}^{\text{III}}$ ($S_{\text{V}}^{\text{III}} = 1$), and $0.54 \text{ V}^{\text{II}}$ ($S_{\text{V}}^{\text{II}} = 3/2$) with g value of 2.0. This is because T_C value of this compound is high and the contribution of the magnetic ordering remains even at room temperature. In addition, a minimum in the $\chi_M T$ - T plots, which is characteristic in ferrimagnet, was not observed below 300 K. The minimum $\chi_M T$ will be located above 300 K.

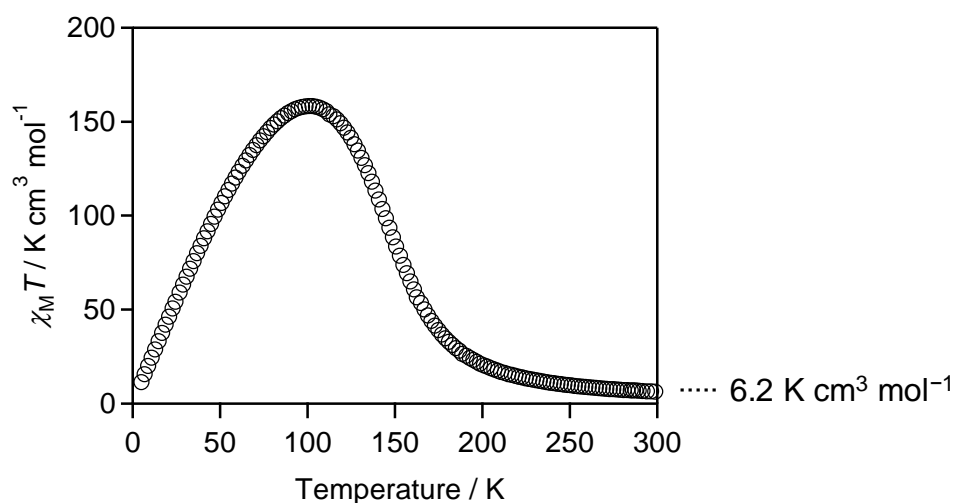


Figure S2. $\chi_M T$ - T plots in an external magnetic field of 5000 Oe.

Estimation of superexchange constant based on molecular-field theory:

The values of the superexchange interaction constants (J_{ij} , $\hat{H} = -J_{ij}S_i \cdot S_j$) between the i site and the nearest neighbor j site in $V_{0.10}^{II}V_{0.54}^{III}V_{1.24}^{IV}[\text{Nb}^{IV}(\text{CN})_8] \cdot (\text{SO}_4)_{0.45} \cdot 6.8\text{H}_2\text{O}$ are related to the T_C value via the following equation:^{S1}

$$T_C = \frac{\left\{ S_{\text{Nb}}(S_{\text{Nb}} + 1) \left[|J_{V^{II}\text{Nb}}|^2 Z_{\text{Nb}V^{II}} Z_{V^{II}\text{Nb}} S_{V^{II}} (S_{V^{II}} + 1) + |J_{V^{III}\text{Nb}}|^2 Z_{\text{Nb}V^{III}} Z_{V^{III}\text{Nb}} S_{V^{III}} (S_{V^{III}} + 1) \right] \right\}^{0.5}}{3k_B} \quad (1)$$

where S_i is the spin quantum number ($S_{\text{Nb}} = 1/2$, $S_{V^{II}} = 3/2$, and $S_{V^{III}} = 1$), Z_{ij} is the number of the nearest neighbor j site around i site, and k_B is the Boltzmann constant. In the case of $K_{0.10}V_{0.54}^{II}V_{1.24}^{III}[\text{Nb}^{IV}(\text{CN})_8] \cdot (\text{SO}_4)_{0.45} \cdot 6.8\text{H}_2\text{O}$, Z_{ij} is as follows: $Z_{V^{II}\text{Nb}} = Z_{V^{III}\text{Nb}} = 4$, $Z_{\text{Nb}V^{II}} = 8 \times (x/2)$, $Z_{\text{Nb}V^{III}} = 8 \times (y/2)$, $x = 0.54$, $y = 1.24$. In addition to the present compound, we used $V_{0.20}^{II}V_{1.20}^{III}[\text{Nb}^{IV}(\text{CN})_8] \cdot 9.4\text{H}_2\text{O}$ ($T_C = 98$ K) to calculate $J_{V^{II}\text{Nb}}$ and $J_{V^{III}\text{Nb}}$. This another compound was prepared by mixing an aqueous solution of $\text{K}_4[\text{Nb}(\text{CN})_8] \cdot 2\text{H}_2\text{O}$ with that of VCl_2 . Calcd. V, 13.2; Nb, 17.1. Found: V, 13.3; Nb, 17.0. Consequently, $J_{V^{II}\text{Nb}}$ and $J_{V^{III}\text{Nb}}$ are estimated to be -51 cm^{-1} and -25 cm^{-1} , respectively.

In contrast, the $J_{V^{II}\text{Cr}^{III}}$ value in a Prussian blue analog, $\text{KV}^{II}[\text{Cr}^{III}(\text{CN})_6] \cdot 2\text{H}_2\text{O} \cdot 0.1(\text{KOSO}_2\text{CF}_3)$, reported by Holmes^{S2} is related to the T_C value via the following equation:^{S1}

$$T_C = \frac{|J_{V^{II}\text{Cr}^{III}}| \left\{ Z_{\text{Cr}^{III}V^{II}} Z_{V^{II}\text{Cr}^{III}} S_{V^{II}} (S_{V^{II}} + 1) S_{\text{Cr}^{III}} (S_{\text{Cr}^{III}} + 1) \right\}^{0.5}}{3k_B} \quad (2)$$

where $Z_{\text{Cr}^{III}V^{II}} = Z_{V^{II}\text{Cr}^{III}} = 6$, $S_{\text{Cr}^{III}} = 3/2$, $S_{V^{II}} = 3/2$, and $T_C = 376$ K. From equation (2), $J_{V^{II}\text{Cr}^{III}}$ is estimated to be -35 cm^{-1} .
