# Platinum-Catalyzed Intramolecular Asymmetric Hydroarylation of Unactivated Alkenes with Indoles

#### **Experimental Section**

General Methods. Catalytic reactions were performed in a thick-walled pressure tube (Ace Glass) under an air atmosphere. NMR spectra were obtained on a Varian spectrometer operating at 400 MHz for <sup>1</sup>H NMR and 100 MHz for <sup>13</sup>C NMR in CDCl<sub>3</sub> unless otherwise noted. IR spectra were obtained on a Bomen MB-100 FT IR spectrometer. Gas chromatography was performed on a Hewlett-Parkard 5890 gas chromatography equipped with a 25 m polydimethylsiloxane capillary column. Flash column chromatography was performed employing 200-400 mesh silica gel (EM). Thin layer chromatography (TLC) was performed on silica gel 60 F<sub>254</sub> eluting with a 2:1 mixture of hexanes and ethyl acetate unless noted otherwise. Elemental analyses were performed by Complete Analysis Laboratories (Parsippany, NJ). 1,4-Dioxane (Acros, anhydrous), HCl solution (4.0 M, 1,4-dioxane, Aldrich), and anhydrous MeOH (Aldrich) were stored in an inert atmosphere glovebox. PtCl<sub>2</sub>,  $[Pt(CH_2=CH_2)Cl_2]_2$ , (S)-Tol-BINAP, (R)-3,5-Xylyl-BINAP,  $Pt(COD)Cl_2$  (Strem), ethyl 5-methoxy indole-2-carboxylate, 5-fluoro indole-2-carboxylate (Alfa Aesar), and ethyl indole-2-carboxylate (Aldrich) were used as received. (R)-3,5-i-Pr-MeOBIPHEP, and (S)-3,5-t-Bu-4-MeO-MeOBIPHEP [(S)-4] were provided by Dr. Rudolph Schmid (Hoffmann-LaRoche). Alkenyl indoles 3, 2-(1,1dimethyl-4-pentenyl)-1-methylindole, 2-(1,1-dimethyl-4-pentenyl)indole, and 2-(2-carbomethoxy-4pentenyl)-1-methylindole (7), S1 [(S)-BINAP]PtCl<sub>2</sub>, S2 and ethyl 3,3-dimethyl-5-hexenate were synthesized employing literature procedures. #### **Platinum Complexes**

[(S)-Tol-BINAP]PtCl<sub>2</sub>. [(S)-Tol-BINAP]PtCl<sub>2</sub> was isolated in 91% yield as a white solid from reaction of (S)-Tol-BINAP and Pt(COD)Cl<sub>2</sub> employing a procedure similar to that reported for the synthesis of [(S)-BINAP]PtCl<sub>2</sub>. [(*R*)-Xylyl-BINAP]PtCl<sub>2</sub>. [(*R*)-3,5-*i*-Pr-MeOBIPHEP]PtCl<sub>2</sub>. [(S)-3,5-t-Bu-4-MeO-MeOBIPHEP]PtCl<sub>2</sub> {[(S)-4]PtCl<sub>2</sub>}. [(S)-4]PtCl<sub>2</sub> was isolated in 89% yield as a pale yellow solid employing a procedure similar to that reported for [(R)-BINAP]PtCl<sub>2</sub><sup>S2</sup> from reaction of (S)-4 and Pt(COD)Cl<sub>2</sub>. <sup>1</sup>H NMR:  $\delta$  8.60-6.50 (m, 14 H), 3.68 (s, 6 H), 3.61 (s, 12 H), 1.37 (s, 72 H). <sup>31</sup>P{<sup>1</sup>H} NMR:  $\delta$  11.4 (s, <sup>1</sup>J<sub>PPt</sub> = 3664 Hz). #### 2-Alkenyl Indoles

**2-(2,2-dicarbomethoxy-4-pentenyl)-1-benzylindole (S1; Table 2, entry 1).** Ethyl l-benzylindole-2-carboxylate (**S2**)<sup>S4</sup> was synthesized employing a literature procedure from reaction of ethyl indole-2-carboxylate and benzyl chloride. A solution of **S2** (1.40 g, 5.02 mmol) in THF (15 mL)

was added slowly to a suspension of LiAlH<sub>4</sub> (286 mg, 7.53 mmol) in THF (20 mL) at 0 °C. The reaction mixture was stirred at room temperature overnight, quenched with 1 N HCl (30 mL), and extracted with ether (2 × 50 mL). The combined ether extracts were washed with water (50 mL), dried (MgSO<sub>4</sub>), and concentrated under vacuum to give crude 2-hydroxymethyl-1-methylindole (**S3**), which was used for next step without further purification.

 $n ext{-BuLi}$  (2.5 M solution in hexanes, 1.96 mL, 4.89 mmol) was added to a solution of crude product of **S3** in THF (35 mL) at -78 °C. After stirring for 2 min, methanesulfonyl chloride (0.58 g, 5.1 mmol) and LiBr (1.22 g, 14.0 mmol) were added sequentially. The resulting mixture was warmed to 0 °C, stirred for 30 min, and transferred via cannula to a solution of sodium dimethyl allylmalonate [generated from dimethyl allylmalonate (0.88 g, 5.1 mmol) and NaH (0.123 g, 5.13 mmol) in THF (25 mL)]. The reaction mixture was stirred at room temperature for 4 h, quenched with water, and extracted with ether (2 × 50 mL). The combined organic extracts were washed (brine), dried (MgSO<sub>4</sub>), and concentrated under vacuum. Column chromatography of the residue (hexanes–EtOAc = 5:1) gave **S1** (1.04 g, 53% from **S2**) as a white solid.

2-(2,2-dicarbomethoxy-4-pentenyl)-1-allylindole (S4; Table 2, entry 2): Ethyl l-allylindole-2-carboxylate (S5)<sup>S4</sup> was synthesized employing a literature procedure from ethyl indole-2-carboxylate and allyl bromide. S4 was isolated in 27% yield as a white solid from reaction of S5 and dimethyl

allylmalonate employing a procedure similar to that used to synthesize **S1**. mp 61-63 °C. **2-(2,2-dicarbomethoxy-4-pentenyl)-1-methyl-5-methoxyindole (S6; Table 2, entry 3).** Ethyl 5-methoxy-l-methylindole-2-carboxylate S5 was synthesized employing a literature procedure from ethyl 5-methoxy indole-2-carboxylate and MeI. S6 was isolated in 26% yield as a yellow solid from reaction of ethyl 5-methoxy-l-methyl-indole-2-carboxylate and dimethyl allylmalonate employing a procedure similar to that used to synthesize S1. 2-(2,2-dicarbomethoxy-4-pentenyl)-1-methyl-5-fluoroindole (S7; Table 2, entry 4). Ethyl 5-fluoro-l-methyl-lH-indole-2-carboxylate<sup>S4</sup> was synthesized employing a literature procedure from ethyl 5-fluoro indole-2-carboxylate and MeI.<sup>S4</sup> S7 was isolated in 62% yield as a pale yellow solid from reaction of ethyl 5-fluoro-l-methylindole-2-carboxylate and dimethyl allylmalonate employing a procedure similar to that used to synthesize S1. **2-(2,2-dihydroxymethyl-4-pentenyl)-1-methylindole (S8; Table 2, entry 5).** A solution of  $3^{S1}$  (1.30 g, 4.13 mmol) in THF (15 mL) was added slowly to a suspension of LiAlH<sub>4</sub> (471 mg, 12.4 mmol) in THF (20 mL) at 0 °C. The reaction mixture was stirred at room temperature overnight, quenched with 1 N HCl (50 mL), and extracted with ether (2 × 50 mL). The combined ether extracts were washed with water (50 mL), dried (MgSO<sub>4</sub>), and concentrated under vacuum to give an oil that solidified upon addition of hexanes/EtOAc (3:1, 3 mL). The solid was washed with hexanes (3 mL) to give **S8** (0.54 g, 50% yield) as a white solid. mp 96-97.5 °C. **2-[2,2-di-(2,2-Dimethyl-propionyloxymethyl)-4-pentenyl]-1-methylindole (S9; Table 2, entry 6).** Pivaloyl chloride (0.37 mL, 3.00 mmol) was added slowly to a solution of **S8** (312 mg, 1.20 mmol), Et<sub>3</sub>N (0.50 mL, 3.6 mmol), and DMAP (73 mg, 0.6 mmol) in CH<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> (20 mL) at 0 °C. The reaction mixture was stirred at room temperature overnight, quenched with brine (20 mL), extracted with CH<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> (30 mL). The organic layer was dried (MgSO<sub>4</sub>) and concentrated under vacuum. Column chromatography of the residue (hexanes–EtOAc = 5:1) gave **S9** (0.47 g, 90 % yield) as a viscous colorless oil. **2-(2,2-dicarbo-***t***-butoxy-4-pentenyl)-1-methylindole** (**Table 2, entry 7**). 2-(2,2-Dicarbo-*t*-butoxy-4-pentenyl)-1-methylindole was isolated in 50% yield as a white solid from reaction of 2-hydroxymethyl-1-methylindol<sup>S1</sup> and di-*t*-butyl allylmalonate employing a procedure similar to that used to synthesize **S1**. mp 45-47 °C. **2-(2,2-dimethyl-4-pentenyl)-1-methylindole (S10; Table 2, entry 8).** n-BuLi (2.5 M solution in hexanes, 8.92 mL, 22.3 mmol) was added dropwise to a solution of N-trimethylsilyl-o-toluidine<sup>S6</sup> (1.81 g, 10.13 mmol) in hexanes (50 mL) at 0 °C. The resulting orange solution was refluxed for 5 h, cooled to -78 °C, and treated with a solution of ethyl 3,3-dimethyl-5-hexenate<sup>S3</sup> (2.07 g, 12.16 mmol) in THF (10 mL). The resulting mixture was warmed to room temperature, stirred for 0.5 h, and quenched with brine. The aqueous layer was extracted with ether (2 × 50 mL). The combined organic extracts were dried (MgSO<sub>4</sub>) and concentrated under vacuum. Column chromatography of the residue (hexanes—CH<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> = 10:1) gave an oil that was chromatographed a second time (hexanes—EtOAc = 20:1) to give 2-(2,2-dimethyl-4-pentenyl)indole (**S11**, 0.79 g, 37%) as a pale yellow oil.

A solution of **S11** (0.74 g, 3.5 mmol) in DMF (9 mL) was added slowly to a suspension of NaH (88 mg, 3.65 mmol) in DMF (5 mL) at 0 °C. The mixture was stirred at 0 °C for 20 min and MeI (0.518 g, 3.65 mmol) was added. The reaction mixture was stirred at room temperature for 1 hour, quenched with brine (50 mL), extracted with ether (2 × 40 mL). The combined ether extracts were washed with water (50 mL), dried (MgSO<sub>4</sub>), and concentrated under vacuum. Column chromatography of the residue (hexanes–EtOAc = 25:1) gave **S10** (0.74 g, 94 %) as a pale yellow oil.

#### **Polycyclic Indoles**

Complete optimization for the conversion of **3** to **5** is depicted in Tables S1 and S2.

**2,2-Dicarbomethoxy-4,9-dimethyl-1,3,4,9-tetrahydrocarbazole (5).** A suspension of **3** (67 mg, 0.21 mmol), [(S)-4]PtCl<sub>2</sub> (30 mg, 2.1 × 10<sup>-2</sup> mmol), and AgOTf (5 mg, 2.1 × 10<sup>-2</sup> mmol) in MeOH (0.82 mL) was stirred at 60 °C for 20 hours, cooled to room temperature, and filtered through a plug of silica gel. The silica gel was eluted with ether, the filtrate and eluant were combined, and concentrated under vacuum. Chromatography of the residue (hexanes–EtOAc = 10:1) gave **5** (62 mg, 93%, 90% ee) as a white solid. The enantiomeric excess of **5** was determined by HPLC analysis using a Chiralpak AD-H column (Figure S1).

All remaining polycyclic indole derivatives were isolated from the corresponding 2-alkenylindoles employing a similar procedure to that for the synthesis of **5** unless noted otherwise. 1,1,4,9-Tetramethyl-2,3,4,9-tetrahydrocarbazole (Table 2, entry 9), 1,1,4-trimethyl-2,3,4,9-tetrahydrocarbazole (Table 2, entry 10), and **8** have been previously characterized. The enantiomeric excess of polycyclic indole derivatives were determined by HPLC analysis using a Chiralpak AD-H column (250 mm) (See Figures S2-S13).

Cyclization of 7 Catalyzed by [(S)-4]PtCl<sub>2</sub>/AgOTf. A suspension of 7 (63 mg, 0.23 mmol), [(S)-4]PtCl<sub>2</sub> (33mg, 0.023 mmol), and AgOTf (6 mg, 0.023) in 0.90 ml of MeOH was stirred at 60 °C for 64 hours, cooled to room temperature, and filtered through a plug of silica gel, eluting with ether. The filtrate was concentrated under vacuum and the residue was chromatographed (hexanes–EtOAc = 10:1) to give a 9:1 mixture of *cis*-8 and *trans*-8 (59 mg 94%) that contained ~5% of an unidentified impurity. **Stereochemistry of** *cis*-8. The stereochemistry of *cis*-8 was determined by conversion of *cis*-8 to *cis*-2,4,9-trimethyl-1,3,4,9-tetrahydrocarbazole (*cis*-S22) in 46% yield over three steps (Scheme S1), followed by X-ray crystallographic analysis of *cis*-S22 (Figure S34, Tables S3-S7). The crystal of *cis*-S22 used for X-ray analysis was recovered and subjected to GC analysis, which confirmed its identity as the major diastereomer.

A solution of (8, cis:trans = 25:1, 64 mg, 0.24 mmol) in diethyl ether (3 mL) was added slowly to a suspension of LiAlH<sub>4</sub> (18 mg, 0.48 mmol) in diethyl ether (2 mL) at room temperature. The reaction mixture was stirred at room temperature for 40 minutes and quenched via slow addition of water. The resulting mixture was filtered through a short plug of silica gel and eluted with ether (5 mL). The filtrate and eluant were combined and concentrated under vacuum to give crude 2-hydroxymethyl-4,9-dimethyl-1,3,4,9-tetrahydrocarbazole (S23) that was used in the next step without further purification. Methane sulfonylchloride (0.3 mL, 3.9 mmol) was added dropwise to a solution of crude S23 in pyridine (2.0

mL) at 0 °C. The reaction mixture was stirred at room temperature for 2 hours, quenched with ice-water (10 mL), and extracted with ether (50 mL). The combined ether extracts were washed with 0.5 HCl (2 × 20 mL), saturated aqueous NaHCO<sub>3</sub> (20 mL), and brine (20 mL), dried (MgSO<sub>4</sub>), and concentrated under vacuum. The residue was chromatographed (hexanes–EtOAc = 3:1) to give **S24** (46 mg, 62% from **8**) as a pale yellow oil.

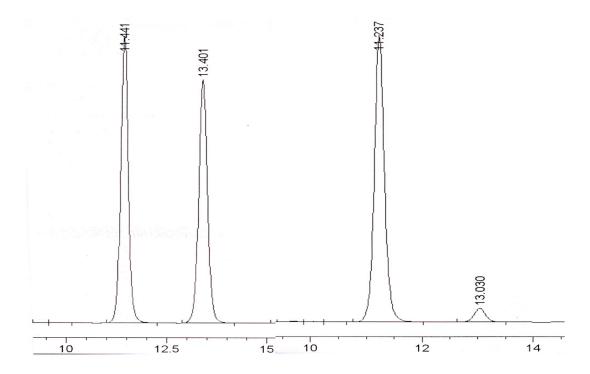
A mixture of **S24** (44 mg, 0.14 mmol), NaI (63 mg, 0.42 mmol), and Zn power (55 mg, 0.84 mmol) in DME (2.5 mL) and water (0.05 mL) was refluxed for 3 hours. 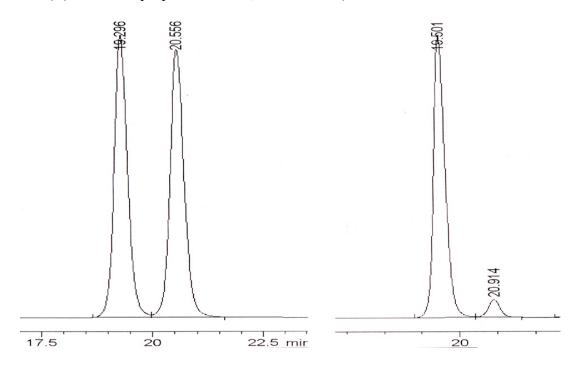

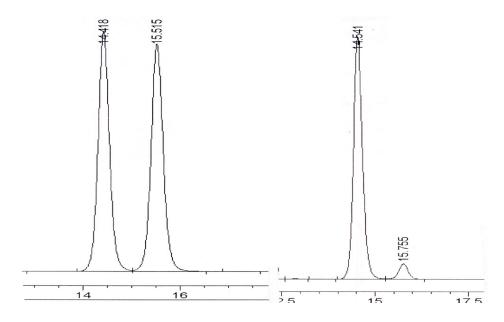

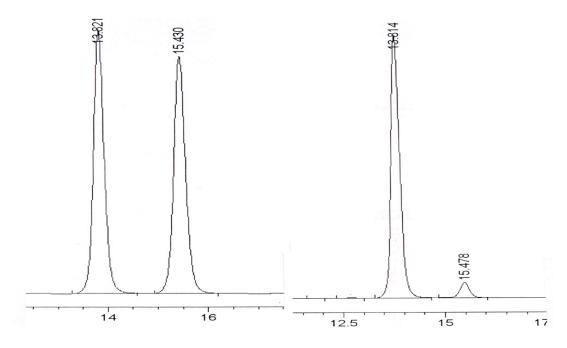

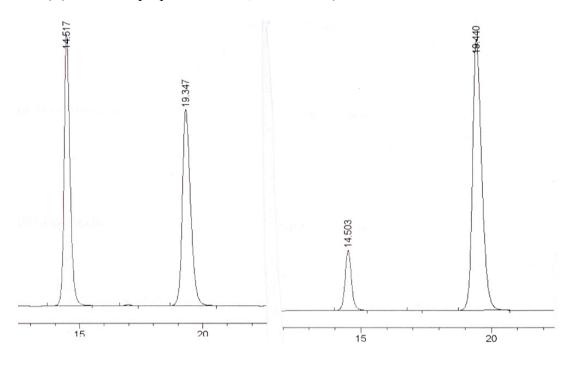

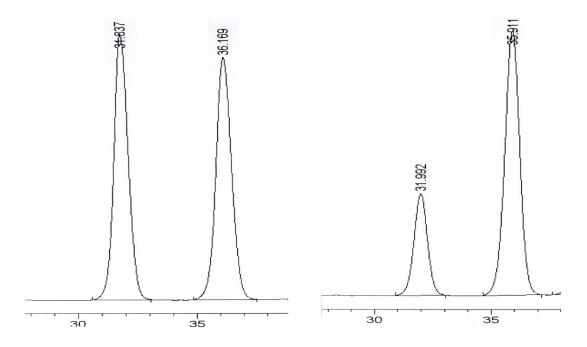

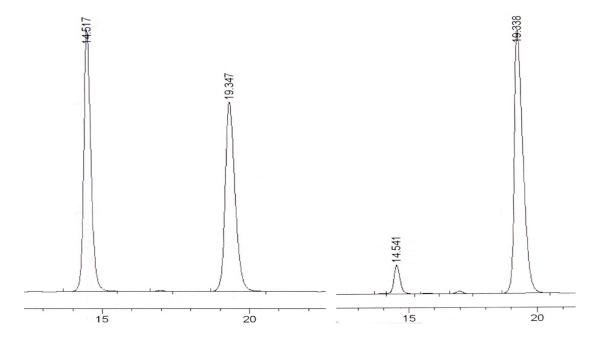

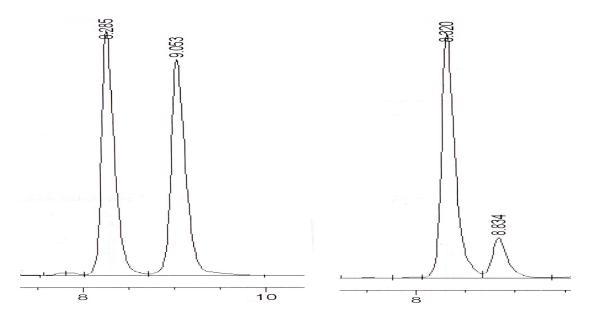

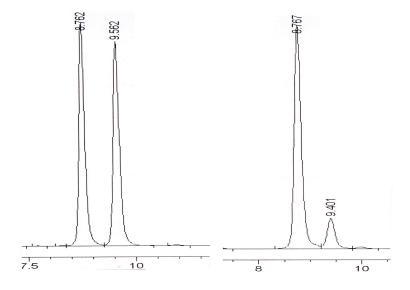

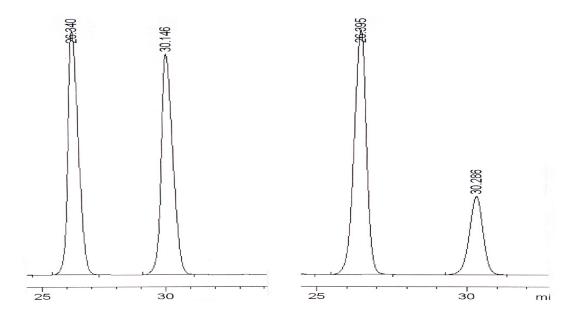

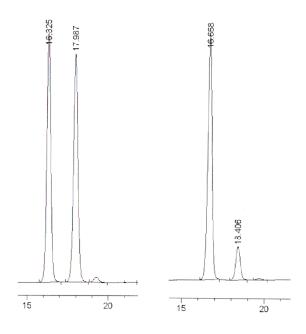

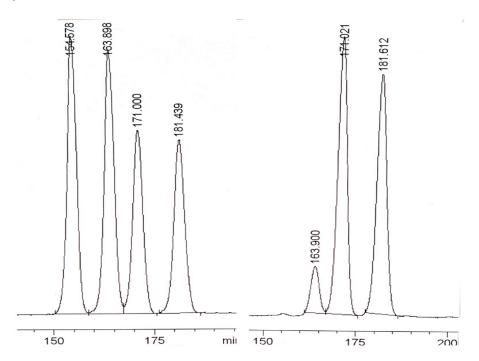

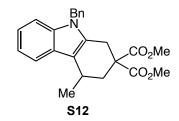

**Figure S14.** <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of **S12** in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



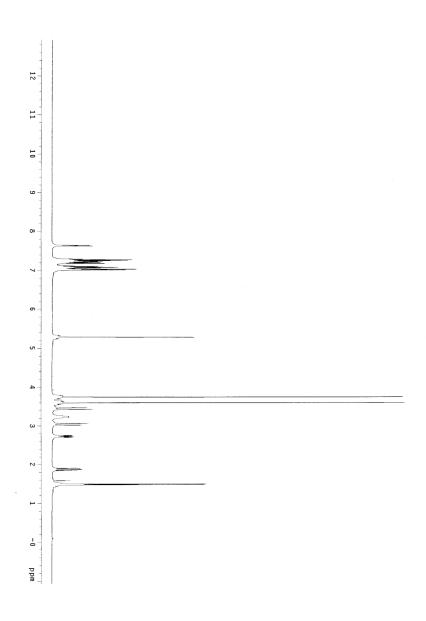
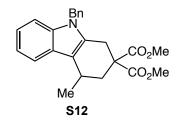
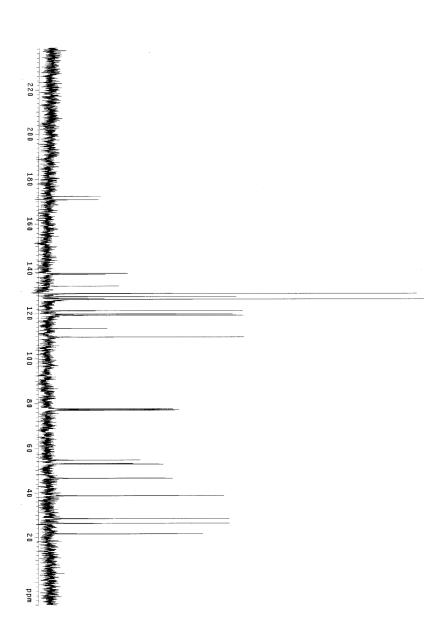
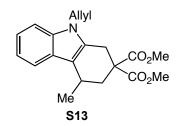


Figure S15.  $^{13}$ C  $\{^{1}$ H $\}$  spectrum of S12 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.





**Figure S16.** <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of **S13** in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



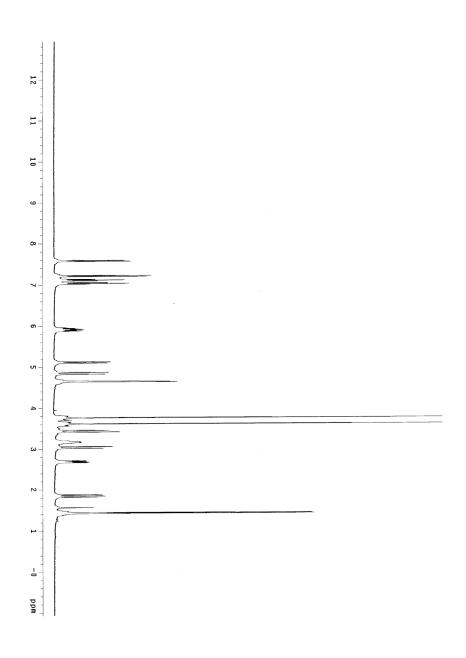
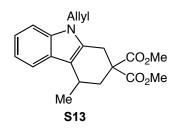


Figure S17.  $^{13}C\{^{1}H\}$  spectrum of S13 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



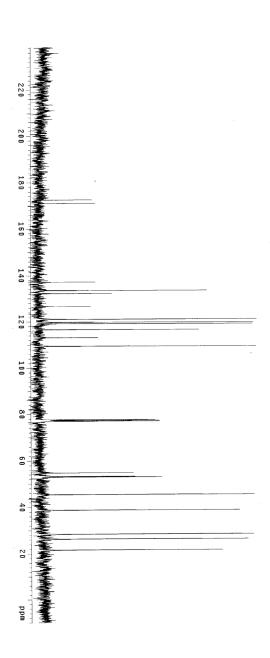


Figure S18. <sup>1</sup>H spectrum of S14 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>

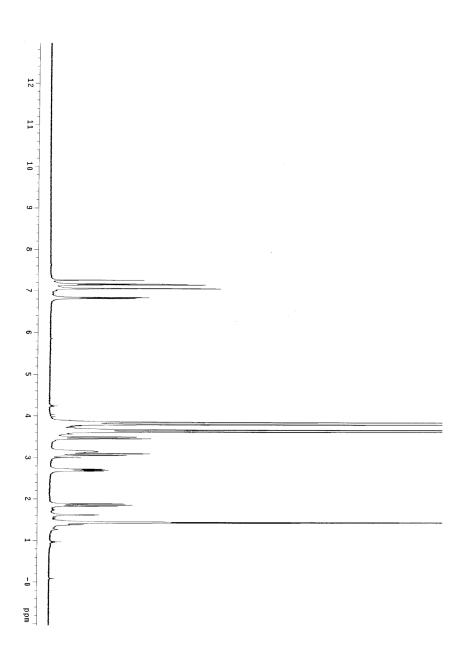
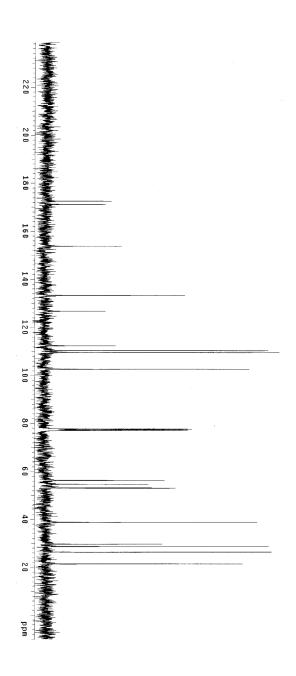
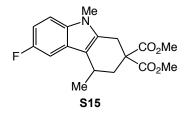


Figure S19.  $^{13}C\{^{1}H\}$  spectrum of S14 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



**Figure S20.** <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of **S15** in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



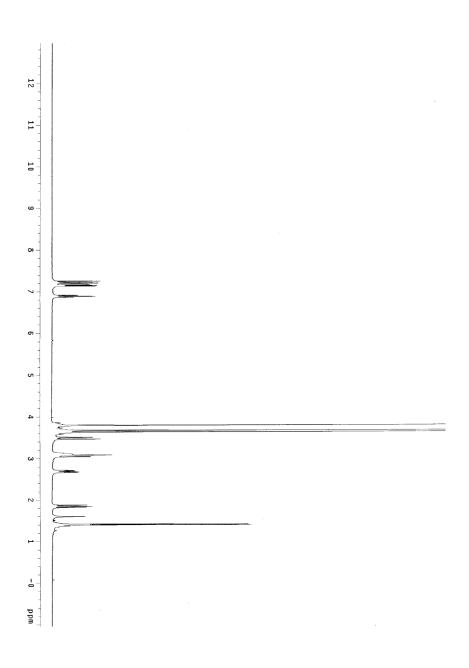
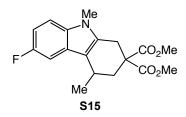


Figure S21.  $^{13}C\{^{1}H\}$  NMR spectrum of S15 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



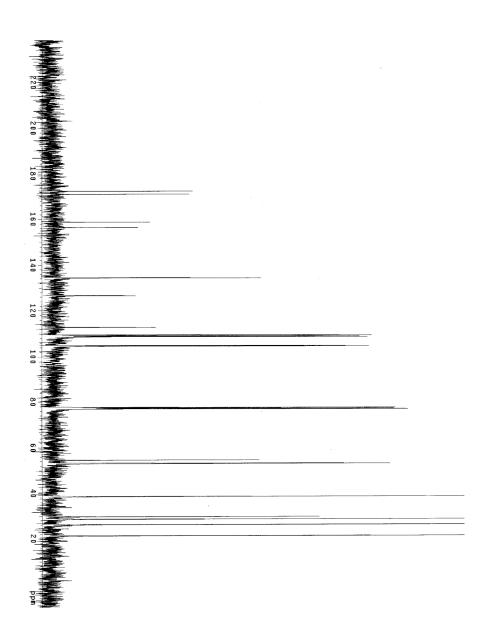
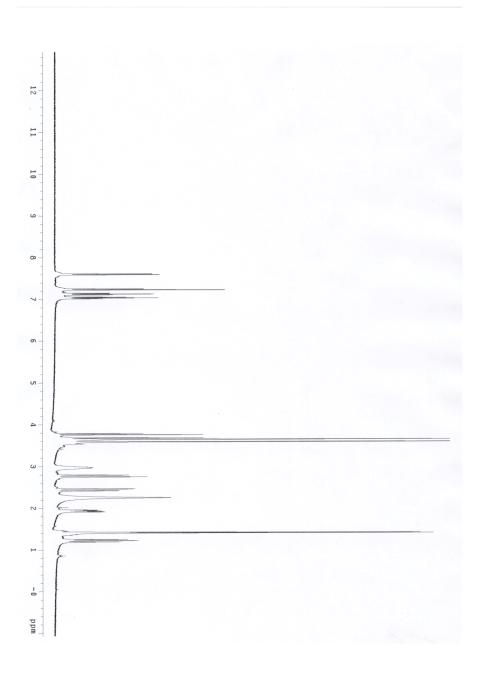
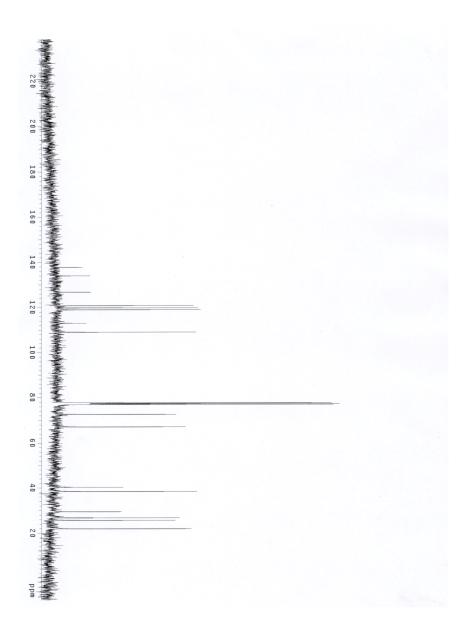


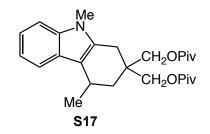
Figure S22. <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of S16 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.

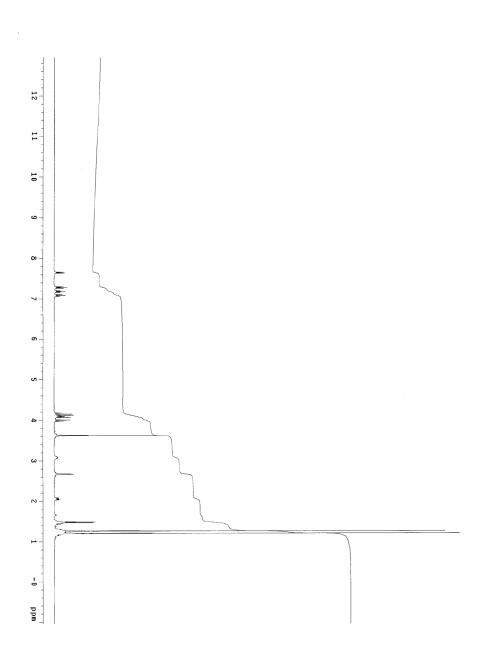


**Figure S23.**  $^{13}C\{^{1}H\}$  NMR spectrum of **S16** in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.

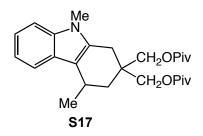


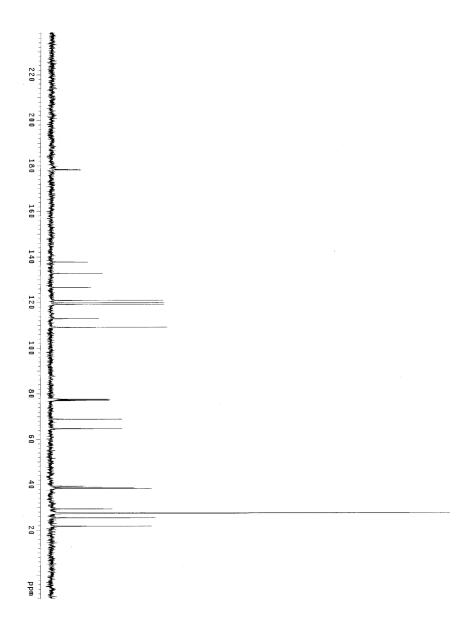
**Figure S24.** <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of **S17** in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.

**Figure S26.** <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of **S18** in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.

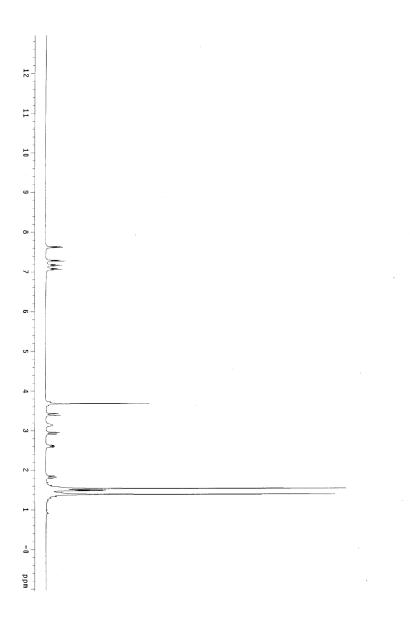
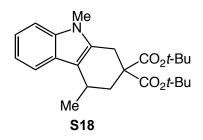


Figure S27.  $^{13}C\{^{1}H\}$  NMR spectrum of S18 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



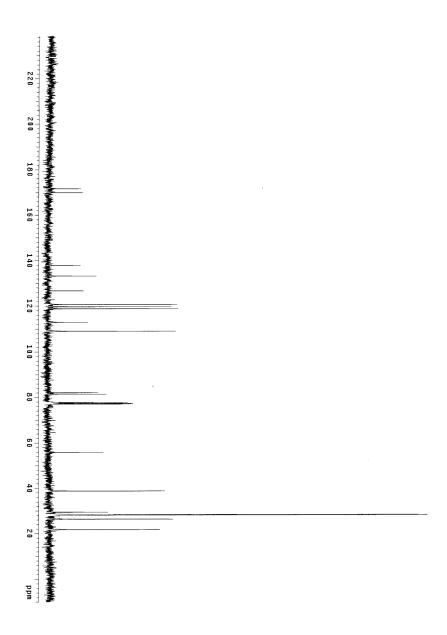
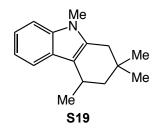


Figure S28. <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of S19 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



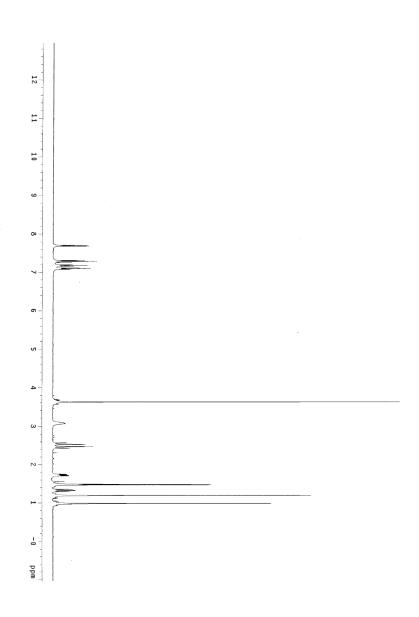
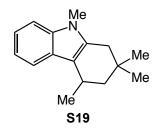


Figure S29.  $^{13}C\{^{1}H\}$  NMR spectrum of S19 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



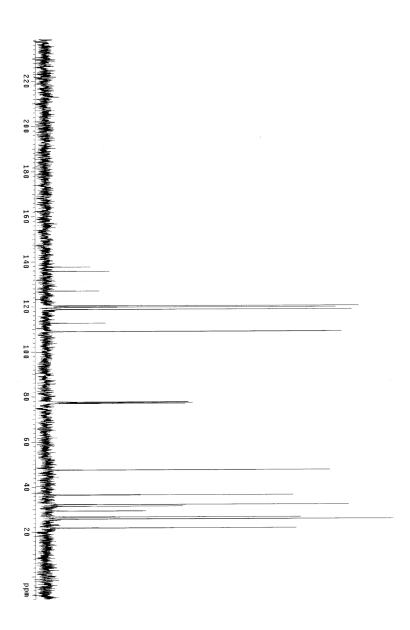
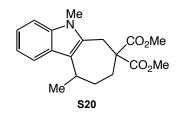


Figure S30. <sup>1</sup>H NMR spectrum of S20 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.



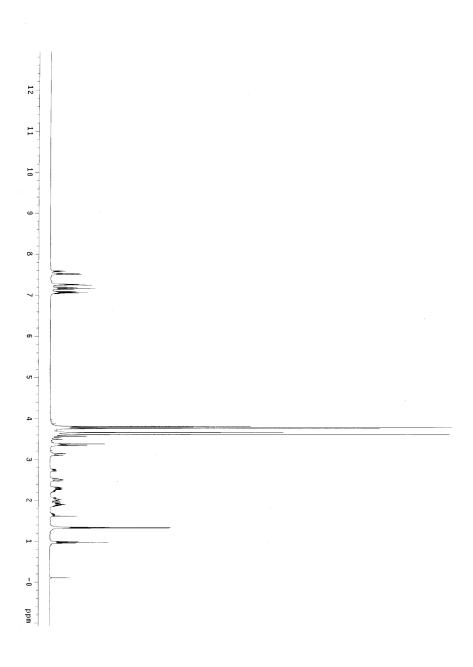
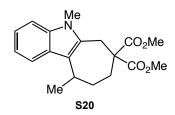
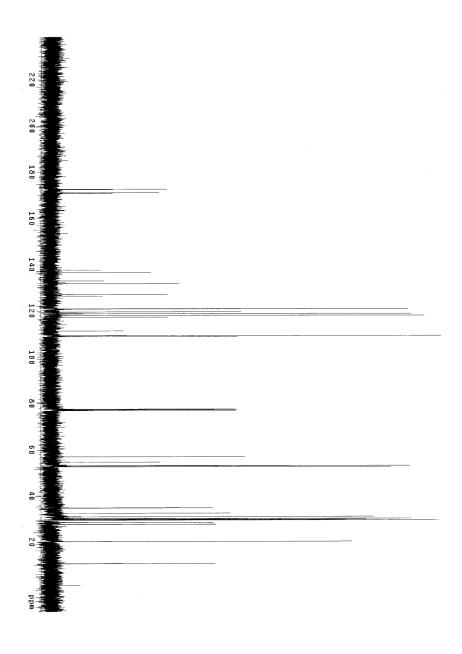
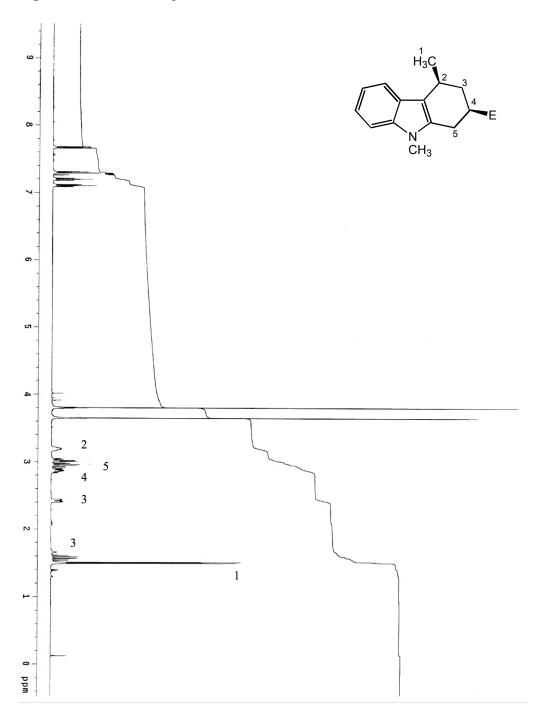


Figure S31.  ${}^{13}C\{{}^{1}H\}$  NMR spectrum of S20 in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.

**Figure S33**.  ${}^{13}C\{{}^{1}H\}$  NMR spectrum for *cis-8* in CDCl<sub>3</sub>.

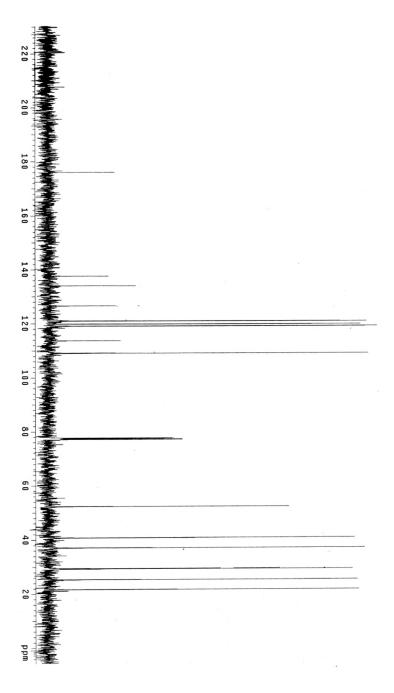
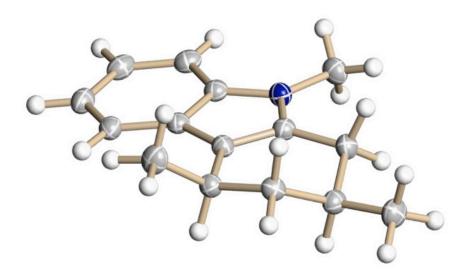


Figure S34. X-ray crystal structure of cis-S22.
