General: Melting point data were measured on Mettler FP62. All the ¹H NMR spectra were recorded with TMS as an internal standard on a Bruker AM-300 or Varian EM-360 (300 MHz). IR spectra were recorded on a Nicolet -AV360 spectrometer. EI Mass spectra were determined on an HP-5989A spectrometer. Elemental analysis for carbon and hydrogen were performed on a Rapid CHN-O analyzer. Optical rotations were obtained on a Perkin-Elmer 241 Autopol polarimeter.

Allyltributyltin ¹ (2) was prepared according to the reported procedure. All aldehydes, amines, and solvents are commercially available and were used after standard purification.

Typical procedure for preparation of N-Tosyl α-amino acids: ²

To a stirred solution of D(+)-phenylalanine (2.5g, 15 mmol) dissolved in 25 mL of 1.5 M NaOH at room temperature was added p-toluenesulfonyl chloride (3.4g, 18 mmol) in Et₂O (15 mL). White solid appeared after stirring for overnight. Concentrated HCl was added to the solution until pH = 2. The Et₂O layer was separated and aqueous layer was extracted with Et₂O (3 x 20 mL). The combined extracts were dried over Na₂SO₄ and concentrated. The crude product was recrystallized from Et₂O giving pure N-Tosyl-D-phenylalanine (3.8g), 79% yield. The other *N*-Tosyl α -amino acids were prepared according to a similar method.

Typical procedure for the allylation promoted by N-tosylglycine:

To a solution of N-tosylglycine (115 mg, 0.5 mmol) in acetonitrile (2.0 mL) were added successively benzaldehyde (53 mg, 0.5 mmol) and allyltributyltin (198 mg, 0.6 mmol) at room temperature. The reaction was quenched with NaOH (2 M, 2 mL) after 23 h. The solution was extracted with $CH_2Cl_2(3 \times 5 \text{ mL})$. The combined organic layer was dried over Na_2SO_4 and concentrated under reduced pressure to furnish the crude product, which was purified by silica gel chromatography (typical eluent: petroleum ether / $EtOAc\ 14:1(v/v)$) to afford $\bf 3a\ (68mg, 92\%)$.

The preparation of **P2**: 7

Chlorosulfonic acid (20 mL) was added dropwise to a suspension of polystyrene (**P1**, 2.0 g) in CHCl₃ (40 mL). After refluxed for 6h, the reaction solution was carefully poured into icewater (30 mL). The solid polymer was filtered and washed with distilled water (3 x 10 mL), CH₂Cl₂ (3 x 10 mL), CH₂Cl₂/THF (V/V = 4/1, 3/2; 3 x 10 mL), THF (3 x 10 mL), CH₂Cl₂ (3 x 10 mL), respectively. After dried in vacuum (8mmHg, 50 $^{\circ}$ C, overnight). The **P2** was obtained as a golden powder (3.9g). Elemental analysis: 4.61 mmol/g Cl and 4.80 mmol/g S. IR (KBr): v 2932, 2831, 1598,

The preparation of **P3**: 7

Et₃N (6.3 mL, 4.5 mmol) was added to the mixture of **P2** (1.84g, 9.0 mmol) and glycine ethyl ester (5.0 g, 36.0 mmol) in anhydrous CH_2Cl_2 (100 mL). The mixture was stirred at room temperature for 4 days. Then removed the solvent under reduced pressure and the resulted solid was immersed in MeOH (200 mL) overnight. The solid polymer was filtered and washed with distilled water (2 x 60 mL), CH_2Cl_2 (2 x 60 mL), MeOH/ distilled water (v/v = 1/1, 2 x 60 mL), MeOH (2 x 60 mL), respectively. After dried (in vacuum, 8mmHg, 50 °C, 16 h). The **P3** was obtained as a golden powder (2.2g). Elemental analysis: Cl < 0.5%. IR (KBr): v 3292, 2983, 2931, 1747, 1597, 1415, 1332, 1209, 1159, 1094, 1031, 970, 832cm⁻¹.

The preparation of **P4**:

P3 (2.2 g) was added to a solution of NaOH (6.0 g, 0.15 mol) in MeOH-H₂O (MeOH/H₂O = 40/10 mL). The mixture was stirred at room temperature overnight. IR showed that the saponification was completed. The solid was filtered and washed with distilled water (3 x 50 mL), MeOH/distilled water (v/v = 1/1, 2 x 50 mL), MeOH (2 x 50 mL). The resulted solid was treated with aqueous HCl (2 M, 100 mL) and stirred for 24 h, then filtered and washed with distilled water to neutral. The solid was stirred in distilled water for 48 h to remove the trace hydrochloric acid and dried in vacuum (1mmHg, P_2O_5 , 50° C overnight). Then the PS-supported *N*-tosylglycine **P4a** was obtained. Elemental analysis: 3.65mmol/g N, 3.89 mmol/g S. IR (KBr): v 3284, 2926, 1732, 1597, 1415, 1324, 1156, 1093, 834 cm⁻¹.

Typical procedure for the allylation of aldehydes promoted by P4a:

To a suspension of **P4a** (164 mg, 0.6 mmol) in acetonitrile (1.5 mL) were added successively benzaldehyde (53 mg, 0.5 mmol) and allyltributyltin (198 mg, 0.6 mmol)

at room temperature. After stirred for 3 h (TLC showed the reaction was completed). The suspension was filtered and washed with CH₃CN (3 x 5 mL). The filtrate was concentrated under reduced pressure to furnish the pure product, **3a** (71mg, 96%). The resulted polymer **P5a** (320 mg) was stirred in a solution of HCl (2 M, 15 mL) and Et₂O (5 mL) at room temperature for 24 h. Then filtered and washed with Et₂O (3 x 15 mL) to recover **P4a**. The Et₂O layer was dried and concentrated under reduced pressure to recover Bu₃SnCl (180 mg, 92% based on allyltributyltin).

Typical procedure for the three-component reaction promoted by P4a:

To a suspension of **P4a** (66 mg, 0.24 mmol) in acetonitrile (0.8 mL) were added successively benzaldehyde (22 mg, 0.2 mmol), aniline (18 mg, 0.2 mmol) and allyltributyltin (66 mg, 0.2 mmol) at room temperature. After stirred for 5 h (TLC showed the reaction was completed). The suspension was filtered and washed with CH₃CN (3 x 5 mL). The filtrate was concentrated under reduced pressure to furnish the desired product **5a** (44 mg, 99%).

To a solution of L-phenylglycine (7.6g, 50 mmol) in anhydrous MeOH (40 mL) was added SOCl₂ (9 mL) dropwise. After the addition was completed, the mixture was refluxed overnight. The solution was cooled to rt, then ether (30 mL) was added in and white solid was appeared. Compound 11(1.53g, 6 mmol) was dissolved in CH₂Cl₂ (32 mL) and the mixture was cooled to -78 °C. DIBAH (13.2 mL, 13.2 mmol, 1.0mol/L in toluene) was added dropwise under -78 °C. After the addition completed, the mixture was stirred for 3.5h until material 11 was disappeared. Cooled Methanol (5 mL) was added slowly to quench the excessive DIBAH under -78 °C. Saturated ice-cooled NH₄Cl (18mL) was added in slowly at this temperature. Then the mixture was warm to rt and filtered. The filtration residue was wash with CH₂Cl₂ (2x 10 mL). The aqueous phase was extracted with CH₂Cl₂ (3x 20 mL). The combined organic layer was dried over anhydrous Na₂SO₄ for 10 min and then dried again over anhydrous MgSO₄ for another 20min. After the solvent was concentrated under reduced pressure, crude Boc-L-phenylglycinal was obtained. Colorless 1.35g. Crude syrup Boc-L-phenylglycinal was dissolved in CH₂Cl₂ (30 mL) for further use. The solution of Boc-L-phenylglycinal in CH₂Cl₂ (7.5 mL, 1.5mmol) was concentrated under reduced pressure to remove CH₂Cl₂. A solution of borane-dimethyl sulfide (0.3mL, 0.6mmol, 2M in THF) was added into the solution of **13** (78.3mg, 0.2mmol) in dry THF (8mL) under 0 °C with stirring. The mixture was then stirred for 4h at rt. The excess B_2H_6 was quenched carefully with water (0.2mL). Then NaOH (2.3mL, 3M) and H_2O_2 (1.3mL, 30%) were added in successively. The mixture was stirred overnight at rt. THF was removed under reduced pressure and the residue was extracted by EtOAc (3 x 15mL), dried over anhydrous Na₂SO₄. To a solution of 14 (47mg, 0.12mmol) in anhydrous CH₂Cl₂ (3mL) was added MsCl (26mg, 0.23mmol) at -78 °C with stirring. Then Et₃N was added in slowly at this temperature. The mixture was stirred for 3 h at -78 °C, then was guenched with saturated NH₄Cl (1mL), and warmed to room temperature. The mixture was extracted with CH₂Cl₂ (3 x 5mL). The combined organic layer was washed with saturated NaHCO₃ (1 x 5mL), dried over anhydrous Na₂SO₄ and concentrated to afforded a colorless oil, 50mg. The oil was dissolved in anhydrous THF (2.5mL) and cooled with an ice-bath. t-BuOK (22mg, 0.2mmol) was added at 0 °C with stirring, then warmed to room temperature and stirred overnight. The reaction was quenched with saturated NH₄Cl (4mL), extracted with CH₂Cl₂ (3 x 8mL), and dried over anhydrous Na₂SO₄. To a solution of **15** (30mg, 0.076mmol) in anhydrous THF (1.5mL) was added 4 Å molecular sieve (15mg) and TBAF (120 μ L, 0.12mmol, 1M in THF) successively with stirring. The mixture was stirred overnight, then was quenched with water (2mL) at 0 $^{\circ}$ C and diluted with CH₂Cl₂ (5mL). After being stirred for about 10 minutes, the mixture was filtered, washed and extracted with CH₂Cl₂ (3 x 8mL), dried over anhydrous Na₂SO₄. After concentration, the crude product was purified by silica gel chromatography (eluent: petroleum ether / EtOAc 8:1 (v/v)) to afford product **7**, pale yellow oil, 20mg, 95% yield.
