
## Photosensitized Degradation of Bisphenol A by Dissolved Organic Matter Supporting Information

## Photodegradation of Trimethylphenol Promoted by Suwannee River Fulvic Acid

We conducted four control experiments to investigate the factors that contributed to the rapid photodegradation of TMP in the SRFA solutions. A solution of TMP ( $\sim$  4  $\mu$ M) and SRFA was irradiated in the solar simulator, incubated in the dark, and spiked with MeOH (20 mM). In an additional experiment, a solution of TMP ( $\sim$  4  $\mu$ M) only (no SRFA) was also irradiated. For a given experiment, the concentration TMP was measured using HPLC, and the decay kinetics were fit to the pseudo-first order model using least squares regression (Microsoft Excel) to determine the value of  $k_{obs}$ , the pseudo-first order rate coefficient. This parameter was used to gauge the reactivity of TMP in a given experiment.


The results are presented below (Figure S1). For the dark reaction,  $k_{obs}$  was not statistically different from zero, and as expected, TMP did not react with SRFA in the dark. We observed no statistical difference between the observed rate coefficients measured for TMP degradation in the absence and presence of methanol which suggested that trimethylphenol (TMP) did not degrade via a hydroxyl radical mediated pathway in the SRFA solutions. The control experiment (SRFA absent) revealed that direct photolysis of TMP could account for, *at most*, 30% of the reaction in the light.

## Effect of Irradiation on the Molar Extinction Coefficient of SRFA at 336 nm

We observed that the molar extinction coefficient ( $\epsilon$ ) at 336 nm for the SRFA solution consistently decreased during irradiation with our solar simulator (Figure S2). This observation suggested that photobleaching changed the composition of the chromophores in the SRFA solution.
