Oxidation of alcohol 106 to ketone 97. Solid Dess-Martin reagent (1.5 g, 3.5 mmol) was added in three portions over 5 min to a vigorously stirred solution of acetonide 106 (620 mg, 1.64 mmol) in CH₂Cl₂ (20 mL) at 0 °C under Ar. The solution was allowed to warm to ambient temperature and stirring was continued for an additional 1 h at which time Et₂O (20 mL) was added to precipitate the reagent followed by sat. aq. Na₂S₂O₃ (30 mL). The heterogeneous mixture was vigorously stirred until the organic phase became clear, at which time it was placed into a separatory funnel. The aqueous layer was separated and extracted with Et₂O (3 × 25 mL) and the combined organics were washed with sat. aq. NaHCO₃ (3 × 20 mL), brine (30 mL), and concentrated. The crude product was dissolved in CH₂Cl₂ (50 mL) and cooled to 0 °C and DBU (200 µL, 1.3 mmol) was added via syringe. After 10 min the reaction mixture was poured into a separatory funnel containing Et₂O (100 mL). The solution was washed with 0.5 M aq. HCl (80 mL), brine (50 mL), dried over MgSO₄, and concentrated to dryness. Alkylation of ketone 97 to tertiary alcohol 107. The ketone 97 (540 mg, 1.44 mmol) was alkylated with the cerium Grignard reagent (3 mmol) according to the procedure already described for the preparation of compound (82). Reduction of 107 and formation at cylic ether 108. To a stirred solution of tertiary alcohol 107 (45 mg, 0.11 mmol) in CH₂Cl₂ (3 mL) and Et₃SiH (0.9 mL, 5.5 mmol) was added TFA (170 μL, 2.2 mmol) via syringe. Elimination of tertiary alcohol 107 to form trisubstituted olefin 109. The tertiary hydroxyl group in 107 was eliminated using a modification of the SOCl₂ protocol described for compound 83. To a cooled (-60 °C) solution of alcohol 107 (406 mg, 0.97 mmol) in CH₂Cl₂ (5 mL) containing lutidine (5 mL) and pyridine (1 mL) under Ar was added SOCl₂ (550 µL, 7.5 mmol) via syringe. The reaction temperature was maintained for 0.5 h and then allowed to reach -20 °C over 2 h, at which time TLC analysis indicated complete conversion. The reaction mixture was quenched with sat. aq. NaHCO₃ (15 mL) at -20 °C and the resulting mixture was allowed to reach ambient temperature with stirring. The biphasic mixture was extracted with 1:1 Et₂O:hexanes (2 × 25 mL), and the combined organic phase was concentrated to dryness and azeotroped with toluene (3 × 10 mL). The residue was filtered through a plug of silica gel (ether:hexanes, 1:1) to afford a mixture of inseparable elimination products (14:2:1 ratio of 109:110:111, 366 mg, 94% total yield) as a clear oil. Hydrogenation of olefin 109 to compound 112. A 10 mL beaker equipped with a stirbar was charged with compound **109** (10 mg, 0.025 mmol, 14:2:1 mixture of isomers), EtOH or EtOAc (2 mL), and ca 5 mg of a hydrogenation catalyst (PtO₂, Pd/C, Pd(OH)₂,

IrP(cyhex)₃(COD)(py)PF₆, Rh black or Rh/Al₂O₃). The beaker was placed inside a Parr bomb and pressurized with 1-60 atm H₂. The atmosphere within the bomb was pressurized and vented (very slowly!) several times to flush other gases from the system. The solution was stirred from below via a stirplate for the indicated length of time (see Table 5). The isomeric olefins and corresponding reduction products were almost inseparable. A small amount of pure material was obtained by repeated PTLC for initial characterization and stereochemical determination. All product ratios were assigned by characteristic downfield ¹H NMR signals. To monitor reaction progress, the H₂ was slowly vented in a hood and the bomb was re-pressurized with 5 atm Ar before exposing the reaction mixture to the air. Preparation of hydroxyl keto ester 116 from 112 via 115. The mixture of olefins (110:111:112:113, 6:3:71:20 ratio, 27 mg, 0.067 mmol) obtained from the reduction of 109 (H₂, PtO₂) was placed in a 10 mL round-bottom flask fitted with a stirbar and a reflux condenser and dissolved in 1:1 THF: 3 M aq. HCl (2 mL). The biphasic solution was vigorously stirred and heated at 80 °C for 1 h. The resulting solution was cooled and poured into a separation funnel containing H₂O (10 mL) and EtOAc (10 mL). Saturated aq. NaHCO₃ was added until the pH became basic (>7). This mixture was extracted with EtOAc (3 × 10 mL) and concentrated to a gummy residue which appeared clean by TLC ($R_f = 0.15$, silica, hexanes:EtOAc, 4:1), but contained numerous products as determined by ¹H NMR spectroscopic analysis. This crude

mixture was oxidized with SO₃•py-DMSO as previously described (80 \rightarrow 81) to afford crude hydroxyl keto ester 116. Preparation of 6-epi-hamigeran A (118) from 117. To a solution of ketone 117 (8 mg, 0.023 mmol) in CH₂Cl₂ (0.5 mL) at 0 °C was added a solution of iPr₂NH in CH₂Cl₂ (0.05 M in iPr₂NH, 50 μ L, 0.002 mmol iPr₂NH), followed by slow addition of NBS as a solution in CH₂Cl₂ (0.1 M in NBS, 240 μ L, 0.024 mmol NBS). The resulting solution was stirred for 3 h and poured into H₂O (5 mL). The biphasic mixture was extracted with CH₂Cl₂ (2 × 3 mL), concentrated, and purified by PTLC (silica, hexanes:Et₂O, 10:1) to afford 6-epi-hamigeran (118) as a yellow solid

Hydroboration of olefin 109 to hydroxy acetonide 121. Neat BH₃•SMe₂ (4 mL, 40 mmol) was added to a mixture of olefins 109-111 (412 mg, 1.03 mmol, 14:2:1 ratio of isomers in favor of 109) in THF (4 mL). The solution was placed in an ultrasonic bath and sonicated for 8 h while the bath temperature was maintained at 40 °C. The reaction mixture was cooled to 0 °C, diluted with THF (8 mL), and cautiously quenched with 10% aq. NaOH (8 mL). After stirring for 12 h, the biphasic mixture was extracted with Et₂O (3 × 30 mL) and the combined extracts were dried (MgSO₄) and evaporated to afford a crude mixture of diasteromeric alcohols. De-oxygenation of alcohol 121 to acetonide ester 113. PhOC(S)Cl (125 μ L, 0.9 mmol) was added to a solution of 121 (190 mg, 0.45 mmol) in pyridine (3 mL) at room temperature, and the reaction mixture was stirred for 2 h. The reaction mixture was then diluted with Et₂O (10

mL) and poured into a separatory funnel containing 0.5 M aq. HCl (30 mL). The aqueous phase was extracted with Et₂O (2 × 20 mL) and the combined organic extracts were washed with 1 M aq. HCl (10 mL), brine (10 mL), dried over Na₂SO₄ and evaporated. The crude residue was filtered through a short silica column (ether-hexanes) and after concentration it was dissolved in benzene (3 mL) and nBu₃SnH (1 mL, 3.7 mmol), and AIBN (16 mg, 0.1 mmol) were added. 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Oxidation of 128 to hydroxyl keto ester 96. Preparation of debromohamigeran B methyl ether (122). A solution of hydroxy keto ester 96 (21 mg, 0.06 mmol) in MeOH (1 mL) and 2 M aq KOH (0.5 mL) was heated to 70 °C for 2 h. The reaction mixture was cooled to ambient temperature, acidified with 0.1 M aq. HCl (11 mL), and extracted with EtOAc (2 × 8 mL). Photochemical ring-contraction of diketone 122 to indanone derivative 123. A solution of diketone 122 (8 mg, 0.026 mmol) in benzene (2 mL) was placed in a 15 mL quartz test tube equipped with a stirbar. The tube was placed 20 cm from a 450 W Hanovia lamp (Kimax filter) and irradiated while vigorously stirred and monitored (TLC) for disappearance of starting material. Preparation of hamigeran E (7). MOM-protected diketone 130 (4 mg, 0.01 mmol) was dissolved in dioxane (1 mL) and 2 N aq. NaOH (0.3 mL) was added at 0 °C with stirring. A 30% aq. solution of H₂O₂ (0.15 mL) was added dropwise and the reaction mixture was stirred at that temperature for 10 min when TLC analysis indicated complete consuption of the starting material. The reaction mixture was diluted with H₂O (2 mL) and 2 M aq. HCl (0.5 mL), and the product was extracted out of the aq. phase with EtOAc (7 × 3 mL). The combined organic phase was concentrated to a reddish-brown residue which was dissolved in THF (3 mL) and 3 M aq. HCl (3 mL). Con. Concentration and flash chromatography (silica, pre-washed with 2% AcOH solution in CHCl₃, $2 \rightarrow 6\%$ MeOH in CHCl₃ with 0.5% AcOH) gave hamigeran E (7, 2 mg, 49% yield) as a colorless, amorphous solid (from benzene). 7: $R_f = 0.1$ (silica plates pre-treated with AcOH, 6% MeOH in CHCl₃ with 0.5% AcOH); IR (film): $v_{max} = 2400-3600$ (brm), 2955 (m), 1712 (s), 1554 (m), 1381 (m), 1250 (m) cm⁻¹; The ¹H NMR spectrum of hamigeran E was complicated by rotational isomers which made all of the signals broad: ¹H NMR (500 MHz, CDCl₃, 40 °C): $\delta = 6.57$ (s, 1 H), 3.80–3.76 (brm, 1 H), 2.39 (s, 3 H), 2.23-2.10 (brm, 2 H), 1.84-1.70 (brm, 2 H), 1.51 (s, 3 H), 1.30-1.27 (brm, 1 H), 1.18-1.08 (brm, 1 H), 0.82 (d, J = 6.0 Hz, 1 H), 0.60 (brs, 3 H). Preparation of 5-*epi*-dibromo hamigeran E (132). Diketone 93 (8 mg, 0.02 mmol) was dissolved in CH₂Cl₂ (1.5 mL) at 0 °C and *i*Pr₂NEt (50 μL) and MOMCl (25 μL) were added according to the procedure given for the preparation of 130 above. This MOM ether was dissolved in dioxane (2 mL) and 2 N aq. NaOH (0.6 mL) at 0 °C and a 30% aq. solution of H₂O₂ (0.3 mL) was added according to the procedure given for the preparation of 7. Work-up and treatment with acid (as before, see 130 \rightarrow 7) led to a solid residue which was purified by flash chromatography (silica pre-washed with 2% AcOH solution in CHCl₃, 2 \rightarrow 6% MeOH in CHCl₃ with 0.5% AcOH) gave 5-*epi*-dibromohamigeran E (132, 5 mg, 60% yield) as a yellow solid. 132: R_f = 0.1 (silica plates pre-treated with AcOH, 6% MeOH in CHCl₃ with 0.5% AcOH); IR (film): v_{max} = 2400–3600 (brm), 1716 (s), 1499 (m), 1386 (m) cm⁻¹; The NMR spectrum of hamigeran E was complicated by rotational isomers which make all of the peaks broad. ¹H NMR (500 MHz, CDCl₃, 40 °C): δ = 5.16 (d, J = 4.0 Hz, 1 H), 3.30-3.25 (brm, 1 H), 2.70 (brs, 3H), 2.39–2.33 (brm, 1 H), 2.22–2.12 (brm, 1 H), 2.11–2.04 (brm, 1 H), 1.61–1.55 (brm, 2 H), 0.88–0.83 (brm, 1H), 0.83 (brs, 3 H), 0.65–0.59 (brd, J = 6.0 Hz, 3 H), 0.82 (d, J = 5.4 Hz, 1 H).

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
