NOTES:

Because the BPS Statistics Ministry has not recently classified cities by population (e.g. small, medium, large), the Ministry of Public Works and Housing's classification system was used. All medium-sized cities with 100,000–500,000 people, large cities with 500,000–1 million people,

and metropolitan areas with more than 1 million people according to the last census<sup>(1)</sup> are depicted in Maps 1–2. All medium-sized cities, large cities and metropolitan areas excluding the capital, Jakarta (as defined by Indonesia’s Ministry of Public Works and Housing), fall under this study’s definition of intermediary cities.

While intermediary cities are, broadly speaking, rural–urban exchange centres with 50,000–1 million people, some Indonesian cities with more than 1 million people still function as zones of rural–urban interaction and serve secondary roles in a Jakarta-dominated urban hierarchy. This study considers these cities intermediary as well, aligned with the inclusive definition used by Roberts et al.<sup>(2)</sup> In contrast, Oberman et al.<sup>(3)</sup> classify cities according to a slightly different working definition. They aggregate city populations by urban district boundaries rather than city jurisdiction boundaries, which is why populations in what they term “middleweight” cities span 150,000–10 million. This study chooses to reference Oberman et al.’s population and economic projections, despite their different classification system, because of their clear city-by-city breakdown.
