

Appendix I

The success probability of the first hop can be calculated by

$$P_{SUC_{R_i U_i}} \square P \left(\frac{\rho_{R_i} \Upsilon_{R_i U_i}^{-\alpha} |H_{R_i U_i}|^2}{I_{U_i}} \geq \theta_{U_i} \right) \quad (20)$$

$$P_{SUC_{R_i U_i}} \square P \left(|H_{R_i U_i}|^2 \geq \theta_{U_i} \rho_{R_i}^{-1} \Upsilon_{R_i U_i}^{\alpha} I_{U_i} \right) \quad (20-a)$$

where I_{U_i} is defined in Eq. (3) as the overall interference received at U_i and written as

$$I_{U_i} \cong \sum_{\{i, j\} \in \phi} \left(\rho_{R_j} \Upsilon_{R_j U_i}^{-\alpha} |H_{R_j U_i}|^2 \right) + \left(\rho_{R_j} \rho_{R_i} \Upsilon_{R_j R_i U_i}^{-\alpha} |H_{R_j R_i U_i}|^2 \right) \quad (20-b)$$

Let us define $f_{I_{U_i}}(t) = dP(I_{U_i} \leq t)$ as the PDF of I_{U_i} . The integration of $f_{I_{U_i}}(t)$ using the CCDF $F_{I_{U_i}}^c(t)$, transforms it as

$$\nabla(s)_{U_i} \square \int_0^{\infty} F_{RU}^c(st) \square f_{I_{U_i}}(t) dt \quad (20-c)$$

Note that the power of desired signal is distributed as $|H_{R_i U_i}|^2 \square X_{i N_R}^2$, and the probability of success given is by

$$P_{SUC_{R_i U_i}} \square P(SINR_{U_i} \geq \theta_{U_i}) \square P \left(|H_{R_i U_i}|^2 \geq \theta_{U_i} \rho_{R_i}^{-1} \Upsilon_{R_i U_i}^{\alpha} I_{U_i} \right) \quad (20-d)$$

$$\square \int_0^{\infty} F_{RU}^c(st) \square f_{I_{U_i}}(t) dt \quad (20-e)$$

$$= \nabla(s) \Big|_{s=\theta_{U_i} \rho_{R_i}^{-1} \Upsilon_{R_i U_i}^{\alpha}} \quad (20-f)$$

Finally, using the CCDF $F_{RU}^c(st) = e^{-t}$ and laplace transform, the success probability can be expressed using the transformation of $f_{I_{U_i}}(t)$ as

$$\nabla(s)_{U_i} \square \int_0^{\infty} F_{RU}^c(st) \square f_{I_{U_i}}(t) dt \quad (21)$$

$$\lambda\{f_{1U_i}(t)\}(s) = \lambda_{1U_i} \quad (21-a)$$

Finally, using the CCDF $F_{RU}^C(t) = \prod_n e^{-nt} \prod_i e^{a_n t^i}$ the transformation of $f_{1U_i}(t)$ is given by

$$\nabla(s)_{U_i} \square \int_0^\infty F_{RU}^C(st) \square f_{1U_i}(t) dt \quad (21-b)$$

$$\nabla(s) \square \int_0^\infty \left(\prod_n e^{-nst} \prod_i e^{a_n (st)^i} \right) \cdot f_{1U_i}(t) dt \quad (21-c)$$

$$\nabla(s) \square \prod_n \prod_i a_n s t^i \left[\int_0^\infty (e^{-nt} t^i f_{1U_i}(t) dt) \right] \quad (21-e)$$

$$\nabla(s) \square \prod_n \prod_i a_n s^i \left[\lambda(t^i f_{1U_i}(t))(ns) \right] \quad (21-f)$$

$$\nabla(s) \square \prod_n \prod_i \left[a_n (-s)^i \frac{d^i}{d(ns)^i} \lambda_{1U_i}(ns) \right] \quad (21-g)$$

$$\nabla(s) \square \prod_n \prod_i \left[a_n \left(\frac{-s}{n} \right)^i \frac{d^i}{d(ns)^i} \lambda_{1U_i}(ns) \right] \quad (22)$$

where Eq. (21-g) is obtained by using Laplace transform property $t^n f(t) \leftrightarrow (-1)^n \frac{d^n}{ds^n} \lambda[f(t)]_s$. Using the moment-generating function of $X_{i N_R}^j$ and Gamma distributions, and applying it to [62] (Thr. 1)] we can get Eq. (10)

Appendix II

Building on [62] (Thr. 3)], we have $\nu(s)$ in Eq. (11) is bounded as $\nu(s) \in [\nu^{\max}(s), \nu^{\min}(s)]$, where $\nu^{\max}(s)$ and $\nu^{\min}(s)$ are defined in Eq. (15) and Eq. (16), respectively. Then, the lower and upper bounds on $\lambda_{1U_i}(s)$ in Eq. (13) and Eq. (14) readily follow.

Appendix III

The success probability of the RU hop is calculated as

$$P_{SUC_{R_i U_i}} \square P(SINR_{U_i} \geq \theta_{U_i}) \quad (23)$$

$$P_{SUC_{R_i U_i}} \square P\left(\frac{\rho_{R_i} \Upsilon_{R_i U_i}^{-\alpha} |H_{R_i U_i}|^2}{I_{U_i}} \geq \theta_{U_i}\right) \quad (23-a)$$

$$P_{SUC_{R_i U_i}} \square P\left(|H_{R_i U_i}|^2 \geq \theta_{U_i} \rho_{R_i}^{-1} \Upsilon_{R_i U_i}^{\alpha} I_{U_i}\right) \quad (23-b)$$

where I_{U_i} is defined in Eq. (3) as,

$$I_{U_i} \cong \sum_{\{i,j\} \in \phi} \left(\rho_{R_j} \Upsilon_{R_j U_i}^{-\alpha} |H_{R_j U_i}|^2 \right) + \left(\rho_{R_j} \rho_{R_i} \Upsilon_{R_j R_i U_i}^{-\alpha} |H_{R_j R_i U_i}|^2 \right) \quad (23-c)$$

The desired signal is distributed as $|H_{R_i U_i}|^2 \square X_{i N_R}^j$. On the other hand, the moment generating function of

$X_{i N_R}^j$ distribution can provide the Laplace transform of I_{U_i} [69] (P. 125) and can be computed as

$$\lambda_{I_{U_i}}(s) \square \xi \left(\prod_{\{i,j\} \in \phi} \xi \left\{ \exp \left(-s \frac{\rho_{R_i} \Upsilon_{R_i U_i}^{-\alpha} |H_{R_i U_i}|^2}{N_R} \right) \right\} \right) \quad (23-d)$$

Appendix IV

Given the definition of $\mathcal{G}(s, r)$

$$\psi(s, D_{RD}) \in \left[\frac{1}{1 + s \rho_{R_i} (r + \Gamma_{RU})^{-\gamma}}, \frac{1}{1 + s \rho_{R_i} (r - \Gamma_{RU})^{-\gamma}} \right] \quad (24)$$

where r is the origin point of relay and Γ_{RU} is the distance between RN and user. We can recall that distances between R_i to U_i , then the maximum and minimum $\lambda_{I_{U_i}}$ can be formulated as stated in Eq. (13) and Eq. (14).
