#### Appendix A

### **Ideological and Programmatic Foundations of UNCG CHANCE**

Program application process. CHANCE facilitates college-going expertise. Interested youth complete a short application and submit an official high school transcript. This process is supported by an online chat feature and bilingual program support specialists and socializes would-be CHANCE participants to the implicit knowledge required when applying for undergraduate programs. Bilingual program specialists equipped with Spanish and English, create opportunities for broader communication with Spanish speaking applicants and their families. Additionally, CHANCE participants who apply for admission at UNC Greensboro may use the transcript they have on-file through this program for initial review, simplifying the college application process. Applicants provide academic and career interests; these details are incorporated into session planning. CHANCE responds to participants' aspirations relative to their academic and professional goals. CHANCE simulates college life and builds on their motivation to achieve college admission. Program participants practice navigating campus, discover myriad facilities, and envision themselves as future college students.

**Program structure.** CHANCE provides knowledge about college and enables youth's scholar-activist identities through formal and informal opportunities. Participants participate in college preparation, leadership development, and civic engagement sessions. As a college immersion program, participants experience an introduction to residential life and navigating an institution of higher education. The formal curriculum includes essential college-going topics: class seminars across several disciplines, admissions and financial aid presentations, leadership development, team building activities, campus organizations, cultural immersion experiences, sports activities, and civic responsibilities (UNCG, 2019). The program responds to Latinx youth

diversity and cultural relevance by offering sessions tailored to a variety of participant interests and lived experiences. For example, among the broad array of sessions, one is designed to address students' families and parents while another is relevant to undocumented students. The CHANCE organizational committee integrates participant feedback for future programming.

Campus and community engagement. CHANCE, and its mission of responding to

Latinx youth college access, elicits strong and encouraging participation from a range of people.

UNC Greensboro faculty teach classes, alumni and special guests offer talks and lead information sessions, and current students share their experiences of applying for, being accepted, and attending college. For the most recent CHANCE session in 2019, "32 UNC Greensboro students served as mentors and more than 60 faculty, staff, and administrators from across campus engaged with campers" (UNCG, 2019). Educational equity is materially important to those involved in supporting CHANCE, evidenced by the broad range of engagement, financial support, and invested time and effort.

A distinguishing feature of CHANCE is the prioritization of community, within and beyond campus. The "civic responsibility" experiences prioritized in the program occur formally through the curriculum and informally through participants' actions and discussion contributions. Participants are encouraged to exercise agency in developing their networks while being supported by the program's structure and purpose. Structurally, CHANCE provides space and time for participants to engage with each other, staff, and faculty to "develop a peer/professional network forging positive, healthy mentorship connections focused on academic success and personal growth" (UNCG, 2019).
