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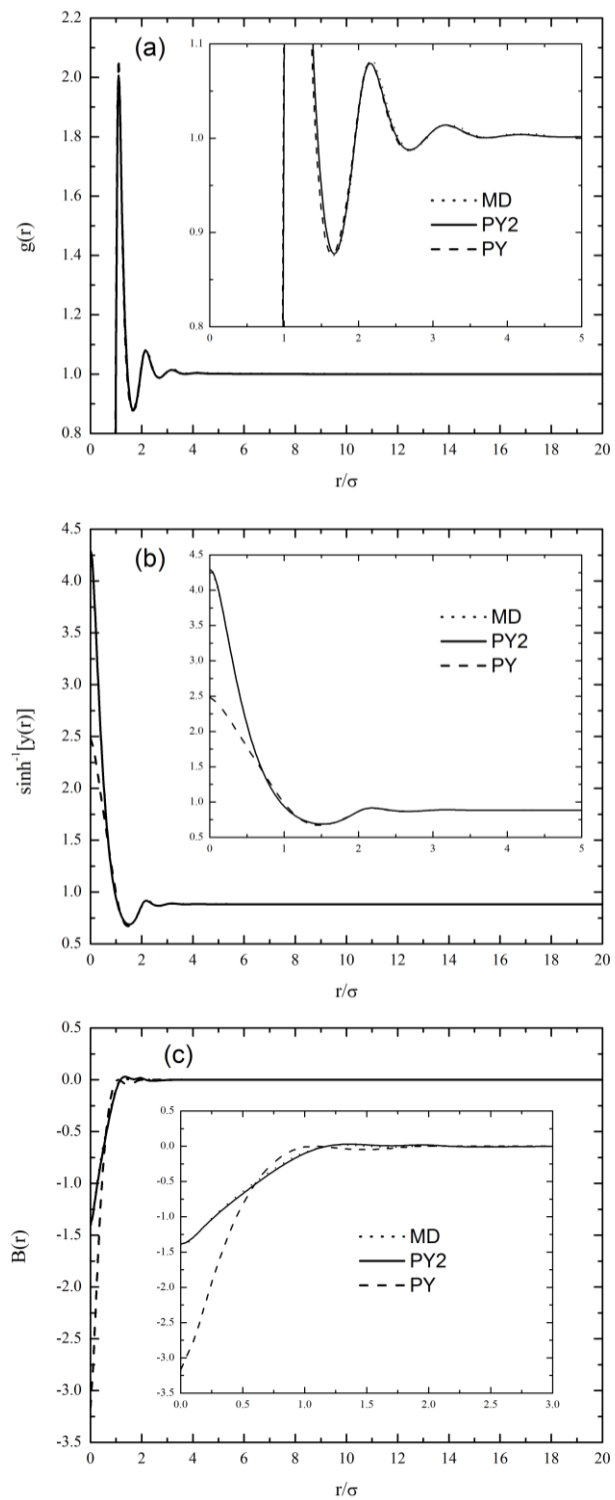


Figure S1. The radial distribution function (a), cavity correlation function (b) and bridge function (c) for $T^* = 1.31, \rho^* = 0.460$.

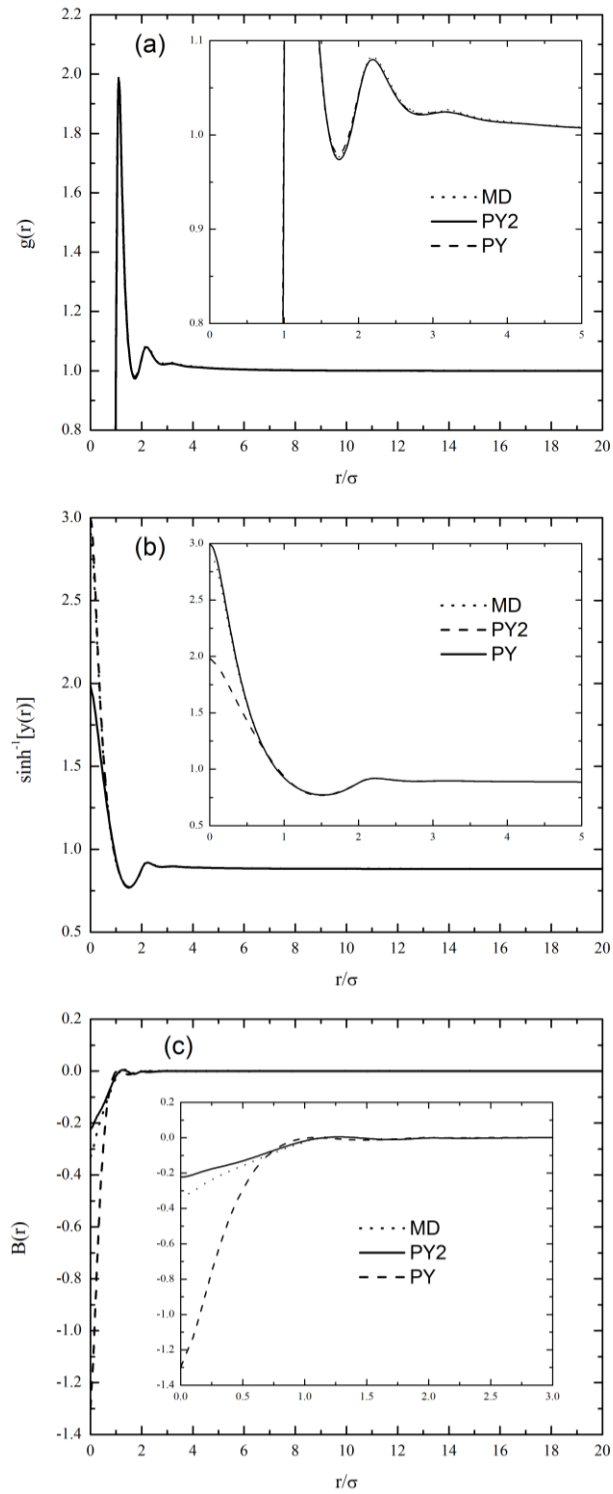
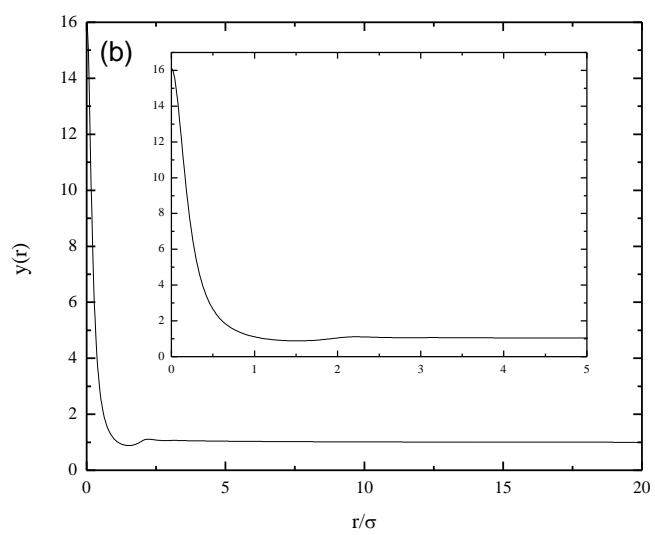
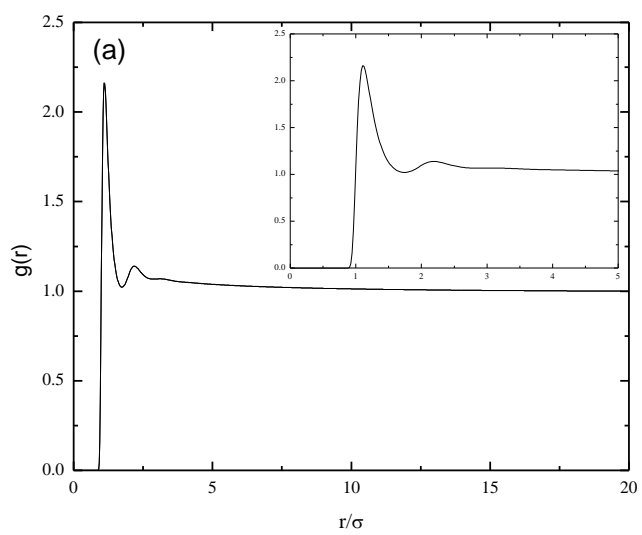


Figure S2. The radial distribution function (a), cavity correlation function (b) and bridge function (c) for $T^* = 1.4, \rho^* = 0.280$.



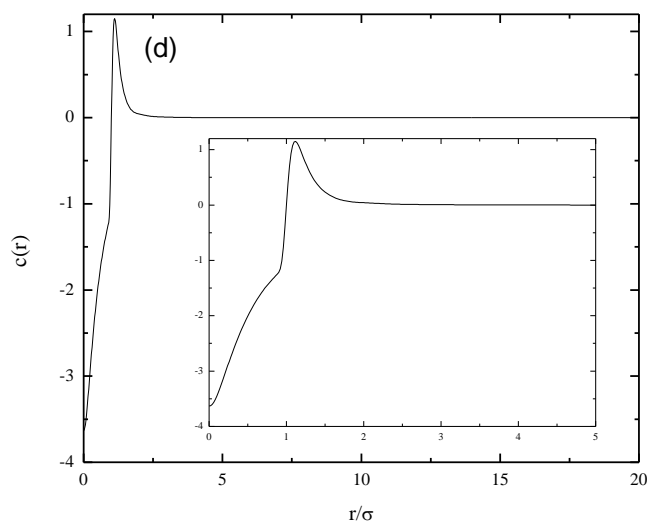
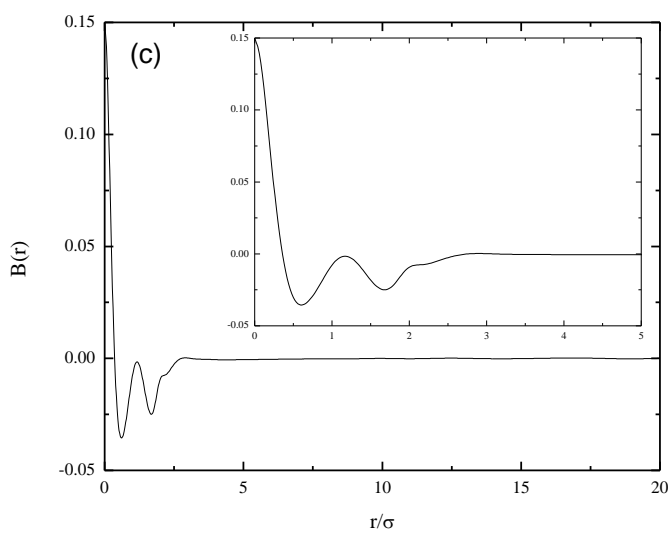
