

Supermodel Carol Alt's body was in need of repair. Gracing the covers of magazines, and fame was not enough when there is a lack of sleep, eating healthy, working long hours, and living on coffee and sugar. Today it's not about survival like it was two decades ago, but living. In her 20s, she believed her body could take the mornings of Scotch coffee, alcohol, sugar, not eating, sleeping, and over taking antacids without repercussions.

he moment of clarity happened in her thirties during s shoot in the Amazon when a younger model was preferred. She was tired, she felt bloated, and her hair was brittle. "I felt like a blob," the 57-year-old wrote in A Healthy You.

She hid behind rocks so people wouldn't notice her belly. A photographer also told the cover model that she was not in shape for the shoot.

Later, a friend called her. He was concerned about her health and encouraged her to make a change. She connected with Dr. Timothy Brantley, a naturopathic doctor and changed her life.

He recommended to eat a raw diet of vegetables, fruits, nuts, and not to cook anything over 115 degrees.

Her body started to recover and heal itself. We hear a lot about celebrities moving to a raw diet, but what is it really? A raw diet is natural, unprocessed, and in an uncooked state. It consists of dehydrated fruits, vegetables, nuts, sprouts, and fish.

"When I first went raw 17 years ago, you couldn't get a raw snack, you couldn't get a raw olive, so I made most of my own foods," said the host "A Healthy You & Carol Alt" on Fox News Channel.

Although she is armed with information, some doctors dismissed this alternative lifestyle, but Alt can battle it with any health expert.

There is a lot of misinformation out there and after talking to health experts.



"There are many choices and changes that you can make to impact your life," the native New Yorker explained.

"I make my choices out of education, not desperation. When you feed your body the best you can and your body is functioning optimally, it's able to defend itself against all kinds of aggressors, whether it's stress, bad air, bad food, bad water, or whatever it is. We can't control a lot of that. But the one thing we can absolutely control 100 percent of the time is the food we put into our bodies."

Carol wants to help you, and with three lifestyle books, and A Healthy You—anyone can make the change with her practical tips.

Not only will you get educated, take control of your life, but will just adore this humble, funny and amazing woman.

Here are Carol's tips on getting started, if eating raw freaks you out:

- Replace chips with kale or vegetable chips.
- Replace soda with raw coconut water or KeVita
- Replace your sweets with fruit leather, it has the texture of candy and won't spike you blood sugar
- Try raw cookie dough can be made with almond flour, honey, dates, and vanilla.
- Eat as close to nature as possible

Here's an interview with Beth Bader of <u>The Cleaner Plate</u> <u>Club</u>:

"Raw" seems like an easy diet to prepare, but some of the methods can take time and special equipment. What's a simple starting point?

Using a blender, you can make everything from soup to dessert. Start with things like guacamole, salsa and soups. You can also use a pot and hot water (up to 115 degrees) to

warm kelp noodles to add to a blended soup. You can make a mousse from raw chocolate and avocado.

Also begin to think of a dehydrator as a crock-pot that works while you're away. It's a simple option once you are in the habit of using it.

Of course, you'll want to make all kinds of fresh salads.

How do you maintain your raw food plan when you are eating out or in social settings?

I look for foods that I know will be raw. If I have any doubts, I ask the chef. If there's any question, I just don't eat it.

There's a bit of discipline in this. You have to eat on a schedule and make sure you are getting the food you need. I may lunch even if I am not hungry, especially when I know I'll be dining out later. It's important to make sure you are not feeling deprived and hungry; otherwise you may find yourself craving things like the bread on the table.

Do you ever miss cooked foods and sometimes indulge?

My diet is 75 to 95 percent raw. When you eat raw foods, you feel so much better that you don't want to eat anything else. My one indulgence is munching on popcorn when my favorite sports team plays.

Do you have any final advice on exploring a raw diet? Relax and have fun trying different things. If you cheat, it's okay. If you feel deprived in any way, go eat. Above all, enjoy the adventure.

leeping for longer each night is a simple lifestyle intervention that could help reduce intake of sugary foods and lead to a generally healthier diet, according to a King's College London

Sleep is a modifiable risk factor for various conditions including obesity and cardio-metabolic disease with some figures suggesting more than a third of adults in the UK are not getting enough sleep.

study.

The randomised controlled trial, which is published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, looked at the feasibility of increasing sleep hours in adults who typically slept for less than the recommended minimum for adults of seven hours.

Alongside this, the researchers undertook a pilot investigation that looked at the impact of increasing sleep hours on nutrient intake. They found that extending sleep patterns resulted in a 10-gram reduction in reported intake of free sugars compared to baseline levels. The researchers also noticed trends for reduced intake of total carbohydrates reported by the sleep extension group.

The principal investigator, Dr Wendy Hall, from the Department of Nutritional Sciences observed: 'The fact that extending sleep led to a reduction

in intake of free sugars, by which we mean the sugars that are added to foods by manufacturers or in cooking at home as well as sugars in honey, syrups and fruit juice, suggests that a simple change in lifestyle may really help people to consume healthier diets.'

The 21 participants allocated to the sleep extension group undertook a 45-minute sleep consultation which aimed to extend their time in bed by up to 1.5 hours per night. A further 21 control group participants received no intervention in their sleep patterns.

Each participant in the sleep extension group received a list with a minimum of four appropriate sleep hygiene behaviours that were personalised to their lifestyle (such as avoiding caffeine before bed time, establishing a relaxing routine and not going to bed too full or hungry) and a recommended bedtime.

For seven days following the consultation, participants kept sleep and estimated food diaries and a wrist-worn motion sensor measured exactly how long participants were asleep for, as well as time spent in bed before falling asleep.

86 percent of those who received
sleep advice increased time spent in
bed and half increased their sleep
duration (ranging from 52 minutes to

nearly 90 minutes). Three participants achieved a weekly average within the recommended seven to nine hours. There were no significant differences shown in the control group.

The data also suggested, however, that this extended sleep may have been of lesser quality than the control group and researchers believe that a period of adjustment to any new routine may be required.

Lead researcher, Haya Al Khatib, from the Department of Nutritional Sciences commented: 'Sleep duration and quality is an area of increasing public health concern and has been linked as a risk factor for various conditions. We have shown that sleep habits can be changed with relative ease in healthy adults using a personalised approach.

'Our results also suggest that increasing time in bed for an hour or so longer may lead to healthier food choices. This further strengthens the link between short sleep and poorer quality diets that has already been observed by previous studies.

'We hope to investigate this finding further with longer-term studies examining nutrient intake and continued adherence to sleep extension behaviours in more detail, especially in populations at risk of obesity or cardio-vascular disease.'


When the couple finally said "I do," surrounded by flowers, fruits, and vegetables, guests and excited store patrons erupted in applause and praise.

"We wanted to know if hug-related behavior is affected by the emotional context of the give situation," explains lead author Julian Packheiser. "Moreover, we wanted to find out if motor characteristics such as handedness determine the lateralisation of the embrace."

Goodbye and aviophobia – joyful reunion and relief

To this end, the researchers studied more than 2,500 hugs. At a German airport, they evaluated approx. 1,000 embraces at the international departures and arrivals terminals each. During departure, they assumed that the people involved in the hug experienced negative emotions: first, because they say goodbye to their loved ones, and second because, according to studies, almost 40 percent of all air travellers

suffer from aviophobia -- which augments the negative effect. On arrival, on the other hand, positive emotions are generated thanks to joyful reunions and the relief experienced after the flight is finally over.

Hugs of strangers in the street

In order to study neutral embraces, the researchers made use of the video platform YouTube. Here, they found clips of actors who offered blindfolded hugs to strangers in the street. They analysed more than 500 such embraces.

Emotions are processed in the right hemisphere

Consistent with older studies, the researchers determined that most people show a preference for right-sided hugs. At the same time, it emerged that left-sided hugs occur more frequently in positive as well as negative situations. "This is because of the influence of the right hemisphere, which controls the left side of the body and processes both positive and negative emotions," explains Julian Packheiser. "When people hug, emotional and motor networks in


the brain interact and cause a stronger drift to the left in emotional contexts."

Hugging a shop window mannequin

In order to investigate the influence of handedness and footedness, the researchers subsequently asked 120 test participants to hug a mannequin after listening to various positive, negative and neutral short stories via headphones. The participants' handedness and footedness were recorded in a survey. "Handedness and footedness can indeed predict the lateralisation of an embrace," says Julian Packheiser. Right-handed people tend to hug the other person from the right side, much more often than left-handed people.

An embrace between two men is an outlier: here, the researchers observed a strong left-hand drift — even in neutral situations. "Our interpretation is that many men consider embraces between men to be something negative; therefore, they tend to perceive hugs as negative even in a neutral situation, such as saying hello," opines Sebastian Ocklenburg. Accordingly, the right hemisphere is activated due to negative emotions and affects the motion to the left.

Stressed out? Try smelling your partner's shirt



The scent of a romantic partner can help lower stress levels, new psychology research from the University of British Columbia has found.

he study, published yesterday in the Journal of Personality and Social Psychology, found women feel calmer after being exposed to their male partner's scent. Conversely, being exposed to a stranger's scent had the opposite effect and raised levels of the stress hormone, cortisol.

"Many people wear their partner's shirt or sleep on their partner's side of the bed when their partner is away, but may not realize why they engage in these behaviours," said Marlise Hofer, the study's lead author and a graduate student in the UBC department of psychology. "Our findings suggest that a partner's scent alone, even without their physical presence, can be a powerful tool to help reduce stress."

For the study, the researchers recruited 96 opposite-sex couples. Men were given a clean T-shirt to wear for 24 hours, and were told to refrain from using deodorant and scented body products, smoking and eating certain foods that could affect their scent. The T-shirts

were then frozen to preserve the scent. The women were randomly assigned to smell a T-shirt that was either unworn, or had been worn by their partner or a stranger. They were not told which one they had been given. The women underwent a stress test that involved a mock job interview and a mental math task, and also answered questions about their stress levels and provided saliva samples used to measure their cortisol levels.

The researchers asked women to act as the "smellers" because they tend to have a better sense of smell than men.

They found that women who had smelled their partner's shirt felt less stressed both before and after the stress test. Those who both smelled their partner's shirt and also correctly identified the scent also had lower levels of cortisol, suggesting that the stress-reducing benefits of a partner's scent are strongest when women know what they're smelling.

Meanwhile, women who had smelled a stranger's scent had higher cortisol

levels throughout the stress test.
The authors speculate that evolutionary factors could influence why the stranger's scent affected cortisol levels.

"From a young age, humans fear strangers, especially strange males, so it is possible that a strange male scent triggers the 'fight or flight' response that leads to elevated cortisol," said Hofer. "This could happen without us being fully aware of it."

Frances Chen, the study's senior author and assistant professor in the UBC department of psychology, said the findings could have practical implications to help people cope with stressful situations when they're away from loved ones.

"With globalization, people are increasingly traveling for work and moving to new cities," said Chen. "Our research suggests that something as simple as taking an article of clothing that was worn by your loved one could help lower stress levels when you're far from home."

hest pain is usually indicative of a more serious problem, such as a stroke or heart attack. In fact, chest pain could mean that you are having a heart attack and not even realizing it. Not all heart attacks are severe, but even small ones can indicate that you are suffering from high cholesterol. If it is not treated, it can worsen and create more severe strains on your heart, ending in death.

These warning signs are caused by blockages in your blood vessels, which large amounts of cholesterol can create. You can catch this problem early, however, before the stroke and heart attacks kick in if you have regular testing done on your cholesterol levels.

How to Treat It

If you suspect you have high cholesterol, you should see a doctor as soon as possible. Your doctor may recommend medicine for you as well as lifestyle changes. You can make those lifestyle changes yourself before ever seeing a doctor if you want to prevent high cholesterol or treat it once it starts to affect you.

Proper dieting is one of the best ways to fight high cholesterol. By eating foods that are low in sodium, saturated fat, sugar and other unhealthy stances, you can lower your cholesterol level and prevent them from becoming too high. Be careful about making major dietary changes without first consulting your doctor. Sudden change, even positive change, can be dangerous, especially if you have a serious medical condition.

Exercising regularly is another great way to prevent high cholesterol. Aerobic exercise, weight trading and just about any activity that gets your heart rate up and your body moving will help tremendously in preventing high cholesterol and lowering it once you have it.

5 DIY WaysTo Whiten Your Teeth Naturally

1. Activated Charcoal Paste

Mix about a teaspoon of activated charcoal with a little water to form a paste. Gently apply the paste to your teeth with your fingertip, and keep it on for a couple of minutes. Rinse with water and brush your teeth. The charcoal powder cleanses away stain-causing bacteria.



2. Crushed strawberries

Put two or three fresh strawberries in a small container, add a teaspoon of baking powder, and mash well with a fork. Use a small soft toothbrush to apply the mix to the surface of your teeth. Rinse well after five minutes. Strawberries have a natural acid that can help lighten stains. This remedy should only be used occasionally.



3. Baking Soda & Hydrogen Peroxide

For an effective tooth whitener that you can do every three months, blend a few drops of hydrogen peroxide with a teaspoon of baking soda to form a paste.
Brush your teeth with it like toothpaste. Both ingredients have natural abrasive and bleaching power to whiten your smile.

Currently, I run and teach raw, plant-based food workshops in the city of Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, share recipes on my blog, film videos for my YouTube Channel and am writing an ebook. I started my blog three years ago as a place to share my raw food creations. Little did I know I would fall in love with food photography and Raw Revive would become my creative outlet. I also like making natural skin care products which I share on my site as well.

Naida: How did you get into this raw-food way of life, and how long have you been a chef?

Crystal: About 5 years ago when I knew I needed to include more fruits and vegetables into my diet. I thought I was eating healthy, although I was pescaratian and gluten-free I did not enjoy cooking so my meals consisted of processed packaged food and eating out a lot. I was constantly getting sick so I started doing some research online about cleanses and detox and came across a raw food meal plan. Right then, I knew "this is what I'm missing"! So I got to work, followed the meal plan and found a passion I never knew existed! I fell in love with the beauty and flavor of raw food but also how good it made me feel! I started taking raw food courses online in 2015, quit my full-time job last year and now am running my business.

I never really considered myself a "chef" until recently. Although I have not had traditional culinary training, all the training I have received has given me the skills and confidence to share my love of raw food with the world.

Naida: What is wrong with cooked food?

Crystal: I don't eat 100% raw, about 80 to 90% and will cleanse with 100% raw food a few times a year. It's important to include more raw food into your diet because food that has not been heated above 46 to 48 C still contain the necessary enzymes our body requires to digest and assimilate nutrients. This is why we feel lighter and energized when eating raw food. As mentioned in earlier, I don't 100% raw; it gets REALLY cold where I live and I love to make cooked healthy plant-based meals as well. I don't think I could ever give up baked yams or potatoes, they are my go-to comfort foods. I also love making vegetable soups in the winter.

Naida: What about steaming vegetables?

Crystal: If you are cooking vegetables, lightly steaming is the best and healthiest option and actually retains the highest amount of nutrients. I personally don't steam vegetables very often, if I do cook them, it's in a stir-fry or baked.

Naida: What kind of water do you drink, or do you?

Crystal: I've always wanted a Berkey water cooler and finally just purchased one! And yes of course, drinking good water is important!



Naida: You seem like you are in good spirits and great health. How much of that would you attribute to diet?

Crystal: Thank you; I am human so I have my moments, especially during winter! Since switching to a 100% plant-based diet I have noticed a big difference in my health and mood. I am more spiritual and feel like I'm on a higher level of consciousness. (I know, that sounds corny, but true!) My friends and family noticed my eyes looked a lot brighter and skin is clearer. My eyesight also improved, I no longer need to wear glasses!

Naida: Wow! That's great, Crystal! How different of a world do you think we'd see if everybody ate raw?

Crystal: If everyone just ate a plant-based diet, there would be huge positive impact on the planet. We would see a huge decrease in illness, disease, cancer, and diabetes The environmental impact would be huge since we would be saving a lot of land and water by not raising ani-

mals for food. I would love to see everyone practicing compassion and treating other living beings as equals; the way they should be treated.

Naida: I agree. What is your greatest fear?

Crystal: Oh my, that's a tough question! I have a lot of fears. I think my greatest fear is not living a meaningful life. I want to look back at my life and know I made a difference and had a positive impact on others and the planet.

Naida: What is your life motto?

Crystal: I don't really have a "defined" motto; but I try to treat others as I would want to be treated, practice compassion to all living beings, and improve myself every day. I have come a long way and still have a lot of work to do on myself to be the person I want to be.

Naida: You're doing great, Crystal! What is your present state of mind?

Crystal: Currently, I am practicing a lot more meditation, spirituality and gratitude. Trying to get out of the winter blues haha.

Naida: I am the same! Do you have upcoming workshops or anything that we can all look forward to and benefit from?

Crystal: I am in the process of moving so I have nothing scheduled for May, but I do have my brand new E-book coming out second week of May. I also wore my best shoes that I've already worn on a few occasions. No veil either, just flowers in my hair. 6. Keep comments to yourself


You might feel occasionally more frustrated by your partner not being vegan. Think before you speak and let the frustration pass.

From seedlings

- **1.** Germinate your seeds- Fill seed starters with a light potting mix that does not contain soil.
- 2. Put 3 to 4 seedlings in each starter and lay them on top of the potting mix.
- 3. Use water and lightly mist the seeds.
- **4.** Cover the seeds with a light layer of regular soil. Use water to dampen the top layer.
- 5. Cover your container with plastic wrap or a top (if it came with one), and put them in a warm spot with light exposure. If you're living in a colder climate a heating blanket may be necessary to keep them warm.
- 6. Water enough to keep moist.
- **7.** When the seedlings reach about 3 inches in height, transplant them to your garden or pot. Make sure it's sunny!
- **8.** Make sure your soil drains well, and water whenever the soil is dried out.

From cuttings

- **1.** Take your rosemary cuttings and trim off the bottom leaves (about 2 inches).
- 2. Place the cuttings in water and change every few days. It will take a few weeks for them to grow roots.
- 3. Gently pot the rooted cuttings into well-draining soil.
- 4. Water when the soil is dry.

Important things to remember

- 1. Rosemary needs ample sunlight
- **2.** Rosemary is drought resistant. Be careful not to over water it.
- **3.** Whether germinating your own seeds or growing rosemary from cuttings, remember the beginning phases take time. Don't get discouraged!

There you have it! Enjoy fresh rosemary and its health benefits directly from your home!

Hors D'Oeuvres





INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Combine all ingredients in a high speed blender and For the chèvre:
 - 2. Pour into a container with a lid, and set in a warm
 - 3. Once it has become tangy in flavor, place in the refrigerator to chill completely.

- 1. Whisk together all ingredients in a large bowl until well blended, then spread out on a lined dehydrator For the crust: tray in a big square about 1/8 inch thick. 2. Dehydrate at 115F for 2 hours, then score into 9
 - squares with a knife. Continue to dehydrate until completely dry, about 22 more hours.
 - 3. Peel the carrots into strips with a vegetable peeler. Toss in a bowl with the olive oil, lemon juice and a little sea salt.

- 1. Spread some of the chevre onto each flatbread, To assemble the flatbreads: sprinkle with a little of the cumin seeds, coriander seeds, red pepper flakes and lemon zest.
 - 2. Top with the carrots, making sure they are drained well, then top with a little of the kale.
 - 3. Serve immediately!

RAW SUNFLOWER SEED PÂTÉ NORI ROLLS

with Spicy Mustard Dip

Ingredients:

Sunflower Pâté:

- 1 cup raw sunflower seeds
- 1 large handful fresh dill
- 2 celery stalks, chopped
- 1/4 red onion, chopped
- 4 sprigs green onion, chopped 2 tablespoons parsley, chopped
- 1 tablespoon coconut nectar,
- or any liquid sweetener
- Juice from 1 lemon 1 teaspoon dulse flakes (optional)
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- Dash of Himalayan salt

Ingredients:

Spicy Mustard Dressing:

- 1 tablespoon of your favorite mustard
- (I use raw soaked mustard seeds) 1 tablespoon coconut nectar,
- or any liquid sweetener
- 1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar 1/ teaspoon paprika
- Dash of cayenne
- Dash of Himalayan salt

Nori Rolls:

- 1/4 large cucumber, julienned
- 1 carrot, shredded
- 1 handful purple cabbage, chopped 1/2 avocado,
- sliced 4 leaves of lettuce

INSTRUCTIONS:

Sunflower Seed Pâté:

- 1. Place all ingredients except green onion and parsley into a food processor and process until combined and texture is like a pate. You don't want to leave the mixture too chunky because you are going to spread it onto nori sheets.
- 2. Place pate into a bowl, add green onion and parsley and stir carefully until combined.

Spicy Mustard Dip:

1. Place all ingredients into a small bowl and whisk until combined.

Nori Rolls:

- Place nori sheet onto a bamboo mat, spread sunflower seed pate, and add all the veggies.
 You can add a lot to make a big wrap (like my picture above), or add less to make sushi rolls.
- 2. Using the bamboo mat, carefully roll the nori roll and cut into however many servings you wish. Don't forget to dip them in the spicy mustard, sooo good!



Refrigerate for up to 3 days. Use the extra as a dip, or on salad!





INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Thinly slice all veggies into strips and place in separate clusters on large plate. Remove herbs from stems and add whole leaves to plate as well.
- 2. Boil water and fill very wide bowl or pie plate about half way full, let sit for a few minutes to cool ever so slightly. One at a time, soften spring roll sheets by dipping them into the hot water, using your fingers to move them around. Depending on hotness of water, it will take about 2-10 seconds for them to soften. They should be pliable but not mushy and falling apart, think al dente pasta, as they will continue to soften even out of the water. Layer two softened spring roll sheets on top of one another on cutting board (wood works well here) and fill bottom third with a a bit of each veggie and herbs, do not overstuff! Less is more here. Roll up like you would a mini burrito, tucking in sides and rolling up tightly. It will conveniently stick to itself, making this very easy. Cut in half and place on serving plate.
- 3. In a blender combine all ingredients for peanut sauce and process 10-20 seconds until creamy. Transfer to small bowl and top with chopped scallions or additional chopped chili pepper, if desired.

SOFT PRETZELS

Ingredients:

Soft Pretzels:

- 1 cup sunflower seeds
- 2 tablespoons flax meal
- 4 tablespoons liquid sweetener 1 used (coconut nectar)
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt

Everything Mix - for coating:

- 1 tbsp sesame seeds
- 1 tbsp poppy seeds
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp onion powder
- 1/2 tsp sea salt

Cinnamon Sugar Powder Mix for coating:

- 11/2 tsp cinnamon
- 4 tbsp coconut crystals finely ground

Cheddar Jalapeño Flavor:

- 1 original batter mix recipe
- 1/4 cup chopped jalapeno
- 1/4 cup nutritional yeast
- 1/2 teaspoon sea salt

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Process sunflower seeds and flax meal together until a flour forms.
- 2. Add in salt and while machine is spinning add in sweetener.
- 3. Once mixture forms into a ball stop it and remove the ball of dough. Press the dough together, roll it into a ball and cut it in quar-
- 4. On a countertop lined with parchment paper roll out each quarter of dough into long strands, if dough gets to long for your surface cut it in half. Roll out the strands of dough into 1/2 inch deep by 1 foot long strands. Roll the ends of each strand a little thinner than the rest (this will create the criss cross center of the pretzel).

- 5. Take the strand and make a u shape bring the left strand down to connect to the bottom of the u and
- 6. Gently press the center to the bottom and continue making pretzel shapes with remaining dough. Will make 4 large pretzels.

Everything Mix:

- 1. Whisk together and coat pretzels in this mix. 2. Coat by placing pretzel face down into bowl of seasoning mix press firmly and set on plate.

Cinnamon Sugar Powder:

1. Grind down in a coffee grinder or spice mill and coat pretzels in the powder.

For the cheddar jalapeño:

1. Process with lid on until it forms into a ball aprox a few seconds.

Christina's tips:

Cheesy sauce is made from soaked cashews, red bell pepper, jalapeño, lemon juice, sea salt and nutritional yeast - simply blend and serve.

THE BEST RAW VEGAN BORSCHT

Ingredients:

Chunky Ingredients: 1/4 Red or White Cabbage (200 g / .44 lb) 1 Carrot (75 g / .17 lb) 1/2 Onion (50 g / .11 lb) Tomatoes (115 g / .25 lb)

Broth:

Tomatoes (460 g / 1 lb) 1 Beet (115 g / .25 lb) Handful of Fresh Dill or 1 – 2 tbsp dry Optional 1 clove garlic 1 green onion 1 tsp black pepper

Raw Vegan Sour Creme: Zucchini (115 g / .25 lb) up to 1/2 Lemon Hemp 1/8 cup

INSTRUCTIONS:

For the chunky ingredients:

- 1. The day before you want to make the borscht prep the first 3 ingredients. Using a mandolin, food processor or a sharp knife cut the cabbage into fine strips, place in a freezer safe bowl or bag. Grate the carrot and add to the same bowl, finely cut or mandolin the onion and also place in the bowl. Mix all well and place in the freezer for 10+ hours.
- 2. The above is optional but really makes the dish, I fully recommend trying this freezing method before simply making it with fresh veggies.
- 3. The day that you are going to make and serve the borscht take a serving of the frozen sliced veggies out of the freezer and let thaw 6-8 hours. You can alternately thaw them under warm water / place them on a dehydrator tray at 115 for a hour or in a warm oven (turn it to its lowest setting, then turn off the oven and place the veggies inside to thaw). My preferred method is to let them thaw at room temperature.
- 4. Once the shredded ingredients are thawed dice the tomatoes and mix into the bowl. You are now ready to make the broth.

For the broth:

- 1. Loose chop the tomatoes and add to your Vitamix Blender.
- 2. Juice the lemon and add 1/2 to the blender.
- 3. Loose chop the beet and add to the blender as well. If desired add any of the optional ingredients as well. Blend till smooth and creamy, taste for tartness and add remaining lemon if desired.
- 4. Add the dill and pulse to leave some texture, if using dry no need to pulse much.
- 5. Pour the broth over the chopped and sliced veggies and your done... That is unless you want to make the Raw Vegan Sour Creme, which I recommend.

For the raw vegan sour creme:

- 1. Peel the zucchini and chop into a medium dice, add to a clean blender.
- 2. Juice 1/2 a lemon and add 1/2 of that to the blender.
- 3. Add 1/8th cup hero hearts (or half if lower fat is desired) to the blender and blend at high speed till creamy. You may need the tamper or even need to add a tiny bit of water, or more zucchini depending on how fresh and juicy your zucchi-
- 4. Taste and add lemon to desired flavour. This is actually easier to make in a double portion but is fine depending on your blender or if you have the tamper and fresh zucchini. Play with it and get your desired consistency and flavour.



Chris' tips:

- 1. As a specially note for the chunky ingredients, you can do them in larger batches and freeze on a baking sheet, scoring the mixed vegetables into approximate serving sizes before freezing so that you can separate them into individual freezer bags once fully frozen. This way you can have many batches of the vegetables ready to go in a pinch for the future. Frozen veggies will stay good for weeks to a few months.
 - 2. Pour or spoon a dollop of Sour Creme on top of your Borscht and either mix together for a pink Borscht or eat each red spoonful with a bit of sour creme on the tip of your spoon. Absolutely delicious, low fat and filling!

- 2. Add 1 cup water and blend on high for 1 minute. Now add 2 cups mushrooms and blend well.
- 3. Add the rest of the water and mushrooms and blend on high until smooth.
- 4. Snap the woody ends off 4 of the garlic scapes and break them into quarters. Add to the blender and blend on high until smooth, about 2 minutes—this is your soup mixture.
- 5. Fine slice the 1 remaining garlic scape for garnish.
- 6. Heat the soup mixture on low heat until it reaches 105 degrees F [use a calibrate thermometer to be sure].
- 7. Place in serving bowls and garnish evenly with the scape slices, cherry bomb dices, and mini mushrooms if you saved them like I did.

RAW POWER ZUCCHINI PASTA

with Hemp Seed Alfredo Sauce

4 medium zucchini, ends trimmed

1 red bell pepper, seeded and julienned

2 heaping cups baby spinach, chiffonaded (very thinly sliced)

1 lemon, juiced (about 2 tablespoons)

1 Hemp Seed Alfredo Sauce Small handful fresh basil leaves, chiffonaded (very thinly sliced) Sea salt, to taste Freshly ground black pepper, to

For the hemp seed alfredo sauce:

1/2 cup raw cashews*

taste

1/2 cup shelled hemp seeds

1/2 cup plain unsweetened almond milk*

1/4 cup nutritional yeast

1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice

2 garlic cloves, peeled

1/2-1 teaspoon sea salt (I recommend using a full teaspoon if you are not going to salt your pasta!)

Freshly ground black pepper, to

Small pinch of nutmeg (optional)



INSTRUCTIONS:

For the pasta:

- Use a spiralizer to spriralize the zucchini into pasta/ noodles. Alternatively, use a vegetable peeler to shave the zucchini lengthwise, forming long, ribbon-like noodles.
- 2. Add the zucchini noodles, red bell pepper, and spinach to a large mixing bowl. Pour the lemon juice over the noodles and veggies and toss to coat. Let the noodles marinate for 10 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, prepare the Hemp Seed Alfredo Sauce.
- 4. Add the basil and pour as much of the Alfredo sauce as desired over the zucchini pasta. Toss to coat. Taste and season with sea salt and black pepper, to taste. If desired, sprinkle on a bit of vegan parmesan cheese*.
- 5. Divide between bowls and serve immediately.



- 1. Soak the cashews in warm water for at least 30 minutes to soften. Drain before using.
- 2. Add all ingredients to a high-powered blend and blend on high for 2 minutes or until super creamy and smooth.
- 3. Serve over your favorite pasta or veggies.
- 4. Refrigerate leftovers.

Ashley's tips:

- 1. You can use store-bought vegan parmesan cheese or homemade. If you opt for homemade, simply add 1/4 cup raw cashews/almonds/hemp seeds, 2 to 4 table-spoons nutritional yeast flakes, and 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon sea salt to a food processor and process for 10 to 15 seconds or until the texture resembles grated parmesan. Sprinkle on as much as desired and refrigerate leftovers.
- 2. This recipe can easily be cut in half if you're looking to serve 1 to 2 people. Just remember to also cut the Hemp Seed Alfredo Sauce in half.
- 3. To make the hemp seed alfredo sauce nut-free, omit the raw cashews and use 1 cup shelled hemp seeds and nut-free plant-based milk.

HEALTHY BREAKFAST PARFAIT

with Banana ke Cream, Raspberry Chia Pudding and Coconut Yogurt

Ingredients:

Layer 1: Berry Ice Cream 2 cups frozen berries 4-8 tablespoons non-dairy milk, unsweetened (I used rice coconut milk)

Layer 2: Spirulina Banana Ice Cream 3 large ripe bananas, frozen and roughly chopped 4-8 tablespoons non-dairy milk, unsweetened (I used rice coconut milk) ½ to 1 teaspoon spirulina powder

Layer 3: raspberries



Ingredients:

Layer 4: coconut yogurt with spirulina (or other non-dairy yogurt)

Layer 5:

raspberry chia pudding - recipe from my new book Vegan & Raw 2

Toppings: berries coconut chia seeds



INSTRUCTIONS:

Berry Ice Cream:

- 1. Put the frozen berries in a food processor fitted with an S-blade. Process until finely ground.
- 2. Add the milk. Process until smooth, stopping occasionally to scrape down the sides of the food processor with a rubber spatula.
- 3. Transfer the ice cream into a large jar and put it in the freezer while you make the green ice cream, so it doesn't melt.

Spirulina Banana Ice Cream:

- 1. Cut the frozen bananas into smaller pieces with a sturdy knife.
- 2. Put the frozen banana chunks in a food processor fitted with an S-blade. Process until finely ground.
- 3. Add the non-dairy milk and spirulina. If you're not used to the taste, start with ½ teaspoon I like to add 1 teaspoon at least. The bananas are more than sweet enough to balance it out.
- 4. Process until smooth, stopping occasionally to scrape down the sides of the food processor with a rubber spatula.

Breakfast Parfait

- 1. Serve the ice cream parfait in two bowls or glasses.
- 2. I like to start with a scoop of berry ice cream, followed by a big scoop of spirulina banana ice cream, and a nice layer of coconut yogurt with some raspberries. To give the yogurt a funky color, you can add some extra spirulina.
- 3. Finish with some raspberry chia pudding on top. I love serving the ice cream parfait with this vanilla chia pudding too!
- 4. Garnish with chia seeds, coconut flakes and berries.

Julie's tips:

- 1. This breakfast parfait will stay fresh for at least 2 days in the refrigerator.
- Spirulina is really detoxifying and a great source of protein and iron - so you're basically having ice cream for breakfast that is packed with nutrients
- 3. You could add some maple syrup (or other sweetener) to the berry ice cream if your berries are very sour, but I usually don't add any since the chia pudding and banana ice cream are more than sweet enough.

Ingredients:

1½ cups almond milk

(or other non-dairy milk)

1/3 cup/2 oz. white chia seed
seeds, can use black)

1/2 tsp lemon zest

1/2 tsp cinnamon

1/2 tsp vanilla

3 oz. of dates (~4-5)

To assemble parfait:

2 cups apples (1 large apple, small pieces, no need to peel)

1 tsp cinnamon

water to sauté

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Place all ingredients into a Vitamix and blend, except assembling ingredients
- Saute apples in 1 tablespoon of water (just enough to prevent sticking, but not too much to steam, add in cinnamon, cook until just softened, about 3 min
- 3. Layer pudding, apples, pudding, and end with a layer of apples
- 4. Top with some pomegranate seeds for holiday color, granola or maple chipotle walnuts for a kick!

GREEN MOUNTAIN PARFAIT

Ingredients:

Light Green Layer - Avocado Ice Cream:

3 hass avocados

1 cup meat of fresh young coconut OR cashews

1/4 cup coconut oil

juice and zest of 1 1/2 limes

5 dates - pitted

1/2 vanilla bean

1/3 cup light raw agave nectar

1 cup water

Forest Green Layer:

1/3 of avocado mixture from above

fresh spinach



Ingredients:

White Layer - Vanilla Cream:

1 cup meat of young Thai coconut

1/4 cup coconut water 1/4 cup coconut oil

1/2 vanilla bean

1/4 cup light raw agave nectar

1/2 cup dry coconut flakes OR cashews

Violet Layer - Blueberry Cream: 1/3 of vanilla cream from above fresh blueberries or blueberry powder

Mango Buckwheat Crunchies:

1 cup sprouted buckwheat flesh of 1/2 ripe mango

2 dates - pitted

Assembly:

1-2 cups fresh cherries - pitted 1 cup fresh or freeze dried sour cherries (optional) - pitted





Light Green Layer - Avocado Ice Cream:

- 1. Combine all ingredients, except the lime zest, in a high speed blender until smooth. Reserve 1/3 of the mixture for the forest green layer.
- 2. Chill well and put into an ice cream maker for 25 minutes or however long your brand of ice cream machine suggests. Add the lime zest directly into the ice cream machine after about 15 minutes of churning. Freeze for 1-2 hours before serving.

If you don't have an ice cream maker, there is an option to make avocado mousse instead of ice-cream. Just exclude the water and coconut meat/cashew, add about two more avocados and adjust the amount of agave to taste. Chill in the refrigerator until the mousse thickens.

Forest Green Layer:

- 1. In a high speed blender, combine the reserved 1/3 of avocado mixture with some fresh spinach until the desired colour is achieved.
- 2. Make ice cream according to the instructions above.



White Layer - Vanilla Cream:

1. Combine all the ingredients in a high speed blender until smooth. Reserve about 1/3 of the mixture for the Violet Layer. Chill in the refrigerator until the cream thickens.

Violet Layer - Blueberry Cream:

1. In a high speed blender, add fresh blueberries or blueberry powder to the reserved 1/3 of vanilla cream until the desired colour is reached. Chill in the refrigerator until the cream thickens.

Mango Buckwheat Crunchies:

 In a blender, puree the mango flesh and dates. Transfer to a mixing bowl together with the sprouted buckwheat and mix well to coat the sprouts.

2. Spread on Teflex sheets and dehydrate overnight or until completely dry and crispy.

Assembly:

- Cut the fresh cherries in half. Optionally, dehydrate the fresh cherries at 115F for 1-2 hours.
- 2. Using a piping or Ziploc bag, squeeze some avocado ice cream into a tall glass to make a first layer.
- 3. Follow by the forest green layer, and then more avocado ice cream mixed with cherries.
- 4. Sprinkle with mango buckwheat crunchies and top with blueberry and vanilla cream. You can arrange the layers in any way you want.

Aesthetically, it's nice to take care to arrange the layers unevenly to create the hilly landscape appearance.

VEGAN NO BAKE CHOCOLATE CHIP CRANBERRY CHEESECAKE

Ingredients:

For the cheesecake:

2 cups organic raw cashews 1/2 cup organic maple syrup

4 tablespoons organic lemon juice 4 tablespoons organic coconut oil

1/2 teaspoon Himalayan pink salt

1 cup Enjoy Life mini chocolate chips (or sub in raw cacao nibs or

raw chocolate chunks)

For the crust:

2 cups organic pecans 4 tablespoons organic cacao powder 4 tablespoons organic maple syrup

2 tablespoons organic coconut oil 1 - 2 pinch Himalayan pink salt

Ingredients:

For the topping:

2 cups organic cranberries 1 organic green apple

(diced)

12 organic medjool dates

2 tablespoons organic

coconut oil

1/8 teaspoon organic

ground cinnamon

1/8 teaspoon organic vanilla bean powder

1/8 teaspoon organic

ground clove

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Prepare the crust: Add all the ingredients for the crust to a food processor and process until it is well combined and has a wet, sticky texture.
- 2. Transfer the mixture to a 6-inch spring form cheesecake pan and press it evenly and firmly on the bottom of the pan.
- 3. Place the cheesecake pan in the freezer to firm while you make the rest of the recipe.
- 4. Prepare the cheesecake: Optional: Soak the cashews in a bowl of purified / filtered water for 30 60 minutes, then drain them prior to using. This will make them soft and the cheesecake mixture will be smooth and creamy.
- Add all ingredients for the cheesecake (EX-CEPT the chocolate chips) to a Vitamix, or high speed blender, and blend until the mixture is creamy and smooth. Use your tamper, if needed.
- 6. Remove the blender container from the base and make sure the contents are not warm before going to the next step. If the cheese-cake mixture is warm from blending, wait until it cools off or the chocolate chips will melt.
- 7. Add the chocolate chips to the blender container and gently stir them in until they are evenly distributed.
- 8. Remove the cheesecake pan from the freezer and pour the cheesecake mixture on top of the crust, making sure it's evenly distributed.
- Rinse out the blender container to use for the next step.
- 10. Prepare the topping: Add all ingredients for the topping to a Vitamix, or high speed blender, and blend until everything is well blended. Use your tamper, if needed.
- 11. Transfer the topping mixture on top of the cheesecake mixture and spread it evenly.
- 12. Optional: garnish with extra cranberries in the center of the cheesecake.
- 13. Place the cheesecake pan in the freezer for 1 2 hours, or until it hardens. Remove from the freezer and allow to thaw on the counter top 10 15 minutes, or until it is soft enough to slice.

RAW BLACK FOREST CAKE

Ingredients:

For the crust:

2 1/2 cups raw walnuts

1 1/2 cup pitted dates

1/2 tsp vanilla powder

1/4 cup raw cacao powder

2 tbsp raw cacao nibs (optional)

pinch of salt

For the filling:

3 cups raw cashew nuts 1 can coconut cream 60 g chunk raw cacao

butter, melted

1/4 cup maple syrup (or liquid sweetener of your choice)

1 tsp vanilla powder

2 tbsp lemon juice

1/2 cup blackberries

1/2 cup cherries



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Place all the crust ingredients into a food processor and run until well combined. Spread the crust mixture in the bottom of a cake pan and set aside.
- 2. Melt cacao butter in a small sauce pan, placed inside of a bigger sauce pan with hot water in it.
- Put all the filling ingredients except berries, into a food processor and run until smooth and creamy. Taste and adjust if needed.
- 4. Pour the filling over the crust, but leave few tablespoons of the filling aside.
- 5. Add blackberries and cherries into the remaining filling mixture. Add optional few the thing maple syrup for more sweetness.
- 6. Pop little dollops of berry mixture over the cake filling and use a knife to form patterns.
- 7. Place the cake into the freezer and let it set for at least 2 hours. Enjoy!

RAW VANILLA AND CHOCOLATE CAKE

Crust | Botten:

100 g dried coconut flakes | kokosflingor 200 g cashews | cashewnötter 4 tbsp sprouted buckwheat* | groddat bovete*

10-15 dates | dadlar

20 g raw cacao | rå kakao

Chocolate mousse layer | Chokladmousse lager: 400 g soaked cashews | blötlagda

cashewnötter (4 timmar)

30 g raw cacao rå kakao

1 cup almond milk | 2 dl mandel mjölk 0,5 cup agave or coconut nectar | 1 dl agave

eller kokosnektar

3/4 cup coconut oil | 1,5 dl kokosolja

Vanilla mousse layer | Vaniljmousse lager: 400 g soaked cashews | blötlagda

cashewnötter

1 tsp vanilla extract | vanilj extrakt (alt. kärna

ur en vaniljstång)

0,5 cup agave 1 dl agave

1 cup almond milk | 2 dl mandel mjölk 3/4 cup coconut oil | 1,5 dl kokosolja





INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Mix all ingredients for the cake crust in a food processor (except the buckwheat), mix until it's firm. Add more dates if necessary. Mix in buckwheat with the pulse function so that they are mixed into the dough without being crushed. Place the crust in a spring form pan. Use the back of a spoon to get nice straight edges and flat surface.
- 2. Mix all ingredients (except coconut oil) to the chocolate layer in a food processor. Blend until smooth. Add the coconut oil in liquid form and mix for a few minutes. Pour the chocolate mousse on top of the crust. Leave it in the freezer for at least 1 hour to settle.
- 3. Repeat the same procedure with the vanilla mousse layer and carefully pour over the chocolate mousse layer. Leave the cake in the freezer for at least 3 hours. Take out the cake for a few minutes until the spring form is ready to let go of the edges, use a flat knife to smooth the edges if necessary.

RAW MIXED BERRY CASHEW CAKE

Ingredients:

For the crust: 1/2 cup pitted dates 1/4 cup walnuts 1/4 cup pecans 1/4 tsp almond extract 1 tbsp water

For the cake: 2 1/2 cups raw cashews (soaked for 8 hours) 3/4 cup maple syrup (the real stuff) 1 cup mixed berries (frozen is definitely best) 140 g creamed coconut





You can use a mixture of raspberries, blueberries, blackberries, etc. Anything works! Creamed coconut is usually sold in small packages. It is solid at room temperature. If you don't have almond extract, you can sub for vanilla.



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Soak the cashews overnight in water (or in boiling water for 1 hour if you're in a pinch).
- 2. Using a food processor, combine the dates, nuts, extract, and water. Pulse as needed to form a sticky, workable dough. This will take a few minutes.
- 3. Flatten the dough to fill the bottom of your can or mould (I use 6-9 inches, but you could stretch this further). Two layers of wax paper and a rolling pin work well to keep things from sticking everywhere.
- 4. Blend the cashew, maple syrup, berries, and creamed coconut until smooth. There should be no chunks. I leave the blender running a few minutes for good measure.
- 5. Pour the mixture over the crust and tap the pan to level out the mixture and remove any bubbles.
- 6. Freeze the cake overnight (this will take at least several hours, but I don't know the magic number). Transfer to fridge a few hours before eating or leave it at room temperature for about 20 minutes. You should not be eating this cake frozen. It should a creamy, smooth consistency.

RAW SUPERFOOD AVOCADO CAKE


Ingredients:

For the crust:

- 1 cup dates
- 1 cup almonds
- 1 thsp coconut flakes
- or shreds pinch of sea salt

For the filling:

- 4 middle size ripe avocados
- 1 ripe banana
- 1/5 cup maple syrup
- 2 tbsp melted coconut oil
- 1 tsp vanilla extract (optional)
- juice of 1 lime
- juice of 1/2 lemon
- 1 tsp of spirulina powder (optional - mainly for color,

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Prepare the crust. Put the almonds and sea salt into a food processor and process until finely chopped (you should still be able to see bigger pieces). Then add dates and coconut flakes, blend until you get a sticky almond-date crumble. Transfer this mixture into a 17cm cake pan and press evenly into the pan. Place the pan into the freezer while you make the filling.
- 2. Prepare the filling. Put avocados, banana, maple syrup, melted coconut oil, vanilla extract, spirulina, lime and lemon juice into the food processor. Blend until you get a creamy and smooth mixture. Taste to see if there's any more need for sweetener or lemon juice. Transfer the mixture into the prepared crust shell. Carefully smooth out the top to even it out. Sprinkle with any decorative toppings. In my case, I used fresh blueberries and cranberries.
- 3. Freeze for 4-5 hours or overnight. Let it sit out for 10 15 minutes before serving.

I CE CREAM GODDESS CAKE

Ingredients:

For the Crust:

1/2 cup coconut flour

1/2 cup raw cacao powder

16 dates

1/3 cup coconut oil

1 tsp of cinnamon powder

1 tsp vanilla extract

FOR THE ICE CREAM LAYERS:

White cream layer:

1 1/4 cup of soaked cashews

3 tbsp melted coconut oil

3 tbsp maple syrup

1/2 cup full fat coconut milk

1 tbsp rose water

1 tbsp arrowroot powder mixed

with 3 tbsp cold water

Chocolate layer:

1 1/4 cup of soaked cashews

1/4 cup raw cacao powder

4 tbsp melted coconut oil

6 tbsp maple syrup

3/4 cup full fat coconut milk

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 thsp arrowroot powder mixed

with 3 tbsp of cold water

Blueberry & blackberry layer:

1 cup soaked cashews

1/2 cup coconut cream

(from the fat of coconut milk can)

1 cup blueberries

1/2 cup blackberries

4 tbsp coconut nectar

3 tbsp coconut oil

2 tbsp arrowroot powder mixed

with 4 tbsp cold water

1 tbsp rose water



For the raw choc to drizzle on top:

1/2 cup raw cacao powder

1/2 cup melted coconut oil

1/4 cup maple syrup

1 tsp vanilla extract





INSTRUCTIONS:

For the crust:

- 1. To make the crust, add coconut flour, cacao powder, dates, cinnamon and vanilla extract to a food processor and mix, scraping down the sides.
- 2. Process until crumbly.
- 3. Then add coconut oil little by little while processing till a soft dough forms.
- Press it down a round 6 by 3 inch springform cake pan, using your fingers to make the surface even and smooth.

For the Ice cream layers:

- 1. Prepare the layers starting with vanilla, raspberry, blueberry and chocolate. no need to wash blender in between.
- 2. Prepare the different layers by add all the ingredients of each layer to a high speed blender and blending until smooth.
- 3. Pour each layer into a separate bowl and set aside until all the layers are ready, so you will end up with 4 bowls.
- 4. Layer your cake as you wish, you can use each color for more than one layer, the easiest way is to split each color in 2.
- i started with white, chocolate, blueberry, raspberry, then choc, vanilla, blueberry, raspberry, chocolate.
- 6. Refrigerate between layers for more defined and straight layers.

For the raw choc drizzle:

- 1. Melt some coconut oil on low flame, then measure 1/2 cup of melted coconut oil.
- 2. Sift raw cacao powder over the oil, add maple syrup and vanilla and whisk by hand until smooth and chocolatey!
- 3. drizzle over your cake.
- 4. Top your cake with fresh or frozen raspberries, blueberries & blackberries.
- 5. Keep in freezer.
- 6. Take out of freezer 1 hour before serving.
- 7. Enjoy!

Nathalie's tips:
You will need approx 3 cups of cashews in total, and you will measure after soaking for the recipe.


