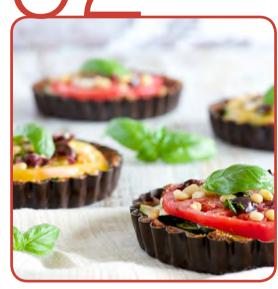

hether you know him as onethird of the legendary rap trio The LOX, as a solo artist from his lyrically superior debut album A Gangster and A Gentleman, or as co-owner of the plant-based chain <u>Juices For Life</u>, <u>Styles P</u> has

been entertaining and educating fans for years. Now, with four Juices For Life locations (two in the Bronx, one in Yonkers, and one in Brooklyn), the emcee is proving that the only beef hip-hop needs is on the mic and not the plate.

He started as a vegetarian around 2003, but would break bread with his family on Thanksgiving and have a little turkey. Then, in 2013, he got sick and did a three-week cleanse and never went back. He then became plant-based and never looked back.

Styles firmly believes in the power of the plant-based message with regard to the hip-hop industry and its fans. When asked if veganism has a place in hip-hop, the rapper replied, "Hell yeah! I preach balance," he enthused.

When on the road, he still follows a plant-based lifestyle. He told VegNews, "It may have avocado, different nut

butters. Sometimes, I'll hit up a Whole Foods. The Happy Cow app is good. There's all kinds of vegetarian spots out there."

Since starting Juices For Life, the feedback from fans has been wholly positive. According to the rapper, the chain, which has two stores in the Bronx, one in Yonkers, and one in Brooklyn, helps members of the community to make healthier choices. "Surviving is gangster," the rapper said. "If the community is eating right, it leads to bright ideas, betterment, and enlightenment."

Late last year, The LOX dropped the surprise EP#4No-ReAsOn. On it, Styles was able to address veganism. He's always talking about how to heal one's self and spreading what he learned. He uses all kinds of natural things he said, like colloidal silver, oil of oregano, juices, and plants.

According to VegNews, Styles considers himself plant-based but feels that he doesn't deserve the label of vegan yet because he still wears leather, but he said that he will eventually get to that point. He said, "You know you love your dog, and a cow is no different. So, yeah, eventually I want to get to that point."

If you ask us, we really hope everyone should be vegan.

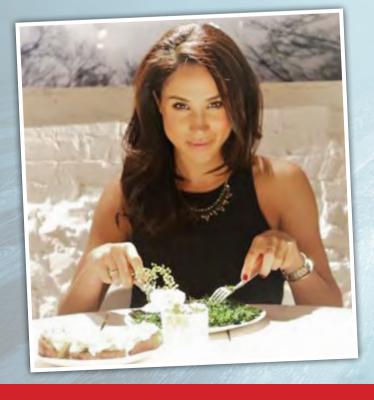

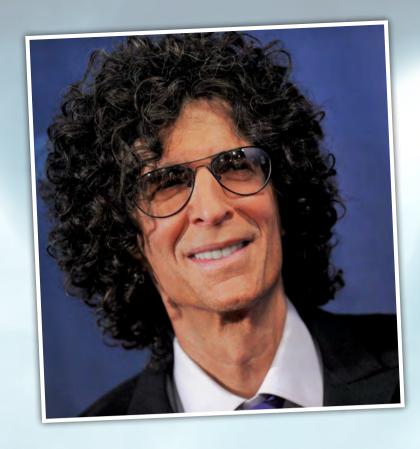


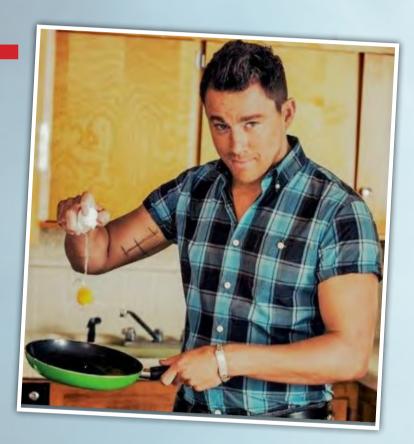
2. Meghan Markle

Tesco Scraps 'Best Before' Dates On Fruit And Veg To Slash Food Waste

esco is removing "best before" dates from most of its fresh fruit and vegetable packs, leaving consumers to use common sense to decide when they are no longer fit to eat.

'Best Before' labels will be taken off apples, potatoes, tomatoes, onions, lemons and other citrus fruit among others.

The retailer says many consumers are confused about what they mean, and that lef to Tesco deciding to ditch them. 'Best Before' dates mean the food is edible, but is likely past its best - unlike 'Use By' dates which suggest eating the food after the date could pose a safety risk.

Tesco said its decision was informed by research by the National Federation of Women's Institutes [NFWI], which discovered that less than 50 percent of respondents knew what 'best before' dates means.

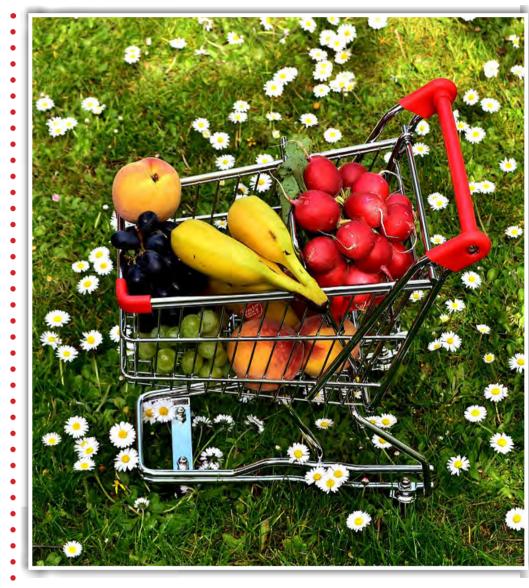
The average home throws away £700 of food every year, with fresh fruit and vegetables among the most commonly thrown in the bin.

Tesco's head of food waste, Mark Little, said: "We know some customers may be confused by the difference between 'Best Before' and 'Use By' dates on food and this can lead to perfectly edible items being thrown away before they need to be discarded.

"We have made this change to fruit and vegetable packaging as they are among the most wasted foods.

"Many customers have told us that they assess their fruit and vegetables by the look of the product rather than the 'Best Before' date code on the packaging."

David Moon, head of business collaboration, WRAP said: "Through the Courtauld Commitment 2025, WRAP is working with the food & drink sector to review all the evidence on date labelling for fresh produce and agree best practice.



"This change by Tesco provides a good opportunity to learn about the customer response, and we anticipate Tesco will share their findings."

"With all fresh produce, appropriate storage including use of the refrigerator is essential in giving the customer more time to use their food, so clarity of storage advice on pack and in-store will be vital."

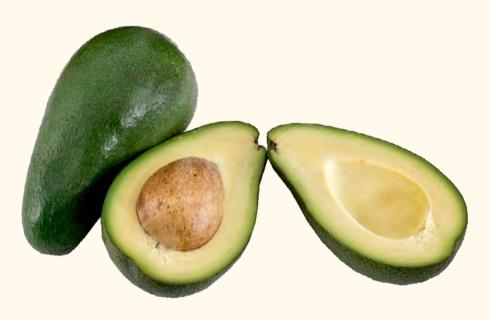
Eating superfoods in the raw state may boost their healing qualities because cooking inactivates their nat-

Can Acupuncture Help You Lose Weight?



ou've heard this before; a great weight loss program must incorporate exercise, proper diet, and stress-reduction techniques. Losing weight and keeping it off is certainly a multi-faceted problem and a real nightmare for most people. In their struggle to shed off excess pounds and maintain their desired weight, some people are painfully spending thousands of dollars on weight loss programs. Regrettably, a majority of them fail in their quest to lose the excess pounds and maintain great shape and health. I've got good news for you; the less conventional acu-

puncture therapy can help. Let's explore the question- does acupuncture for weight loss work?

Western medicine is increasingly embracing acupuncture to help quell a host of ailments; including postoperative pain, chronic pain, addictions, high blood pressure, weight loss, nausea, and vomiting.

Combined with Chinese medicine and digestive aid exercises, Auricular acupuncture therapy is a wonder cure for weight loss and control. Apparently, a study by Korean researchers confirmed that acupuncture undertaken on five specific spots of the ear works best compared to treatment in

helping overweight people to shed excess pounds. The procedure also gave incredible results in beating midriff bulge.

Acupuncture technique involves the insertion of fine, sterile needles on specific "energy pathways" or body points. These needles stimulate the release of the body's natural "feel good" hormones called endorphins. This creates a relaxing, calming effect which counters the desire to eat excessively as a result of increased anxiety, stress, or frustration. In essence, acupuncture therapy can calm those feeling troubled and help them lose weight without using drugs, bingeling, or overeating fattening foods.

Acupuncture therapy is founded on the understanding that specific points on the body and ear represent all parts of the body; the internal organs included. This theory has been proven to underpin clinical treatment for overweight people in Korea.

Indeed, acupuncture is an effective way to lose, control, and maintain weight if one is willing to live a healthy lifestyle. When endorphins are released, they enhance the hormonal and digestive systems enabling acupuncture to rebalance other organ systems that are either moving too fast or in the case of the overweight, too slow: in other words, the will power and metabolism.

The Acupuncture Therapy

The acupuncture treatment begins by consulting an acupuncturist to first determine the ideal points for you, as well as identify any pattern of overeating and whether you are having any form of digestive difficulties. The acupuncturist will also check your pulse to help understand your overall energy state and stomach energy

health before taking a look at your tongue for peeling, cracks, puffiness around the stomach area, or thick white/yellow coating- which would reveal heat or coldness in the stomach, giving a clue to the weight gain.

The Specific Acupuncture Points

Once the acupuncturist is armed with this information, she/he will formulate a suitable treatment protocol using a winning combination of body and ear points. The Chinese discovery of acupuncture system was centered on auricular (ear) acupuncture many years ago, as it was thought to be one of the body Microsystems containing all the points representing the rest of the organs and body parts. Later, a Frenchman called Nogier discovered more specific ear acupuncture points pertaining to Western medicine; including points referred to as "Ovary", "Pituitary", "Adrenal", "FSH", "Thyroid", etc. Some of the body acupuncture points necessary for weight loss treatment include:

 Mouth – for an impulsive eater who may also smoke or talk a lot

- Thyroid for treating slow metabolism
- Hungry for overall appetite control
- Stomach for those who are constantly nibbling or eating even after they're full
- Lung for those addicted to food as well as chocolates and sweets
- Endocrine for treating water retention known to promote weight gain
- Spleen for hormonal disturbances and sugar imbalances
- Ovary and Adrenal used when weight gain is a result of P.M.S or menopause
- Kidney for nervous system, water retention, and hormonal imbalances
- Shenmen a relaxing point, for the psychology calming patients from anger, anxiety, frustration, insecurity, etc.

An acupuncturist can use two or more of these points to treat weight loss problems based on the patient's personality and difficulties in relation to overeating.



How Acupuncture Works

Once the body points have been chosen, the initial treatments would most likely involve the "Four Gate" points (Liver3, LI 4) to calm the whole nervous system and circulate energy throughout the body.

Usually, the point where the stomach energy collects would be chosen for undertaking treatments as would the stomach that is three inches away from the eye of the knee which circulates blood and oxygen around the whole body and especially the stomach. Then depending on the diagnosis, the acupuncturist may add another master point for kidney, mucous, edema, or water retention.

The practitioner may sometimes use electro stimulation on specific acupuncture points to enhance the release of endorphin and stimulation of metabolism. The needles inserted would stay in place for about 30-45 minutes based on the amount of support the patient needs. Once the needles are removed, sticky ear tacs are placed in the same spot to carry on with the simulation between the acupuncture treatments.

Now this is how it works: When the patient gets the urge to eat or munch, she/he rubs the point back and forth or applies mild pressure on it for 20 seconds. This acupuncture technique will stimulate the point, causing a mild release of endorphins, hence relaxing the patient and helping them to recoup their willpower or resist the desire to eat. The patient is expected to remove the tacs after three days and throw them away as soon as possible in case of any discomfort or irritation. Since an effective weight loss program involves a lifestyle change, it will require a patient using acupuncture for weight loss to stay away from a food, place, or person that triggers the breakdown of willpower or resistance to the new diet. For instance, it

would be good to distance yourself from the refrigerator or kitchen in between meals.

The Acupuncture Therapy Process

Acupuncture treatments vary for each patient and mostly depend on the patient's main objective for weight loss, the speed and period within which they want to lose, and their dedication to maintaining the weight after loss. If the patient has a severe problem of overeating, a daily treatment for the first five days is necessary and thereafter it can be every other day during the second week and every three days from the third week. An average patient who wants to lose five to ten pounds can undertake one treatment twice a week or every three

days until she/he attains their goal.
A booster treatment is appropriate once every two weeks to enhance the process.
After a couple of booster treatments, the acupuncturist and patient would mutually agree on when to reduce

mutually agree on when to reduce the frequency of the treatments and aim at performing about four times each year, especially during seasons when energy levels become unstable.

Acupuncture Benefits For Weight Loss

The idea of using acupuncture therapy to reduce and control weight is based on the view that weight gain could be triggered by unstable energy flow to and from the brain's regulating center known as the hypothalamus. The hypothalamus maintains functional balance or "homeostasis," which enables the body to perform its activities efficiently. The body's dispatch center is responsible for regulating neurochemicals and hormones, besides controlling the body temperature, thirst, and hunger as well as circadian rhythm.

In this case, acupuncture has the ability to influence hormones associated with obesity. Research evaluating the

effectiveness of using acupuncture for weight loss discovered that acupuncture treatments enhanced the release of ghrelin, a hormone that regulates meal initiation, metabolism, and fat storage.

The guiding theory is that acupuncture therapy can boost other weight control strategies by enhancing metabolism, curbing appetite, improving digestion, quelling cravings, enhancing nutrient use, and regulating hormones related to obesity.

Acupuncture is also effective in strengthening the functions of the liver; including production of important chemicals used in digestion, breaking down fats, and processing nutrients. In addition, acupuncture increases tone in the stomach's smooth muscle, helping people to feel full when they are.

A comprehensive weight loss program incorporates appropriate exercises and nutritional advice as well as a dedication to a permanent lifestyle change. Your acupuncturist should be able to offer you nutritional counseling; including a proper diet schedule that you can adopt and maintain for a long term. A diet low in fat and high in fiber, with a moderate amount of low-fat protein and low-density carbohydrates is ideal. This kind of diet program can help a patient to avoid the temptation of yo-yo dieting or a tendency to lose weight and regain it soon after.

As with all medical conditions, you must seek the advice of a qualified doctor before you begin an acupuncture therapy. Remember, acupuncture should be considered as a support system and not the only modality. So if you are among those looking for a quick weight loss fix, acupuncture isn't magic. You still have to eat the right diet as well as exercise regularly.

As a self-motivated patient planning to use acupuncture for weight loss, taking the time to put into practice the ideas outlined in this post will give you results you will definitely be pleased with.

Yoga Poses that Can Help You Get Rid of Stress

he origins of yoga can be traced back to thousands of years. This unique method of meditation is known for its healing and relaxing abilities. Not only is it a useful stress reliever but is also successful in easing symptoms of anxiety and tension. However, because this type of meditation has hundreds of positions that are meant to help with specific things, it is crucial that you explore the yoga poses that will help you get rid of your stress.

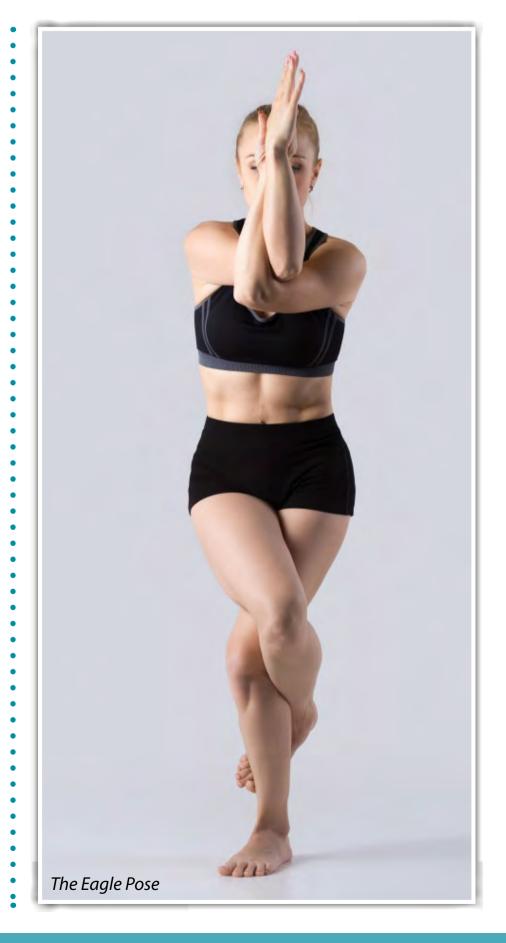
According to research and recent stats, approximately <u>526,000</u> people suffer from work-related stress, and this is one of the leading reasons why a lot of people have to deal with elevated blood pressure, hypertension and other such diseases.

Though your lifestyle is a significant contributing factor, you need to remember that meditation techniques such as yoga can help you improve your bodily function and take it towards better health.

Also, because yoga warrants specific breathing techniques, it helps regulate blood pressure, glucose level, and a lot of other things as well. So, without further delay, let's dive in and explore the seven yoga techniques that can help you relieve stress.

The Eagle Pose

If you're a yoga fanatic and know that it helps to ward off stress and improve balance, then you need to try this pose. The eagle pose may feel a little challenging at first, but once you get it right, you'll realize that it improves concentration and helps in opening the muscles of your shoulders, hips and upper back. Because you'll be twisting both your arms and legs together, it will aid in compressing circulation when entwined and releasing the pose will cause a flow of energy through your body.



To get this position right, you'll need to stand straight, lift your right leg and lock it behind the left foot's shin and cross your left elbow over the right and join the palms of the hands. Align your elbow with your chin and hold for several breaths and then let go. Repeat this pose for the other side, and you'll start feeling relaxed.

The Legs Up On A Wall Pose

If you have a job that keeps you on your feet, then you need to try the 'legs up' yoga poses to relieve stress. This pose will help you release tension and fatigue in the lower body, improve circulation and relax the nervous system by allowing the body to focus its attention on the heart. The pose isn't just great for calming the mind but also helps in renewing blood and lymph drainage back to the core.

If you're new to it, you'll need to place a bolster or folded blanket a few inches from the wall and lie face up with your pelvis resting on top the bolster. Lift your legs straight up into the air and lean them against the wall.

Extend your arms out at shoulders and bend the elbows to create a 90-degree angle. Hold this position for 3-5 minutes and release.

The Corpse Pose

The Child's Pose

The child's pose benefits the nervous as well as the lymphatic system and can relieve stress and anxiety symptoms within minutes. This pose is also one of the restful postures that can be sequenced between other more challenging poses such as the eagle or crow positions. The pose helps in quieting the mind and can be a proper technique when you're feeling very stressed out and want to let it all go.

To do this pose, you'll need to kneel on a mat with your legs together and sit back on your heels. Next, once you get into the sitting position, bring your chest forward and rest it on your thighs with chin on the floor. Bring your shoulders ahead and let the palms of your hands relax next to the feet. Hold this position for at least 10-12 deep breaths and then let go.



The Standing Forward Bend Pose

One of the most popular yoga poses that help in stretching the muscles of the thighs and hips is the standing forward bend pose. This position doesn't just help you get rid of stress and mild depression but also allows you build strength because it requires specific balance. However, remember that this posture may be a little challenging if you're doing it for the first time because it needs practice and perseverance.

To do the standing forward bend pose, stand up with your feet and carefully fold your chest over your legs. Instead of bending your knees outward, bend them deeply, so you can feel it in the abdominal muscles. Let your arms hang down straight freely. As you inhale and exhale, you'll feel your body is releasing stress.

The Dog Down Pose

The dog down pose, also known as the downward facing dog gets your heart higher than the head and helps in blood and lymph circulation. The dog down position isn't just ideal for those who want to relieve stress but also works to stimulate digestion and tone the abdominal muscles.

Because stress is known to cause <u>disruptions to the digestive system</u>, this position can help significantly when you're facing such issues. Other than this, this posture also helps in elongating the spine and easing the muscles in your neck, shoulders, and back.



The dog down pose will start with you on all your fours with the surface of your palms pressing into the floor and toes tucked underneath. Once you've achieved the position, try to slowly lift your knees and hips to straighten the legs and aim to get your heels to the ground. If you feel too tight, bend your knees only slightly. Press on your palms and feet and lift your bones as you move your thighs back. Allow your head to hang between your arms and hold the position for 5-10 breaths.





The Easy Pose

Finally, if you don't feel like giving it much effort or are new to the world of meditation and yoga, you can try the natural pose which is the primary yoga position. This posture helps in bringing you to a state of calm and eliminates negative symptoms of physical and mental exhaustion, tiredness, and stress. It improves you in opening your hips, lengthens your spine and increases overall tranquility.

All you'll need to do is to sit straight and cross your legs at the shins. Next, place each foot beneath the other and fold your legs towards the torso. Place your hands on your knees and align head, neck, and spine, so everything is in perfect cohesion. Hold this position for at least 60 seconds and then change the cross over to the other side.

In combination with yoga and physical activity, getting into a routine and eating a healthy diet rich in leafy greens are <u>helpful in relieving stress</u>. Yoga is excellent if you want to de-stress and it can provide a lot of help when you're trying to bring some relaxation into your life. 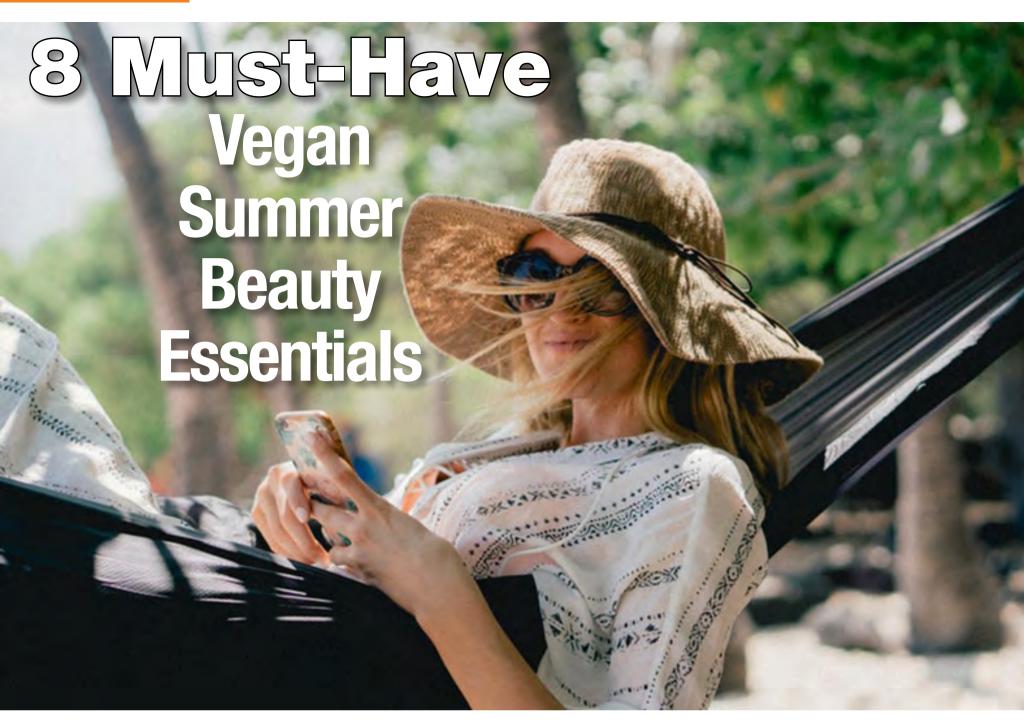

- 7. Blend everything together for 2-3 minutes.

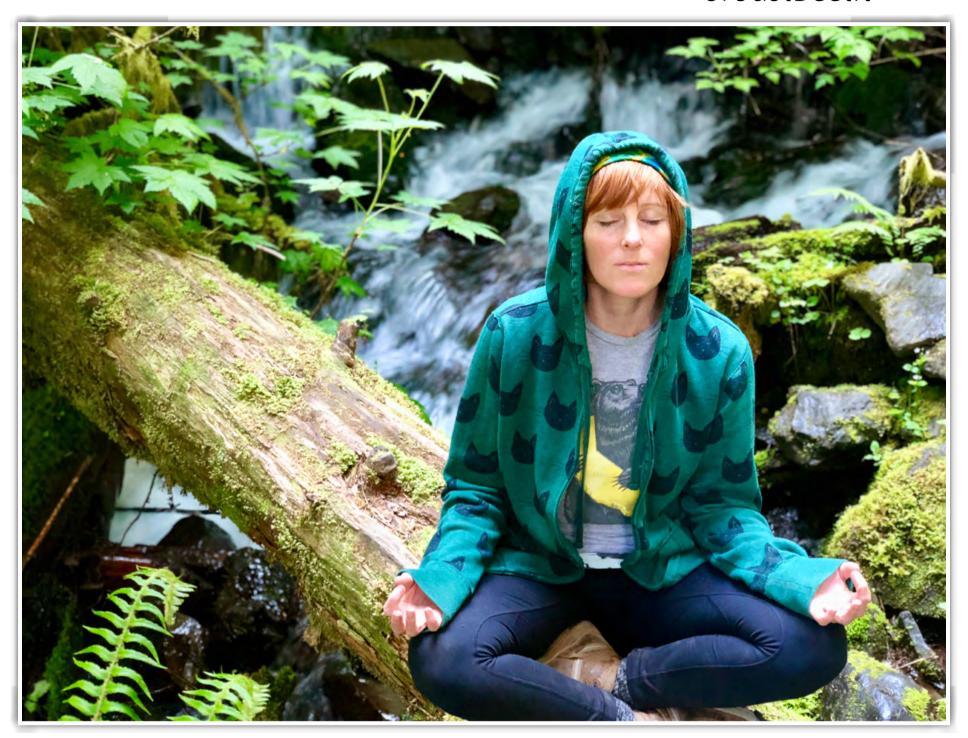

FEEDING WILDLIFE can influence migration, spread of disease





nimal migration patterns are changing as humans alter the landscape, according to new research from the University of Georgia. Those changes can affect wildlife interactions with parasites-with potential impacts on public health and on the phe-

nomenon of migration itself.

In a paper published in Philosophical Transactions of the Royal Society B, Leone Brown, a recent postdoctoral researcher at the Odum School of Ecology, and Richard Hall, a faculty member in the Odum School and the College of Veterinary Medicine's Department of Infectious Diseases, used mathematical models to explore the impacts of wildlife feeding on migration and disease.

"One familiar example for that would be American robins, where widespread ornamental plantings of berry-bearing bushes in city parks and backyards means there's food for them in the winter, so an increasing fraction of them is staying north," said Hall. "That's a species that we know is an important host for maintaining West Nile virus in places such as New York City."

People provide food to wildlife both unintentionally-think of raccoons rummaging in trash cans-or purposely, as with bird feeders or butterfly gardens. Either way, access to new food resources, especially if they're available all year long, can cause some migratory animals to stay put.

Many animals migrate to avoid harsh winter conditions or to follow available food as the seasons change. But migration can have another important benefit. By allowing animals to escape from habitats where parasites have accumulated and by weeding out infected individuals that are not able to survive the journey, migration can reduce parasite infection in animal populations.

When human-provided food resources allow some animals to forego migration and form resident populations, the consequences can be serious. For one thing, by the time migrants return, resident individuals may already be taking up breeding territories and resources, putting the migrants at a competitive disadvantage. And many of those resident animals the migrants encounter may be infected by parasites.

"When you get resident populations forming, you might extend the parasite transmission season, and additionally if those residents are supported by food subsidies through the winter, the infected individuals might be more likely to make it through," said Hall. "So now these migrants are returning to areas where there's already a larger number of infected individuals, so those mechanisms for escaping parasitism become less effective."

Another concern is that resident animal populations with supplemented diets might support more virulent parasites.

"If you think about it from the parasite's perspective, killing too many of their hosts reduces the chances of onward transmission and could cause them to die out." said Hall. "So parasites that rely on migratory animals may have evolved to be more benign to their hosts during their strenuous migratory journeys."

If supplemental food allows some animals to forego the rigors of migration and at the same time helps them survive infection, these resident populations might support the transmission of parasites that are more lethal to migrants.

"Migration is considered to be a threatened phenomenon by some because of the many barriers resulting from human land use and activities," said Hall. "Providing food and shelter for wildlife in our backyards provides us with an important connection with the natural world, with associated benefits for our well-being and engagement with conservation issues. I don't want to say to people, 'Stop bird feeding,' but rather to adopt practices to ensure its benefits for people and wildlife alike."

But there are steps people can take to minimize the unintended consequences.

For example, people can help by planting native species in their yards that have a fruiting or flowering period that co-evolved with native birds, Hall said.

To prevent disease, those who use bird feeders should regularly sweep out seed husks and clean feeders and birdbaths, he said. It also helps to place feeders far apart from each other to reduce exposure to infectious pathogens.

SEA TURTLES

use flippers to manipulate food

Sea turtles use their flippers to handle prey despite the limbs being evolutionarily designed for locomotion, a discovery by Monterey Bay Aquarium researchers published today in PeerJ.



he in-depth examination of the phenomenon -- Limb-use By Foraging Sea Turtles, an Evolutionary Perspective -- by authors Jessica Fujii and Dr. Kyle Van Houtan and others reveals a behavior thought to be less likely in marine tetrapods is actually widespread and that this type of exaptation of flippers may have been occurring 70 million years earlier than previously thought.

"Sea turtles don't have a developed frontal cortex, independent articulating digits or any social learning," says

Van Houtan, Director of Science at Monterey Bay Aquarium. "And yet here we have them 'licking their fingers' just like a kid who does have all those tools. It shows an important aspect of evolution -- that opportunities can shape adaptations."

Lead author Jessica Fujii is part of the Aquarium's sea otter research team where she specializes in ecomorphology -- the intersection of evolution, behavior and body form. Fujii's expertise in sea otter foraging and tool use behavior has influenced her recent examination of sea turtles and how they have evolved to use their limbs in novel ways.

Analysis by Fujii and Van Houtan using crowd-sourced photos and videos finds widespread examples of behaviors such as a green turtle holding a jelly, a loggerhead rolling a scallop on the seafloor and a hawksbill pushing against a reef for leverage to rip an anemone loose.

Similar behaviors have been documented in marine mammals from walruses to seals to manatees -- but not in sea turtles. The paper shows that sea turtles are similar to the other groups in that flippers are used for a variety of foraging tasks (holding, bracing, corralling).

"Sea turtles' limbs have evolved mostly for locomotion, not for manipulating prey," Fujii says. "But that they're doing it anyway suggests that, even if it's not the most efficient or effective way, it's better than not using them at all."

The finding came as a surprise to the authors, given sea turtles' ancient lineage and the fact that the reptiles are considered to have simple brains and simple flippers. The results also offer an insight into the evolution of four-limbed ocean creatures that raises questions about which traits are learned and which are hardwired.

"We expect these things to happen with a highly intelli-

gent, adaptive social animal," Van Houtan says. "With sea turtles, it's different; they never meet their parents," Kyle says. "They're never trained to forage by their mom. It's amazing that they're figuring out how to do this without any apprenticing, and with flippers that aren't well adapted for these tasks."

The study may also help inform the aquarium's ongoing sea otter research. How developmental biology predisposes animals to adopt dining strategies is of particular interest, given the aquarium's efforts to raise stranded sea otter pups and prepare them for a return to the wild. Rearing and releasing stranded pups contributes to the aquarium's work to recover California's threatened sea otter population.

Before they're released, ecologically naïve pups have to be taught foraging behaviors, be it for crabs or abalone, by adult female sea otters at the aquarium, which serve as surrogate mothers to the pups.

"What we're trying to understand is how to have the best sea otter surrogacy program," Kyle says. "This is kind of one end of the spectrum of that -- the opposite end of the spectrum."

Chamomile - Chamomile is world's most widely consumed herbal tea ingredient that people are using for thousands of years. Coming to its medicinal values, chamomile helps to settle inflammation, treating fevers and cold, calming nerves and upset stomach due to its anti-inflammatory benefits.

10. Rosemary - Known for its sweet, resinous flavor, rosemary is an evergreen perennial shrub and a herb garden indoor. Its needlelike leaves feature lemon-pine flavor that enhances that taste of lots of dishes. Rosemary accentuates the taste of tomato sauce, pizza, pork, detox smoothies, and focaccia. This herb has a strong flavor, so make sure you use it light-handily.



You can grow most of these herbs from seeds and plants' stalks using your basic indoor herb garden kit.

e love shopping according to the seasons. When you buy seasonal produce, you not only save money and support local farmers, but you also prepare the best tasting meals since the ingredients are so fresh. Who doesn't love that?

If you don't have a local farmers' market near you, no problem! You can print this handy dandy list and take it into any supermarket to guide your shopping.

Below are popular fruits for both the Northern and Southern Hemispheres, and their health benefits.

Northern Hemisphere

Apricots - Rich in fiber and antioxidants, apricots are not only good for your heart and bloodstream, they also slow down the aging process.

Cherries - Also high in antioxidants, cherries prevent cancer, reduce inflammation and arthritis, and decrease fat as well as the risk of stroke. Their natural form of melatonin promotes healthy sleep patterns.

Mangoes - Packed with vitamin A, mangoes improve eyesight, prevent dry eyes and night blindness. They lower cholesterol levels, improve digestion, the immune system, and normalize insulin to fight diabetes.

Papayas - Boasting a variety of health benefits, papayas improve the immune system, digestion, and weight loss, diminish blemishes and reduce the risk of infections.

Pineapples - High in antioxidants, pineapples boost the immune system, fertility, and mental health.

Southern Hemisphere

- 1. Gently wash beets. Remove golden beet skins (if preferred). Beet skins are edible, but the smoothie texture may be chunky unless you use a highpowered blender like a Vita-Mix.
- 2. Peel orange to use orange segments.
- 3. In blender, add coconut water base. Add golden beets, banana, orange segments, and mango. Blend until smooth.

Aarika's tips:

Using frozen mango creates a chilled smoothie. If using fresh fruit, add 1/2 cup ice for a chilled texture and taste.



RAW VEGAN WATERMELON SLUSHIE

Ingredients:

8 cups ripe seedless watermelon

1 Tbsp lemon juice

A pinch of salt

1/2 cup water or more as needed Some maple syrup to taste (optional, only if the watermelon is not sweet enough)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Roughly chopping up the watermelon, so it's easier to blend in the blender
- 2. Put the watermelon in the blender and blend until smooth
- 3. Place a large ziplock bag on the baking sheet and pour the watermelon juice into the bag. Tightly seal the bag and lay it flat on the baking sheet. Stick the baking sheet with the bag in the freezer overnight
- 4. Take out the frozen watermelon juice from the freezer. Keep the ziplock bag sealed and break up the watermelon into smaller pieces, so that it'll break down easier in the blender
- 5. Add the watermelon ice cubes, lemon juice, and salt into the blender, and blend until it becomes a slushie. You'll need to add some water to help it blend. Be careful not to add more than you need, as you can easily make it too thin and watery. If you don't own a high speed blender, don't add all the watermelon ice into the blender at once, do it in parts. If you have a Vitamix, use the tamper and blend it into a nice slush
- 6. Add maple syrup to taste, if the watermelon needs sweetening and mix well
- 7. Pour it into a glass and serve with a straw

RAINBOW NOODLE SALAD

1 tablespoon Shiro miso & nutritional yeast each (optional, for a

salty 'cheesy' flavor)

1/2 teaspoon Himalayan crystal salt

Black pepper & turmeric, to taste or sea salt

(optional)

Ingredients:

Rainbow Noodle Salad:

200g of rice or buckwheat noodles (RFR tip: or use 100% spiralized vegetables for an all-raw dish)

2 small zucchini

2 large carrots

1 large beetroot

1 large handful peas, fresh or

frozen and thawed

Toppings: pumpkin seeds (raw or lightly toasted), ALL GOOD almond cashew cheese crumble, fresh herbs,

edible flowers



INSTRUCTIONS:

Pea Pumpkin Seed Pesto:

- 1. Add your peas, herbs, pumpkin seeds, olive oil, lime juice and salt to a food processor fitted with an S-blade. Process until creamy.
- 2. I also like to add black pepper and turmeric because they have really strong antiinflammatory properties + miso and nutritional yeast for a salty 'cheesy' flavor.

Rainbow Noodle Salad:

- 1. Use a spiralizer to turn your zucchini, carrots and beetroot into noodles. If you're using organic veggies, you can leave the skin on for extra minerals - just make sure to rinse them well. If not, it's best to peel the vegetables.
- 2. In the meantime, cook the noodles according to the package directions. (RFR tip: emit if using 100% vegetable noodles)
- 3. Combine the vegetables noodles in a bowl. I like to serve the pesto on the side so you can add as much or as little as you want.
- 4. For garnish, I used pumpkin seeds, ALL GOOD almond cashew cheese crumble, basil and oregano (the same herbs I used for the pesto) and a few edible flowers from our garden.

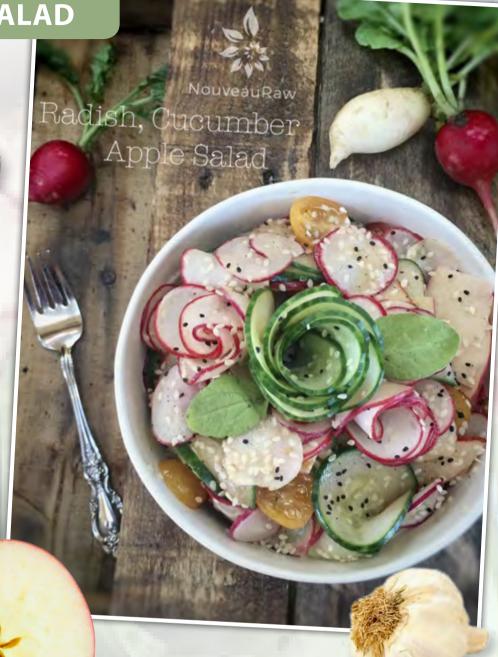

RAW SUN DRIED TOMATO

And Basil Cashew Cheese

NUT-FREE RAW CRACKERS

Ingredients:

1 cup sunflower seeds 1/2 cup sesame seeds 1 shallot (tiny onion) finely minced

1/3 cup ground flax seeds

1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. provincial herbs (mix of oregano, basil, thyme etc)

1/2 cup water Any herbs you like to change the flavour (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Finely chop the shallot.

- 2. Feel free to crush the sunflower seeds in a food processor or with a knife beforehand if you so desire, but whole ones are fine too. I wanted to make this as easy as possible, so I used them whole.
- 3. Just mix all of the ingredients in a large bowl and mix well with a spoon or your hands.
- 4. Spread the mixture over a baking sheet on top of a tray or on a non-stick dehydrator sheet, making it as thick as you like. Mine was enough for one Sedona dehydrator sheet.
- 5. Now you have 2 options: if you don't have a dehydrator, just leave the tray in the sun for a few hours until they are done or in a dry shady place in your house if you have no sun (this may take longer). If you have a dehydrator, then dehydrate at 42°C for 4-8 hours. Here in Spain in the summer, it's actually faster doing this under the sun!

SUN DRIED TOMATO TRUFFLES

Ingredients:

2/3 cup almonds

1/4 cup sesame seeds

1/4 cup macadamia nuts (or other nuts of choice or more almonds)

1/4 cup linseed (flax meal)

1 tsp garlic powder

pinch of sea salt

Paprika, to taste

1 cup sun dried tomatoes

3 dates

1.5 TBSP tahini

1 TBSP chopped fresh basil

(I used Thai basil)

6 TBSP extra virgin olive oil

(I used cold pressed)

4 TBSP lemon juice

1 TBSP balsamic vinegar





INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Soak the sun dried tomatoes and dates in water for half an hour to an hour.
- 2. Add to a blender the first set of ingredients (the dry ones) and pulse for few seconds until finely crumbled and mixed. Don't turn it into a flour thought; leave some texture to it.
- 3. Drain tomatoes and add them to the blender.
- 4. Add the remaining ingredients and pulse until everything is incorporated and sticky.
- 5. Scoop out the mixture and roll the truffles into desired shapes. (I made round and square ones.)
- 6. Place in fridge until ready to serve.
- 7. 'Dip' in sesame seeds or herb mix before serving.

SUN DRIED TOMATO AND ZUCCHINI TARTS



INSTRUCTIONS:

Filling:

- 1. Add the zucchini, garlic, olives, basil, olive oil, lemon juice, sea salt and black pepper, to taste, to a bowl.
- 2. Mix thoroughly but gently until well incorporated.

Crust:

- 1. Grind the flax seeds in a coffee grinder dedicated to nuts and seeds.
- 2. Add the pistachios and pumpkin seeds to the bowl of a food processor. Process on high until finely ground, about 1 minute. Add the flax seeds, nutritional yeast, sundried tomatoes and sea salt and process again until a paste forms, about 2 minutes (if the mixture feels a little dry, add some olive oil, 1 teaspoon at a time, until the right consistency is achieved).
- 3. Using your fingers, evenly spread the crust onto each tart pan (about 1/3 cup per tart), coming up the sides, as well. Your fingers will be wet and sticky.
- 4. Add one layer of tomato slices to the bottom of the tart, then some of the zucchini mixture, then another layer of tomato slices, etc. until it reaches the top.
- 5. Top with extra basil, olives, and pine nuts, and serve immediately.

RAW SUN-DRIED TOMATO WRAP RECIPE

Ingredients:

Sun-dried tomato paste:

1.5 cups sun-dried tomatoes

Raw Organic Ingredients:

- 1 cup of zucchini
- 2 fresh tomatoes
- 1/2 an apple
- 1 stock celery
- 1/2 cup of fresh lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons of mixed herbs and seasonings. You can use whatever salt-free herb mix you like. Both times I've made it, I used different seasoning blends (first one was more of a mexican/cajun and second time around I did a fresh garden herb mix and both were delicious.)
 - 1/2 cup of water



- 1. Start by soaking 1.5 cups of sun-dried tomatoes for about 20 minutes and do not discard the water.
- 2. Once they are soft, blend the sun-dried tomatoes with 3 dates and the water you soaked them in.
- 3. You can either blend then in a food processor, or if you need to, blend them in a high-powered blender, like a Vita-mix which is what I use and recommend to get them very soft.

- 4. In a food processor blend the following raw organic ingredients (chopped up), and added to the sun-dried tomato paste
- 5. As recipes will always turn out different for everyone, it's best to start paying attention to consistency, which is really one of the most important aspects of working with raw food recipes. You don't want the mixture to be too runny or too firm, just a nice spreadable batter. If you think it's looking too thick, start by adding a half a cup of water and work your way up from there.
- 6. It's not also uncommon that as you start spreading them, the batter thickens due to the flax absorbing the water. In this case, I would simply add a little more water to the food processor, process again and then continue spreading.
- 7. Spread them thin on a <u>Teflex dehydrator sheets</u>. I use an <u>icing spatula</u> to spread my sun-dried tomato wraps, as well as for crackers. This is a useful and indispensable kitchen tool to keep in your raw food kitchen.
- 8. When spreading the batter, make sure you don't have areas that are spread too thin, so that you don't have any holes once it dries. Remember that it will get a lot thinner once it's dry.
- 9. Start it off at about 140 degrees, and then after about 30 minutes turn it down to 115. These won't take that long to dry since they're very thin. You should also make sure to flip them as soon as you see that the wraps are becoming dry enough to peel off the teflex sheet.
- 10.Most of all, have fun and experiment with recipes, take notes if you like to jot down what you like and didn't like about a particular recipe as well as to dial in recipes that you love and can keep recreating.

RAW SUN DRIED TOMATO BURGERS

Ingredients:

1/2 cup sunflower seeds soaked for 8 hours or overnight 1/2 cup sprouted almonds soaked for 8 hours or overnight 1/2 cup flax seeds 1/2 cup chopped sun-dried tomatoes (not packed in oil!) soaked for 20 min 2 tbls apple cider vinegar 1/2 cup fresh cilantro chopped 1 tbls kelp flakes optional

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Pre-soak sunflower seeds and almond in a cold water for 8 hours or overnight.
- 2. Pre-soak sun-dried tomatoes in a clod water for at least 20 min.
- 3. Drain the water from sunflower seeds, almond and sun dried tomatoes, place into a trainer and wash under cold running water.
- Put all the burger patty ingredients in a food processor and pulse until the consistency is slightly sticky.
- 5. Shape into 8 smaller or 6 medium size patties and dehydrate at 115 for about 2 hours, flip, and keep dehydrating for another 3-4, or until they're the texture you like.
- 6. Don't own a dehydrator? No problem! Alternatively, you can dehydrate these in the oven.
- 7. Preheat your oven to its lowest setting (mine is 170°F). Dehydrate" for about 4-5 hours or until the patties feels stiff and dry to the touch. Serve over greens, on some raw bread, or in a wrap in a nori sheet!

CHIA MANGO SOFTEE PARFAIT

Ingredients:

7 tbsp of chia seeds
120ml of any nut milk
1/2 cup of sliced fresh
strawberries
1/2 cup of frozen mangoes
1 cup of frozen bananas
Dash of nut milk for the
softee



- 1. Firstly, you would need to prepare the chia pudding 30 mins in advance. Place chia seeds and nut milk in a bowl. Stir well until it is properly mixed and set aside for half an hour to thicken into a gelatin-like texture, similar to a pudding. Next, slice the strawberries and set aside. To prepare the softee (ice cream like texture), you need to do this at the very last minute.
- 2. Make sure to place the thickened chia pudding into a tall glass, then followed by a layer of fresh strawberries as shown in the picture above. Once you have done that, place the frozen bananas, mangoes and dash of nut milk in a blender. Blend until it is smooth and texture consistency should be like a creamy sorbet. I recommend brands like eg. Nutribullet or a Vitamix blender for the optimium "softee" texture.





3. Once blended, you can either use a ice cream scoop to scoop our your "softee" into the glass or you can place the blended softee into a piping bag with a "open star" piping tip to pipe this into the glass. Practise makes perfect to swirl without melting. So don't be disheartened if your first attempt is a result of a melted watery softee.



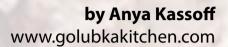

Ingredients:

Blackberry Sauce: 2 cups fresh blackberries raw honey or another sweetener of choice - to taste

Kuchen Ice-Cream:

2 cups raw cashews - soaked overnight 2 cups meat of fresh young Thai coconut

1 cup freshly squeezed apple juice 3/4 cup agave syrup or another sweetener of choice zest of 2 oranges 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg 1 teaspoon ground ginger 3/4 cup coconut oil

Spiced Apples:

raw honey mixed with a couple drops of vanilla extract 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed orange juice 1-2 apples - thinly sliced zest of 1 orange sprinkle of ground cinnamon and ground nutmeg - to taste fresh blackberries - optional





INSTRUCTIONS:

Blackberry Sauce:

In a high speed blender, combine the berries with your sweetener of choice. Run the mixture through a fine-mesh sieve to discard the seeds.

Kuchen Ice-Cream:

In a high-speed blender, combine all the ingredients until smooth. Chill well, and process in your ice-cream maker according to the manufacturer's instructions. Pour a small amount of ice-cream into a chilled container, then spoon some blackberry sauce on top. Continue with the ice-cream, alternating with layers of blackberry sauce to get a swirled effect when you scoop. Cover the container and freeze for a couple of hours before serving.

Spiced Apples:

Whisk the vanilla infused honey and orange juice in a small mixing bowl. I didn't measure the amount of honey precisely, just eyeball it according to the amount of apples you're using. Mix the apples with orange zest and spices. Pour the honey mixture over, stirring and making sure that all of the apples are coated. Let sit for a couple of hours or while making the ice cream.

Serve the ice-cream with spiced apples, fresh blackberries, and extra blackberry sauce if you prefer.

RAW MOJITO SQUARES

Ingredients:

Zest of 2 limes Juice of 2 limes, 6 Tbsp at room temperature 1 soft avocado, roughly diced

1/2 cup raw cashew butter, at room temperature

1/2 cup fresh mint leaves, chopped 1/4 tsp powdered stevia (to taste) 1 tsp mint extract

3 Tbsp melted coconut oil, melted 1 cup raspberries

2 cup pecans, raw

1/2 cup shredded coconut, unsweetened

1/4 tsp stevia 1/4 tsp salt

1/2 tsp vanilla

6 Tisp coconut oil, melted



- 1. Place the pecans in a food processor and pulse until finely ground.
- 2. Transfer to a bowl and mix in the shredded coconut, stevia and salt.
- 3. Add the coconut oil and vanilla and stir until mixed.
- 4. Press the mixture into the bottom 8x8 pan lined with wax paper and freeze until the filling is ready.
- 5. In a medium sized bowl, zest 2 limes and set aside 2 Tbsp of zest for garnish.
- 6. In a food processor process the zest, lime juice, avocado, cashew butter, mint, stevia, mint extract and coconut oil and process until silky smooth.
- 7. Remove the chilled crust from the freezer spread the mojito filling over the top then sprinkle with the remaining zest. Place back in the freezer and chill for 2 hours to set.
- 8. Before serving, place the Raw Mojito Squares on the counter for 20 minutes or in the fridge for 2 hours to soften. Then top with fresh raspberries and serve.
