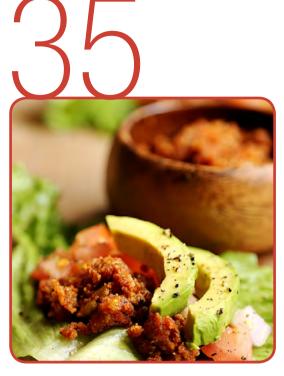

ho is Joss Stone? When Joss Stone burst onto the music scene, she blew everyone away with her powerful, soulful voice—a voice that Interview magazine has said "can sting like aged bourbon, or melt like strap molasses." Belting

out songs with a force unlike anyone else in her generation, Joss has sold millions of albums, been nominated for multiple Grammy Awards, and made fans of all ages across the globe. She earned a Grammy nomination for Best New Artist two years later after releasing her second studio album 'Mind, Body & Soul,' which comprised mostly of her own compositions including the majestic 'Security' and the earworm "You Had Me". At 16, she became the youngest person nominated for the United Kingdom's prestigious Mercury Music Prize.

Besides singing, Joss has likewise already ventured herself into acting. She made her film debut in 2006 fantasy adventure film 'Eragon' where she played Angela -- a fortune teller. In television, Joss portrayed Anne of Cleves in the Showtime series 'The Tudors' in 2009.

been vegetarian since birth. 'I eat everything, I'm not fussy - as long as it hasn't got a face.' I'm a singer, a songwriter, a performer, and a human being accepting of all sizes, shapes, colors, and species.' A wise man once said, 'Animals are my friends, and I'm not in the habit of eating my friends.' That is exactly how I feel'.

She's normally a healthy vegeta<mark>rian, but adm</mark>its she sometimes packs on a few extra pounds here and there.

Blame it on the non-vegan food on tour. "In Europe, all they want to give you is bread and cheese, bread and cheese, bread and cheese" Stone said.

Stone has taken part in various campaigns for animal rights group <u>PETA</u>. She has made animal advocacy a part of her charity outreach (she also owns a number of rescue dogs) and has also campaigned for a vegetarian lifestyle.

The State of Cancer: Are We Close to a Cure?



e are closer in 2017 to curing cancer than we ever have been before. Nevertheless, cancer remains one of the most common terminal illnesses in the United States, and we still do not have a surefire cure for it. In the last decade there

have been a number of new treatments, however, and some of them seem to be more promising than the traditional routes of surgery, radiotherapy and chemotherapy.

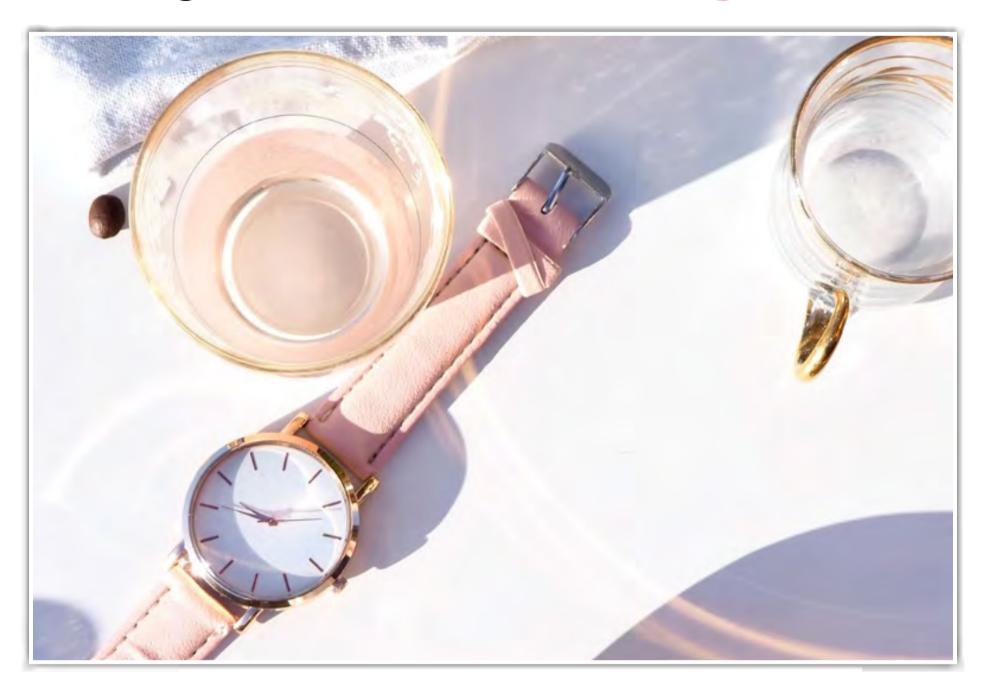
Lately, there has been an attempt to treat cancer with low dose laser methods. In a recent study, 20 patients were treated with this method for prostate cancer, and 20% of them experienced complete remission. 35% had a partial remission. 35% of these patients experienced no further tumor growth, but were not cured. 10% of these patients experienced further tumor growth. Sufferers of malignant tumors in the US usually only have a 2.1% survival rate

when chemotherapy is the chosen treatment. This experiment showed great success in comparison, especially since chemo comes with a host of negative long term side effects, such as cognitive decline and heart disease.

One of the reasons that cancer is so difficult to treat is that it is incredibly adaptable. It mutates quickly and changes in response to drugs. However, there has been an attempt recently to combat this by training a patient's white blood cells to carry chemotherapy drugs directly to cancer cells according to their individual DNA. The difficulty with this method is that there are too few T cells to overcome an entire tumor, although pound for pound our white blood cells are able to defeat them with the appropriate tweaks.

Overall, it seems there are quite a few promising cancer treatments emerging lately, and hopefully soon this disease will be curable in every case.

Changes in breakfast and dinner timings can reduce body fat



odest changes to breakfast and dinner times can reduce body fat, a new pilot study in the Journal of Nutritional Sciences reports.

During a 10-week study on 'time-restricted feeding' (a form of intermittent fasting), researchers led by Dr Jonathan Johnston from the University of Surrey investigated the impact changing meal times has on dietary intake, body composition and blood risk markers for diabetes and heart disease.

Participants were split into two groups — those who were required to delay their breakfast by 90 minutes and have their dinner 90 minutes earlier, and those who ate meals as they would normally (the controls). Participants were required to provide blood samples and complete diet diaries before and during the 10-week intervention and complete a feedback questionnaire immediately after the study.

Unlike previous studies in this area, participants were not asked to stick to a strict diet and could eat freely, provided it was within a certain eating window. This helped researchers assess whether this type of diet was easy to follow in everyday life.

Researchers found that those who changed their mealtimes lost on average more than twice as much body fat as those in the control group, who ate their meals as normal. If these pilot data can be repeated in larger studies, there is potential for time-restricted feeding to have broad health benefits.

Although there were no restrictions on what participants could eat, researchers found that those who changed their mealtimes ate less food overall than the control group. This result was supported by questionnaire responses which found that 57 percent of participants noted a reduction in food intake either due to reduced appetite, decreased eating opportunities or a cutback in snacking (particularly in the evenings). It is currently un-

certain whether the longer fasting period undertaken by this group was also a contributing factor to this reduction in body fat.

Dr Jonathan Johnston, Reader in Chronobiology and Integrative Physiology at the University of Surrey, said: "Although this study is small, it has provided us with invaluable insight into how slight alterations to our meal times can have benefits to our bodies. Reduction in body fat lessens our chances of developing obesity and related diseases, so is vital in improving our overall health.

"We are now going to use these preliminary findings to design larger, more comprehensive studies of time-restricted feeding."



Meat Could Prevent A Third Of Early Deaths, Say Harvard Scientists



f everyone stopped eating meat, at least one-third of early deaths could be prevented, according to Harvard scientists.Doctors claimed that the positive effects of vegetarian and vegan diets have been underestimat-

According to top plant-based physician Dr. Neal Barnard - President of the Committee for Responsible Medicine-the positive effects of vegetarian and vegan diets have been underestimated, adding: "I think people imagine that a healthy diet has only a modest effect and a vege-

- tarian diet might help you lose a little bit of weight. But when these diets are properly constructed I think they are enormously powerful.
- "A low-fat vegan diet is better than any other diet I have ever seen for improving diabetes."
- "With regards to inflammatory diseases like rheumatoid arthritis we are seeing tremendous potential there too. Partly because of things we are avoiding and cholesterol
- but also because of the magical things that are in vegeta-
- bles and fruits which just aren't in spam."

Making happiness last longer

Goal setting strategies can influence positive emotions



or most people, the sense of happiness derived from a luxurious vacation, a good movie or a tasty dinner at a restaurant may seem short-lived, but what if it were possible to extend these feelings of enjoyment?

Researchers from the University of Minnesota and Texas A&M University decided to explore whether the way people frame their goals for an experience influences how much happiness they glean from the experience over time. They started by questioning whether the traditional

approach to setting goals could be limiting the level of happiness for consumers, and their findings will be published in the October issue of the Journal of Consumer Psychology.

Prior research has shown that people are more likely to have a sense of well-being if they set specific goals that are concrete and easy to measure -- rather than broad, general goals that may be harder to quantify and attain.

While this approach may be effective in setting work,exercise or weight loss goals, the researchers hypothe-

sized that this may not be as beneficial when happiness is the goal. In this area of life, general goals may be an advantage because people will be open to experiencing a broader range of positive emotions.

"If people watch a movie with a specific goal like feeling excitement, then they may be less likely to remember the funny or meaningful elements of the movie," says Rohini Ahluwalia, a professor of marketing at the University of Minnesota and author of the study. "We predicted that people with general goals would engage a broader range of emotions and experience more happiness over time."

In one experiment, the researchers asked participants to describe an important purchase they had made in the past month. One group described purchases aimed at increasing their level of joy and happiness in life -- a general goal. The other two groups described purchases they had made for more specific goals: to become happier by increasing excitement or to become happier by increasing peace of mind and relaxation. Then the participants completed a survey with questions about how much initial happiness they had derived from the purchase. Two weeks later, the participants received an e-mail asking how much their purchase was contributing to their overall happiness, and how aware they were of it at that point in time. They received an e-mail with the same questions six weeks after their initial purchase.

The results from the study showed that although the levels of happiness were equal for the three groups at the initial time of the purchase, those who had more general goals reported more happiness as time passed. The difference between the groups was the most significant six weeks later.

"Our findings suggest that people can change the amount of happiness they get out of an experience," Ahluwalia says. "A general happiness goal can leave a longer-lasting positive emotional imprint."

This can apply to material purchases like a new car or dress as well as experiential purchases like spending money on vacation or a new music album. Another experiment in the study showed that participants with broader happiness goals experienced more positive emotions after listening to a new song than the participants who had a specific goal of feeling excitement and energy. The participants with the broader goals were also willing to pay more for the song.

"Although more studies are needed to confirm our findings, these initial results show that we can make small changes in our thinking patterns to help us experience more joy," Ahluwalia says.

"Given that short-lived happiness after experiences is such a common phenomenon, this is an important step in stretching that timeline."

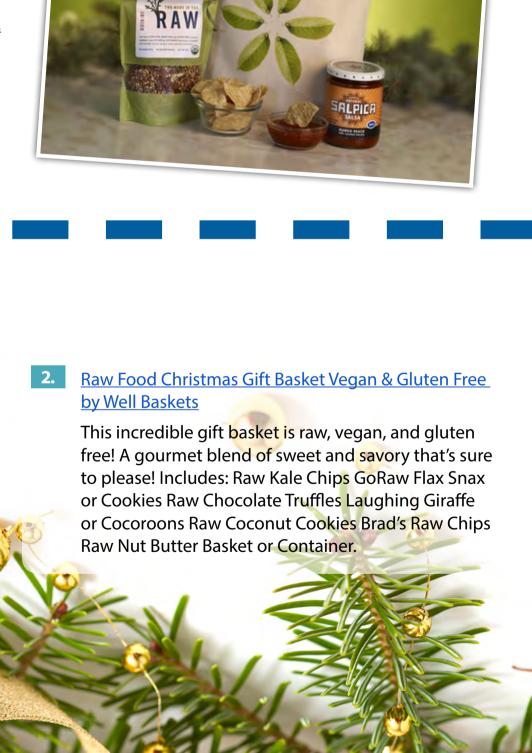

And Her **Vegan Lifestyle**

Naida: Thanks for making time to do this quick interview. If you could just jump right in and introduce yourself and tell us a little bit about what you do and what brought you into creating your new book, Vegan Reset: The 28-Day Plan To Kickstart Your Healthy Lifestyle?

Kim-Julie: Sure! I'm a vegan food and lifestyle blogger and author based in NYC. I went vegan for ethical reasons in 2011 and then started exploring the benefits of a plant-based diet as well. I wrote my book as the kind of guide I wish I'd had when I first went vegan.

Naida: Can you tell us more about your book, and what can our readers expect from it that can't be found in other recipe books?

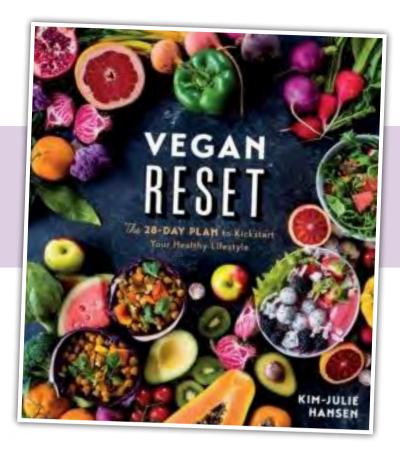
Kim-Julie: The uniqueness of *Vegan Reset* is that's it practically three books in one. You'll get a practical guide to veganism, a cookbook and a 28-day meal plan. It's written for beginners but also people who are already vegan and would like to know more about meal prepping and how to easily make healthy yet delicious recipes.

Naida: You seem like you are in good spirits and great health. How much of that would you attribute to diet?

Kim-Julie: I believe in a holistic approach to health where food plays an essential role, but is not the only role. I think that you can eat the healthiest foods and still not *feel* healthy or be happy. For me, it's a mix of diet, meditation, movement, spirituality and rest.

Naida: What methods did you use to determine the effectiveness of going vegan?

Kim-Julie: Veganism has always been about ethics for me, so it became effective the moment I made the decision to adopt the lifestyle. In order to determine whether I'm healthy as a vegan, I go by how I feel and I also get my levels checked regularly to see if I'm getting all the



nutrients I need. Interestingly, I have less deficiencies as a vegan than I did when I still ate animal products. The last time I checked, the only deficiency I had was Vitamin D, but I've since been supplementing and also making sure I spend more time outdoors.

Naida: It was mentioned to us that you tried the Raw Vegan diet in the past, what was one of the biggest challenges that you've encountered?

Kim-Julie: I loved eating raw and actually never felt better than during that time, but the biggest challenge for me was convenience. It's quite easy to be raw, but I really enjoy going to restaurants that don't necessarily have raw options other than a juice and a side salad. I also love cooked foods and cooking in general, so it felt limiting. I will occasionally incorporate raw meals or even raw days now and I'm grateful for the experience because it's what taught me to love fruits and vegetables when I never had before.

Naida: What would you say to someone who declines going vegan or living a healthy lifestyle?

Kim-Julie: In the beginning I used to try and convince every person I met to go vegan, but I've since come to realize that you can't make anyone do anything they don't want to do and even if you're successful in pressuring them into going vegan, it probably won't last. All you can do is provide the information and lead by example. The less I try to convince people, the more open they seem. That doesn't mean I don't talk about it, I do it all the time, but I try to be inviting rather than insistent. Whenever I

meet someone who's very opposed to veganism, I try to find common ground and let them know that I understand how they feel because I used to love meat, eggs and dairy and that at one point, the idea of veganism seemed absurd and extreme to me too. You'll find that most of these people are opposed to the idea of being told what to do, but they're often open to dialogue or they might even agree with your reasoning if you listen and engage with them. I believe in encouraging people to do something, anything, even if it's just eating one vegan meal a month, rather than making them feel like it has to be an all or nothing decision right from the start.

Naida: How different of a world do you think we'd see if everybody went vegan?

Kim-Julie: Hopefully a world in which compassion trumps profit.

Naida: What's your earliest food memory?

Kim-Julie: Baking a chocolate cake with my mom.

Naida: What comes to mind when you think of "comfort food"?

Kim-Julie: I used to associate that term with any food that helped me numb whatever pain I didn't want to feel. It wasn't necessarily about the food itself, but rather how I was using it and why. Nowadays everything I eat is comfort food, because it nourishes me and I find comfort in it. On some days that's a green salad or a macro bowl and on other days it's an oat milk latte with a vegan donut. I think that the less you label some foods as "bad" or "guilty pleasures", the less likely you'll be to want to overeat on them. I do believe that some foods aren't as healthy as others, but I don't think that obsessing over excluding them is good for our mental health. And just to clarify, when I say that, I mean within veganism. Since animal products always contribute to the unnecessary suffering of animals, I no longer consider them "food".

Naida: What would be your favorite vegan or raw vegan dish, and why?

Kim-Julie: My favorite raw vegan dish is zucchini noodles with a creamy cashew sauce because it's just so delicious and my favorite vegan dish is anything that involves tempeh because I'm obsessed with tempeh and could eat it every day.

Naida: If you bring back one (unhealthy) food from your childhood into your present diet with no negative impact to your health, what would it be?



Kim-Julie: My favorite Belgian chocolate, Côte D'or. Unfortunately they don't have a dairy-free version.

<u>Chris Wark - Colon Cancer</u> Survivor

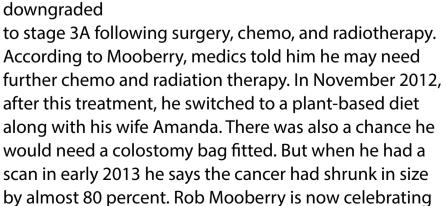

Rob Mooberry Rob Mooberry, 43, was diagnosed with stage 4 colorectal cancer in 2012. His cancer diagnosis was



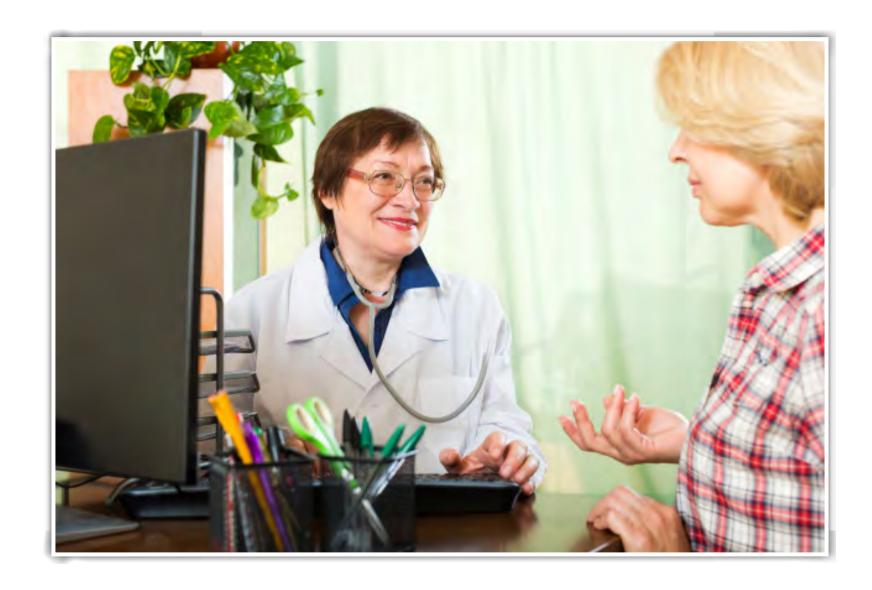


five years of being cancer-free - and has since founded a

How To Explain Your Vegan Diet

To A Non Supportive Doctor



octors take an oath to do no harm, but that often makes them resistant to new ideas, so when you let a physician know about your vegan diet, there may be an awkward silence. Telling them it's a raw diet may even earn you a disapproving stare.

In a recent editorial for the Journal of the American Medical Association, Doctors Scott Kahan and JoAnn Manson identified a broad failure on the part of primary care physicians to discuss proper nutrition with their patients (1). In part, they blame lack of nutrition knowledge for generally poor dietary counseling. While doctors fear that patients are taking advice about what to eat from disreputable sources, they're not trained to do better. This

is when proactive patients can take the lead by sharing their nutrition awareness with non-supportive physicians.

Begin by pointing out that the principals of veganism and a raw diet correlate to doctor-approved tenets of nutrition including emphasis on fruits and vegetables. Acknowledge that some aspects of your diet are nontraditional and sound like they may be difficult to stick to, but explain how the change has improved your overall eating habits.

Finally, show off the good results. If you've been struggling with digestive issues or other ailments that haven't improved with conventional nutrition wisdom, take a stand for your approach. Doctors are outcome-oriented and disapproval is hard to maintain in the face of success.

Selenium: What Is It and Why Do Vegans Need It?

The quota for essential vitamins and minerals is easy to hit when you are eating a whole, plant-based, vegan diet. However, selenium is one mineral that you should be mindful of.

What Is Selenium?

It can be hard to tell just how much selenium you are getting because there may be no way of knowing what type of soil the food has been grown in.

If the soil is rich in selenium, there is a higher chance that the food is rich in selenium (and vice versa).

Why Is Selenium Important for Vegans?

Selenium is most commonly found in fish, beef, and poultry. As a vegan, you will need to make sure you are getting selenium from plant-based sources.



Why? Because selenium is important for your metabolism, immune system, cognitive function, fertility, and other bodily functions. It also helps to form antioxidants to keep cells and tissues in the body healthy.

A deficiency in selenium could lead to increase of infection and disease, moodiness, and fertility issues.

The good news is, a little selenium goes a long way. Adults can safely ingest 400 micrograms a day, but it is recommended to that adult males ingest 75 micrograms and adult females ingest 60 micrograms daily.

The daily recommended selenium intake can be easily hit by eating the above foods, but always speak with your doctor if you have concerns. By talking with your doctor, he or she may be able to recommend a supplement if your intake is not adequate.

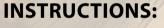


BEETROOT BREAD ROLL

Ingredients:

1 cup ground flax seeds 1 cup almond meal 1 cup ground, buckwheat 1/4 cup ground chia (grind the whole almonds, flax seeds, chia seeds and buckwheat into fine flour by using a high speed blender and it's dry jug) 3 thsp raisins paste, or date paste 1 cup chopped beetroot



- 1. Combine all the ingredients in the food processor fitted with the S blade and
- 2. process until well combined.
- 3. Remove dough and form into a small loaf or bread roll (longer and thinner is better so the drying process take shorter amount of time) or your preferred shape. Roll with coating of your choice, I used ground flax seeds.
- 4. Dehydrate at 140°F for 2 hours. Decrease heat to 115°F and continue to dehydrate about 8-10 hours or until dry. It can also be sped up a little, to make the total time as little as 10 hours by slice the bread and place slices on dehydrator sheet.
- 5. This baguette is definitely best served warm, right out of the dehydrator, so enjoy it immediately.

- Thermomix and blend for 8 seconds. Place in a bowl, set aside.
- 3. Put onion, garlic, vinegar, salt and any optional seasonings in blender. Mince for 7 seconds.
- 4. Drain the almonds and raisins, add to blender with the onion mix and mince for 10 seconds. Push down sides with a spatula and repeat.



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 5. Kneed and work in the flax and chia seed mixture.
- 6. Press the dough into a large ball, press into a loaf firmly to prevent cracking. Opt to brush with raw flax oil and a sprinkle of herbs and seeds.
- 7. Dehydrate at 115 degrees F for 15-16 hours. If using an oven place loaf on a raised cookie rack to ventilate while baking at 200 degrees F or the lowest temperature for 3-4 hours.

RAW VEGAN MOIST SPONGY LOAVES

2 cups almonds

1 cup psyllium husk

1/2 cup flax meal

1 1/2 cups white onions

(roughly chopped) 2 cloves garlic

3 teaspoons lemon juice

1 1/2 teaspoons sea salt

1/3 cup water + 1/8 cup

water



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Place almonds in food processor. Process until they look like slightly chunky "almond flour." REMOVE from food processor and dump into big bowl.
- 2. Add psyllium husk, flax and salt to bowl that contains "almond flour" that you just made.
- 3. Your food processor should now be empty. Add onions, garlic and lemon juice to your food processor. Process until quite liquidy, mushy and pourable.
- 4. Dump onion mixture into the big bowl that contains your dry ingredients.
- 5. Add 1/3 cup water to big bowl. Mix everything together with spoon. Add more water (1/8 cup) if necessary to get dry, doughlike texture that you can mold into loaves.
- 6. Mold into six small loaves.
- 7. Place directly onto dehydrator tray. Dehydrate at 145 degrees for 1 hour then reduce temperature to 110 degrees. Dehydrate for another 6 hours or so. Tastes best if eaten right out of dehydrator, but can be stored in fridge for 4 days.



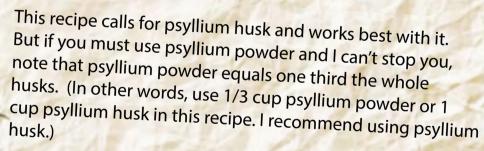

Ingredients:

Dry Ingredients: 1 cup rolled oats, gluten-free oats,

soaked and dehydrated

1/4 cup ground flax seeds 2 Tosp psyllium husks, powdered

2 tsp ground Ceylon cinnamon

Wet Ingredients:

2 cups packed, moist almond pulp

2 cups mashed bananas

1/4 cup date paste

3 Tbsp raw agave nectar

or maple syrup

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 cup raisins

1/2 cup chopped raw walnuts,

soaked and dehydrated

1 cup diced banana chunks



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. In the food processor fitted with the "S" blade, place the following ingredients: oats, flax meal, psyllium, cinnamon, salt
 - Pulse together until combined
 - Place dry ingredients in a large bowl
- 2. Add to the bowl the nut pulp, mashed banana, date paste, sweetener, vanilla, raisins, and chopped walnuts. Hold off on adding the diced banana chunks.
 - With your hands, blend til everything is well incorporated
- 3. Add the banana chunks and gently mix.
 - I didn't want you to add them in #2 because they would have turned pure mush. I want the chunks to remain in the bread
- 4. Shape into a loaf and place on the mesh sheet that comes with your dehydrator
- 5. Dehydrate at 145 degrees for 1-2 hours. This will create a crust on the outside



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 6. Remove from the dehydrator, place the loaf on a cutting board and slice pieces to the desired thickness.
 - I did mine at about 1/2 "
 - Return the bread to the mesh sheet laying the pieces flat
- Decrease the temperature to 115 degrees
 (F) and continue to dehydrate for about 6 hours
 - As an indicator, if it is dry enough, touch the center of the bread slices
 - You don't want it to be doughy, but you also don't want the bread to dry out too much
 - You decide on how dry you want the end result to be

Amie Sue's tips:

- 1. Shelf life and storage: My personal recommendation would be to store this bread in an air-tight container and in the fridge, for 3-5 days. The more moisture that is left in your bread, the shorter the shelf life. Therefore, shelf life will vary with your drying technique. Whenever I make this drying technique. Whenever I make this bread, it never lasts very long enough to spoil. Keep in mind, the whole purpose of eating a raw diet is to eat foods at their peak of freshness, so don't expect this bread to have a long shelf life
 - To warm the bread before eating, place it in the dehydrator set at 145 degrees for 5-10 minutes.

RAW VEGAN LETTUCE TACOS

with Chorizo, Salsa and Avocado

Ingredients:

7 romaine lettuce leaves (or 3-4 large romaine lettuce leaves)

Vegan chorizo:

- 1/3 cup sunflower seeds, pre-soaked
- 1/4 cup Brazil nuts
- 2 tablespoons walnuts
- 5 sundried tomatoes soaked in olive oil
- 1 tablespoon diced red onion
- 1 tablespoon nutritional yeast
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1 teaspoon extra virgin olive oil
- 1 small clove garlic
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon Himalayan/Sea salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- A pinch of red pepper flakes 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Ingredients:

Salsa:

- 1 tomato, diced
- 1 tablespoon diced red onion
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon extra virgin olive oil
- A sprinkle Himalayan/Sea salt
- A few sprinkles ground black pepper

Topping:

- 1 avocado, sliced
- Salt and pepper to taste
- A few drizzles lemon juice (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- To make the Chorizo: Soak the sunflower seeds in warm water for about half an hour. During this time, get the other ingredients ready. Peel the garlic and dice the onions. Also, wash the romaine lettuce leaves well so that there's no dirt on it.
- 2. Add everything for the vegan chorizo into the blender, including the soaked sunflower seeds, as well as Brazil nuts, walnuts, sundried tomatoes, diced onion, nutritional yeast, paprika, garlic powder, onion powder, extra virgin olive oil, garlic clove, dried oregano, salt, cumin, red pepper flakes and cayenne pepper. Blend until most of it is smooth, you don't have to have it completely smooth. Sometimes it's nice to have some crunch. You may like to keep it totally smooth, or not smooth at all. This is completely up to you! When it's done, spoon the chorizo into a small bowl and set it aside.
- 3. To make the Salsa: Peel the onion and wash the tomato, then dice both into small cubes and put it in a bowl. Add the lemon juice, extra virgin olive oil, salt and pepper into that bowl and give it a good stir to mix everything in. Set that aside as well.
- 4. To make the Taco: Chop the avocado in half, then remove the seed. Use a spoon to scoop the flesh out and chop it sideways into small slices. Have the romaine lettuce leaf ready. If you're using a very large leaf, you will need to cut it sideways in half or three, be sure that you cut off the very hard stems. Spoon some chorizo, salsa, two slices of avocado in the center of the lettuce leaf. Finally, sprinkle a little salt and pepper to taste, and a bit of lemon juice on the avocado if desired.

RAW BEET CHIPS

12 Beets (turnips, and yams are also simply heavenly)
Coconut Oil
Cumin

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Simply lightly cover the beets with coconut oil (What I have started doing, because too many times I came out with too oily a chip, is I put a teeny tiny bit of oil in the palm of my hand, and then use my hands to massage the oil into the chips. I've also tried other oils, but I still find that coconut oil works the best
- 2. Sprinkle a little cumin or whatever spices I want for seasoning over the beets or whatever vegetable I'm using for a chip
- 3. Place them on trays in the dehydrator and you can put them up to 145-150 for about 20 minutes then down to 115 for a few more hours. Depending on how thin you sliced them, these beet chips won't take too long in the dehydrator. They will also get a little crunchier if you let them cool after you remove them from the dehydrator, before you start eating them
- 4. Enjoy with a tasty dip like my <u>cilantro lime dip</u>, or <u>raw</u> <u>vegan pesto</u>. Don't forget to share with your partner, friends or family, you might entice them to switch over to raw root chips!

RAW FALAFELS WITH TZATZIKI SAUCE

Falafel:

2,5 cup (320 g) chopped carrots

3/4 cup (70 g) celery

2 Tbsp (30 g) sunflower seeds

1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

1/4 tsp cumin seeds, ground extra 1/8 cup sesame seeds

Tzatziki Sauce:

1 cup (125 g) chopped zucchini,

peeled

1 cup (125 g) chopped cucumbers,

peeled

1/8 cup (20 g) macadamia nuts

1 Tbsp lemon juice

1 Tosp lime juice

1/2 Tbsp chives, chopped

extra 1 small (100 g) cucumber,

peeled

Tahini Sauce:

1/2 Tbsp lemon juice

1 Tbsp water

1 Tbsp tahini or grounded sesame

seeds

Pickled Turnips:

1 large (200 g) turnip, spiralized

1 Tbsp beet juice

1 tsp lemon juice

To serve:

1 head (400 g) lettuce

7 oz (200 g) baby spinach

3 tomatoes, cubed



INSTRUCTIONS:

Falafel:

- 1. Coarsely chop carrots and celery.
- 2. Mix sunflower and sesame seeds in the food processor until ground. Add carrots and celery and process until well mixed.
- 3. Add chopped fresh parsley and ground cumin seeds and process.
- 4. Form into balls, they roll in sesame seeds.
- 5. (The mixture will be quite wet, so be patient with forming the balls.)
- 6. Transfer to the dehydrator and dehydrate for 3 4 hours at 115 degrees Fahrenheit (46°C).

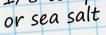


ALMOND BUTTER COOKIES

- 1/4 cup coconut oil
- 1/4 cup coconut flour
- 5 tablespoons date paste 20 drops pure liquid Stevia (or extra
- date paste)
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 5 drops almond extract (optional)
- 1/8 teaspoon Himalayan Crystal salt





- 1. Warm up the coconut butter until it turns into liquid coconut oil. Remove the oil from the stove and let it cool
- 2. Combine almond butter, almond meal, coconut oil, coconut flour, date pasta, Stevia, vanilla extract, almond extract and salt in the food processor. Mix until all the ingredients turn into a big cookie dough ball.
- 3. Form the cookie dough into forms of your choice.
- 4. Place the cookies onto a dehydrator tray lined with a Teflex sheet. Dehydrate at 115°F for 20 hours or more, until they are crispy on the outside and slightly soft on the inside.





Julie's tips:

- 1. If the cookies are still slightly moist inside, they will stay fresh for at least 10 days in an airtight container in the refrigerator. 2. If the cookies are completely dry and crispy,
 - you will be able to store them for at least 2 months in an airtight container in a cool, dry
 - 3. Try experimenting with other types of 'butter' for different flavour variations. I'm thinking tahini, sunflower seeds, pumpkin seeds, walnuts, pecans, cashews, macadamias, hazelnuts, brazil nuts, pine nuts, pistachios...

VEGAN WHITE CHOCOLATE TRUFFLES

Ingredients:

200g coconut cream
30g cacao butter
seeds of 1 vanilla bean
50g dessicated coconut
(plus a bit extra for coating)
30g maple syrup
4 TBSP coconut flour

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Whisk coconut cream in a medium bowl until you get it smooth and silky.
- 2. Melt the cacao butter (bain marie method) and add it to the coconut cream, with the vanilla. Whisk to incorporate.
- 3. Add dessicated coconut, maple and coconut flour and mix well until you get a sticky, wet(ish), soft mix.
- 4. Form bite sized truffles.
- 5. Roll them in dessicated coconut and refrigerate for 20 minutes.
- 6. ENJOY!!! xx

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Place coconut flour, sea salt, nectar, beet, and vanilla in the food processor and process until well combined. Add coconut and pulse until the mixture holds together.
- 2. Form the mixture into 12 balls, and place on a dehydrator sheet. Dehydrate for about 6-8 hours, or until they are dried, but not so much so that they are not a little chewy in the middle.
- 3. To make the glaze, whisk together all ingredients until smooth, adding 1 tsp of water at a time until the mixture is a glaze consistency (not too thin though, you want to be able to pipe it).
- 4. Place in a plastic bag with the tip cut off or a pastry bag with a small tip, and pipe like ribbon onto the macaroons.
- 5. Place in the freezer when they are all done for about 10 minutes to set the frosting. Store macaroons in the fridge.





INSTRUCTIONS:

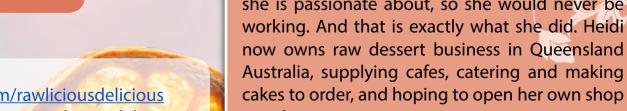
- 1. Place all the ingredients, except dried fruit mix and cranberries, into a food processor and blend until well combined.
- 2. Add dried fruit mix and dried cranberries in the bowl with the raw Christmas fruit cake mix and mix them in by hand.
- 3. Firmly press the mixture into square lined cake tin and place in the fridge to set for at least two hours.
- 4. Once the raw Christmas fruit cake feels firm enough to cut, cut it into squares and serve. Enjoy!

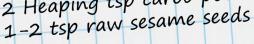
Ingredients:

1-15 bananas (any variety, 1 like Cavendish best)

Creamy Hot Chocolate:

- 1 lb dates (Barhi are my fave)
- 1 1.25 liters Hot water
- 2 Heaping tsp carob powder





INSTRUCTIONS:

For the marshmallows:

(Make the night before, they freeze good for later use)

- 1. Peel and slice into 3-6 pieces that resemble large marshmallows.
- 2. Arrange on a dehydrator try and set at 105-115 to dehydrate 6-10 hours or over night.
- 3. Once dried to the desired consistency use in the Hot Chocolate and or freeze any extra for later use.





INSTRUCTIONS:

For the Creamy Hot Chocolate:

- 1. Pit all dates and place in the vitamix blender. If you don't have a vitamix you may want to do this 4-6 hours in advance and soak with just enough water to cover to soften and use tahini instead of whole seeds.
- 2. Scoop carob and sesame seeds into blender, Heat water till steaming and add to the blender.
- 3. Fasten the lid tightly, very important.
- 4. Blend on high till very smooth, pour into a mug or thermous to enjoy now or later on a cold day!
- 5. PS add the marshmallows, they add a special texture and taste!
