



aw vegan retreats are increasingly popular in today's stressed-out world. If you're feeling frazzled or drained by life's challenges, a relaxing retreat can give you the quiet you need to think and help you feel rejuvenated with thoughtfully prepared raw vegan meals.

You'll also be able to get inspiration from others following the raw vegan lifestyle, and you'll probably form new friendships that last long after the retreat ends. Whether you're looking for a rural escape or a touch of luxury, our top picks for raw vegan retreats in 2019 will help you feel fantastic throughout the new year.

### 1. Bliss Body Retreat in Ubud, Bali (multiple dates)

In this tranquil and tropical setting, you can immerse yourself in seven days of yoga and gourmet raw cooking. Guests will learn the basics of the raw vegan diet, and retreat organizers will teach more than 20 different recipes for sauces as well as dessert and main dish recipes that retreat goers can take back with them to their own kitchens. Information sessions are held to instruct guests on how to eat sustainably. This retreat is held many times throughout the year.

## Happiness Lengthens Life

Happiness does not heal, but happiness protects against falling ill. As a result, happy people live longer. The size of the effect on longevity is comparable to that of smoking or not.

his is concluded from an analysis of 30 follow-up studies published in a recent issue of the Journal of Happiness Studies.

There have been more reports of happy people living longer, but for long it was unclear whether happiness causes longevity, since it can also be that good health add both to happiness and longevity.

Scientists assess causality using long-term follow-up studies, taking initial health into account. The results of such studies seemed contradictory; several studies found the expected causal effect of happiness on longevity, but other studies found no effect and some observed even earlier death among the happy. The analysis of 30 follow-up studies showed that the difference is in the people under investigation.

Happiness does not lengthen the life of seriously ill people, but it does prolong the life of healthy people. Happiness appears to protect against falling ill. One of the mecha-




nisms behind that effect seems to be that chronic unhappiness causes stress, which on its turn reduces immune response.

Another possible mechanism is that happiness adds to the chance of adopting a healthy life style.

An implication of this finding is that public health can also be promoted by policies that aim at greater happiness for a greater number.

## Seeking happiness

## Remember the good times, forget the regrets



eople who look at the past through rose-tinted glasses are happier than those who focus on negative past experiences and regrets, according to a new study published in the journal *Personality and Individual Differences*. The study helps explain why personality has such a strong influence on a person's happiness. The findings suggest that persons with certain personality traits are happier than others because of the way they think about their past, present and future.

The study examined how peoples' ratings on the "Big Five" personality traits relates to their approach to time and life

satisfaction. The "Big Five" model assesses how extraverted, neurotic, open, conscientious and agreeable a person is, and rates individuals as high or low on each personality trait rather than assigning them a personality type.

"We found that highly extraverted people are happier with their lives because they tend to hold a positive, nostalgic view of the past and are less likely to have negative thoughts and regrets. People high on the neurotic scale essentially have the exact opposite view of the past and are less happy as a result," said Ryan Howell, assistant professor of psychology at San Francisco State University, who authored the study with SF State graduating senior Jia Wei Zhang.

"This is good news because although it may be difficult to change your personality, you may be able to alter your view of time and boost your happiness," Howell said. The authors suggest that savoring happy memories or reframing painful past experiences in a positive light could be effective ways for individuals to increase their life satisfaction.

Numerous studies over the last 30 years have suggested that personality is a powerful predictor of a person's life satisfaction. These latest findings help explain the reason behind this relationship. "Personality traits influence how people look at the past, present and future and it is these different perspectives on time which drive a person's happiness," Howell said.

More than 750 participants completed surveys about their personality, life satisfaction and "time perspective" -- a concept coined by Stanford psychologist Philip Zimbardo to describe whether an individual is past, present or future orientated. To assess time perspective, participants were asked such questions as whether they enjoy reminiscing about the "good old days" or whether they believe their future is determined by themselves or by fate.

People's view of the past had the greatest effect on life satisfaction. Extraverts, who are energetic and talkative, were much more likely to remember the past positively and be happier as a result. People high on the neurotic scale, which can mean being moody, emotionally unstable and fretful, were more likely to have an anguished remembrance of the past and to be less happy.



### 5 Tips To A Zero-Waste Vegan Lifestyle

Followers of plant-based and vegan diets already cut down drastically on the waste they produce. However, there are always other ways to cut back on the amount of waste one produces. Keep reading for five easy ways you can help to live a zero-waste lifestyle.

### 1. Steer Clear of Single Use Items

While throwaway items like coffee cups, plastic utensils, and straws may be convenient in the moment, they create a lot of excess waste. Avoid using single use items by opting for a travel mug, bamboo utensils, and a mason jar to carry your leftovers in.





### 2. Start Composting Your Leftovers

Lawn and food waste adds up. Making up 25% of the waste in landfills, lawn and food waste can easily be eliminated through composting. If you have a garden, use the "trenching" method of composting. Save your scraps in a container or compost bin. Then, bury the food waste in your garden.

If you don't have a garden, consider using the same "trenching" method. Once your waste has decomposed, donate the compost to a local garden.



### 3. Buy Clothing Secondhand

Living a zero-waste lifestyle isn't as hard as it seems. Use these tips to make sure your vegan lifestyle is as healthy for the environment as it is for you.




## What too Much Salt Can Do to Your Brain

t isn't exactly a secret that a large number of Americans eat an unhealthy diet that is high in salt. But their poor food choices are often not intentional though. With busy lifestyles, long work hours, and families to raise, they just don't always have the time to cook, which makes the fast-food restaurants that sell salt-laden burgers and fries along their daily commutes very tempting. Unfortunately, this is putting many people at risk for the damaging effects that consuming too much salt has on the brain though.

Research has shown that when mice were fed diets that were high in salt, it impaired them cognitively to the point where it appeared that they had dementia. They could no longer remember how to build their nests daily or find their way through mazes like they used to. After their diet was switched back to include only healthy, low-sodium foods, their cognitive problems seem to disappear though. If they were given L-arganine, the recovery process took less time.

The way that an overload of salt seems to affect cognition is by causing the endothelial cells that line the blood vessels in the brain to not function like they are supposed to. But the effects on the body don't stop there. A high intake of salt can also increase a person's blood pressure, affect the good bacteria in their gastrointestinal system, and even impair the immune system. However, this doesn't mean that salt has to be avoided entirely since humans need a small amount of it in their diet in order to get enough iodine that is important for good thyroid health. The amount of sodium just has to be kept at less than 2,300 milligrams per day.



## Is It Safe To Drink From Plastic Bottles?

In addition to maintaining a raw food diet, it's important to drink plenty of water to enjoy optimal health benefits. Nowadays, many people drink water from plastic bottles instead of getting it from a tap, but there is also a concern that drinking from plastic bottles increases certain health risks. So, is it safe to drink from plastic bottles?

#### **What Studies Show**

tudies have shown that with every sip from a plastic bottle, you're likely ingesting microplastics. However, many of these microplastics along with other contaminants are also found in much of the world's drinking water. The International Bottled Water Association disputes the findings of these studies and the testing methodology.

There is also evidence that certain types of plastic are more harmful than others, but studies on these plastics have been largely inconclusive. Polyethylene terephthalate (PET) plastic may cause diarrhea, vomiting and other gastrointestinal problems when high amounts are ingested. High-density polyethylene (HDPE) plastic may increase cancer risks. There are also conflicting reports as to whether bisphenol A (BPA), which is a chemical that's used to make plastics, is dangerous to humans.



Another concern is whether plastic bottles that are exposed to hot temperatures put people at further risk. A plastic bottle that's left in a hot car or another location could leak chemicals that make the fluid less safe to drink, but many bottled water manufacturers dispute this claim.

#### **The Conclusion**

Unfortunately, there is no definite conclusion when it comes to the safety of bottled beverages. If you're concerned about health risks, try looking for products that don't contain BPA in their packaging and making sure that you don't expose your plastic bottles to high temperatures.



# A Close Up On The Science Behind Face Massage Rollers

Facial massaging using a roller can increase skin blood flow for more than ten minutes after the massage. It can also improve vasodilation -- the widening of blood vessels, -- in the long-term, according to a study by researchers in Japan.

eauty experts rave about them, and millions of us buy them, but what do scientists make of face massage rollers?
Few studies have so far investigated the effects of using facial massage rollers over time.

To address this gap, Naoyuki Hayashi of the Institute for Liberal Arts, Tokyo Institute of Technology (Tokyo Tech) and colleagues at Tokyo Healthcare University and the Research and Development Center, MTG Co. Ltd., conducted short- and long-term experiments involving participation of healthy male and female volunteers to examine the effects of using a massage roller on facial skin and blood flow.





In the short-term experiment, even a five-minute massage can significantly increase facial skin blood flow in the massaged cheek, with a relative change of up to around 25%. Visualization of the change in blood flow was achieved using a non-invasive technique called laser speckle flowgraphy.

One surprising outcome was the duration of the effect immediately after the five-minute massage. "The increase in skin blood flow after applying the massage roller persisted much longer than we had expected," the researchers say in their study published in Complementary Therapies in Medicine. "Short-term mechanical stimulation by a facial massage roller increased skin blood flow for more than ten minutes solely in the massaged cheek."

In the long-term experiment, the researchers examined the effects of daily massage on the right cheek over a five-week period. They also examined the reactivity of facial blood vessels to a heat stimulus, involving application of a heating probe set at 40°C, in order to test whether there were any changes in vascular dilation response.

Findings from the long-term study suggested that using a roller improved blood flow response, or the so-called vasodilatory response, to heat stimulation. One explanation for this could be that endothelial cells in the massaged area produce more nitric oxide, which is known to be a potent vasodilator.



## Chemicals In Beauty Products To Avoid

Parabens are the most recognized ingredient in skin care products. An estimated 60% of cosmetics contain this inexpensive ingredient.

What is not widely known is that this substance can also treat mold, bacteria and funguses. It's certainly not wise to apply something that is strong enough to kill parasites to your delicate skin.

Further research indicate Paraben is absorbed through the skin into the bloodstream. Tests show the chemical essentially is stored in the body, as it accumulates Parabens disrupt hormonal balance and effects overall health. The problem begins when your body mistakes the chemical for estrogen. Perfumes are another area that bear monitoring. Aromatics blends create the distinct fragrance of each product, however, unidentified chemicals used in the process may harm your skin.

The Federal Drug Administration (FDA) has found that around 30% of allergic reactions to skin care products are caused by fragrance blends. To protect yourself, use unscented, fragrance free products.

There are many natural alternatives that will maintain the awesome improvement of your complexion as you continue to follow the raw food diet. These include rosemary extract, hemp seed oil and almond or avocado antioxidant oils.

Welcome to another interview presentation with Raw Food Magazine. My name is Naida, and today, we are very pleased to be learning from another inspiring woman - *Sahara Rose*. Sahara is the best-selling author of Eat Feel Fresh: A Plant-Based Ayurvedic Cookbook and Idiot's Guide to Ayurveda. She has been called "a leading voice for the millennial generation into the new paradigm shift" by Deepak Chopra, who wrote the foreword of both her titles. She is an Abundance Mindset Expert and guides people to pave their path to freedom, joy and purpose.

**Naida:** Hi Sahara, thanks for making time to do this quick interview. If you could just jump right in and introduce yourself and tell us a little bit about what you do and what brought you into creating *Eat Feel Fresh: A Contemporary Plant-Based Ayurvedic Cookbook?* 

**Sahara:** Hi! I'm passionate about bridging ancient Ayurvedic healing and spiritual wisdom with modern western nutritional science and psychology and globally-inspired plantbased recipes.

Eat Feel Fresh: A Contemporary, Plant-Based Ayurvedic Cookbook comprises of the recipes that saved my life. They're what I call alkaline Ayurveda—the new approach to following the ancient Ayurvedic guidelines, updated for today's people.

We live in a very different world from that of ancient India and are exposed to pesticides, GMOs, chemicals, antibiotics + hormones in our foods, therefore we cannot consume the exact same diet, as the world has drastically shifted. It takes the principals of Ayurveda (eating for your Dosha, the season, time of day, six tastes, qualities), but includes superfoods + ingredients from Blue Zones (areas with the longest lifespans) around the world, for a modern approach to this healing science.

Instead of focusing on rice, ghee and heavily cooked stews, my alkaline Ayurveda approach approach focuses on alkaline-forming ingredients, such as organic leafy greens, bitter vegetables, fresh fruit, nuts and seeds, consumed correctly for your Dosha. <u>Eat Feel Fresh: A Contemporary Plant-Based Ayurvedic Cookbook</u> marries the age-old wisdom of Ayurveda with the nutritional necessity of today's people and I am so honored to share it with your community.

Naida: What is Ayurveda?

Sahara: Ayurveda is the world's oldest health system, originating in ancient India 5000 years ago and the sister science of yoga. In fact, the two were always meant to be practiced side-by-side. While yoga is for spiritual purposes, Ayurveda is for balancing the mind and



body.. because you can't really transcend the physical dimension when your mental and physical health is out of balance. Ayurveda literally means "the knowledge of life" in Sanskrit because in order to have health you must have full knowledge of your life.

**Naida:** How did you get started in Ayurveda?

Sahara: My own health issues brought me to Ayurveda—I don't think there is any healer out there who didn't first need the healing themselves. I suffered from chronic digestive issues (IBS-C, candida, leaky gut), hormonal imbalance (hypothalamic amenorrhea), anxiety, fatigue, hair-loss, weight-loss, dizziness, insomnia and low blood pressure.

Each doctor kept prescribing me another pill—birth control, progesterone, IBS medication, antidepressants, anti-anxiety medication, yet no Doctor asked about the root cause or other areas of my life. The gastroenterologist never asked how I was feeling or the endocrinologist never asked how my digestion was-- everything was all so isolated. I knew there had to be a root cause issue all of behind this and that's when I decided to become my own investigator. I began studying various holistic healing systems, which eventually brought me to Ayurveda.

Ayurveda is based on finding the right diet and lifestyle for your unique mind-body type- in fact, according to Ayurveda, it's not you are what you eat but you are what you digest. I became fascinated by this science and ended traveling to India to study it alongside Doctors and Practitioners for over two years, later writing my book The Idiot's Guide to Ayurveda with foreword by Deepak Chopra, which became the best-selling Ayurveda book nationally, and now\_ **Eat Feel Fresh: A Contemporary Plant-**Based Ayurvedic Cookbook. I realize now my health issues were given to me to allow me to help heal others. Naida: What do you like and don't like about Ayurveda?

Sahara: The world is a very different place today from that of 5000 years ago, particularly the dairy industry. For example, in ancient India, cows were treated like revered Gods and fed food

just as healthy as the humans. Today, that is unfortunately not the case.

Factory farming, antibiotic-pumping and hormonal usage is rampant in the dairy industry and whatever goes into the cows ends up in their milk. Though dairy was a good option in ancient times for those needing easily accessible fats and proteins, our world is very different today and have plant-based replacements such as almond/flax/ coconut milk, avocado/ olive/sesame/ grapeseed oil, with even more benefits.

Plant-based options are free of the hormones and pesticides in animal products and allow us obtain healthy fats and proteins, without the downsides. In fact, we now know dairy causes an increase in osteoporosis, rather than a decrease which we've been taught. With that knowledge and the pressing environmental issues, it's time for Ayurveda to have a modern update.

Ayurveda is a living, breathing science that has shapeshifted with the generations and I believe it's renaissance includes removing the heavy usage of dairy in the diet.

**Naida:** In your website, you mentioned about eating right for your body type, What is a body type?

**Sahara:** According to Ayurveda, we each need different diets according to our *Doshas*, or mind-body types. There are three types: Vata, Pitta and Kapha.

Vatas are cold and dry like the Fall leaves. They have dry skin and hair and often feel cold. Their appetite varies like the wind, sometimes strong and other times meek. They love movement and exercise, but can easily overwork themselves, becoming fatigued and weak. They are the most likely to suffer from anxiety, low hormones, bone density issues and insomnia. Vatas require



more warming and grounding foods to balance their weak digestion, such as soups and curries.

Pitta types contain a great deal of heat that needs to be released. You can often see the signs of fire in their body manifesting as red tones in their hair and a flushed face. They become overheated easily and cannot tolerate hot, humid days. They perspire more than the other Doshas and are naturally well-muscled. They require strenuous exercise to cool down their bodies and can become addicted to exercise. They have more oily skin and hair that is prone towards acne. Pittas need more cooling and hydrating foods to balance their overheated constitutions, such as leafy greens and juicy fruits.

Kapha types tend to overeat and are prone towards water retention, sluggish metabolism and weight-gain. It can feel impossible for them to lose the weight and even if someone else ate fries NEXT to them, they'll still feel like they're the one gaining the weight. Kapha types have cold hands and feet due to poor circulation and often suffer from water retention and puffiness. However, unlike Vata they do not have dry and rough but rather moist and soft skin. In fact, Kaphas have the best skin of the Doshas and

tend to age fantastically! (There's a good side to everything!) Kaphas need more stimulating, light and bitter foods like spiced kale, brussels sprouts and asparagus.

Naida: Awesome! Will definitely try the free quiz, thank you! What about food cravings - should people trust their body?

**Sahara:** It depends on whether their body is in balance. In Ayurveda we say "like attracts like." This means a body in balance will further crave the foods that bring you back into balance and a body out of balance will crave the foods that knock you off balance.

For example, if you eat a high vibrational, prana (life-force) filled diet, you will be in-tune with your body's needs and can tell when you need something more grounding, refreshing or stimulating. However, if you're eating dead foods such as processed foods, meat, dairy and fried foods, your body is out of touch with its subtle nuances and you may crave foods that are grossly overstimulating, like those.

Naida: How should people deal with their desire to eat?

Sahara: The desire to eat is a beautiful thing that should be celebrated—it's what is keeping us alive. However, often times what we believe is the desire to eat is the desire to be loved, to rest, to be noticed, to recharge. The easiest way we believe we can get these qualities is to eat—but no amount of avocado chocolate pudding is going to feel like the hug, yoga session or walk outside that you actually really needed.

This is why I like to stick to meals instead of graze—if you find yourself constantly wanting to eat through-



out the day, there is most likely an emotion you are trying to override by distracting yourself with food.

Try taking a walk, dancing, meditating, jumping up and down, lying on the floor, calling a friend, inhaling essential oils or something else to change your state instead.

Naida: Would you advise people to not go on a diet? What are your thoughts on this?

Sahara: I think the word diet has become so politicized. Technically the word diet just means the type of foods you eat—therefore we are all on some type of diet, whether it's serving us or not.

I believe the dietary shifts we make should be gradual and lasting—there is no point on doing a crash diet and going back to eating unhealthily. That being said, there are benefits to fasting, kitchari cleanses and taking a break from the regular foods you eat.

Our diet also must shift between the seasons—more cooling + hydrating during Pitta summer season, grounding + nourishing during Vata fall season and stimulating and light during Kapha late winter/early spring season. We should not be going on "diets" but rather consuming the diet that best serves us at the present moment.

Naida: What are some tips people can use to improve digestion?

#### Sahara:


- 1. Start your day with warm water.
- Add more spices to your diet.
- 3. Sip CCF tea (cumin, coriander + fennel seeds, steeped in water.)
- 4. Eat for your Dosha (the imbalances that are showing up for you
- 5. Adjust for the Dosha of the season

Naida: In Ayurveda, it says raw foods must be avoided. Do you not eat raw anymore? Do we have to avoid raw foods just because Ayurveda said so?

Sahara: This is one of the things I confront in Eat Feel Fresh. Ayurveda does say to avoid raw foods and when I first began studying it, I firmly listened and stopped eating all raw foods as well (and I used to be a raw vegan.) However, I then realized how much I love raw foods and how much lifeforce (prana) they provide me with.

I began to research where this belief came from and learned that it is because in India, where Ayurveda was created, it is not safe to eat most raw foods because of the bacteria/ amoebas (single-celled parasites) in the soil. Leafy green salads were never part of the culture for this reason (which is why I used to be called the cow when I lived in India—they had never seen anyone eat a bowl of raw greens except cows.)

However, this does not mean raw foods are not safe for everyone. There are many Blue Zones around the world, with the world's longest



lifespans, who have been eating raw foods for just as long as Ayurveda has existed. It has to do with the time and place. If you live in a place where raw foods are safe to eat, then go for it. If you live in a place where it's precautionary, then don't.

Always listen to your body. If you're feeling a Vata imbalance (bloating, gassy, constipated, cold, anxious, not getting your period), then add more cooked + warm foods into your diet and decrease raw until you feel balanced again. If you eat raw foods without an issue and are in pristine health, then keep it up! Pittas tend to do best with raw foods and Pitta season (summer) is the best time for them.

**Naida:** How much of your health would you attribute to diet?

Sahara: The diet is the foundation but it's not everything. It's like the base of the house. You need to have good foods coming into your body to think clear thoughts. When your body is bogging you down, you won't be your most productive, loving, empowered self. However, the diet is not the only factor to health.

In Ayurveda, we say the diet is 1/5 of your overall health. This means the other 4/5 is up to you. For me, it's my environment, my mental state, my

relationships, my sense of purpose. You can eat a lot of kale and still have a toxic mindset. It's about making adjustments in all areas of your life, which I have seen naturally happens to most who are eating a high vibrational plant-based diet.

**Naida:** What is your present state of mind?

Sahara: My present state of mind is to move with the Doshas. These are like seasons of our lives. In some periods, I'm more Vata, coming up with new ideas and brainstorming. In other periods, I'm more Pitta, getting things done, speaking, creating, expanding. In other periods, particularly for this holiday season, I'm more Kapha, going inwards, focusing on rest and relaxation so I can go deeper into my truth. Naturally from this place, the idea (Vata) emerges.

Naida: What is your life motto?

**Sahara:** Life is a canvas and I am the painter, dancing my masterpiece.

**Naida:** That's beautiful. How can our audience download/purchase your new book?

### Is beauty really in the 'eye of the beholder'?

## Yes, and here's why

any of us have had the experience of disagreeing with friends or family about which celebrity is more attractive. Now, researchers reporting in the Cell Press journal Current Biology on October 1 show in a study of twins that those

differences of opinion are mostly the result of personal experiences that are unique to each individual. In other words, even identical twins don't agree.

Of course, some aspects of attractiveness are pretty universal and may even be coded into our genes, the re-

searchers say. For example, people tend to prefer faces that are symmetric. Beyond such limited shared preferences, however, people really do have different "types."

"We estimate that an individual's aesthetic preferences for faces agree about 50 percent, and disagree about 50 percent, with others," write joint leaders of this project, Laura Germine of Massachusetts General Hospital and Harvard University and Jeremy Wilmer of Wellesley College. "This fits with the common intuition that on the one hand, fashion models can make a fortune with their good looks,

• while on the other hand, friends can endlessly debate

about who is attractive and who is not."

Germine and Wilmer say that past research on the way people respond to faces has focused primarily on universal features of attraction. In the new study, however, they and their colleagues wanted to know more about where those disagreements over facial attractiveness come from.

To tackle this question, the researchers first studied the face preferences of over 35,000 volunteers who visited their science website <a href="http://www.TestMyBrain.org">http://www.TestMyBrain.org</a>(<a href="http://www.testmybrain.org/setup.php?b=309">http://www.testmybrain.org/setup.php?b=309</a>); they used the insights gained to develop a highly efficient and effective test of the uniqueness of an individual's face preferences. They then tested the preferences of 547 pairs of identical twin and 214 pairs of same-sex, non-identical twins by having them rate the attractiveness of 200 faces.

Comparisons between identical and non-identical twins allowed the researchers to estimate the relative contribution of genes and environments to face preferences. Prior studies of twins and families have shown that virtually every human trait--from personality to ability to interests--is to some large degree genetically passed down from one generation to the next. Indeed, the researchers even found this in an earlier study for another aspect of face processing: the ability to recognize faces.

In contrast, they now show that the origin of the "eye of the beholder" -- the uniqueness of an individual's face preferenc-

es--is mostly based on experiences, not genes. Those experiences, moreover, are highly specific to each individual.

"The types of environments that are important are not those that are shared by those who grow up in the same family, but are much more subtle and individual, potentially including things such as one's unique, highly personal experiences with friends or peers, as well as social and popular media," Germine says.

In other words, it's not about the school you went to, how much money your parents made, or who lived next door. That pretty face you see apparently has a lot more to do with those experiences that are truly unique to you: the faces you've seen in the media; the unique social interactions you have every day of your life; perhaps even the face of your first boyfriend or girlfriend.

The researchers say that the large impact of personal experience on individual face preferences "provides a novel window into the evolution and architecture of the social brain." They say that future studies could look more closely at which aspects of the environment are really most important in shaping our preferences for certain faces and for understanding where our preferences for other things--like art or music or pets--come from.

our diet is your first line of defense against mental illness. Oftentimes, when you improve your physical health, you have more energy. This allows you to be more physically and socially active, which may improve the overall quality of your life. Our mental, emotional, and physical health are more connected than sometimes acknowledged.

#### **Statistics**

Despite our increased connectedness via smartphones and social media, it seems loneliness and depression on actually becoming more prevalent.

- 18-44-year-olds are being prescribed antidepressants over any other prescribed medication
- as many as 11% of all Americans over the age of 12 are on antidepressants
- as many as 23% of all women between the ages of 40 and 69 on antidepressant medicine

Depression can also lead to physical health problems like obesity due to bad dietary choices. Poor lifestyle and eating choices may fuel our depression. Obesity suppresses dopamine pathways. Meaning, if you are obese, you may need more stimulus, in the form of food, to feel satisfied. Easy to eat "junk foods" may actually be involved in unhappiness and depression.



It is a vicious cycle that can be broken. Studies have shown that more plant-based diets low in meats and high-fat dairy can decrease rates of depressive episodes.

These fruits and veggies may actually boost your mood and reduce depressive episodes and are best consumed raw.





# **RAW CREPES WITH CARAMEL APPLE FILLING**



#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. Process all the crepe ingredients in a food processor until very smooth mixture is formed. Spread the mixture evenly on a teflex or baking paper lined dehydrator sheets. Ideally, you want to spread it relatively thin.
- 2. Dehydrate at 45'C or 115F for 3 hours or until you can carefully peel the crepe off the paper or teflex. The crepe should still be pliable.
- 3. Place dates, vanilla, cinnamon and salt in the food processor. Blend till dates are broken down.

  Add liquid if needed and blend till smooth caramel consistency. Add diced apple and raisins and pulse till mixed through.
- 4. Once the crepes are done, spread the filling on top. Best served warm, straight from the dehydrator.



#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. Blend the bananas in a high speed blender (I recommend the Vitamix or Blendtec) until smooth. Don't add water but feel free to add some cinnamon powder if you like.
- 2. Spread the mixture onto a non-stick dehydrator sheet, making sure it's about 0.5cm thick so it doesn't break when it's done.
- 3. Put into the dehydrator for about 6-10 hours at 42°C. For the first hour you can put the dehydrator at 60°C and then lower it – it takes some time for the food to warm up so it will still technically be raw, but it will get ready
- 4. When that's done, cut the fruit that you like and prepare the sweet sauce according to the recipe.
- 5. Wrap together and enjoy.



# Anya's tips:

 To store the wraps, roll them up in between baking sheets. Don't leave them on the dehydrator sheets, they will be difficult to take off after a day (if that happens, just dehydrate them again for 30 minutes).

Don't keep the crepes in the

fridge.

 If you over-dried them and they went too hard - don't worry! Either leave them out for a day for them to naturally soak up the moisture in the air, or spray some water on them to soften them up.

I also didn't add any extra sweetener, but you may want to add an extra date or two to make it a little sweeter, although I did find the raw crepe



# **INSTRUCTIONS:**

# For the crepe:

1. Blend until really smooth,

2. then spread thinly on a Teflex sheet with an angle

3. and place in your dehydrator at 150 degrees for 1 hour, then turn down to 110-115 degrees.

4. You can spread them in a circle or a square. I personally spread the raw crepe batter in a big square (to fill up the entire teflex sheet, and then cut them with scissors into 4 smaller squares, and folded them over, as shown in the image above.

5. Check on the crepes after about 1.5 to 2 hours and once you see they are dry enough, flip them over and carefully peel the teflex sheet off of the crepe. If it's still too gooey, then it's not yet ready to flip.

# INSTRUCTIONS:

- 6. The teflex sheet should easily peel off once it's ready to flip. Removing the teflex sheet will allow it to complete drying more quickly.
- 7. Once flipped, the raw crepes should be done within a couple of hours.
- 8. Once the raw crepes are finished, place it face open on a plate. Toss whatever fruits you like (I used bananas and pears) into a bowl with a little bit of the cream sauce.

# For the Raw Strawberry Cream Sauce:

- Blend in high-powered blender until very smooth
- 2. Place a scoop of sauced up fruits in the middle of the crepe and fold over.
- 3. Drizzle the strawberry cream sauce over the raw crepes and voila! An easy raw crepe recipe that even your family will love!

- Pour the batter out either in small circles or one large circle onto the teflex sheets of your dehydrator trays.
- 3. You can make one large one or 2-4 small ones.
- 4. Dry for around 8-10 hours until malleable but dry all the way through.
- 5. To make the pancake, lay the wrap out flat on a chopping board or plate and add your fillings and toppings!





# **EASY RAW VEGAN CHOCOLATE**

# Ingredients:

1 cup Raw Cacao Powder
1 cup Raw Cacao Butter
melted
1/3 cup liquid sweetener
I use coconut nectar

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- Melt the cacao butter double boiler method on the stove with the lowest heat setting.
- Add the cacao powder and mix until smooth. Once mixed, add the liquid sweetener and mix again.
- 3. Place liquid mixture into a chocolate mold or a small pan lined with parchment paper.
- 4. Place into the freezer for minimum 1/2 hour.
- 5. Take out of the freezer and enjoy!
- 6. Store extra in the freezer.

# Crystal's tips:

Be creative! After a few minutes in the freezer the chocolate should be a little firm and you can add your favorite nuts or berries by placing them on top.

# **BEST VEGAN CHOCOLATE EVER!**

# Ingredients:


1 cup grated / shredded Raw Cacao butter (100g - .22lb)3/4 cup raw Cacao powder (75 g - .17 lb) 70 Dates (\*Barhi, Khadrawy and Halawi dates are my fave) 105 raw pecans

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. Start by grating or finely shaving some raw cacao butter until you have one full cup.
- 2. Next take the date of your choice and pit it tearing the date in half from the top down leaving the two halves still attached.
- 3. Take 1.5 pecans and place them inside of the torn open date, press the date back together so that the nut is encased in the middle.
- 4. Act like the hulk and squish it fairly flat between the palms of your hands or on the counter top.
- 5. Thats one, repeat the process until all the dates and pecans are gone. (watch the video for more clarity on this process)
- 6. Take a medium sized pot and fill it 2/3 3/4 with water.
- 7. Find another metal or glass pot that can fit right on top of the first pot effectively creating a double broiler.
- 8. Warm the water on a stove to just below boiling, place the smaller pot on top of the water and add the 1 cup grated cacao butter. It will start to melt, stir it occasionally and watch that the water does not come to a boil.
- 9. Once it is fully melted add 3/4 cup of cacao powder to the mix and stir it up until you have a smooth chocolate sauce.
- 10. Alternatively you can place the cacao butter in a glass dish and put in the dehydrator at 115 until it is fully melted. Cacao butter has a melting point just above room temperature.
- 11.I prefer my chocolate without any sweeter as to me these are sweet enough with the date. If you wish a sweetener you can add 1 – 3 tbs of your favourite and stir it in. Some people swear by Maple syrup which isn't raw but is a good choice if that isn't a big deal to you, others swear by raw agave or coconut sugar. There is a debate over the best sweeter, again I prefer none and feel this recipe stands out more and is simpler without any.

- 12.Let sit 3-5 minutes off the stove and out of the water to cool. While cooling line two cookie sheets with parchment paper and set aside.
- 13.Once slightly cooled to thicken just a bit place the flattened date / nut rounds into the raw chocolate, make sure to coat it evenly. Give the chocolate a small shake to get excess off and place the chocolate coated date / nut onto the cookie sheet.
- 14. Repeat until all of the chocolate or date / nut bites are used up. I find this recipe works pretty perfectly to use both up at once.
- 15.If there is any extra or either get creative with a lover...
- 16.If your in a rush to eat place the coated chocolates into the freezer to cool quickly for 3-5 minutes, otherwise place them in the fridge for 10-15 minutes.
- 17.Once the chocolate is solid they are ready to serve!!





You can use any type of dates that you want but it is best if they are a little soft. If the dates come pre pitted this usually means that they have been steamed, aim to get dates with pits and pit them yourself for the best quality. This recipe uses mid sized dates, if you use big medjools you may find you can only make 45-55 chocolates.

# RASPBERRY & PEPPERMINT COCONUT BUTTER HEARTS

# Ingredients:

Heart-shaped silicone molds (my mold could fit 1 tbsp of liquid per cavity; you can also use any other shape silicone molds)

# For the regular base:

1/2 cup (75 g) cashews (or any other nuts)

1/2 heaping cup (100 g) soft dates a pinch of salt

# For the chocolate base:

1/2 cup (75 g) cashews (or any other nuts)

1/2 heaping cup (100 g) soft dates 1 tbsp cacao powder a pinch of salt

# For the coconut butter glaze:

1 1/2 cup (150 g) shredded coconut for peppermint flavor: 1/2 tsp spirulina powder + 2 tsp pure peppermint powder\*

for raspberry flavor: 2 tsp pure raspberry powder

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- Let's start by making the regular base put cashews and a pinch of salt in the food processor and process till you get a fine meal (but not flour!). The add dates – keep processing until you get a sticky dough.
   Remove from the food processor and set it aside.
- 2. Now make the chocolate base put cashews, salt and cacao powder in the food processor. Process until you get a fine meal (but not flour!). The add dates keep processing until you get a sticky dough. Remove from the food processor and set it aside.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 3. Lastly, it's time to make the coconut butter. Place coconut shreds into the food processor and process for about 5 to 10 minutes until you get a smooth butter (see in the photo above). It doesn't have to be perfect and each coconut shred brand will give you a slightly different result. When the butter is ready, place 4 Tbsp. (60 g) in one small bowl (for the raspberry flavor) and another 4 Tbsp. (60 g) in another bowl (for the peppermint flavor). You'll probably have a bit of coconut butter left you can use it to make a couple of white coconut hearts.
- 4. In the first bowl with coconut butter, mix in 2 tsp of raspberry powder. In the other bowl with the coconut butter, mix in 1/2 tsp spirulina powder and 2 tsp peppermint powder.
- 5. Now it's time to fill the heart-shape molds. Fill around 1/3 of each cavity with the flavored coconut butter. Put the mold into the freezer for 5 to 10 minutes until the coconut butter gets hard. Then on top of the coconut layer, press on the cashew-date base (I used regular flavor one for raspberry and chocolate flavor for peppermint) until each cavity is filled. Place the mold into the freezer for about 2 hours (or overnight) to firm up. Then carefully press out each heart from the mold. Let the hearts defrost a bit and sit in a room temperature for about 30 minutes and enjoy!
- 6. It's best to store the hearts in a fridge or freezer as the coconut butter is sensitive to heat and can melt on warm summer days (when it's more than +24C).

# Laine's tips:

As the intensity of peppermint powder can vary, it's best to add the peppermint powder in parts and taste on the way until you get a flavor that you like.

# **RAW VEGAN COCOA TRUFFLES**

- 1/2 cup almonds
- 1/2 cup cashew
- 1 cup dates, pitted
- 2 tbsp chia seeds
- 3 tbsp cacao powder + 1
- tbsp for rolling
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- Pinch of salt (optional)



#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. In the blender, pulse nuts.
- 2. Add in dates, vanilla, chia seeds, cacao powder salt and pulse until everything is incorporated and the mixture sticks together when pressed between your fingers.
- 3. Form the dough into 1 inch balls with your hands.
- 4. Sprinkle cacao powder on a flat surface.
- Gently roll the balls in the powder until they are completely covered.
- 6. Place truffles in the fridge for 1 hour.
- 7. Share with family and friends and eat all in one go.

# **APPLE SPICE SAUERKRAUT**

# Ingredients:

- 1 head of cabbage
- 2 tablespoons of fine celtic sea salt or other high quality salt 3 medium apples shredded
- 3 medium apples shredded (about 3 cups)
- 1 tablespoon of fresh grated ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 quart sized mason jar or
- 2 small glass jars



#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- Pull 3 outer leaves off the head of cabbage and set aside. Shred the remaining cabbage in a food processor, mandolin or chop with a knife. Add it to a big bowl.
- 2. Sprinkle the cabbage with sea salt. Mix and massage the sea salt into the cabbage for about 5 minutes.
- 3. Set the cabbage aside and let it sit for 15-20 minutes so the sea salt has time to draw out the liquid and make the cabbage soft.
- 4. Shred the apples using a food processor or cut them into thin strips.
- Add the shredded apples, ginger, cinnamon and cloves to the cabbage mixture.
- 6. Mix and squeeze the cabbage mixture with your hands or a vegetable pounder until liquid comes out when squeezed.
- 7. Pack the cabbage in the mason jar tightly with either your hand or a vegetable pounder. Push it all the way down until it submerges in its own juices (this is the brine).





- 8. Repeat this until there is about 1½ inches of space from the top of the jar.
- 9. Roll up the leaves and place them in the jar to push the cabbage under the brine.
- 10. Screw on the jar loosely so gas can escape as fermentation takes place. Set on the counter for 5-7 days in a cool, shaded place. Place a plate under the mason jar in case it bubbles over and makes a mess.
- 11.During fermentation the sauerkraut will bubble a little and become cloudy. If scum appears, remove it with a spoon.
- 12.Remove the rolled up cabbage leaves and toss in the garbage before eating.

13. Store in the fridge.

# **RAW TACO GORILLA WRAPS**

# Ingredients:

1 cup soaked Walnuts

1 cup finely shredded Cauliflower

3-5 soaked Sun-Dried Tomatoes

(for umami flavor)

3 tsp Cumin powder

2 tsp Coriander powder

1/4 tsp Turmeric powder

1/2 tsp Cayenne powder

2-3 tsp homemade Salsa (have used

pineapple-pepper salsa)

Salt to taste

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. Add all the ingredients (except the salsa) in a grinder and grind to a coarse consistency. This becomes the filling for the wrap.
- 2. Take one collard green with the dark edge facing down on your cutting board.
- 3. Trim off the stem and up about two inches into the leaf.
- 4. Place about ¼–1/3 cup of the nut meat mixture in the middle of the leaf.
- 5. Top with some salsa.
- 6. To assemble, roll up burrito style. Fold one of the long ends in, and then both the end pieces, and then the other long way, tucking in firmly.
- 7. Place with the folded edge down on your cutting board, and slice firmly into two pieces on the diagonal.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. Bring 3 cups water to a boil, add tea, cinnamon, cloves, peppercorns, lavender, ginger, cardamom and nutmeg, turn heat to low and simmer for 15 minutes. Turn of heat and let cool 10 minutes. Remove tea bags. Add vanilla and maple syrup, give a good stir. Strain out the large ingredients and place in container of choice.
- 2. In a glass or mug/cup, pour tea concentrate to about 1/3 1/2 full, fill remaining with water or milk.
- 3. Serve warm or iced.
- 4. Store leftover tea in the refrigerator, use within one week
- 5. Makes about 4 6 servings.

# Julie's tips:

- 1. If you don't want to use all these ingredients, try using chai tea bags instead.
- 2. For the tea I used 2 black tea bags and one orange pekoe.
  I recommend going with the strongest black tea you can find since this is a concentrate.


