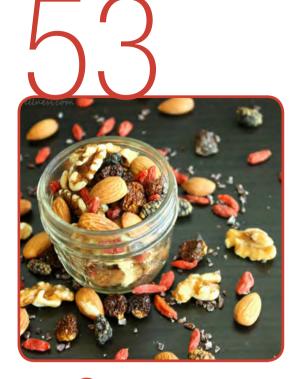

Plant Food + Wine, the brainchild of Matthew Kenney, one of the world's leading raw food chefs and restaurateurs, offers a menu inspired by seasonal and local produce. 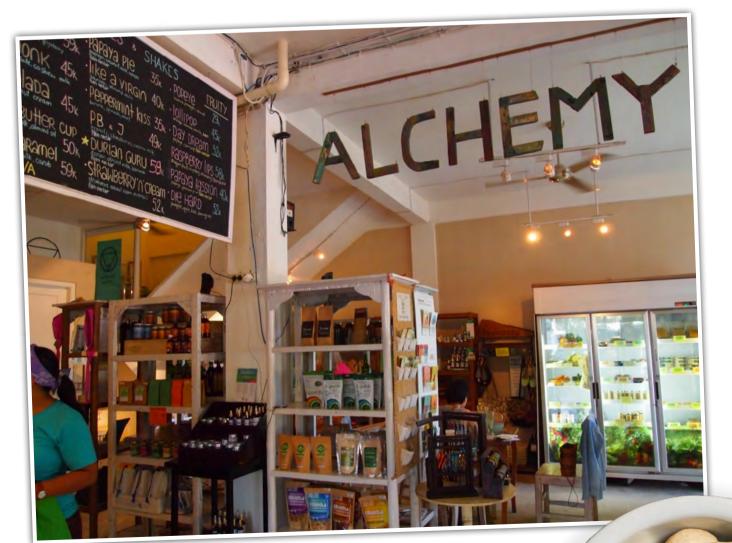
Raw and Roxy:

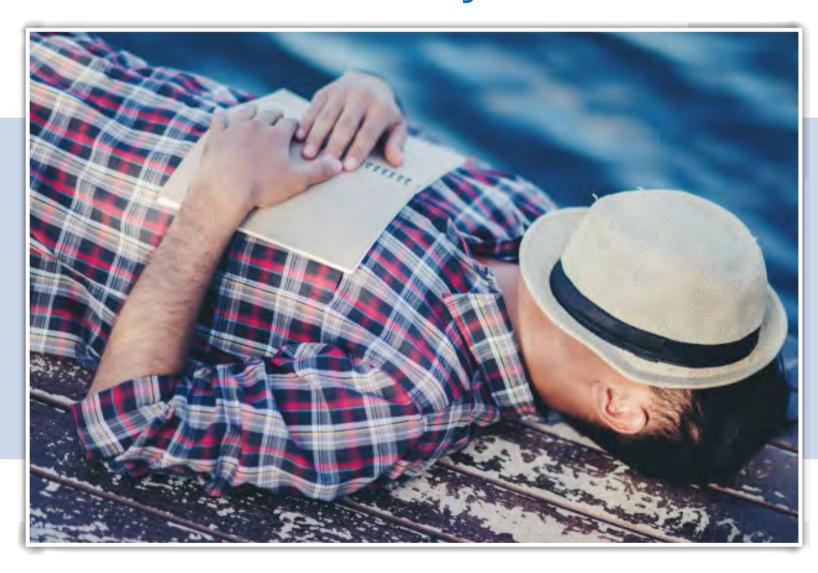




Alchemy: Bali

A nap a day keeps HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE at bay



t seems that napping may do more than just reboot our energy level and improve our mood. New research being presented at the American College of Cardiology's 68th Annual Scientific Session found that people who took advantage of a midday snooze were more likely to have a noticeable drop in blood pressure compared with those who didn't nap.

"Midday sleep appears to lower blood pressure levels at the same magnitude as other lifestyle changes. For example, salt and alcohol reduction can bring blood pressure levels down by 3 to 5 mm Hg," said Manolis Kallistratos, MD, cardiologist at the Asklepieion General Hospital in Voula, Greece, and one of the study's co-authors, adding that a low-dose antihypertensive medication usually lowers blood pressure levels by 5 to 7 mm Hg, on average. Overall, taking a nap during the day was associated with an average 5 mm Hg drop in blood pressure, which researchers said is on par with what would be expected from other known blood pressure-lowering interventions. In addition, for every 60 minutes of midday sleep, 24-hour average systolic blood pressure decreased by 3 mm Hg.

"These findings are important because a drop in blood pressure as small as 2 mm Hg can reduce the risk of cardiovascular events such as heart attack by up to 10 percent," Kallistratos said. "Based on our findings, if someone has the luxury to take a nap during the day, it may also have benefits for high blood pressure. Napping can be easily adopted and typically doesn't cost anything."

This is the first study to prospectively assess midday sleep's affect on blood pressure levels among people

whose blood pressure is reasonably controlled, according to the researchers. The same research team previously found midday naps to be associated with reduced blood pressure levels and fewer antihypertensive medications being prescribed among people with very high blood pressure readings.

"The higher the blood pressure levels, the more pronounced any effort to lower it will appear. By including people with relatively well-controlled blood pressure, we can feel more confident that any significant differences in blood pressure readings are likely due to napping," Kallistratos said.

The study included 212 people with a mean blood pressure of 129.9 mm Hg. They were 62 years old on average and just over half were female. About 1 out of 4 participants were smokers and/or had Type 2 diabetes. The groups were similar in terms of risk factors for heart disease except there were more smokers in the napping group. Researchers assessed and recorded blood pressure for 24 hours consecutively, midday sleep time (the average duration was 49 minutes), lifestyle habits (for example, alcohol, coffee and salt consumption, physical activity levels), and pulse wave velocity, a measure of stiffness in the arteries. Participants wore an ambulatory blood pressure monitor to measure and track blood pressure at regular intervals during routine daily living, rather than just one time in the clinic. At study recruitment, participants also underwent an echocardiogram, an ultrasound of the heart that shows its structure and function.

In their analyses, researchers adjusted for factors known to influence blood pressure levels, including age, gender, lifestyle and medications. There were no differences in terms of the number of antihypertensive medications taken between the two groups, and pulse wave velocity tests and echocardiograms were also similar.

Overall, average 24-hour systolic blood pressure was 5.3 mm Hg lower among those who napped compared with

those who didn't (127.6 mm Hg vs 132.9 mm Hg). When looking at both blood pressure numbers, people who slept during the day had more favorable readings (128.7/76.2 vs 134.5/79.5 mm Hg). There also appeared to be a direct linear relationship between time asleep and blood pressure; as reported, for each hour of napping, the average 24-hour systolic blood pressure lowered by 3 mm Hg.

"We obviously don't want to encourage people to sleep for hours on end during the day, but on the other hand, they shouldn't feel guilty if they can take a short nap, given the potential health benefits," Kallistratos said. "Even though both groups were receiving the same number of medications and blood pressure was well controlled, there was still a significant decrease in blood pressure among those who slept during midday."

Researchers said the findings are further bolstered because patients had similar dipping blood pressure rates at night (natural drops during nighttime sleep), meaning that any reductions in ambulatory blood pressure were separate from this phenomenon and give greater confidence that reductions in ambulatory blood pressure could be due to daytime napping.

Further research is needed to validate these findings. Although it falls outside the scope of this study, researchers said one could speculate that along with the hearthealthy Mediterranean diet endemic to this region, the cultural acceptance of midday napping may also play a role in the healthier profile seen in these populations.

Nearly half of American adults have high blood pressure. Many don't know they have it because there are often no signs or symptoms; over time, high blood pressure increases the risk of both heart attack and stroke.

Kallistratos will present the study, "Mid-day Sleep Effects as Potent as Recommended Lifestyle Changes in Patients With Arterial Hypertension," on Monday, March 18.

A SIMPLE STRATEGY TO IMPROVE your mood in 12 minutes



e all have a remedy -- a glass of wine or a piece of chocolate -- for lifting our spirits when we're in a bad mood. Rather than focusing on ways to make ourselves feel better, a team of lowa State University researchers suggests wishing others well.

"Walking around and offering kindness to others in the world reduces anxiety and increases happiness and feelings of social connection," said Douglas Gentile, professor of psychology. "It's a simple strategy that doesn't take a lot of time that you can incorporate into your daily activities."

Gentile, Dawn Sweet, senior lecturer in psychology; and Lanmiao He, graduate student in psychology, tested the benefits of three different techniques intended to reduce anxiety and increase happiness or well-being. They did this by having college students walk around a building for 12 minutes and practice one of the following strategies:

- Loving-kindness: Looking at the people they see and thinking to themselves, "I wish for this person to be happy." Students were encouraged to really mean it as they were thinking it.
- Interconnectedness: Looking at the people they see and thinking about how they are connected

to each other. It was suggested that students think about the hopes and feelings they may share or that they might take a similar class.

 Downward social comparison: Looking at the people they see and thinking about how they may be better off than each of the people they encountered.

The study, published in the Journal of Happiness Studies, also included a control group in which students were instructed to look at people and focus on what they see on the outside, such as their clothing, the combination of colors, textures as well as makeup and accessories. All students were surveyed before and after the walk to measure anxiety, happiness, stress, empathy and connectedness.

Love and kindness wins

The researchers compared each technique with the control group and found those who practiced loving-kindness or wished others well felt happier, more connected, caring and empathetic, as well as less anxious. The interconnectedness group was more empathetic and connected. Downward social comparison showed no benefit, and was significantly worse than the loving-kindness technique.

Students who compared themselves to others felt less empathetic, caring and connected than students who extended well wishes to others. Previous studies have shown downward social comparison has a buffering effect when we are feeling bad about ourselves. ISU researchers found the opposite.

"At its core, downward social comparison is a competitive strategy," Sweet said. "That's not to say it can't have some benefit, but competitive mindsets have been linked to stress, anxiety and depression."

The researchers also examined how different types of people reacted to each technique. They expected people who were naturally mindful might benefit more from the loving-kindness strategy, or narcissistic people might have a hard time wishing for others to be happy. They were somewhat surprised by the results.

"This simple practice is valuable regardless of your personality type," Lanmiao He said. "Extending loving-kindness to others worked equally well to reduce anxiety, increase happiness, empathy and feelings of social connection."



Social media comparisons

Social media is like a playground for comparisons: he makes more money than I; she has a nicer car. While the study did not look specifically at social media, Gentile says the results demonstrate that comparison is a risky strategy.

"It is almost impossible not to make comparisons on social media," Gentile said. "Our study didn't test this, but we often feel envy, jealousy, anger or disappointment in response to what we see on social media, and those emotions disrupt our sense of well-being."

Comparison works well when we are learning something or making a choice, Gentile said. For example, as children we learn by watching others and comparing their results to ours. However, when it comes to well-being, comparison is not as effective as loving-kindness, which consistently improves happiness.

5 Ways To Cut Down On Sugar



tudy after study finds that sugar is bad for us.
Sugar is said to contribute to health issues
like heart disease, diabetes, and weight gain.
Sugar has also been found to be addictive
– which is why it is so hard to kick the sugar
habit. Follow these five tips for success at
cutting sugar out of your diet.

Pre-plan meals and snacks

Make it a point to sit down each week and plan out what foods you will eat and when, then shop based on your plan. Not only will you save time throughout the week, planning ahead and taking snacks along with you will prevent you from impulsively purchasing a sugary snack or meal when you are hungry and on the go.



2. Stay away from canned and dried fruits

Canned fruit is often stored in syrup, and many dried fruits have sugar added. Instead, try to purchase your fruit fresh or frozen. If you must be canned or dried, look for options with no added sugar.

3. Season your food with herbs and spices

The flavor of food can be enhanced without sugar (or similar items like syrup, molasses, or honey.) Instead, add flavor such as cinnamon or thyme, or use stevia, a plant-based sweetener with minimal impact on blood glucose.

4. Use fruit to sweeten your food

There's no need for added sugar if you let the natural sweetness of fruit do the trick! Add fruits to salads or smoothies with leafy greens to enjoy all the health benefits plus the pleasure of something sweet.

4. Sweeten your beverages naturally

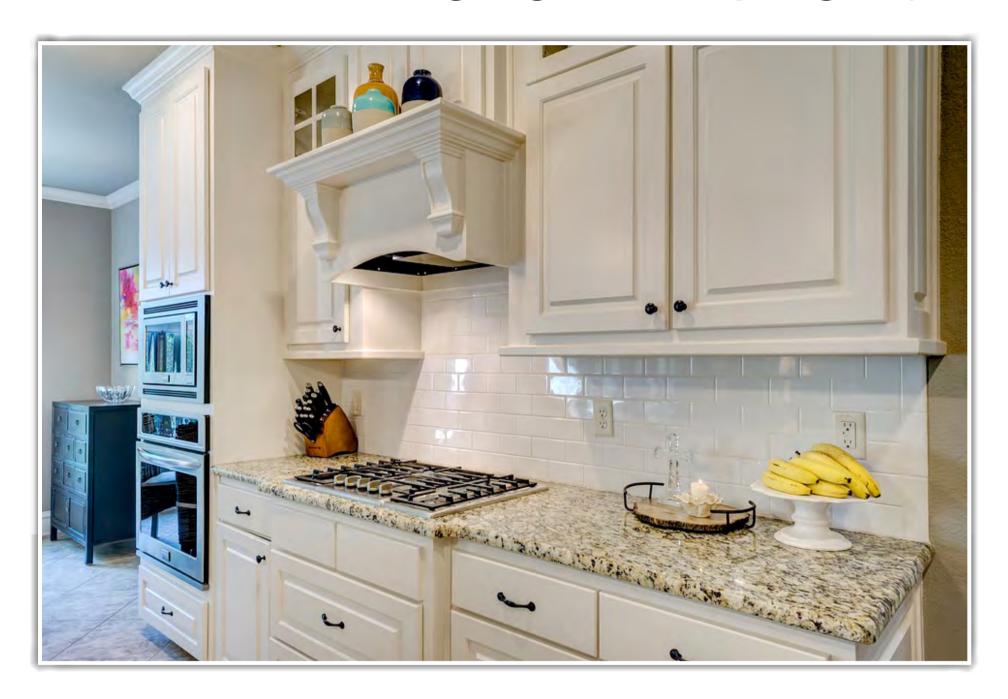
If you want to add sweetness to your drink, skip the sugar and instead infuse your drinks with flavor from fruits. For example, add berries or citrus fruits. You can also get adventurous by using herbs too, such as combining cucumber and mint.

Chili is a broad term that means hot pepper. Jalapeno, Hungarian Wax, Fresno, and similar are all chilies that you can grow, buy fresh, and purchase in various non-raw forms. This article speaks to the healthful benefits of consuming raw chilies.

How chili might help you lose weight

1. Capsaicin found in chilies stimulates calorie burn, which allows you to shred extra calories without additional effort. Chili revs your metabolism, which is why you might sweat after consuming them.

The amount of calories you burn might not be a lot on its own, but if you pair chili with your workout days, the results can be greater.

- Capsaicin can reduce the amount of fat your body stores. Scientists believe the thermogenic effect is responsible for the increased burn. Animal studies showed a drop in serum triglycerides as well as fat tissue. Additional studies show decreases in abdominal fat loss and total body weight.
- 3. Chili helps stabilize blood sugar. Hot peppers might also promote satiety without you feeling deprived, which in turn, can stop you from overeating due to blood sugar spikes.

Does the type of chili pepper matter?

Yes! The spicier the better too. Keep in mind that sweet peppers don't contain capsaicin. If you cannot tolerate the heat, you might be able to gradually build a tolerance.

You might experience common side effects, including cramps, diarrhea, and a burning sensation in your stomach and chest. If you experience such distress, chili pep-

pers might not be for you. However, you can try a gradual approach.

2. Garden Cress

It's not only a fast-growing vegetable but also a space-saver. A small patch supplies abundant leaves of this tangy herb.

3. Smooth-leaf spinach

Smooth varieties of spinach like Corvair and Space offer the least growth and maturity time. Their leaves maintain quality throughout growth and maturation. Further, their

long stems and flat leaves make harvesting and cleaning easy.

4. Adelaide Carrot

This true baby carrot yields roots that are 3-4 inches when ready for harvesting. It's a rich source of vitamin A and vitamin K and is loved for its mild flavor.

5. Tatsoi

A great addition to soups and salads, tatsoi is a low-growing mustard green. Its baby leaves can be harvested in 25 days while the mature leaves take up to 40 days before harvesting.

6. Cherry Belle Radish

This vegetable has been a garden standard for many years. It can be eaten from top to bottom, and you can let it linger in your garden for some time for a spicier taste.

7. Arugula

The peppery leaves of arugula are sure to add a zip to your salad. The gourmet green is fast-growing with its baby leaves ready three weeks after sowing.

8. Leaf lettuce

You can't beat this one at the maturation speed. It comes in various leaf textures and colors, with the best bets being Black Seeded Simpson, Red Salad Bowl, and Merlot.

9. Hakurei Turnip

It's one of the many fast-growing salad turnips, whose roots are delicious when eaten raw, cooked, or pickled. It's a popular dual-purpose veggie, giving delicious roots as well as tasty leaves for salads and stir-fries.

10. Chinese Cabbage

It is a popular green that forms delicious and firm heads of greens. The fresh salad greens are best enjoyed during the spring and fall as the veggie is sensitive to the sun.







10 Vegetables Of A Different Color

In order to have the most balanced diet, you need to consume a numerous amount of vegetables. A great way to change things up a bit is by adding vegetables that are a variety of different colors. The following 10 vegetables are a great addition to a raw diet.



Purple carrots tend to be sweeter than ones of the orange variety. While they are often eaten cooked, they can be eaten fresh.



Blue potatoes aren't commonly found in the United States. However, they are delicious and worth trying if you happen to come across one.



Black tomatoes contain a high amount of anthocyanin, which gives them a fairly long shelf life. This inside of the tomatoes are dark red in color.



Black corn does have a rather tough hull, but still can be eaten. Just like with white or yellow corn it does have a somewhat sweet flavor.



Orange eggplants can grow as big as a baseball. This sweet vegetable can either be grown outdoors or indoors in containers.



Pink swiss chard can add color to nearly any dish. It has somewhat of a bitter flavor and tastes similar to spinach.



Golden beets are a great alternative for those that like red beets, but don't like the way they stain everything. They also tend to have a sweet flavor.



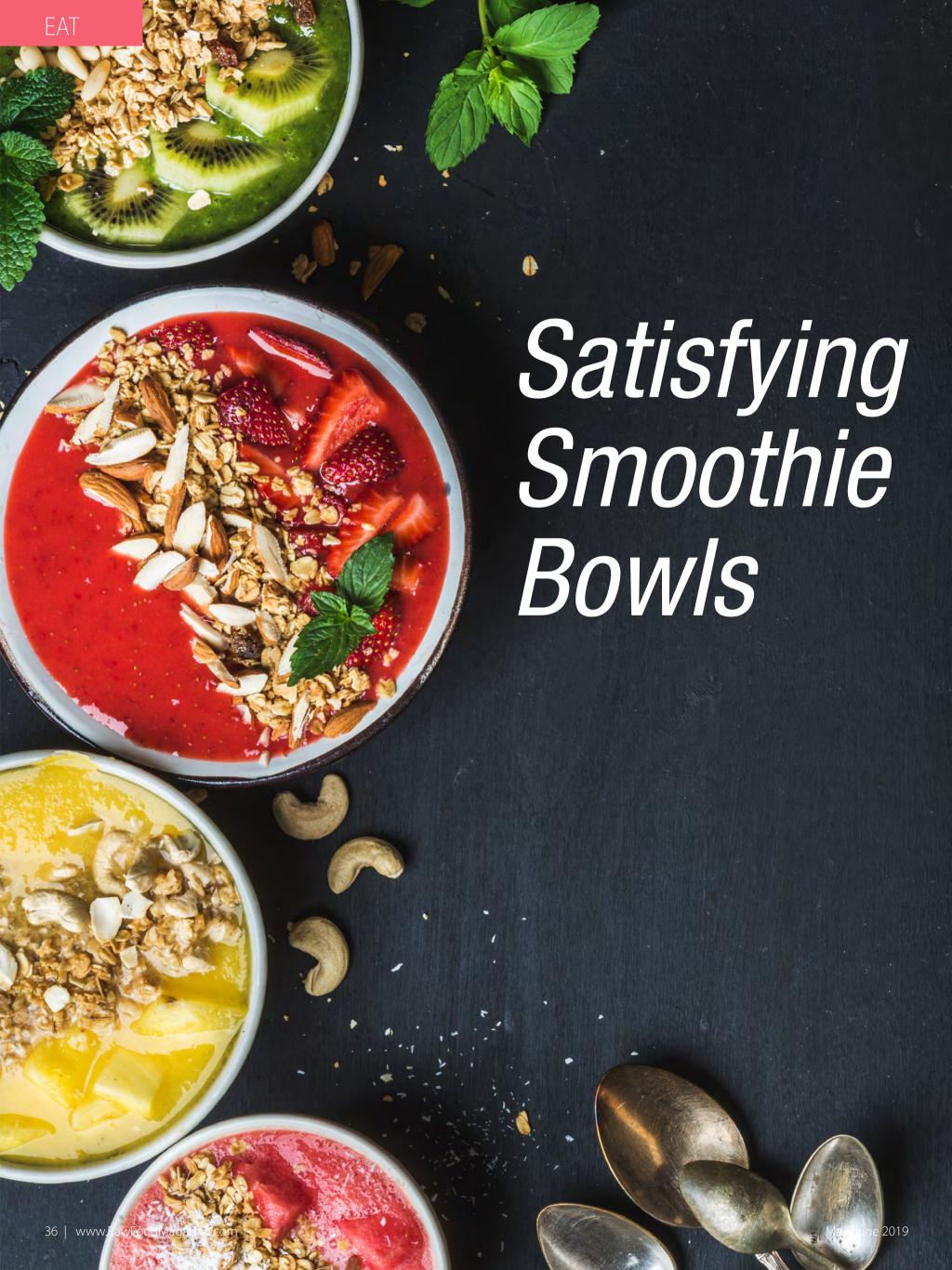
Chocolate peppers don't taste like candy, but they do have a sweet flavor. They are a great alternative to hot peppers.

1 Pitaya pack,
1/2 cup frozen cherries
3 ripe bananas
1/4 cup fresh cranberries
1/4 small beet, (if organic
no need to peel the skin)
3/4 cup water

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Blend ingredients in a blender on high until creamy
- Pour into a bowl and decorate with lots of fruit
- 3. Enjoy!

I topped mine with a banana, pear, shredded coconut, cacao nibs, and sunflower seeds. Other options are: fresh fruit of choice, dried coconut, mulberries, fresh herbs like mint, cacao nibs, granola, nuts or seeds.

Christine's tips:

If you don't have a pitaya pack you can use 1/2 of a fresh pita-ya fruit, or substitute it with fresh or frozen berries of choice. If you don't have fresh cranberries you can use frozen. Also, if you're not a beet lover start off with a small chunk and taste before adding more, but you really don't taste the beet in this recipe.

INSTRUCTIONS:

The Best Pizza Sauce:

Place all the ingredients except herbs in a blender and blend until smooth. Add herbs and pulse a few times.

Raw Vegan Parmesan:

Blend everything until smooth. Spread evenly over dehydrator sheet, dehydrate at 140°F for 1 hour, decrease heat to 118°F and continue to dehydrate until completely dry (approximately for 7 to 8 hours).

Raw Vegan Pizza:

Place all the ingredients (except the pshyllium husk) in the food processor fitted with the S blade and process until smooth. Add pshyllium husk and whisk together until well combined.

Preparation:

- 1. Spread the mixture (over dehydrator sheets) evenly into pizza shape about 1/4 thick. Dehydrate at 140°F about 1 and a half - 2 hours.
- 2. Decrease heat to 118°F and continue to dehydrate for another 12 hours.
- 3. Flip and remove dehydrator sheets.
- 4. Spread the pizza sauce over the crusts (about 3-4 tbsp/pizza) add toppings (pineapple, mushrooms and tomatoes) and continue dehydrate until dried through.
 - 5. You can allow it to dry to your desired texture and crisp.

RAW VEGAN PESTO PIZZA

Pesto:

- 1/3 cup fresh basil
- · 1/4 cup hazelnuts
- · 2 garlic cloves
- 1 cup spinach or kale, chopped
- · 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tbsp nutritional yeast
- 2 tsp garlic powder
- · 2 tsp onion powder
- salt/pepper to taste

For the crust:

Dry Ingredients:

- · 3 cups almond meal
- · 1 cup flax meal
- · 2 tsp nutritional yeast
- 1 tsp onion powder
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- salt/pepper to taste

Wet Ingredients:

- · 1/4 cup flax meal or seeds
- 1/2 cup water

Toppings:

- 2 large portobello mushroom caps, sliced thick
- 1-2 cups spinach or any other preferred green
- · 1 red onion, sliced thin
- · handful of parsley
- · pesto to your liking

INSTRUCTIONS:

Making the pesto:

- 1. Place all ingredients into a high speed blender or food processor and run until everything is combined and has a runnier consistency. You will have to stop and scrape down the sides. Be sure the hazelnuts are not in big chunks.
- 2. Add water or oil as necessary and adjust seasonings to your liking.

Pesto Pizza:

- 1. Mix 1/4 cup flaxseeds or meal with 1/2 cup water, place into the fridge for 10 minutes so it thickens up.
- 2. In a bowl of a stand mixer combine all dry ingredients. Once flax egg is ready, add it to the dry ingredients and run until a dough forms
- 3. The dough will start out crumbly, but the more you mix the more pliable it will become.
- 4. Once dough is ready, roll into a large ball.
- 5. Deciding on which pan you'd like to use, round or rectangle, place down parchment paper, wet fingertips, and spread dough out evenly across the chosen surface, pressing down with the palms of your hand when needed.
- 6. Once dough is all set, add on toppings.
- 7. Spread as much pesto as desired across the crust. Top with remaining vegetables and place in the oven set at 118F, and let sit with the door ajar about 2 inches for 45 minutes up to an hour.
- 8. Once done, cut into slices, serve, and Enjoy!

Jennifer Rose's Tips:

- 1. Dough can be cut into 4 to form 4 small round mini pizzas or you can cut the dough recipe in half and freeze the other half for a later time.
- 2. Water can be used in place of extra virgin olive oil.
- 3. If you have a dehydrator, you're more than welcome to use it for this recipe.
- 4. Pesto can be stored in the fridge for up

RAW VEGAN PIZZA

With Eggplant Crust

Ingredients:

Pizza crust and sauce:

1/2 large eggplant

1 mushroom

1/4 cup red onion

1 garlic clove

3 sprigs fresh dill

4 Campari tomatoes

(or 2 plum tomatoes)

Pizza cheese (optional): 1 cup soaked cashews

1/3 cup filtered water

dash of salt

2 tablespoons cold pressed,

extra virgin olive oil juice from one lime





INSTRUCTIONS:

Pizza crust and sauce:

- 1. The first step is to make the crust by removing the skin from the eggplant and slicing 10 pieces about 1/8 inch thick using a knife or a mandolin slicer.
- 2. Next, mix all the other ingredients except for the eggplant together in a blender or small food processor and process until smooth.
- 3. Place the eggplant slices in a large bowl (you can overlap them) and pour the mix over them. Make sure both sides of the eggplant have sauce on them. Marinate in the refrigerator for about one hour.
- 4. After the eggplant has marinated, remove the the slices from the refrigerator and place them in the dehydrator on teflex sheets or parchment paper and set to 115 degrees Fahrenheit. Be sure to cover the entire surface of the eggplant with the marinade sauce. Save a little of the sauce for applying it to the other side later. Dehydrate for one hour.
- 5. Flip the eggplant crust over and add the rest of the sauce to the other side and dehydrate for another 6 hours. You'll want to rotate the trays after about 4 hoursso they dehydrate evenly.
- 6. The crust is done when it is crispy. If you're not going to eat it right away, make sure you put it into the refrigerator so that it stays crispy, otherwise, the crust will be slightly leathery, which isn't bad at all and you might prefer it this way.

Pizza cheese:

- 1. Soak the cashews for 8 hours.
- 2. Put all the ingredients in the food processor except for the water. Mix for a couple of seconds.
- 3. Add half of the water, blend, then test the consistency. You don't want to add too much water and make the cheese too runny. I consider my cheese done when it is just creamy enough that when I put some on a spoon and turn it sideways, it slowly falls off. You can make it as creamy, smooth, thick or thin as you want. Add more water to make it thinner and creamier, less water to make it thicker with more body.

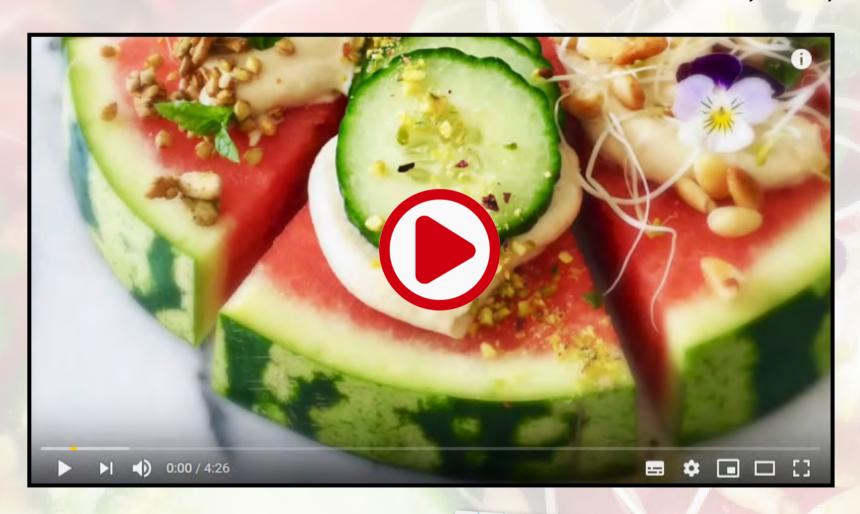
For the pizza crust and sauce:

set to about 118 degrees Fahrenheit.

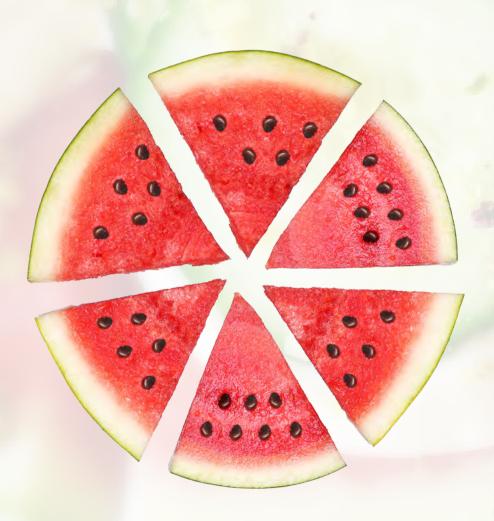
For the cheese:

WATERMELON PIZZA WITH NUT CHEESE

Ingredients:

Nut Cheese (adapted recipe from my cookbook Vegan & Raw 2):

1 1/2 cup (180 g) nuts (1 used cashews & macadamia nuts)

10 tablespoons (130 ml) water

4 tablespoons nutritional yeast

3 to 4 tablespoons lemon juice, to taste

1 tablespoon white shiro miso (rice-soybean paste - optional)

1 teaspoon Himalayan crystal salt or sea salt

Watermelon Pizza:

- 1 small watermelon
- 1/2 small cucumber, sliced
- 2 handfuls of sprouts (I used alfalfa)
- 1 handful olives, pitted and sliced 1 handful fresh herbs: oregano, basil, mint...

INSTRUCTIONS:

Nut Cheese:

Blend all the ingredients into creamy nut cheese, preferably using a high-speed blender. If needed, use a rubber spatula to scrape down the sides of the blender in between mixing.

Watermelon Pizza:

- Using a sharp knife, cut off a slice of watermelon right down the middle, about 2-3 inches thick.
- Cut the watermelon slice in smaller 'pizza slices'. Top each slice with a few tablespoons of nut cheese, leaving a bit of empty space at the top.
- 3. Layer with toppings of your choice. I used sliced cucumber, sprouts, sliced olives and fresh mint and oregano.
- 4. Garnish with edible flowers and seeds if desired. I used lightly toasted pine nuts, curried sunflower & pumpkin seeds (also a recipe from my book Vegan & Raw 2) and crumbled pistachio.

Julie's tips:

- 1. This nut cheese will stay fresh for at least 4 days in an airtight container in the refrigerator.
- 2. The pizza tastes and looks best when served fresh. As soon as you add the nut cheese, the watermelon will release some of its water content because it reacts with the salt.
- 3. If you'd like to serve this watermelon pizza for a big crowd, it's really fun to have everyone layer their own pizza. Set out a big platter of watermelon wedges, a bowl of nut cheese and several small bowls with your toppings, and get the pizza party started:)

1. Spread on dehydrator sheet creating a crust if you desire. I used my small offset spatula to achieve a raised crust.

2. Dehydrate for 15 hours or more at 115 degrees. Drying time will depend on your machine.

3. Top it all off with a hot sauce drizzle if you want an extra spicy kick!

Fat-free tomato crust:

1 3/5 lbs Tomatoes

1/4 cup Buckwheat

1/4 cup Psyllium Husk

1 clove of garlic

Smokey BBQ Sauce:

1 1/4 lb Tomatoes

4 Medjool Dates, pitted

1 Lemon

2 tsp Smoked Paprika

1 tsp Chili Powder

1/2 tsp Chipotle Chili Powder

1 tsp Onion Powder

1 tsp Garlic Powder

Rawkin' Ranch Dressing:

1/2 lb Zucchini

2 Medjool Dates, pitted

2 Green Onions/Scallions

1 tbsp Lemon Juice

1/4 cup Hemp Seeds or Cashews

1 tsp Dried Parsley

1 thsp Italian Seasoning

Toppings:

1/2 lb Mushrooms, sliced

1/2 lb Red Onion, thinly sliced

1/4 lb Cherry Tomatoes, sliced

in half

1 tbsp Lemon Juice

1 tsp Smoked Paprika

1 tsp Garlic Powder

INSTRUCTIONS:

To make the fat-free tomato crust:

- 1. Wash tomatoes well and slice into small cubes. Add to high powered blender.
- 2. Add buckwheat, psyllium husk and clove of garlic to the blender and blend until smooth.
- 3. Pour mixture in the center of a ParaFlexx sheet lined Excalibur Dehydrator tray.
- 4. Use a large flat knife or spatula to spread into a round pizza crust. You want the crust to be about as large as the tray and just 1/4" thick.
- 5. Dry in your Excalibur Dehydrator at 118 F for 4-5 hours.
- 6. Once the top is fully dry, flip the crust over on the tray and peel off the ParaFlexx sheet. Place the crust back into the dehydrator for 1-2 hours more until fully dry to the touch on both sides but not crispy.

INSTRUCTIONS:

To make the smokey BBQ sauce:

- 1. Wash tomatoes well and dice them.
- Add all sauce ingredients to highpowered blender and blend until smooth.

To make the rawkin' ranch dressing:

- 1. Wash and peel the zucchini, then chop into cubes.
- 2. Chop the bottom whites off of the green onions.
- 3. Add white portion of green onions, zucchini, hemp seeds/cashews, dates, and lemon juice to high speed blender. Blend until smooth.
- 4. Loosely chop the green onions and add to the blender along with parsley and Italian seasoning. Pulse a few times to mix well leaving small bits of green onion and herbs.

Pizza Assembly:

- 1. Pour 1/2-2/3 of the Smokey BBQ sauce on top of the dried pizza crust. Spread evenly edge to edge.
- Add the toppings (sliced tomatoes, mushrooms, and red onion) to bowl.
 Add lemon juice, smoked paprika and garlic powder and mix well.
- 3. Add the remaining Smokey BBQ sauce to the toppings and mix well.
- 4. Pile all of the toppings on top of the crust in an even layer.
- 5. Slice the pizza into 8 pieces.
- Carefully move the pizza slices back to the Excalibur Dehydrator tray. Keep the slices separated slightly.
- 7. Dry at 118 F for 2-3 hours, turning the tray halfway through.
- Slide pizza out of the dehydrator.
 Drizzle the with Rawkin' Ranch Sauce on top & serve.

RAW VEGAN CHIPOTLE ALMOND STUFFED BRUSSELS SPROUTS

Ingredients:

15 - 20 o<mark>rganic bru</mark>ssels sprouts

For the stuffing:

1 cup organic almonds 1/4 cup organic extra virgin olive oil

2 cloves organic garlic

2 tablespoons organic lemon juice

2 tablespoons nutritional yeast

1 tablespoon organic apple cider vinegar

1 teaspoon organic ground chipotle

1/2 teaspoon Himalayan pink salt



INSTRUCTIONS:

Prepare the brussels sprouts:

- 1. Cut the ends off all the brussels sprouts and slice them in half.
- 2. Option 1: Raw Set aside.
- 3. Option 2: Blanched Put them in a medium sized pot with <u>filtered/purified water</u> and quickly blanch for 1-2 minutes or until they turn bright green.
- 4. Strain and allow them to cool completely before preparing to add the stuffing.
- 5. After they are cooled, remove the inner part of the brussels sprouts until only the outer "shell" remains. Make sure you leave enough of the outer part of the brussels sprouts to support the stuffing.



INSTRUCTIONS:

Prepare the stuffing:

1. Add all the ingredients for the stuffing to a food processor and process until it becomes a crumbly, chunky texture.

Take care not to over process, just enough to break the almonds down into tiny pieces. Adjust the seasonings to your preference.

Assemble:

- 1. Add the stuffing to the insides of the brussels sprouts.
- 2. Option 1: Eat them raw and enjoy them immediately
- 3. Option 2: Sprinkle the tops with nutritional yeast and bake at 400 degrees for approximately 20 minutes, or until the tops are golden.

RAW SWEET BREAD

1/3 cup psyllium husk 2 tablespoons flax meal 1 cup dates 1/2 cup pecans 2/3 cup raisins 1 medium orange (peeled) 1 large apple (peeled, cored, roughly chopped) 1 teaspoon orange zest (outer orange peel) 1 teaspoon cinnamon (or 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon + 1/4 teaspoon cloves) 1/8 teaspoon sea salt (or less)



INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Add all ingredients to food processor EXCEPT RAISINS, PSYLLIUM HUSK AND FLAXSEED MEAL. Process very well.
- 2. Add raisins. Pulse again until raisins are well distributed but raisins still looked like raisins:)
- 3. Transfer mixture to a bowl. Add psyllium husk and flaxseed meal. Stir well.
- 4. Form into two small loaves.

5. Dehydrate for 1 hour on high - then reduce to 110 degrees for another few hours (perhaps 5). These actually dehydrate pretty fast! You can nibble them as they firm up. Pull out when you want to eat them - I like them still a bit moist inside.

2 cups meat of fresh young Thai coconut

1 cup water of fresh young Thai coconut

INSTRUCTIONS:

Filling:

- 1. In a high speed blender, combine the coconut meat, water and oil with the Irish moss until very smooth.
- 2. In a food processor, mix together the nuts, lemon juice, yeast, salt and water until well combined and fluffy like ricotta cheese.
- 3. Add the basil leaves and pulse briefly.
- 4. In a large mixing bowl, gently fold the coconut mixture into the nut "ricotta", followed by the chopped sun-dried tomatoes and olives.
- 5. Pour the filling into the crusts.
- 6. Dehydrate at 115F for 6 hours, then refrigerate overnight.
- 7. Optionally, slice fresh tomatoes thinly and dehydrate on Teflex-lined dehydrator trays just to dry the surface.
- 8. Garnish the tarts, placing the tomatoes dry side down for the last 1-2 hours of tart dehydration.

VEGAN CHEESY KALE CHIPS

1/2 cup sun dried tomatoes
(no salt added)
1/3 cup nutritional yeast
1/2 red bell pepper
1 1/2 cup cherry tomatoes
1 stalk celery
1/4 cup fresh cilantro
3 tbsp lemon juice
2 tbsp hemp seeds
1-1 1/2 tsp chili powder,
to taste
1/2 tsp garlic powder
Salt and pepper to taste
3 bunches of kale (I used
curly and lacinato)*

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Wash and dry kale. remove stems if you would like (I left them on).
- 2. Blend all of the ingredients together except for the kale.
- 3. Place the kale in a large bowl and pour all of the sauce over. Massage the sauce into the kale with your hands until easily and thoroughly distributed.
- Place in a dehydrator* on 115-120F for 12-14 hours, checking doneness around 12 hours.

Jasmine's tips:

You may break the kale up in half or thirds for bite-sized pieces, or you can dehydrate them whole as I did for larger bites.

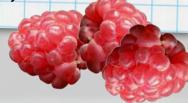
