Malawi Facts

Malawi is one of the six poorest countries in the world.

40 Percent of Malawi's population does not have access to a protected water source.

Nationally less than 5 percent of Malawi's population has access to electricity in their homes.

It is estimated that 17.5% of the adult population of Malawi is HIV positive.

Maternal mortality rate is in excess of 1200 per 100,000 live births in the year 2000, largely due to AIDS related complications.


The death rate for adults has tripled since 1990, now in excess of 70,000 per year.

Seven year old Rose Jeffries died in November 2003 from a rare stomach condition. Rose's parents Steve and Bronwen raised thousands of pounds to fund new play ground equipment for a Harrogate park in her memory.



They also wished to do something for the orphans of Malawi so they have embarked on a further fundraising scheme to help us provide foster houses for Open Arms children who have nowhere else. To date they have raised six thousand pounds.
