Chapter 13. Quantitative

- 1. A union has N members and is deciding what wage to demand from firms. The union wishes to maximize its utility function, given by $U = N_u \omega_u + (N N_u) \omega_n$, where N_u is the number of workers employed in the unionized sector, ω_u is the wage paid in the unionized sector, and ω_n is the wage paid in the non-union sector. Assume all union members who are not employed in the unionized sector gain employment in the non-unionized sector until a union job becomes available. In addition, aggregate labor demand is $L^d = 200 4\omega$ in the unionized sector.
 - (a) If N = 175, how many union members are employed in the unionized sector if the union insists upon $\omega_u = 20$? What if $\omega_u = 15$?
 - (b) If the union is deciding between $\omega_u = 15$ and $\omega_u = 20$, which will the union prefer if $\omega_n = 10$? What if $\omega_n = 15$?
- 2. In an economy, there are two sectors: one unionized and the other non-unionized. Aggregate labor demand is $L^d = 150 5\omega$ in the unionized sector, while labor demand is $L^d = 225 20\omega$ in the non-unionized sector. Labor supply is $L^s = 75 + 5\omega$ in the non-unionized sector. Under the current union contract, the union wage (ω_u) is \$10/hour and there are 100 workers in the union sector.
 - (a) What is the equilibrium level of employment and wages in the non-union sector? What is the relative wage advantage (*R*) for unions?
 - (b) As the current union contract expires, the union votes to increase its wage demand to $\omega' = 15$. How many union workers lose their jobs?
 - (c) The workers who lose their union jobs move to the non-union sector (as their reservation wages are all well below the wage in the non-union sector). What is the new equilibrium wage in the uncovered sector? What is relative wage advantage (*R*) for unions?
- 3. Suppose major league baseball players and owners agree to impose a salary cap on teams, but cannot agree on the actual salary cap. (A salary cap is the maximum cumulative salary teams are allowed to pay their players in a given season.) The players go on strike and have a resistance curve given by $SC = 70 + 0.3s 0.1s^2$, where SC is the salary cap (in millions) and s is the length of the strike (in weeks). The owners of the baseball teams have a concession schedule given by SC = 50 + 0.5s. According to Hicks' simplest strike model, determine the length of the strike and the salary cap that will be agreed upon. [Hint: Recall the quadratic formula. If $ax^2 + bx + c = 0$, then $x = (-b \neq \sqrt{b^2 4ac})/2a$.]
- 4. Unions in two different industries confront employers with identical concession schedules, given by $\omega = 25 + s$, where ω is the percentage wage increase and s is the strike length in weeks. However, in one industry, workers had been paid higher wages in the past (and were

therefore able to accumulate personal savings). As a result, the union's resistance curve in the high-paying industry is $\omega = 50 - s$, whereas it is $\omega = 50 - 2s$ in the low-paying industry.

- (a) Graph the concession and resistance curves on one graph.
- (b) Calculate the expected outcome in each industry according to Hicks' simplest strike model.
- 5. Consider an economy containing a union and non-union sector. In the union sector, $L^d = 50 2\omega$ and $L^s = -15 + 8\omega$. In the non-union sector, $L^d = 60 4\omega$ and $L^s = -44 + 12\omega$.
 - (a) Calculate the initial equilibrium wage and employment in each sector assuming the union imposes no demands on the firms in the union sector.
 - (b) If the union insists on a wage of \$10/hour, how many union workers will lose their jobs?
 - (c) Assume the percentage of unemployed union workers who decide to seek employment in the non-union sector depends (negatively) on level of unemployment benefits they could otherwise collect. In particular, assume that the percentage of unemployed union workers moving to the non-union sector is given by p = 1 RR, where RR is the replacement rate under the unemployment insurance (UI) system. [Note: The replacement rate is the percentage of one's former salary that is replaced through the UI system. This is discussed further in Chapter 15.] Calculate the new wage and level of employment in each sector, as well as the relative wage advantage (R), if the union insists on a wage of \$10 and (i) RR = 0 and (ii) RR = 3/7? Assume all union workers who do seek employment in the non-union sector are willing to work for any non-union wage (as long as it is greater than zero).
