GRAPHIC ANIMATION Hip, funky, MTV-style animated title opening—

## **ASRE**—Check It Out!

JAMMIN' MUSIC—Upbeat, funky, exciting, hip hop music with some blazing electric guitar.

CUT TO . . .

INT. — LARGE DRUG STORE — DAY.

Our HOST is dressed in a black tee shirt, blue jean jacket, jeans, and unlaced boots. He wears sun glasses. Beneath a backwards baseball cap, his long hair is pulled back in a pony tail. He stands in front of a large group of young AMERICAN STORE EMPLOYEES. They surround him, crunching together, trying to squeeze into the shot. Like the host, they're pumped up and excited, dancing and moving to the music.

> HOST Yo! Welcome to ASRE— Check It Out! You're down with

I'm here in Chi-town chillin' with the gang at American Stores.

The group cheers.

HOST

We've got a jammin' show for you today. We'll be talkin' about the Big M, monaaay, loot, mullah, the long green.

(SFX: cash register)

How do we make it? How do we spend it? And how can we get more of it?

The group cheers.

QUICK CUT TO . . .

GRAPHIC ANIMATION (3 seconds) The number—10 and ASRE.

HOST (VO)

Today is the big ten year anniversary of American Stores' *awesome* Retirement Plan called ASRE. . .

Back to HOST.

HOST and we'll find out how to scoop some cool cash absolutely free.

So check it out!

CUT TO . . .

GRAPHIC ANIMATION (3 sec.) The opening title sequence.

CUT TO . . .

INTERIOR — GROCERY STORE — DAY. The host leans over the counter at the deli department, gives the young deli worker a soul shake, and asks him the first question.

> HOST Yo, man. We're talking about money. You've got a good job. What do you spend your money on?

CUT TO . . .

EMPLOYEE SHORT CLIPS

A fast-paced series of short employee video and sound bites. A funky ANIMATED BORDER in constant motion surrounds each of the people being interviewed. These responses are just suggestions and examples of style. The actual responses will come from the employees. Deli workers. Cashiers. Stock people. Pharmacists. Butchers. Grocer. Check-out people. All young, in the age range of our target audience—19 to 25.

Cut in short (1 second) sequences of the things they talk about.

### MUSIC KICKS UP

# ASRE—Check It Out!

EMPLOYEE Pearl Jam tickets.

EMPLOYEE CDs.

EMPLOYEE Clothes.

EMPLOYEE

Beer.

EMPLOYEE Bulls tickets.

HOST I can dig that. Now what would you

do if you had a lot of money? I mean a real pile. Livin' large. What would you spend it on? Get crazy.

EMPLOYEES SHORT CLIPS Short answers. Mix in the answers with short sequences of their fantasies.

> EMPLOYEE A Porsche . . . *and* a Ferrari.

CUT TO . . .

PORSCHE or FERRARI (1.5 seconds)

SOUND—Porsche screaming through its gears

EMPLOYEE A big house with a swimming pool and an indoor basketball court.

EMPLOYEE I'd make a movie.

EMPLOYEE Get a big yacht and sail around the world.

EMPLOYEE Paaarty!!

HOST

Yeah!!

So how do you think you could get money like that?

EMPLOYEE (Blank stare.)

EMPLOYEE (Blank stare.)

EMPLOYEE (Blank stare.)

## HOST

Hello in there. (Knocks on screen.) How about saving it?

> EMPLOYEE No way.

> EMPLOYEE I don't make enough.

EMPLOYEE I need money now. Saving's for the future.

HOST Ding, ding, ding. The magic word.

#### EMPLOYEE

What?

#### HOST

Future, my man. Future. That's what it's all about. You know, what's happening now (snap), and now (snap), and now (snap). The future's just now a little later, dig?

#### EMPLOYEE

#### Huh?

HOST Pretend your life's a video. Press fast forward.

The video fast forwards. HOST looks ten years older. A little grayer, a little balder, a little fatter.

#### HOST

What' your life look like ten years from now?

Video fast forwards. HOST looks twenty years older. Grayer, balder, fatter.

#### HOST

## How about twenty?

Video fast forwards HOST looks forty years older, white hair, white beard. HOST How about forty? You're retired. What will your life be like?

BALD FAT MAN Smiles and waves at camera.

EMPLOYEE Bald and fat.

OLD WOMAN WITH BLUE HAIR Smiles and waves at camera.

EMPLOYEE I'll have blue hair and live in Miami.

### AMERICAN GOTHIC

The Grant Wood painting of the elderly farm couple owned by the Art Institute of Chicago.

EMPLOYEE I'll look like my parents.

CUT TO . . .

ANIMATED GRAPHIC Animated graphic of a huge POOL in front of a MANSION. An animated CARTOON of HOST's body—but with his REAL HEAD—floats in the pool sipping a huge exotic drink sprouting flowers. HOST's head talks to camera.

OR

This could also be shot in a really nice HOTEL'S INDOOR POOL.

HOST If you want to be liven' large—or even a half-way decently—you've got to do something about it today. It doesn't happen by itself. It's up to numero uno.

> EMPLOYEE You mean save?

EMPLOYEE Get real, I'm too young for this.

EMPLOYEE I'm only nineteen.

EMPLOYEE No way.

HOST Yes way. In fact, saving is the only *way*. And American Stores helps you do it? And throws in some free money. CUT TO . . .

STORE — OVERHEAD ANGLE — FAST MOTION High wide shot looking down on the store and HOST. From behind every counter and every aisle, hundreds of employees pour out in fast motion and surround HOST.

SOUND—stampeding elephants

HOST Now I got your attention.

> EMPLOYEE Alright!

> EMPLOYEE Awesome!

> EMPLOYEE Jammin'!

EMPLOYEE Why would American Stores give us free money?

CUT TO . . .

HOST

From a wide-shot, the camera quickly pushes in to a close up of his puzzled face.

SOUND—squealing breaks

HOST That's a good question.

CUT TO . . .

LONG CORPORATE CORRIDOR. The camera follows the host down a corporate corridor. As he walks, he turns back to talk to us.

HOST

When you want an answer, go right to the top. I have a tip Vic Lund, the CEO of American Stores, is in this office up ahead. Let's see what he has to say about this free money thing?

The host opens the office door. This is real guerrilla style shooting. It appears as if he's just barging in on the CEO of the company. The main camera follows the host. The second Hi-8 black and white camera weaves around the room in constant motion, picking up odd-angled close-ups of feet, faces, and details.

HOST Hey, I'm looking for Vic Lund. Anybody seen Vic Lund? Yo, Vic! Where's the Vicster?

VIC LUND is talking with a group of people. They're shocked to see the host, this shabby-looking, long-haired intruder. Vic approaches the host.

VIC I'm Vic Lund. How can I help you?

HOST I'm \_\_\_\_\_.

The host gives Vic a complicated soul shake. Vic stays right with him.

HOST Smokin'. We're shooting a video about American Stores' retirement plan. And I think our audience wants to know—forget about the audience—*I* want to know, what's with this free money thing? Are you guys just psyching us or is this for real?

VIC It's for real. In fact, in the past ten years, we've put \_\_\_\_\_ million dollars into American Stores Retirement Estates Plan. HOST (whistles) Wheww. Like winning the lottery.

VIC

Not quite. We don't give it all to one person. We give it to *every* employee who participates in the plan.

HOST Why? You pay them a salary. Why give them this extra money?

#### VIC

Our employees are responsible for our success. We owe them. This is one way we can pay them back and show them we appreciate them.

#### HOST

So what kind of money are we talkin' here?

VIC Since this is the tenth anniversary of ASRE, American Stores will contribute \_\_\_\_\_ dollars to the plan.

For every hundred dollars an employee earned in 1994, ASRE will put \_\_\_\_\_ dollars into their profit sharing account.

HOST Whoa!

VIC That's not all. We'll also put \_\_\_\_\_ dollars for every \_\_\_\_\_ dollars they put into their ASRE Plan up to a total of 6%.

HOST OK. That leaves me with the obvious question.

VIC Shoot.

HOST (sotto voice) How do I get a job with this company?

#### VIC

(laughs)

#### HOST

(to camera)
I'm going to chill with my man Vic here for a while. We've got some stuff to talk about. Catch you later.
(to Vic)
Seriously, Vic, you have any openings for a video jock?

SWISH PAN TO . . .

HOST back in a store.

### MUSIC KICKS UP

HOST There it is. Get with ASRE and BOOM! free money. ASRE actually *pays* you to save.

But that's not all. Check this out. This is way cool.

You may not be able to put a lot into your ASRE account at first. But if you start early enough, the magic of compounding makes even a small amount of cash get huge.

ANIMATED GRAPHIC (2 seconds) Small amount of dollars grow huge.

#### SOUND EFFECTS—Money growing

HOST It's unbelievable. Check this out.

CUT TO . . .

GRAPHIC ANIMATION A hip, MTV-style graphic treatment of how money grows through compounding.

The graphic shows how a fifteen hundred dollar a year contribution grows when started at age 25. The example is from the ASRE Annual Report Brochure.

#### HOST (VO)

Say you put fifteen hundred dollars into your ASRE plan every year until you were sixty-five. That's less than thirty dollars a week. If you started when you were twenty-five, you'd have put in a total of sixty thousand dollars. But because of tax-deferred compounding, you'd have almost eight times that much—over four hundred and fifty grand! Almost half a mill. You know what I'm sayin'? You'll be half a millionaire. And this doesn't even include the company matches.

EMPLOYEE

Alright!

## ASRE—Check It Out!

EMPLOYEE

Yes!

EMPLOYEE Radical!

#### EMPLOYEE Awesome!

HOST

HOST But to get that kind of money, you have to start soon.

#### GRAPHIC ANIMATION

The graphic shows how a fifteen hundred dollar a year contribution grows when started at age 25, 35, 45, and 55.

HOST (VO) If you wait even ten years, you'd have less than two hundred thousand.

If you wait twenty years, you'd only have a little over seventy thousand. And if you wait until you're fifty-five, ten years before you retire, you'll have under twenty-five thousand.

HOST

#### HOST

The sooner you start saving, the more you make. So it pays to start right away.

And you can't start too soon. You're going to *need* that money. You know how the cost of things goes up every year? Check this out.

#### GRAPHIC ANIMATION

MTV-style animation showing results of inflation. Money gets smaller.

#### HOST (VO)

Twenty years ago a car only cost three thousand dollars. Today that same care cost almost twenty thousand. It's called inflation and it means your money is worth *less* every year.

HOST

HOST Over a few years the value of your money gets pounded. (punches at the camera)

> EMPLOYEE That's not fair.

#### HOST

Hey, I don't make the rules. And it gets worse over time.

#### **GRAPHIC ANIMATION**

MTV-style animation showing how much employees will need save to retire in 10, 20, 30, and 40 years.

#### HOST (VO)

Because of inflation, in forty years, you'll need every bit of that four hundred and fifty grand to retire.

But ASRE is the best way to get it. Check it out in the brochure. It's all there.

HOST

#### HOST

You don't want to be slavin' at a McJob when you're sixty-five. You want to be large and in charge. And that takes bucks. And that takes saving. And that takes ASRE.

HOST But there's more good news. ASRE's not like saving money in a bank account. You're investing it in the best investment you can make—mutual funds. You choose how you want to invest. Boom! Just like the big money guys on Wall Street.

CUT TO . . .

SNOW BOARDER A snow boarder sails over our heads in slow motion. (stock)

> HOST (VO) You can take some risk and go for the highest earnings.

CUT TO . . .

BUNNY SLOPE A beginning skier snow plows down the bunny slope.

> HOST (VO) Or play it safe.

HOST

HOST

ASRE gives you all the investment choices in between. Check 'em out in your ASRE brochure.

> EMPLOYEE I don't know anything about investing. How do I know what to choose?

HOST

Don't sweat it. ASRE helps you make the right choices. You'll get all the info you need about investing for your future, showing you how to make the best choices for *your* goals and *your* situation. Need more information? Just pick up the phone. And you can change your investments any time with a single phone call.

Whoa, I've done enough yackin'. Lets hear what your fellow employees say about the plan.

#### PLAN PARTICIPANTS SHORT CLIPS

Short video and sound bites from employees who have participated in the plan. Some are older than our target audience and have been saving for years, but most are fairly close to the target audience's age. This is our chance to sell the plan from the employees' perspectives. These clips will push the different benefits of the plan. Like the employee clips, these are just suggestions. The real clips will come from the actual interviews.

#### PARTICIPANT

I never knew the small amount of money I put into ASRE every month would grow so fast.

#### PARTICIPANT

Compounding and no taxes really make a difference. And of course the company match.

#### PARTICIPANT

I'd advise anyone to start as soon as they can. You'd be a fool not to take advantage of it. Especially the company matches. I mean, who'd turn down free money.

#### PARTICIPANT

If you need to get money before retirement, you can borrow it from yourself as a loan.

#### PARTICIPANT

Automatic payroll deduction makes it easy to save. I'm not even aware I'm saving until I look at my ASRE

#### HOST

Check it out. Free money from company matches. Tax-deferred compounding making your money grow. Awesome investment choices. And automatic payroll deductions making saving easy.

Remember—it don't pay, if you don't play. So be smart. Don't wait. Get with the plan today.

MUSIC—reaches crescendo

As the music hits it's last downbeat, instead of the standard fade to black, the video clicks-off to black with the small diminishing white dot in the center as if the television monitor were suddenly switched off.
