- is thin, pale, shabby but neat. He is an average young man but with an aura of despair and hopelessness about him. He reacts with his eyes and mouth which display his pain and conflict as well as his amusement with the world whose illogic is to destroy him.

COMMISSIONAIRE:

- is a uniformed ex-serviceman in charge of the foyer and lifts of the office building.

- is a nine-to-five office girl.

- Bartleby's employer is middle-aged, secure, self-reliant and prudent. Although punctilious, he is rather easy going and generous with those around him. He has a conflict within himself between calculated self-interest and a need for moral self-approval if not the approval of the world. He needs to feel that whatever he does is right.

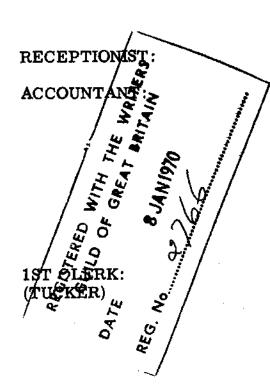
- is a conventional man in his late twenties in pursuit of a career in accountancy. He has a humorous contempt for the absurd and unbelievable logic of Bartleby's passive resistance.

- is also an audit clerk, who quietly vegetates under the dominance of Tucker.

- is young, cheeky and energetic.

- is a dry, matter-of-fact, portly man who has his feet on the ground and his mind on his lunch. He cannot really understand the accountant's position or what the Bartleby problem is all about. He is crisp and to the point.

BARTLEBY IS SITTING NEXT TO WINDOW IN SILHOUETTE. LIGHT RAIN STREAKS THE WINDOW AS THE TRAIN FLASHES PAST LONDON SUBURBS. THE TRAIN PLUNGES UNDERGROUND. Fx CONTINUE.

TITLE CARD

PRODUCTION CREDITS.
Fx FADE UNDER. MUSIC FADES UP.

CUT TO

SCENE 2

INT. TUBE STATION

L.S. of train arriving.
CAMERA PANS with
crowd. BARTLEBY is
in the middle of frame.

A TRAIN ARRIVES IN THE STATION AND STOPS. PEOPLE POUR OUT ACROSS PLATFORM. IN THE MIDDLE, WE CATCH A GLIMPSE OF BARTLEBY.
MUSIC CONTINUES OVER Fx.

CUT TO

SCENE 3

INT. TUBE ESCALATOR

M.S. from CAMERA on escalator from behind.

Side shot from parallel escalator descending.

CUT TO

BARTLEBY IS RIDING UP ESCALATOR. HE IS MOTIONLESS. THE BACK-GROUND MOVES BY. Fx and MUSIC CONTINUE

INT. TUBE ESCALATOR

L.S. PAN from opposite escalator that is going down.

BARTLEBY IS ONE OF A LINE OF PEOPLE RIDING UP ESCALATOR. MOST OF THEM ARE LOOKING STRAIGHT AHEAD. BARTLEBY LOOKS TOWARDS CAMERA AS IT DESCENDS, PAST HIM. Fx and MUSIC CONTINUE.

CUT TO

SCENE 5

INT, UNDERGROUND PASSAGEWAY

CAMERA TRACKS WITH BARTLEBY AND PANS OFF HIM TO BEGGAR.

WE SEE A LONG PASSAGEWAY IN THE UNDERGROUND IN WHICH PEOPLE ARE PASSING. A SHABBY BEGGAR IS KNEELING, PLAYING A MOUTH ORGAN. BARTLEBY STANDS LOOKING AT HIM. Fx and MUSIC CONTINUE.

CUT TO

SCENE 6

INT. TUBE STATION

CAMERA TRACKS and PANS past lockers coming upon BARTLEBY, HOLDS him with PAN then passes him. WE SEE A LONG BANK OF '24 HOUR'
LOCKERS PASS AS WE TRACK AND
COME ONTO BARTLEBY PUTTING A
BAG INTO A LOCKER AT CHEST
HEIGHT.
Fx and MUSIC CONTINUE.

CUT TO

SCENE 7

INT. DAY. POST OFFICE SORTING ROOM

CAMERA TRACKS in M.S. at right angles to the scene.

TRACK PAST THE PIGEON HOLES OF A SORTING SECTION WITH CLERKS STANDING BEHIND STUFFING LETTERS IN THEM.

Fx and MUSIC.

CUT TO

REGISTERED WITH THE WRITERS

L.S. to M.S. PANS passing

BARTLEBY STANDS ON THE PAVE-MENT IN THE MIDDLE OF A STREAM OF RUSH HOUR CROWDS SINGLE-MINDEDLY HURRYING TO THEIR DESTINATIONS. THEY FLOW AROUND BARTLEBY WHO IS LOST IN REVERIE. Fx and MUSIC.

CUT TO

SCENE 10

EXT. DAY. IN FRONT OF LABOUR EXCHANGE

V. L. S. static HIGH ANGLE from a bridge overlooking the scene.

BARTLEBY STANDS IN FRONT OF THE FACADE BEARING A SIGN THAT THIS IS A LABOUR EXCHANGE. HE MOVES TOWARD THE ENTRANCE. MUSIC FADES AT END OF SHOT.

CUT TO

SCENE 11

INT. DAY. WAITING AREA OF LABOUR EXCHANGE

M.S. TRACK to BARTLEBY and past him just as he gets up. BARTLEBY SITS WAITING HIS TURN. WE HEAR THE SOUND OF A TELE-PHONE BEING DIALLED.

CUT TO

SCENE 12

INT. DAY. LABOUR EXCHANGE

M.S. TRACK past cubicles.
In the last BARTLEBY
crosses a step to the chair
and sits down.

A ROW OF INTERVIEW CUBICLES IS FILLED WITH THE BACKS OF PEOPLE BEING INTERVIEWED. IN THE LAST BARTLEBY SITS DOWN.

Fx OF TELEPHONE DIALLING.

INT. DAY. A FLAT COUNTER

B.C.U. static frame.

A HAND PUTS DOWN A PRINTED APPLICATION CARD. IT IS STAMPED AND HANDED TO BARTLEBY'S HAND. Fx OF TELEPHONE RINGING.

CUT TO

SCENE 14

EXT. DAY. A BRIDGE OVER THE RIVER

V. L. S.LOW ANGLE from a boat receding or cheated from the embankment promenade going under the bridge at one side. THE BRIDGE IS CONSTRUCTED OF IRON GIRDER WORK. IN THE CENTRE ARE SEVERAL RAILWAY TRACKS BEARING A CONSTANT TRAFFIC WHICH MAKES THE WHOLE BRIDGE RESOUND AND RUMBLE. TO ONE SIDE OUTSIDE THE MAIN GIRDER SUPERSTRUCTURE IS A FOOTBRIDGE WITH A RAILING ON THE RIVER SIDE. BARTLEBY IS LEANING OVER THE RAILING LOOKING DOWN.

Fx OF TRAINS AND TELEPHONE RINGING.

CUT TO

SCENE 15

EXT. DAY. FOOTBRIDGE

L.S. HIGH ANGLE from bridge over BARTLEBY's shoulder. BARTLEBY STANDS AT THE RAILING LOOKING DOWN AT A BOAT PASSING. SOMEONE ON BOARD WAVES AT HIM. Fx OF TELEPHONE RING STOPPED BY THE RECEIVER BEING LIFTED. BIPS SOUND.

CUT TO

REGISTERED WITH THE WRITERS
GUILD OF GREAT BRITAIN

DATE

8 JAN 1970

REG. No.....

EXT. DAY. OUTDOOR TELEPHONE BOX

M.S. TRACK from outside looking in through the glass.

A TELEPHONE BOX STANDS IN AN OPEN SPACE. INSIDE BARTLEBY IS HOLDING THE RECEIVER TO HIS HEAD.

Fx OF THE BIPS STOPPING AS THE MONEY GOES IN.

CUT TO

SCENE 17

EXT. DAY. FOOTBRIDGE

from CAMERA into
L. S.

(CONTINUATION OF SHOT 15)

THE LINE CLEARING. AS IT
CLEARS CUT.

SCENE 18

EXT. DAY, FOOTBRIDGE

M.C.U. TRACK of BARTLEBY in profile as he walks. BARTLEBY IS WALKING. BEHIND HIM IS THE CRISS-CROSS GIRDER WORK OF THE BRIDGE. TRAINS RATTLE PAST ON THE OTHER SIDE OF THE GIRDERS.

CUT TO

SCENE 19

EXT. DAY. FOOTBRIDGE

LOW ANGLE L.S. through the railings. Static.

A STAIRWAY CONNECTS BETWEEN
THE FOOTBRIDGE AND THE STREET
LEVEL. IT DOUBLES BACK ON
ITSELF SO THAT WE SEE UP
THROUGH TWO SETS OF RAILINGS TO
THE TOP WHERE BARTLEBY
ARRIVES AND BEGINS TO WALK DOWN.
FLUTE MUSIC OF STREET MUSICIANS

LEADS THE NEXT SHOT.

EXT. DAY, STREET

L.S. TRACK OR ZOOM TO VL.S. THREE BLIND MUSICIANS ARE PLAYING ON THE STREET, ONE ON FLUTE, ONE ON BANJO, AND ONE HOLDING A CAP FOR COLLECTION. BARTLEBY BUYS A NEWSPAPER AND WATCHES THEM. WHEN THE MUSIC ENDS, THEY SHUFFLE OFF PAST HIM, ONE WITH HIS HAND ON THE OTHER'S SHOULDER IN FRONT.

MUSIC AND STREET Fx.

CUT TO

SCENE 21

EXT. DAY. PLAZA IN FRONT OF OFFICE BUILDINGS.

L.S. HIGH ANGLE ZOOMS back to VL.S. BARTLEBY IS STANDING IN THE MIDDLE OF AN EMPTY CONCRETE SPACE LOOKING UP. WE SEE HIM GET SMALLER AND SMALLER, ISOLATED IN THIS SPACE AS THE CAMERA ZOOMS BACK. DURING THE MOVEMENT, WE HEAR THE FX OF TELEPHONE BIPS AND THE SOUND OF MONEY GOING IN.

VOICE: Hello.

BARTLEBY: HELLo. VOICE: Can I help you?

BARTLEBY: Yes.

VOICE: (REPEATING IN

MECHANICAL TONES OF A RECEP-

TIONIST) Can I help you? BARTLEBY: YES...I...

THE LINE GOES DEAD BEFORE HE CAN PROCEED.
MUSIC FADES IN.

CUT TO

CAMERA PANS him
in L.S. through the
glass. After the lift
doors close, CAMERA
TILTS UP.

BARTLEBY IS LOOKING AT THE ENTRANCE AND FOYER OF A LARGE BUILDING WHOSE GROUND FLOOR IS WALLED WITH GLASS, AS IF TRYING TO DECIDE WHETHER TO ENTER. ALIEN, HE WALKS TO THE REVOLVING DOORS AND INTO THE FOYER. A COMMISSIONAIRE LOOKS AT HIM SUSPICIOUSLY. AFTER A MOMENT'S HESITATION, BARTLEBY WALKS TO THE LIFT. HE ENTERS; THE DOORS CLOSE.

MUSIC CONTINUES UNDER. AS HE WAITS FOR THE LIFT, A 'VOICE OFF' IS HEARD.

VOICE: Please fill out this questionnaire.

BARTLEBY (OFF): (READING AS IF TALKING TO HIMSELF SOTTO VOCE) Name, address, telephone number, date of birth, nationality, education, previous employment, position and salary.

MUSIC UNDER

DISSOLVE TO

SCENE 25

INT. DAY. POST OFFICE SORTING ROOM.

CAMERA TRACKS TILTED UP then TILTS DOWN AND STOPS in L.S. WE SEE THE SECTIONS OF THE SORTING ROOM INDICATED BY LARGE LETTERS: A, B, C, etc. AS WE PASS AND TILT DOWN FROM THE CEILING THE ACTIVITY OF THE ROOM COMES INTO VIEW. BAGS OF MAIL ARE MOVED AND LIE IN PILES.

BARTLEBY (SOTTO VOCE): State briefly why you consider yourself suited for the position applied for.

FX OF SORTING ROOM.

CUT TO

SCENE 26

INT. DAY. RECEPTION OF ACCOUNTANT'S OFFICE.

CAMERA PANS
BARTLEBY'S movement to the reception
desk. After he sits
down, TRACK into
B.C.U. of eyes until
out of focus.

BARTLEBY ENTERS THE OFFICE WALKING TOWARD CAMERA AND GOES TO THE RECEPTION DESK WHERE HE IS SEEN TO EXPLAIN HIS PURPOSE TO THE RECEPTIONIST AND HANDS IN HIS LABOUR EXCHANGE CARD. SHE GETS UP, INVITES HIM TO SIT DOWN AND EXITS. BARTLEBY SITS IMPASSIVE AND CALM.

SCENE 26 (contd)

Fx OF TYPING AND OFFICE BACK-GROUND.

BARTLEBY (SOTTO VOCE - OFF): Give the names of two referees.

From a M.S. CAMERA PANS as BARTLEBY disappears to reemerge at the doorway. CAMERA PANS BARTLEBY as he approaches and turns away from CAMERA down the street.

BARTLEBY STANDS BEHIND A WINDOW LOOKING OUT. DIRTY SURFACE OF THE GLASS IS THE FIGURE OF VISIBLE. BARTLEBY RETREATS LEAVING FRAME. HE REAPPEARS AT A DOORWAY AS WE PAN SLOWLY TO THE DOOR. HE STOPS, PEERS AT THE WORLD, AND WALKS OUT INTO THE STREET. HIS WALK HAS DIRECTION BUT NOT PURPOSE AS SUGGESTED IN HIS BEARING. Fx AND MUSIC.

CUT TO

SCENE 28

EXT. DAY. TELEPHONE BOX IN THE STREET.

M.S. DOOR OPENS TO CAMERA.

THE SAME LOCATION AS FOR PREVIOUS TELEPHONE BOX SHOT. BARTLEBY OPENS THE DOOR AND

COMES OUT.

VOICE OFF: Please go in. MUSIC FADES OUT

CUT TO

SCENE 29

INT. DAY. OFFICE.

ACCOUNTANT'S

STATIC CAMERA. BARTLEBY walks from L.S. to M.S. THE DOOR OPENS. BARTLEBY APPEARS ON THE THRESHOLD BEHIND THE RECEPTIONIST WHO cont'd over... SCENE-29 (contd)

LETS HIM IN. HE APPROACHES SEEN FROM THE ACCOUNTANT'S POINT OF VIEW.

CUT TO

SCENE 30

INT. DAY. ACCOUNTANT'S OFFICE

C.U. FROM BELOW EYELINE. THE ACCOUNTANT LOOKS UP AT BARTLEBY. HE SMILES AN OFFICIAL SMILE.

CUT TO

SCENE 31

INT. DAY. ACCOUNTANT'S OFFICE

CAMERA TRACKS
TOWARD DESK with
BARTLEBY who is partly
IN FRAME.

WE SEE BARTLEBY APPROACHING
THE ACCOUNTANT WHO IS JUST
GETTING UP FROM BEHIND A DESK.
HE EXTENDS HIS HAND IN A
FRIENDLY MANNER, BARTLEBY'S
HAND COMES INTO FRAME AND SHAKES
THE ACCOUNTANT'S.

ACCOUNTANT: Good morning!
BARTLEBY: (MUMBLES UNINTELLI-GIBLY)

CUT TO

SCENE 32

INT. DAY. ACCOUNTANT'S OFFICE

CAMERA C.U. on handshake TRACKS BACK TO TWO-SHOT. With TRACK OR PAN measured and slow favour the ACCOUNTANT. THEY FINISH SHAKING HANDS AND SIT DOWN. ON THE EMPLOYER'S DESK THERE IS AN IN-OUT TRAY, A BLOTTER, A PEN IN A STAND, A CLOCK, AN INTERCOM UNIT. THE DESK IS NEAT. AS THE ACCOUNTANT SPEAKS, HE HAS THE HABIT OF STRAIGHTENING THE ALREADY STRAIGHT PAPERS IN FRONT OF HIM. BARTLEBY'S PRESENCE QUICKLY CASTS A SPELL OVER HIM WHICH MAKES THE INTERVIEW Cont'd over....

SCENE 32 (contd)

INCREASINGLY BIZARRE.
THE ACCOUNTANT SITS BACK
BEAMING.

ACCOUNTANT: So you're looking for a position as audit clerk with us. (THERE IS NO REPLY) Tell me, have you done this kind of work before? BARTLEBY: (QUIETLY) Yes. ACCOUNTANT: I see. Where have you worked before? BARTLEBY: I worked in the Post Office, in the dead letter section. ACCOUNTANT: Oh really? How interesting. I've often wondered what happens to letters that can't be delivered and can't be returned.

CUT TO

SCENE 33

INT. DAY. POST OFFICE DEAD LETTER SECTION.

C. U. STATIC.

BUNDLES OF LETTERS ARE STACKED READY TO BE INCINERATED. SOMEONE OPENS A FURNACE DOOR AND THROWS IN A BUNDLE.

ACCOUNTANT: (OFF) But what did this have to do with accounting?

CUT TO

SCENE 34

INT. DAY. ACCOUNTANT'S OFFICE.

M.S. OF ACCOUNTANT OVER BARTLEBY'S shoulder. CONTINUATION OF SCENE 32. -

BARTLEBY: Nothing. I was going to say I was then transferred to the Comptroller's department as an audit clerk.

ACCOUNTANT: Good. So you've had experience with accounts and bookkeeping.

SCENE 34 (contd)

BARTLEBY: I was an audit clerk.

CUT TO

SCENE 35

INT. DAY. OFFICE

M.S. TILT UP FROM his hands on the desk_fideling-to his face.

THE ACCOUNTANT LOOKS AT HIS NOTES AND PAPERS. HE FEELS THE INFLUENCE OF BARTLEBY. HE HAS NO REAL CONTACT WITH THE MAN IN FRONT OF HIM. IN EXERTING HIMSELF TO ACHIEVE IT, HE FAILS AND FEELS INCREAS-INGLY WEAKER. HE ENDS UP CONDUCTING AN INTERVIEW TO PROVE TO HIMSELF HE IS CONDUCT-ING AN INTERVIEW. IT IS A FORMALITY BECAUSE THE OUT-COME IS UNAVOIDABLE. THERE IS NO WAY NOT TO EMPLOY BARTLEBY.

ACCOUNTANT: Well, work here is on a smaller scale, although some of our larger clients require all our resources. (LOOKING UP) But tell me a little bit about your background.

DISSOLVE TO

SCENE 36

EXT. DAY. A PARK WITH STATUES

A LONG SLOW ZOOM
FROM M.S. of the
HOWITZER to a LONG
SHOT of the machine-gun
statue with BARTLEBY IN
FRAME.

WE HEAR THE INTERVIEW CONTINUE AS A VOICE OVER.

BARTLEBY: There's nothing much to tell. I put it all down in the application.

FADE OUT VOICE. FADE IN MUSIC.

WE SEE A STATUE OF A
HOWITZER, ITS BASE DECORATED
WITH SOLDIERS IN BAS RELIEF.
PULLING BACK, WE SEE THIS
cont'd over...

SCENE 36 (contd)

STATUE BECOME A SILHOUETTE, BARREL POINTING TO THE SKY. IN THE FOREGROUND WE SEE A STATUE OF A MACHINE-GUN, THE BARREL WREATHED WITH LAUREL. FINALLY BARTLEBY APPEARS IN FRAME, MOTIONLESS AND STARING.

FADE UNDER MUSIC. FADE IN VOICE

ACCOUNTANT: (VOICE OVER)
Perhaps we should discuss your salary.

FADE UP MUSIC.

CUT TO

SCENE 37

EXT. DAY. PARK

REVERSE ANGLE TRACK around statue until PICTURE COMPOSED THEN ZOOM TO THE EXTENT NECESSARY TO READ THE WRITING.

FROM THE REVERSE ANGLE WE TRACK AROUND THE STATUE UNTIL FACING AN 18TH CENTURY BUILD-ING WHOSE FACADE IS WRITTEN ON IN PAINT: "We are the writing on your wall". ON THE LEFT OF FRAME WE SEE THE MACHINE-GUN AND ON THE RIGHT BARTLEBY.

Fx AND MUSIC.

CUT TO

SCENE 38

INT. DAY. OFFICE

M.S. OF EACH (REVERSE ANGLES). BARTLEBY: The salary is not important. Anything reasonable will be alright

be alright.

ACCOUNTANT: Well, you must appreciate that here we expect an employee to stay on for a minimum period of time. It's no good to us if you disappear after a few months. If things work out, there's always the chance of something more senior, more permanent.

cont'd over....

SCENE 38 (contd)

BARTLEBY SEEMS TO NOD HIS HEAD. THE ACCOUNTANT GETS UP FEELING PLEASED WITH HAVING ALMOST CONCLUDED THE MATTER.

ACCOUNTANT: Do you think this job is your kettle of fish? Now take your time to answer.

CUT TO

SCENE 39

INT. DAY. OFFICE

CAMERA BEGINS IN
B. C. U. and TRACKS BACK
TO REVEAL THE REST OF
BARTLEBY.
C. U. 'S for cover of paper
coming out of the machine,
on feet under the desk, on
eyes.

L.S. PAN OFFICE BOY as he enters and again as he exits.

THE OFFICE BOY BURSTS IN, DROPS SOME POST ON THE SECRETARY'S DESK AND CHATS HER UP.

OFFICE BOY: Eloo, lovely. Gi'

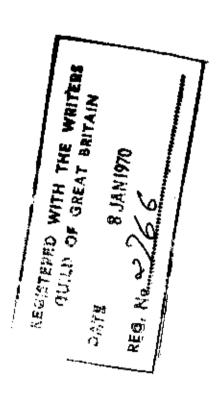

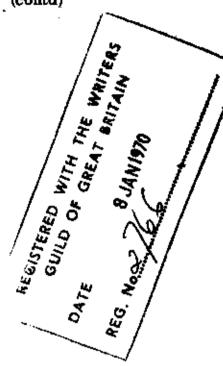

LIGHT FROM THE STREET GIVES SOME ILLUMINATION. A SLIGHT MOVEMENT IN THE SHADOW DRAWS OUR ATTENTION TO BARTLEBY'S OBSCURE FORM BEDDED DOWN UNDER THE STAIRS IN THE FOYER. MUSIC.

INT, DAY, PUBLIC LAVATORY IN THE BUILDING.

M.S. of BARTLEBY. PAN to capture CARETAKER's look. BARTLEBY IS SHAVING AT THE WASH-BASIN IN THE MEN'S LAVATORY. IN THE MIRROR WE SEE WHAT BARTLEBY SEES - A CARETAKER

COMES IN AND GOES TO THE URINALS, HE GIVES BARTLEBY A FUNNY LOOK, MUSIC.
