Language concepts and examples.

Synonyms: Words that have the same or nearly the same meaning.

raven and black

Antonyms: Words that have opposite meanings. mingle and separate

Homophones: Words that sound the same but may be spelled differently and have different meanings. would and wood: which and witch

Neologisms: New words that enter our vocabulary through extensive usage or for new inventions. bytes, silicon

Portmanteaus: New words formed by combining two existing words and omitting some of the letters.

breakfast + lunch = brunch; smoke + fog = smog

Acronyms: Words formed from initials of other words. NATO = North Atlantic Treaty Organization Euphemisms: A more pleasant sounding word used in place of a word with negative connotations.

administrative assistant instead of secretary

Oxymoron: Two contradictory words or ideas used together in a word or phrase.

jumbo shrimp; awfully good; plastic silverware

Regionalisms: Words associated with particular geographic regions.

couch or sofa; pop or soda; griddle cakes or pancakes

Puns: Humorous expressions that highlight the multiple meanings of a word or two words that sound alike.

Fruit flies like a banana.

Onomatopoeia: Words that sound like their meanings. Sploosh went the fish through the water!
